You DO NOT qualify for unemployment benefits 5

Dear Anthony Claimant,

We have completed a review and investigation of your claim for unemployment benefits referenced above. We have determined that you were discharged because of unsatisfactory work performance.

Your employer's expectations were reasonable, based on your proven abilities and previous work performance. You had been warned about your work, and did not provide good cause for your unsatisfactory performance. Your last day of work was 01/10/2025.

The information we have shows your separation from INSURANCE ADV ALT does **NOT** meet Pennsylvania Unemployment Compensation Law 402(e) requirements for receipt of benefits. 6 This means that **you do NOT qualify for unemployment benefits**. This disqualification is effective **01/05/2025**.

Pursuant to section 401(f) of the Law, this disqualification remains in effect until the claimant has earned, subsequent to the disqualifying separation identified in this determination, remuneration for services in an amount equal to or in excess of six (6) times his or her weekly benefit rate in "employment" as defined in this act. You have the right to appeal this determination.

You have 21 days from the determination date on this letter to file an appeal. This means your **appeal must be received or postmarked by 03/18/2025.** (8)

Late appeals are accepted, but an Appeals Referee will decide if your reason for filing late is acceptable before the rest of your case will be considered. Appeal instructions are included on the second page of the determination. If you receive more than one disqualifying determination, you need to file a separate appeal for each one.
