Report of Board Prosecution - Status of Cases

[J. Karl Geschwindt, Esquire, Senior Board

Prosecutor, on behalf of Jonathan Zurinskas, Esquire,

Board Prosecution Liaison, provided a Status of Cases

Report for the Board's review. He reported 142 open

cases, noting 16 of those cases were opened since the

last Board meeting. He stated 136 of the 142 cases

are with the Professional Compliance Office (PCO) or

prosecution, including cases that are being

investigated, three cases are with counsel, and three

cases are with the prothonotary or a hearing

Mr. Geschwindt provided a breakdown of case categories with the highest being unprofessional conduct at 55, fraud in the practice of the profession at 23, unlicensed practice at 28, practice on the lapse or suspended license at 22, along with a variety of other categories.

Mr. Hostetter thanked Mr. Geschwindt for the report and asked that the report be provided periodically throughout the year. He also asked whether prosecution keeps track of how many cases are closed each year and how long it takes for the average case to work through until it is closed.

Mr. Geschwindt was unable to provide information regarding closed cases at this time but mentioned that it is in the yearly report Mr. Smith presents at the beginning of the year. He reported the overall time to close a case for the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) is around one year but can be shorter or longer.

Mr. Geschwindt introduced two new attorneys,
Riley Baker and Ron Jackson, and provided a summary
of their professional background.]

   Amendments. He provided a draft preamble and draft

   annex, noting the annex shows the proposed text
24
   changes, deletions, and additions, while the preamble
25
   tells the story of what the changes mean and why they
```

are occurring.

Chairman Rader commented that the regulation has been seen by stakeholders, and everyone had input but requested information concerning the next steps.

Mr. Farrell explained, once it is approved by the Board, he would prepare a Regulatory Analysis Form, send it for review and approval by the Governor's Office, and ultimately to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission for review.

Mr. Farrell hoped to have the regulation published as proposed in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by the end of this calendar year, 2024, and then go through final rulemaking at the beginning of next year, 2025. He mentioned the Board has never gotten this close before and requested the Board adopt the two documents for it to move forward. He explained that there will also be additional chances for the public and stakeholders to provide input at the proposed and final stages.

Mr. Hostetter referred to the first paragraph on the second page of the preamble, where it has 1 year in the employ of a qualified sponsor and show participation for compensation in at least 15 auctions and then compensation in at least 15 auctions and then 2 years in 15 auctions. He noted

the second one that has 2 years in 15 auctions should be changed to 2 years in 30 auctions.

Mr. Hostetter referred to the bottom of the first page of the annex and asked what 20 credit hours means, because they are talking about Group A. He also referred to the top of page 2, noting it says Group B and 20 credit hours. He explained that it should be 80 hours when talking about Group B.

Mr. Hostetter referred § 1.11, approved course of study, noting 80 standard hours is correct, so Group B should not be 20 and should be 80 hours, not 20 credit hours.

13 Chairman Rader commented that 1 credit hour is 4 hours.

Mr. Hostetter mentioned that college classes could go 6, 8, or 12 weeks and is not the same as something 2 weeks.

Mr. Farrell stated some of the definitions for Group A and Group B comes straight from Act 88.

Mr. Hostetter referred to (b), where a credit hour of instructions is defined as 15 standard hours, noting that means 20 credit hours times 15 is 300.

Mr. Hostetter referred to 6(c.1), where a prescribed course of study in auctioneering for a Group B auction school consists of 80 standard hours

is correct.

Mr. Hostetter stated everything on pages three and four is correct, because they are all standard hours for each unit.

Mr. Hostetter noted § 1.24(d) has 2 years and not less than 15 auctions, which should also be changed to 30 auctions.

Chair Rader explained that the apprentice program is for 2 years with 30 auctions, and a Group B school is 1 year of apprenticing also with 15 auctions.

Mr. Hostetter referred to § 1.26(b) on page 7 and asked whether there were no more company licenses effective September 18, 2016. He also noted that it states that the Board will not issue a new auction company license.

Chair Rader explained that they still have auction company licenses but not for a sole proprietor because a sole proprietor will just go under their own license.

Mr. Hostetter asked whether they need a company entity to get a company license.

Ms. Kocher stated there is a definition for auction companies under the law for an LLC or corporation, which is anything outside of being a sole proprietor. She noted they would have to

register with the Bureau of Corporations and
Charitable Organizations and need to apply for an
auction company license.

Mr. Hostetter asked whether it is correct that he would have to get a company license if he went under Heritage Auctions.

Mr. Jayman was unable to provide an answer but offered to get back with him.

Chair Rader commented that it defines it later in the paragraph, where the Board will not issue a new auction company license to a sole proprietor. An existing auction company license issued to a sole proprietor before this date may continue to be renewed as an auction company license issued to a legally recognized entity. He mentioned than an LLC can still get that.

Chair Rader noted it also stated a licensed auctioneer may operate an auction company as a sole proprietor without holding an auction company license. He noted it gives permission to do one thing and not the other.

Mr. Hostetter stated the concern a long time ago was that, for example, Dan Trace used Heritage instead of Dan Trace Auctions, if it is not a company, they have no way of tracking that he owns

Heritage and Heritage goes back to him, where the public could not find him and know who Heritage is if he is doing bad business. He mentioned being good with whatever the law says but asked how they handle it if Mr. Trace just went in business 3 years ago, so he is new since 2016.

Chair Rader commented that a sole proprietor or a company can do either, but if they were a company as a sole proprietor prior to this, they can still be an auction company.

Mr. Hostetter noted that to be correct, but this is talking about anything newer than 2016, where it would happen at some point that somebody instead of under their name there would be a company name, but they do not require them to have a company license and asked how they hook the two together.

Ms. Kocher described how it reads in the law as far as legally recognized entity, where it says a partnership, association, corporation, limited liability company, or other entity recognized under the laws of this Commonwealth or any other state, where they would then apply for an auction company license.

Ms. Kocher stated they still have to register a fictitious name with the Department of State Bureau

of Corporations and Charitable Organizations. She
mentioned that an individual auctioneer who is not
one of those things that falls under the definition
of a legal entity would not have to apply for an
auction company license but would have to register
using a fictitious name with the Bureau of
Corporations and Charitable Organizations.

Acting Commissioner Claggett informed Board members that approving the regulation is just moving it along because it is not final at this point. He noted Mr. Jayman could do some research and bring that information back to the Board.

Mr. Farrell explained that the Board could adopt the regulation as per the discussion, including the changes regarding 15 versus 30.

Chair Rader noted that it was reregulated, where anyone who had some school would do 15 hours but would do 30 hours if they had no school and just a straight apprenticeship.

George Michak, Esquire, Michak Legal, reported having experience with the 2016 amendments to the act. He referred to Mr. Hostetter's question regarding the provision in the regulation that after a date that there would be no further company licenses issued to individuals.

Mr. Michak believed what happened prior to the 2016 amendments was that individuals would acquire a company license using a fictitious name, use an auctioneer of record, and then have an individual who was acting in that capacity but was not licensed as an auctioneer. He noted that it was a way to circumvent the requirements of doing an apprenticeship or, prior to 2016, do the Group A school, which was all available.

Mr. Michak stated clarity was added after 2016 that only a legal entity like a corporation or a limited liability company or some other legally recognized entity could acquire a company license going forward. He noted that even individuals operating under a fictitious name were required to obtain the AU license.

Mr. Michak referred to what Ms. Kocher indicated, where someone operating as an individual and under a fictitious name would register that fictitious name with the Department of State Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations and is a way to track back to somebody. He mentioned that the State Board of Dentistry requires notice when someone is operating under a doing business as (DBA) entity, noting their act does not provide that specifically.

Mr. Michak addressed Mr. Hostetter's concern 1 2 about tracking someone down. He explained that it is 3 a two-part process by checking the licensing and DBA 4 on the corporation side. He believed the regulation 5 language of no longer issuing company licenses to individuals is consistent with the statute and 6 7 basically stops individuals from doing a runaround 8 with the licensing requirement. 9 Mr. Geschwindt pointed out that an individual 10 operating under a trade name would still be required 11 to include their license number on advertisements and 12 contracts. 13 Chair Rader thanked Mr. Farrell for his hard 14 work.
