6 at 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session
7 with Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, for
8 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial
9 deliberations and to receive advice of counsel. The
10 Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.]

11 ***

12 [Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the
13 Board met in Executive Session and conducted quasi-
14 judicial deliberations.

15 Ms. O'Malley also informed everyone that the
16 meeting was being recorded, and voluntary
17 participation constituted consent to be recorded.]

18 ***

19 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
20 Architects Licensure Board was held on Tuesday, March
21 28, 2023. Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, called the
22 meeting to order at 10:35 a.m.

23 ***

24 Introduction of Board Members

25 [President Roller requested an introduction of Board

1 members.]

3 Approval of minutes of the January 12, 2023, meeting

4 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

15 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

Are there any other corrections? Mr.

21 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

Report of Prosecutorial Division

8

[Angela L. Solomon, Esquire, Board Prosecution

9

Liaison, had nothing substantial to report from the

10

prosecution division and yielded her time for the

11

hearing at 11 a.m. and the American Institute of

12

Architects Pennsylvania (AIA) Pennsylvania but

13

offered to answer any questions.]

14

15

Report of Board Counsel

16

[Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted

17

general revisions would be discussed later during the

18

meeting.

19

President Roller provided a background regarding

20

the rolling clock regulation, where over the past 10

21

years, the National Council of Architectural

22

Registration Boards that administers the Architect

23

Registration Examination (ARE) had a rule in place

24

that once someone takes the first exam, they have 5

25

years to complete all of them. He noted anyone who

1 does not complete all of them would lose at least the
2 first test and would keep going and that it is
3 mirrored in the Board's regulations.

4 President Roller stated NCARB announced in the
5 spring they are removing the clock and are going to
6 regulate the exam differently. He noted currently
7 being in their exam 5.0, the fifth edition of the
8 ARE.

9 President Roller explained that NCARB decided
10 that anybody who took an exam under the previous
11 exam, ARE 4.0, would remain valid as they go through
12 5.0, and when NCARB eventually switches to the next
13 version, which is 6.0, portions passed under the 4.0
14 exam would no longer have credit. He noted there
15 would be enough warning time between the announcement
16 so anybody could catch up, but the Board should be in
17 synch with NCARB.

18 Ms. O'Malley stated the rolling clock requirement
19 is codified in their regulation at § 9.46, and
20 suggested the Board remove § 9.46(b) about the rolling
21 clock requirement and leave everything else the way
22 it is because § 9.41a.(b) language states that
23 candidates shall comply with examination procedures,
24 conduct standards, and standards pertaining to
25 eligibility and passing of the ARE as established by

1 NCARB unless otherwise stated in this chapter.

2 Ms. O'Malley noted the Board could simply rely on
3 that language and leave it as it is or add subsection
4 (c) to that section as well to say, candidates must
5 pass all divisions of the ARE. She noted a pass/fail
6 division would remain valid throughout the delivery
7 of the exam version under which it was taken, as well
8 as the next version of the exam, which is the new
9 system NCARB would be operating under.

10 President Roller mentioned that agreeing with the
11 second option puts the Board in same boat they are
12 now, which is mirroring what NCARB does and including
13 that in their regulations.

14 Ms. O'Malley suggested adding something similar
15 to what is currently at the last line of the rolling
16 clock requirements that would allow the Board to
17 waive it to read, the Board may waive this
18 requirement upon proof of medical hardship or other
19 extraordinary circumstance.]

20 MS. O'MALLEY:

21 I would be looking for a motion to send
22 this regulation with that additional
23 section we added to § 9.41a and do an
24 exposure draft.

25 MS. MCCLLENAGHAN:

1 I'll make a motion to approve as
2 amended and send an exposure draft.

3 MR. PILIGIAN:

4 I'll second it.

5 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

6 I have a motion and a second. Ms.
7 McClenaghan, would you call the roll,
8 please?

9
10 Mr. Roller, yes; Mr. Bates, yes; Mr.
11 Burns, yes; Mr. Johns, aye; Ms.
12 McClenaghan, yes; Mr. Piligian, yes.

13 [The motion carried unanimously.]

14 ***

15 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, commented that the
16 change would go through the regulatory process and
17 asked whether the Board could make a blanket
18 statement that it is the intent of the Board to waive
19 the rolling clock in accordance with the practice
20 adopted by NCARB.

21 Ms. O'Malley explained the Board could note it to
22 be a hardship on their applicant to have to continue
23 following the 5-year rolling clock requirement and
24 could waive the requirement in their regulation as
25 that requirement rolls over into the new requirement.

1 She explained the Board could make a motion to find
2 a hardship and waive this requirement while they work
3 on their regulatory package.]

4 MS. MCCLLENAGHAN:

5 I'll make a motion.

6 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

7 Motion. Do I have a second?

8 MR. PILIGIAN:

9 Second.

10 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

11 Ms. McClenaghan, please call the roll.

12

13 Mr. Roller, yes; Mr. Bates, yes; Mr.
14 Burns, yes; Mr. Johns, aye; Ms.

15 McClenaghan, yes; Mr. Piligian, yes.

16 [The motion carried unanimously.]

17

18 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, informed Ms. Harris
19 that the vote would allow her to notify NCARB the
20 Board has waived the rolling clock requirement
21 temporarily until they change their regulations.]

22

23 Miscellaneous - Appointment - American Institute of
24 Architects Pennsylvania Update

25 [Stephen M. Swarney, JD, Executive Director, American

1 Institute of Architects Pennsylvania, asked whether
2 the Board could provide something to AIA for their
3 members regarding the rolling clock changes.

4 Ms. O'Malley offered to send the information to
5 Ms. Mahrouki.

6 President Roller explained the Board's recent
7 actions were that they agreed to change the
8 regulations but waive the current regulations in the
9 meantime, where the eligibility for exams under the
10 new NCARB rule taking effect May 1 would be effective
11 in Pennsylvania as well.

12 Mr. Swarney thanked the Board and commented that
13 it would be good news for their younger and emerging
14 professionals and good news for AIA National because
15 they put them on their list of states where there
16 would be impediments and could now report to them
17 that the issue has been solved in record time.

18 Mr. Swarney informed Board members that Ms.
19 Mahrouki is preparing to attend the third meeting
20 with the group representing interior designers in the
21 hopes of compromising on some sort of language. He
22 noted prior Board discussion and speaking with the
23 AIA Government Affairs Committee, along with a small
24 group of members, to negotiate and attend some
25 meetings with the interior designers and would report

1 any results at the next Board meeting.

2 Mr. Swarney stated things are currently more
3 settled in the legislature as far as the parties in
4 charge and that AIA is working on several different
5 pieces of legislation that are carryovers, including
6 the Statute of Repose Bill and indemnification.

7 Mr. Swarney also noted AIA is looking at
8 affordable housing and greener communities and is
9 putting out information for members and legislators.

10 He mentioned that AIA would be restarting their
11 Shaking Up Small Cities series and putting a
12 spotlight on certain communities to see how they are
13 developing their downtown area and confronting some
14 of the important issues in society, including
15 affordable housing and sustainability.

16 Mr. Swarney mentioned that AIA is preparing for a
17 convention, noting Maureen Guttman did a lot of
18 really good work for the profession on the Review and
19 Advisory Council for codes and was elevated by the
20 College of Fellows.

21 Mr. Swarney stated AIA is reaching out to members
22 throughout the state who may want to try to attain
23 membership into the College of Fellows and is working
24 with Pittsburgh and Philadelphia get the word out
25 about getting Pennsylvania more fellows.

1 Mr. Swarney announced AIA's Architects Action Day
2 is in April but would be a little different this
3 year, noting AIA is not inviting all of their members
4 and only their leadership, board, and people on their
5 committees to have more targeted meetings.

6 Mr. Swarney mentioned that the AIA family
7 experienced a great loss recently with the passing of
8 the executive director of AIA New Jersey, Joseph
9 Simonetta. He stated Pennsylvania worked closely
10 with New Jersey on definitions and bills and would
11 continue that relationship forward.

12 President Roller asked whether an initiative from
13 the Board would be helpful regarding the adoption of
14 continuing education and where they are with that.

15 Mr. Swarney commented that it would be helpful
16 and that AIA wants to be respectful of the process of
17 what they started with interior designers, where AIA
18 is not going to push anything further until they see
19 if something could be worked out, including. He
20 mentioned that continuing education and whatever
21 happens with interior designers should be two
22 separate issues and that AIA stands ready to push
23 that issue forward with legislation that they have
24 had for years.

25 Mr. Swarney explained that AIA is simply holding

1 off until they see what happens and explained that
2 something like that would either be part of something
3 or they would introduce that with some champions on
4 their own in the House and Senate. He noted that it
5 would be one of their issues for action day to remind
6 the legislators that they are one of very few
7 professions in the country that do not have
8 continuing education.

9 President Roller asked AIA to let the Board know,
10 so the Board could reconsider that at their meeting,
11 noting the Board would hopefully be willing by then
12 and request that from the legislature.

13 Mr. Piligian asked Mr. Swarney to explain the
14 email he received from AIA Pennsylvania concerning an
15 invitation to access applications within their
16 organization.

17 Mr. Swarney explained that AIA is in the process
18 of changing over their internal system from Google to
19 Microsoft 365 and are working with an information
20 technology (IT) consultant to be more secure and
21 accessible for staff and members. He informed Board
22 members that the email is legitimate and that
23 Microsoft sent emails out to everyone on AIA's
24 directory inviting them to be a recognized member in
25 their 365 system.

1 Mr. Swarney explained that that AIA currently
2 does not have a chance to reiterate information to
3 members because they cannot send emails until someone
4 is either part of their system on the backend or
5 someone accepts it on the front end but is working on
6 a solution that would eliminate that. He further
7 explained that Microsoft sent the email without AIA
8 having a chance to message it or put their names on
9 it.]

10

11 [A Formal Hearing was held from 11:03 a.m. until
12 11:51 a.m. in the Matter of the Initial Application
13 for a License by Reciprocity of Yang Chai, Case No.
14 22-41-016971.]

19 at 11:54 a.m. the Board entered into Executive
20 Session with Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board
21 Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial
22 deliberations and to receive advice of counsel. The
23 Board returned to open session at 12:29 p.m.]

24 MS. O'MALLEY:

1 discussions in Executive Session, I

5 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

6 Do I have a motion?

7 MR. BATES:

8 I will make that motion.

9 MR. PILIGIAN:

10 Second.

11 MS. MCCLENAGHAN:

12 Mr. Roller, yes; Mr. Bates, yes; Mr.
13 Burns, yes; Mr. Johns, no; Ms.
14 McClenaghan, no; Mr. Piligian, yes.

15 [The motion carried. Michael Johns and Mary
16 McClenaghan opposed the motion.]

17 ***

18 Report of Board Counsel - Thomas Jefferson University
19 Integrated Path to Architectural Licensure (IPAL)
20 Letter Review

21 [Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed
22 the Integrated Path to Architectural Licensure (IPAL)
23 from Thomas Jefferson University, noting the Board
24 were all in favor of their proposal at the prior
25 meeting. She mentioned that she would be making a

1 couple of grammatical edits and would send that to
2 Jefferson University on the Board's behalf.]

3

4 Report of Board Counsel - Sunshine Act Presentation
5 [Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided
6 an overview of the Sunshine Act, noting the purpose
7 of the Sunshine Act is the right of the public to be
8 present at all meetings of agencies and to witness
9 deliberations, policy formulation, and the decision-
10 making that is vital to the enhancement and
11 functioning of the democratic process and that
12 secrecy in public affairs undermines the faith of the
13 public in government.

14 Ms. O'Malley explained that meetings must be open
15 to the public with public notice when making
16 decisions and taking official action. She noted
17 public notice of meetings is placed in a newspaper,
18 posted within their building and on the Board's
19 website at least 24 hours in advance of a meeting.
20 She also noted the agenda is available at the meeting
21 as well in paper form.

22 Ms. O'Malley stated all matters being discussed
23 and deliberated on are listed on each agenda. She
24 noted all votes are publicly cast so that everyone in
25 the public is fully aware of the Board's actions.

1 She mentioned that the meetings are recorded and
2 minutes are taken at all Board meetings.

3 Ms. O'Malley stated executive sessions and
4 conferences are exceptions to the public portion of
5 meetings. She reminded Board members that they
6 cannot deliberate on any information before the Board
7 meeting or when attending conferences. She also
8 addressed executive sessions, where Board members can
9 discuss personnel issues, receive legal advice from
10 counsel on litigation issues, and conduct quasi-
11 judicial deliberations on matters that are pending
12 before the board, but official action must be taken
13 in public session. She also noted executive session
14 may not be used as subterfuge to defeat the purpose
15 of the Sunshine Act.

16 Ms. O'Malley explained that legal challenges to
17 the Sunshine Act have to be filed within 30 days of
18 the violation or within 30 days of discovery of the
19 violation. She noted there could be criminal
20 consequences to violations and official actions may
21 become invalid, along with having to pay attorney
22 fees.

23 Ms. O'Malley stated Board business has to be
24 conducted in open meetings, and board members should
25 not discuss agency business, especially executive

1 session matters, outside of an official Board
2 meeting.

3 Ms. O'Malley addressed mandatory recusals, where
4 a Board member had a prosecutorial role, including
5 Probable Cause Screening Committee matters or a
6 financial interest. She addressed strongly suggested
7 recusals, where there is a personal affection or
8 outside knowledge and a member cannot make an
9 unbiased determination. She noted that discretionary
10 recusals are when a Board member cannot hear and
11 dispose of the case or participate in a decision on a
12 subject fairly and without prejudice. She encouraged
13 Board members to ask counsel if they have questions
14 about whether to recuse.]

15 ***

16 Report of Board Counsel - General Revisions
17 [Ariel E. O'Malley, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided
18 the current version of the general revisions package
19 for the Board's discussion.

20 President Roller asked whether there were any
21 comments concerning page 1 and 2 of general
22 revisions.

23 Ms. O'Malley referred to § 9.27 regarding
24 inactive records and asked whether the Board was
25 talking about application. She noted the records are

1 not actually destroyed because they are in the
2 Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) and suggested
3 changing language to expire instead of destroying and
4 Board members agreed.

5 President Roller asked whether there were any
6 comments concerning page 4, 5, and 6.

7 Ms. McClenaghan referred to § 9.46, where the
8 applicant can apply directly to NCARB to sit for the
9 ARE and asked whether that was the correct process
10 and if they were relinquishing their rights. She
11 mentioned that it came up a few years ago because
12 NCARB was just processing them, and the Board should
13 have been processing them.

14 Ms. Harris explained that they apply to NCARB,
15 but the eligibility has to be opened up by the Board
16 to confirm they have the National Architectural
17 Accrediting Board (NAAB) degree and also ask them to
18 confirm their home and work addresses.

19 Ms. McClenaghan referred to § 9.46(b)(1), where
20 it says, shall submit a written statement from the
21 applicant describing the applicant's professional
22 experience from each of the applicants' employers or
23 supervisors and asked whether they should include
24 that the employers or supervisors should be
25 registered architects because they cannot just get a

1 letter from anybody. She stated it implies that they
2 could receive the letter from anybody they are
3 working with.

4 President Rolled explained that it is for
5 somebody who does not hold a NAAB degree.

6 Ms. Harris commented that the Board does require
7 the reference forms that they submit have to be
8 signed and sealed by an architect.

9 Ms. O'Malley suggested the addition of employing
10 or supervising architect, and the Board agreed.

11 President Roller referred to page 7, where
12 applicants who do not hold a degree from an NCARB
13 program must complete and suggested it read,
14 additional practical experience in the employ of or
15 under an architect as listed in § 9.41 beyond an
16 Architectural Experience Program (AXP), where those
17 who have a bachelor's degree, they need another 3
18 years or associate degree, another 6 years.

19 President Roller noted it to read, after Board
20 discussion, additional practical experience in the
21 employ of or under the direct supervision of a
22 registered architect beyond AXP requirements as
23 listed in § 9.41.

24 President Roller referred to page 8 under meets
25 the requirements of § 9.41(a), § 9.41(b), or

1 § 9.41(c).

2 President Roller referred to pages 9 and 10,
3 noting he would like to add to section (c), a
4 candidate who is recognized and approved jurisdiction
5 seeking practice in this Commonwealth who does not
6 qualify under § 9.61(a)(1) and who has not lawfully
7 continuously practiced. He further explained that
8 this is where people who have other criteria gives
9 them a right to submit a portfolio and anything else
10 that says they can apply for reciprocity.

11 President Roller referred to page 11, page 12,
12 and page 13, where no changes were necessary.

13 Ms. O'Malley informed Board members that she
14 would provide a new version in May after changes have
15 been made to formatting and grammatical issues.

16 President Roller encouraged Board members to read
17 through the new version. He commented that he would
18 like to approve the package in May and asked Ms.
19 O'Malley to provide a copy in advance of the May
20 meeting.

21 Ms. O'Malley offered to provide the corrected
22 version in mid-April.]

23 ***

24 Report of Board President - Licensure Eligibility
25 Requirements - Education Equivalency Matrix

1 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, referred to the
2 Education Equivalency Chart draft, noting it would be
3 brought forward for everybody to accept.]

4

5 Report of Board President - NCARB Regional Summit
6 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, addressed the report
7 from the National Council of Architectural
8 Registration Boards Regional Summit. He noted the
9 draft resolutions were all discussed and would be on
10 the May 10 meeting agenda for the Board to take a
11 position. He commented that he was not sure where
12 NCARB is going on the governance change. He hoped
13 everybody filled out their survey, noting it would
14 come back for a vote.

15 President Roller informed Board members that they
16 would be voting on the election for treasurer between
17 Richard McNeel and John Rademacher and election for
18 secretary between Lenora Isom and Sylvia Kwan. He
19 encouraged everyone to read their literature.]

3 Report of Board Administrator - Question on the
4 Architects Licensure Law Section 9(a)

5 [Jessica Harris, Board Administrator, noted the Board
6 currently had somebody who earned a license in
7 another state, obtained their NCARB certificate, and
8 then tried to apply by reciprocity with NCARB
9 certification to their Board, but NCARB was refusing
10 to send their certificate to the Board because they
11 did not have 3 years between their AXP and licensed
12 experience. She asked whether she should go back to
13 NCARB and say they could follow their guidelines and
14 send it to the Board to make the determination.

15 President Roller explained that the equivalency
16 is no longer in question of someone who has a license
17 in another state and an NCARB certificate because the
18 law says if they have a certificate that it is deemed
19 equivalent. He noted they could submit for
20 reciprocity once they have the license and the NCARB
21 certificate.

22 Ms. Harris informed Board members that she would
23 respond to the applicant and contact NCARB.]
