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4 Report of Board Counsel - Act No. 144 of 2024 5 [Ashley Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, reported on working on the regulatory changes required by Act 44 6 7 of 2024, particularly regarding mandatory Continuing Education (CE). While a full draft was still in 8 9 progress, she highlighted the need for the Board to 10 determine which Continuing Education providers should 11 be pre-approved. She proposed vetting potential 12 providers-possibly by inviting them to present or 13 submit applications-to ensure they were trustworthy and willing to be listed. Ms. Goshert mentioned 14 15 examples used in other states, including the American 16 Institute of Architects (AIA), the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB), and 17 18 educational institutions accredited by the National 19 Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB). She invited 20 Board members to suggest additional entities to 21 contact for future vetting.

President McClenaghan inquired whether an online entity like Hanley Wood, if AIA-approved, would qualify. Ms. Goshert affirmed that AIA-approved coursework would be accepted under their approval

framework.

Mr. Bates explained that AIA National maintains a rigorous vetting system for education providers, including AIA Pennsylvania. Providers must submit programs with learning objectives and summaries to AIA National for final approval. He noted that any provider certified by AIA would inherently meet the Board's standards. He warned against allowing low-quality, infomercial-style presentations and advocated for trusting only vetted entities to maintain educational quality.

Mr. Roller supported the inclusion of AIA, NCARB, and NAAB-accredited institutions, noting that AIA approves many courses and providers. He emphasized that course approval, rather than provider name, was critical and supported using these three entities as a standard model, in line with other states.

Mr. Bates added that pre-pandemic provider standards were more lenient, but current national and state practices had become more rigorous, especially for health, safety, and welfare (HSW) topics.

President McClenaghan noted that the Board should rely on trusted organizations that already perform rigorous vetting.

Ms. Goshert confirmed that she would reach out to

AIA, NCARB, and NAAB-accredited institutions to
potentially present to the Board. She clarified that
public input was welcome and that any interested
parties could contact the Board to be considered for
vetting.

Mr. Endler asked whether the Board preferred a presentation from AIA National or AIA Pennsylvania, both of which are approved providers, so appropriate representatives could be arranged accordingly; to which, Ms. Goshert replied that it was up to the Board to decide which they would feel more comfortable with.

Mr. Roller stated that AIA, NCARB, and NAAB-accredited institutions were nationally recognized and widely respected in the profession. He questioned the need for additional vetting unless it was a mandatory procedural requirement.

President McClenaghan asked whether any Board members had seen a Continuing Education course specifically labeled from NAAB.

Mr. Bates responded, while he had not seen NAAB-labeled courses, he had taken valuable summer courses from universities such as University of Pennsylvania (UPenn) or Harvard. He emphasized that AIA had a rigorous process to ensure courses were informative

rather than promotional, unlike some manufactureroffered programs. He added that while some courses
from general contractors' associations could be
useful, their relevance to architects varied.

Ms. Goshert clarified that for less clear providers, there would still be a path to approval through Board review. She reiterated that the current effort was to identify only those providers that would receive automatic approval. She acknowledged that many Board members were already familiar with the quality of AIA, NCARB, and NAAB-accredited institutions but expressed a desire to document due diligence formally, anticipating potential questions during the regulatory process.

Mr. Farrell agreed with Ms. Goshert's cautious approach, stating that it was appropriate and aligned with their responsibilities. However, he felt that the Board's collective experience with the three organizations was sufficient for pre-approval without requiring presentations. He added that if the Board wanted to invite any provider, they should invite all for consistency.

President McClenaghan reiterated skepticism about NAAB, noting she had never seen a course that explicitly credited NAAB.

Mr. Roller clarified that NAAB itself did not offer courses but accredited the institutions that did. He explained that any course offered by a NAAB-accredited school such as UPenn or Carnegie Mellon would be appropriate as Continuing Education.

President McClenaghan questioned how such courses would be credited and reported.

Mr. Roller and Ms. Goshert responded that credit value would likely be based on the university's designation. Mr. Bates added that while these university programs did not always offer formal university credit, they included multi-day seminars with qualified faculty and covered new, relevant industry topics, making them appropriate for Continuing Education.

Ms. Goshert noted that comments would be heard from individuals in the room, including representatives from AIA.

President McClenaghan asked for Jeremy Fretts' input.

Mr. Fretts, representing NCARB, explained that standard conversions exist to calculate contact hours from university credit hours, referencing Carnegie units. He stated that during audits, licensees would likely submit course documentation directly to the

Board to confirm equivalency, such as converting 3 credit hours to 45 contact hours.

Ms. Goshert stated that such conversion details could be addressed in the regulations, and she referenced how other states, such as New Jersey, define acceptable education sources.

Mr. Johns and Mr. Bates emphasized the importance of distinguishing between general and Health, Safety, and Welfare (HSW) credits, noting that AIA uses different criteria for each type.

Ms. Goshert suggested that if NAAB-accredited institutions were to be approved, the Board would need to invite representatives to explain their processes, since there were many unresolved questions.

President McClenaghan expressed concern that courses from NAAB-accredited schools did not clearly indicate HSW or general credit values, unlike AIA or NCARB.

Mr. Bates and Mr. Endler explained that universities rarely offer brief CE sessions like AIA and NCARB, and when they do, they are often presented in partnership with AIA.

Ms. Goshert asked whether the Board wanted her to pursue NAAB or focus on drafting for AIA and NCARB,

while reminding the Board that Act 44 required a mechanism for non-approved providers to apply for course recognition.

Mr. Roller questioned whether the Board had to provide this alternative path. Ms. Goshert confirmed that the legislation mandated it and that the Board could not delegate this review to AIA or NCARB. Mr. Bates suggested providers could be directed to the AIA process when applicable.

Mr. Farrell stated the requirement would likely resolve itself, as providers would prefer the more straightforward AIA or NCARB route over presenting directly to the Board.

Ms. Harris and Ms. Solomon advised establishing clear criteria in regulations for third-party course approval, as seen in other Boards such as those for accountants and real estate.

Mr. Michalowski recommended consulting the pharmacy Board, which uses a similar system and rarely sees direct applications.

Mr. Bates added that universities would prefer AIA or NCARB approval to appeal to a broader, multistate audience.

Ms. Goshert concluded that she would begin drafting language based on the discussion and

continue refining the regulation for future
meetings.]

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4 Report of Regulatory Counsel

5 | [Marc Farrell, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, Office of

6 Chief Counsel, Department of State, stated that the

7 | Board would need to develop a Continuing Education

8 (CE) process for certified interior designers, which

9 | would be a learning process since it was new to the

10 Board. He outlined four regulatory packages

11 | currently in progress.

The first, 16A-4122, was the CE regulation discussed earlier and was being drafted by Ms.

14 Goshert.

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The second, 16A-4123, was the certified interior designs regulation, which he was drafting to expand on the statutory language and formally integrate interior designers into the Board's responsibilities.

He noted that this regulation was in the early stages, with staff reviewing similar models from other states to craft appropriate language.

Finally, Mr. Farrell noted that 16A-4112, the General Revisions package, was on track for completion by the end of the year, and 16A-4120, the Act 41 licensure by endorsement regulation, had

already been drafted and was moving through the 1 2 regulatory process.]

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Miscellaneous - AIA Pennsylvania Update 5 [Steve Swarney, Executive Director for AIA, 6 Pennsylvania, provided several updates, beginning

7 with the upcoming national AIA convention, where

8 Pennsylvania member Jeff Paskva, Fellow of the

9 American Institute of Architecture (FAIA), was

10 running for an at-large Board seat. Mr. Swarney

11 actively supported Pastva's campaign through calls,

12 emails, and coordination for town hall appearances.

13 He invited Board members attending the convention to

14 notify him to secure invites for the limited-

15 attendance Tri States Fellows reception at the

16 Scorpion Club in Boston. He noted AIA Pennsylvania

was preparing for future Continuing Education needs 17

18 by investing in webinar technologies and tracking

19 systems, informed by insights from a recent ASAE tech

20 conference.

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Mr. Swarney also mentioned open positions on the DGS Selections Committee and was forwarding names for consideration. His legislative update included general bill tracking with no current high-priority items due to the state budget focus, but anticipated

action in the fall on the Statute of Repose, with oral arguments in a related court case expected in September. A stakeholder meeting was planned for late July to discuss reducing the repose period from 12 years to a target of 6. He confirmed a Board nomination was in the Senate pipeline and another name was being submitted.

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Mr. Swarney announced the AIA Pennsylvania Foundation was nearly operational, with himself named Executive Director. Two major projects were underway: Funding participation in the AIA National Women's Leadership Summit-an initiative Pennsylvania pioneered and which other states had since adoptedand sponsoring up to three families to attend the NOMA conference, aiming to inspire high school juniors and seniors to pursue architecture careers in Pennsylvania. He clarified families would accompany students for liability reasons. He also promoted an upcoming educational program on tariffs in July and commented on AIA National's CEO search, endorsing Corey Clayborne for the role. He closed by publicly thanking Carrie Hillman, the lobbyist for interior designers, for her instrumental role in advancing legislation on registration and continuing education for interior designers.

Ms. Carrie Hillman expressed her appreciation to AIA and the Board members for their longstanding support and partnership. She shared her enthusiasm for moving forward collaboratively and welcomed questions from the Board.]

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7 Miscellaneous - NCARB

[Maurice Brown, Assistant Vice-President of Advocacy/External Engagement, NCARB, introduced colleagues Caitlin Stromberg and Jeremy Fretts. He thanked the Board for the opportunity to attend the meeting and helped with the development of continuing education requirements and the implementation of the newly enacted interior design regulation.

Mr. Brown noted that his counterpart at the Council for Interior Design Qualification (CIDQ) supports several existing regulatory Boards for interior designers and offered to facilitate information sharing and expert connections as needed.

The floor was opened for any questions or related discussion from the Board. No additional matters were raised.

Mr. Brown confirmed his willingness to facilitate that collaboration, stating that CIDQ had finalized a model law and was in the process of approving model

17 regulations. He mentioned that 14 other Boards 1 2 jointly regulated architects and interior designers 3 and could serve as useful references.
