- Advised on April 14th he represented the SVC at the Military Association of America luncheon.
- Met with federal legislators in DC and advocated for the Richard Starr Act.
- Signed three Educational Gratuities for a total of \$23,000.00
- Announced SVC will host the organization Clearing House for Family Readiness at the September meeting for a brief presentation.
- Repeated the Japan NHP Broadcasting Corp will be sending a filming crew to the U.S. and will be in PA in search of Veterans who survived the Battle of Saipan as part of the 80th anniversary. Asking if any of their service organizations were able to find a veteran.

DAG-OVA briefed on the following: She reminded the commission members to save the date for the VetCon meeting in September in Pittsburgh; and the agenda for the conference will follow soon.

DMVA Policy, Planning, and Legislation

Mr. Durand

Mr. Durand briefed members on the following:

- Reported SB 973-veterans of armed forces benefits for separation, HB1627-veteran benefits at the workplace, HR1532-veteran discounts at state parks are moving out of committee
- Resolutions: 404-PA Legislators supporting Richard Starr Act and 415 supporting Armed Forces Day.
- Informed members about National Guard Day at the Capitol with the theme of: together we serve, past, present and future.

DMVA Bureau of Homes

Mr Davis

Mr. Davis briefed members on the following:

• Reported BVH learned that many veterans are unaware of DMVA-BVH homes existence, and that they are available to spouses. In fact, the homes have a 80-85% female occupancy.

- Veterans were aware that they can keep \$450.00 a month from their Medicare unlike other private nursing homes that only let residents have \$45.00 per month.
- BVH is still experiencing staffing issues. However, care is still outstanding.
- BVH is moving to hire a full-time medical physician, and to have two full-time nurse practitioners on each campus.
- Announced the annual TAG Fishing Derby.
- Announced the upcoming Veterans Homes carnivals in the week of June 10 to 15.

Questions/Discussion

Mr. Googins asked about veteran denials at the homes if it was over staffing issues.

Mr. Davis said they experience about 10 denials per month, but it is over various reasons such as violent behavior issues, felonies and psychiatric issues that pose an extreme challenge for staff. However, BVH is filling their beds with eligible veterans.

Question over TEAMS: Is there an age requirement for the homes?

Mr. Davis, no requirement for age.

DMVA Bureau of PIRO Mr. Mutschler

Mr. Mutschler briefed on the following:

- DMVA Digest now focused more on department with inputs from across the agency.
- The Shapiro Administration awarded \$800.000 through the DMVA Veterans Trust Fund to support veterans' initiatives, County VA Offices, veteran food programs, transportation, and service dogs.
- DMVA had over 5000 veteran interactions, over 300 outreach events, over 2000 referrals to PA VETConnect partners since July 1, 2023.
- Virtual VEAC on May 7-9 offering 1-on-1 assistance for VA health care, benefits, education, disability claims, toxic exposure concerns, mental health support, and burial options.
- Program Highlights: Education Gratuity increased 372 ytd a 27% increase. RETX over 1K per year for past 4 years, over 19K on RETX with an estimated \$57.14M in exemptions to disabled veterans and surviving spouses.

- VISN 4 had a performance rating of 94 out of a 100 (were top rated) which can be contributed to their focus on decision making.
- VISN 4 enrolled 400,000 new veterans into VA healthcare a 30% increase.
- Congressional hearings ongoing for the budget with the VA secretary which should be resolved soon.
- Directed members attention to a public facing webpage regarding the implement of the PACT Act.

Vice Chairwoman Snavely was unable to present so Mr. Googins presented what Ms. Snavely wrote regarding the MAL committee:

The Committee is in the process of reviewing our recommended changes and updates for the Member-at-Large SOP, Candidate Evaluation Guide, and scoring sheets to improve the process prior to the next round of open Member-at-Large positions.

Questions/Discussions

Mr. Googins asked a question separate from the MAL committee. Mr. Googins asked about the inconsistent dates from time of expiration to date of assignment with the home's advisory councils. Mr. Durand then explained that even at the expiration date the advisory council member remains until replaced. Mr. Durand further explained it is done this way, so the positions and terms don't change.

Transportation Committee

Mr. David Gui, DAV Adjutant, reported on behalf of committee chairman Mr. Hines:

- Statistics as of March 2024: 311 volunteers, volunteering hours 4,837, miles traveled 114,970 and 2047 veterans transported.
- 12 new vans were purchased.
- Applied for \$100,000 with the VTF

Chairman Taylor the committee needs to address the reutilization or apportionment of vehicles targeting the vehicles at the most highly trafficked locations so that some vehicles are sitting around unused. Mr. Gui agreed.

Mr. Hollenbeck briefed the members on the new direction in conjunction with DMVA how better to utilize the funding of the grant cycle.

- The VSO recipients met a few weeks ago with DMVA staff to discuss changing the grant contract from a single year contract to a multi-year contract or changing the performance period. The reason for this request is to eliminate a gap in funding that currently takes place between July through approximately September/October. Currently some of the organizations must take out a loan to cover the VSO costs until they get the grant funds and by changing to either a multi-year contract or moving the performance period from July-June to Jan-December they are hoping this would prevent them from having to take out a loan.
- DMVA Executive Secretary Mr. Marc Ferraro stated that he is currently working through this with Legal to make it work.

Questions/Discussions

Chairman Taylor stated the VSO Grant Committee needs a motion from the commission to move forward on this new way to budget the VSO grants. Chairman Taylor called on Mr. Hollenbeck to make a motion on changing how the VTF funds the VSO grants with multi-year contracts to Jan-Dec.

Mr. Johnson stated that he had recently been at a meeting at the Philadelphia VA Medical Center and one of the main topics was the inaccuracy of filling out the death certificates of veterans not placing on the death certificate service-related causes or contributions to the death, thus causing the spouse to not receive the benefits so entitled.

Chairman Taylor offered that maybe VSOs could be better briefed and able to inform the spouse about ensuring the service-connected disabilities are on the death certificate as a contributor to the death.

DAG mentioned it is difficult to get the death certificate amended.

Mr. Durand introduced Ms. Sara Herr as a new member of PPL. She will be working on identifying issues and designing solutions.





Problem Statement



How does OVA increase capacity, provide necessary outreach and flexibility through staff reorganization and realignment to meet the demands of its current mission set?

- ✓ The complexity of today's changing environment requires organizations to be flexible and agile to meet the demanding needs of its customers.
 - Building trust through leadership, empowerment and the delivery of quality services provides for that flexibility.
 - OVA does not possess the organizational structure to be able to manage the multitude of functions it is responsible for and plan for future programs, provide proper oversight, conduct program assessment or provide for staff development.


Lessons Learned



- ✓ Communication is key it needs to flow openly both up and down, between leadership, employees, residents, families and supporting organizations
- ✓ Leadership guidance needs to be clear, concise and from the leadership top down.
- ✓ Fact gathering from all perspectives should be presented to leadership.
- ✓ An organizational structure that is rigid with too many supervisory layers (span of control) and not enough input from subject matter experts can cause miscommunication and misdirection.
- ✓ Guidance from outside regulating agencies can be conflicting.
- ✓ Agency training should be made a priority

Current OVA Org Structure










Long Term Care



- ✓ Elevate Division Business Operations to a Bureau level office (Division Chief already at appropriate pay grade)
- ✓ Create the Bureau of Facility Management that overseas all facility issues for the homes the homes have unique facility requirements, and this allows for those requirements to be met (Facility Manager already at appropriate pay grade)
- ✓ There would be no costs associated with these moves as the structure already exists but is not formalized

Proposed Long Term Care Org








Veteran Services



- ✓ Establishes the Executive Office for Veteran Services
 - Executive Director
 - GAV-VS
 - SV0
 - Administrative Assistant
- ✓ Bureau of Programs This Bureau is responsible for the management of state-run veterans' benefit programs that are enacted by law or mandated through Executive Orders (Act 66, Transportation, RETEX, etc.) It will also have SMEs that will manage and run programs in the following areas:
 - Division of State Benefits: VTA, MFRAP, RETX, BVP, APVP, Etc)TAP, Enhanced Yellow Ribbon, Justice, Vet Courts, VSUs
 - Division of Outreach/Reintegration Programs: Mental Health Programs, Employment, Education, Homelessness, Transpiration, etc.
 - Division of Training: Provides training programs for partners
- Bureau of Outreach and Reintegration This Bureau is responsible for outreach services and reintegration to veterans and other governmental and non-governmental agencies. Regional offices currently under Veterans Service Programs will fold into this Bureau.
 - Consist of regionally placed multi-functional teams
 - Each Region will have the following
 - A Regional Director
 - A VSO that will focus on outreach to attend functions within the community and interact with partners (VetConnect)
 - A VSO that will focus on reintegration
 - SME on (Homelessness, Employment, Education, Mental Health, Transportation)
- ✓ Bureau of Analysis & Initiatives— This Bureau will conduct data analysis and focus on the development of new programs for the Department. It will not be limited to programs funded by the Department, but also programs that we can participate in with other partners in and out of Government. They will have SMEs in Homelessness, Employment, Education, Mental Health, Transportation. The Grants Team will fall under this Division as well.







We build relationships that amplify service to the SMVF community

- Region 1 RPOC was made aware that the Vietnam veterans gas line was not fixed due to the underground utilities not being marked correctly. Upon talk to the Vet, given his hospice situation and how much pain he is in, he told RPOC he was done trying with anything anymore. RPOC sent her husband and another Veteran over to check on him and if it wasn't for that visit, the Vet confirmed he was going to end his life. RPOC & her husband have checked on him daily, taking him dinner, and her husband fixed the gas line 5/9. RPOC will be making frequent visits until veteran's end of life.
- Region 2 Planned MVP enrollment at a VLP Military Food Share event, organized the Breaking Bread event in Erie, and initiated virtual VTA training for Service Navigators at VLP.
- Region 3 Enhanced cross-state collaboration with NY and WV VAMCs serving PA Veterans. Will work state travel requests for RPOCs to facilitate meetings at these locations.
- Region 4 –RPOC was referred a PANG service member who recently lost their home in a house fire and is going through a difficult custody issue with ex-spouse. RPOC was able to connect the service member to Helping Heroes NEPA, who provided the service member and kids food, clothing, and toiletries. This connection then allowed another organization, Fight4Vets, to learn about his story, and they are now holding a fundraiser to house him in a hotel until he can return. RPOC referred the service member to the PANG SFRS, who is helping him acquire a lawyer to deal with child custody issues and insurance issues.
- Region 5 Presented PA VETConnect to AMVETS DSOs, coordinated a meeting with Erie Reentry services, and arranged support for a training session with Perry County VA Director and Lebanon VAMC.









DISABLED VETERANS' REAL ESTATE TAX EXEMPTION







Leadership Update

Patient Experience Update- Trust

VISN 4 has consistently received the highest trust score in the nation at 94.7% and continues to trend up. Our network also has the highest number of compliments at 79.1% and the lowest number of concerns at 10.8%.

Other Than Honorable Discharge Rule Changes

The Department of Veterans Affairs on April 26, 2024, <u>posted a final rule</u> amending its regulations regarding character of discharge determinations, expanding access to VA care and benefits for some former service members discharged under other than honorable conditions or by special court-martial.

When former service members with other than honorable discharges and bad conduct discharges (adjudged at special court-martial) apply for VA benefits and services, we carefully review their records to determine if we can provide them the requested care and benefits.

This process helps ensure that VA can provide services to deserving former service members – including certain individuals who faced discrimination, survived sexual assault or harassment, struggled with their mental or physical health, or faced other challenges while serving in the military.

VA's new regulation will expand access to care and benefits for certain former service members by:

- Eliminating the regulatory bar for "homosexual acts involving aggravating circumstances or other factors affecting the performance of duty" as a bar to benefits.
- Creating a "compelling circumstances exception" for certain former service members
- Opening the door for previously denied service members to reapply for benefits.

VA encourages former service members with other than honorable discharges and bad conduct discharges (adjudged at special court-martial) to apply for VA care and benefits today. Over the past 10 years, VA's eligibility determination rate for these former service members has been 75% – meaning that VA provided care or benefits to 75% of them (57,000+ former service members).

The final rule becomes effective June 25, 2024. VA is currently developing policy guidance for claims processors to be issued coincident with the effective date of the final rule.

"Closer to Me" Cancer Moonshot Effort

As a part of the Biden Cancer Moonshot, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced on April 25, 2024, an <u>expansion of its Close to Me cancer care program</u>. This expansion will bring new cancer diagnosis, treatment, and surveillance services to an additional 9,000 Veterans and 30 locations by the end of October 2025.

Under this program, VA clinicians travel to provide Veterans with the full continuum of cancer care at nearby community-based outpatient clinics, often in rural locations. This reduces the need for Veterans to travel to medical centers for cancer care, affording Veterans and their caregivers more time to go about their daily lives and focus on healing. It also allows more Veterans to utilize VA care, which is proven to be the best care in America for Veterans.

PACT Act Update

The PACT Act is the biggest expansion of Veteran health care and benefits in generations, making it so the millions of Veterans who fought our wars – who breathed in debris from sandstorms, fumes from burning trash, chemicals like Agent Orange and more while overseas – are taken care of for the conditions that followed them home from war.

"Memorial May" Activities

Between now and Memorial Day, May 27, the Department of Veterans Affairs will participate in a 20,000-mile nationwide march across the United States with 214,000 volunteers honoring our nation's Veterans, service members and families.

The annual partnership between <u>Carry The Load</u> and VA's National Cemetery Administration supports rallies at 32 VA national cemeteries covering 20,000 miles along five separate routes across 48 states. Teams will walk throughout the 'Memorial May' campaign, converging on Memorial Day weekend for a final rally in Dallas, Texas. View the full list of NCA national cemeteries and the dates and times of Carry the Load marches.

VA national cemeteries will be open for visitors from sunrise to sunset every day of the Memorial Day weekend. Families are encouraged to visit on any day – not just Memorial Day – and place flowers or flags on their Veteran's grave.

We welcome members of the public to join us as we honor Veterans and servicemembers with the solemn dignity and respect they have earned through their service and sacrifice.

Ceremonies will consist of a wreath laying, moment of silence, the playing of taps, speeches, and other patriotic activities where all are welcome.

Ending Homelessness among Veterans

The VA has taken aggressive action to combat Veteran homelessness. In calendar year 2023 <u>VA permanently housed 46,552 homeless Veterans, exceeding its goal to house 38,000 by 22.5%.</u>

<u>VA announced its 2024 goals</u> in support of its efforts to prevent and end Veteran homelessness on March 14, 2024.

Specifically, in fiscal year 2024, VA will:

- Place at least 41,000 Veterans experiencing homelessness into permanent housing.
- Ensure that at least 95% of the Veterans housed in FY 2024 do not return to homelessness during the year.
- Engage with at least 40,000 unsheltered Veterans to help them obtain housing and other wraparound services.

As of March 31, 2024:

- 22,507 Veterans have been permanently housed, representing 54.9% of the goal. VA is on track to meet this goal at the end of the year.
- 98.2% of the Veterans housed so far have remained in housing. 414 Veterans have returned to homelessness, representing 1.8% of the Veterans housed.
 VA is monitoring this goal closely to ensure that Veterans stay housed or are re-engaged by VA services if they return to homelessness.
- 21,156 unsheltered Veterans have been engaged, representing 52.9% of the goal. VA is on track to meet this goal at the end of the year.

Ending Veteran homelessness is a top priority of VA and the entire Biden Administration. Thanks in part to VA's efforts, the number of Veterans experiencing homelessness <u>has fallen by nearly 5% since early 2020 and by more than 52% since</u> 2010.

We all have a part to play in ending Veteran homelessness. There are many ways that Americans can help end Veteran homelessness:

- If you are a Veteran who is homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness, call the National Call Center for Homeless Veterans at 877-424-3838 for assistance. It is staffed 24/7 with trained counselors who can talk with you right now and connect you with your nearest VA for help.
- If you are a landlord or housing provider with housing units, rent to Veterans participating in VA homeless programs.
- o If you are a business owner, hire homeless and formerly homeless Veterans.

HRO (High Reliability Organization) Highlight- Coatesville VAMC

One of VHA's seven HRO values is "It's About the Veteran." Recently, a Veterans Transport Service Motor Vehicle Operator (VTS MVO) at the Coatesville VAMC exhibited "It's About the Veteran" during an interaction with a transfer to dialysis.

VTS MVO Brooklyn Anderson was transporting a veteran to dialysis for a treatment. Brooklyn is a PA National Guard with the 2nd 104 Calvary Scout and was deployed with the Composite Truck company into Kuwait and Iraq. Brooklyn had a great relationship with the veteran as the veteran was also a PA National Guard solider and they were both 88M motor transportation operators. Brooklyn and the veteran often shared stories about Fort Indiantown Gap, a military base in Lebanon PA, and comparisons of their military experience - differences between meals, gear, vehicles, and weapons throughout the years. She transported him multiple times a week, from his hotel residence to his dialysis treatments.

On this day, Brooklyn noticed the veteran was delayed with his greeting. The greeting was different and not as exciting as usual. This was not their normal interaction. The veteran was not up and smiling, waiting for Brooklyn's arrival as usual. As she was standing next to the veteran, she asked how he was doing and if he was ok. The veteran was complaining that his stomach hurt and thought he had food poisoning.

Brooklyn asked the veteran what he ate to see if she could provide additional assistance.

The veteran requested that Brooklyn help him to stand as was unable to stand on his own and was experiencing severe knee pain. Another hotel resident, who was a medic, tried to help without success. The resident also shared that she had given him some food earlier. Immediately following this conversation, the veteran fell back onto the chair and lost consciousness. Brooklyn immediately went into action to help the veteran, instructing the front desk personnel to call 911. Brooklyn moved the veteran to the floor safely and immediately initiated cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Brooklyn continued to administer the lifesaving procedures for what seemed like an extended period as she, the hotel resident, and staff anxiously awaited paramedics. There was an extensive delay with the paramedic's arrival as the ambulance went to the wrong hotel location. Brooklyn continued CPR until the paramedics arrived and took over. While the paramedics were working on the veteran, Brooklyn called the VTS office to inform her supervisor of what took place. She asked to confirm any medical changes in the veteran's chart for the paramedics since the veteran was unresponsive. Ms. Anderson's quick response and attention to detail allowed her to stabilize the veteran until he was transported to the local emergency room for continued care. Brooklyn's actions saved the veterans life. Her actions are a true illustration of ICARE values and the HRO principle, 'It's About the Veteran'.



Order of Precedence: The PA VSA will be worn after the First Sergeant Ribbon and before the PA MG Thomas R. White Jr Ribbon

Subsequent Awards: Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster; Sixth Award will be Silver Oak Leaf Cluster.
