FEDERAL SURPLUS PROPERTY SUPPLIES AND SURPLUS OPERATIONS

Federal Surplus Property for Small Business Administration 8(a) Program Participants

The Small Business Administration's (SBA's) 8(a) Business Development Program is intended to help small businesses be successful for the future.

Eligible 8(a) Program Participants may receive surplus Federal personal property from State Agencies for Surplus Property (SASPs) to be used in the normal conduct of business activities.

In order to receive surplus Federal personal property, the 8(a) Program Participant must:

- 1. Submit a completed Federal Surplus Property Application.
- 2. Certify in writing to the SASP that it is eligible to receive Federal surplus personal property;
- 3. Inform the SASP of its servicing SBA Field Office;
- 4. Identify the intended use of the surplus property and indicate that this proposed use is consistent with the objectives of its business plan;
- 5. Agree in writing that it will:
 - Use the property in the normal conduct of business activities or be liable for the fair rental value from the date of its receipt;
 - Not sell or transfer the property to any party other than the Federal Government during its participation in the 8(a) Program and for one year after it leaves the Program;
 - At its own expense, return the property to the SASP or transfer it to another Participant if directed to do so by SBA because it has not used the property as intended within one year of receipt;
 - Be liable to the Federal Government for the established fair market value or sale price, whichever is greater, of the property sold or transferred, should it breach its agreement not to sell or transfer the property; and
 - Allow SBA to inspect the property and all records pertaining to it.
