23 [The following individuals attended the meeting in  
24 order to speak during the Public Comment period:

25 Sarah Stinson, Aesthetic Operations Manager for the

1 Hand and Stone Franchise Corporation; Tara DeLutis  
2 Parys, Area Manager for Hand and Stone in Lancaster,  
3 PA and Harrisburg, PA; Logan Brown from Hand and  
4 Stone in Lancaster, PA; Aubrey Atwell from Hand and  
5 Stone in Harrisburg, and Jaclyn Palmieri from Hand  
6 and Stone, (no location given).

7 Ms. Stinson stated, in February of 2026, two  
8 franchise Hand and Stone locations in Harrisburg and  
9 Lancaster received investigative visits in which Hand  
10 and Stone were advised that dermaplaning was  
11 considered outside of the licensed aesthetic scope of  
12 practice in Pennsylvania. Ms. Stinson, on behalf of  
13 the Hand and Stone employees, requested that the  
14 Board might be able to clarify what their  
15 interpretation was of dermaplaning being outside of  
16 the licensed aesthetic scope of practice.

17 Ms. Stinson described in detail the comprehensive  
18 training an individual needed to complete in order to  
19 practice dermaplaning. She also advised that Hand  
20 and Stone remained current and up-to-date with all of  
21 the local and state regulatory requirements. She  
22 stated, in reviewing the current Pennsylvania  
23 aesthetic regulations set forth in 49 Pennsylvania  
24 Code, Chapter 7, they could not identify language  
25 that specifically referenced dermaplaning or a

1 clearly analogous service. She further added that  
2 neither their professional liability insurance  
3 partner associated with associated skin care  
4 professionals nor a professional skin care partner,  
5 Dermalogica was able to identified express regulatory  
6 language prohibiting dermaplaning within  
7 Pennsylvania. She discussed encouraging Pennsylvania  
8 spa owners to support a proposed bill that seeks to  
9 clarify whether dermaplaning falls within the  
10 aesthetic scope of practice or not. As such, she  
11 commented that the existing regulatory language did  
12 not provide explicit direction on this matter.

13 Ms. Stinson stated certain Pennsylvania spa  
14 locations had successfully completed state  
15 inspections while offering dermaplaning as one of the  
16 services they provided. She advised, though they had  
17 sought out the clarification of the dermaplaning  
18 regulation, they had received inconsistent  
19 information from inspectors and no definitive  
20 guidance from the State Board on same.

21 Subsequently, Hand and Stone recommended that all  
22 franchises in Pennsylvania discontinue the practice  
23 of dermaplaning until such time as further regulatory  
24 clarification on the issue could be obtained.  
25 Advocacy efforts that would support new legislation

1 approving dermaplaning as a legitimate practice for  
2 spa owners had also begun.

3 Ms. Stinson re-iterated their goal was to make  
4 certain the spas were fully aligned and in compliance  
5 with state regulations. She requested that the Board  
6 clarify the specific statutory or regulatory language  
7 declaring that dermaplaning was a prohibited service  
8 within the licensed aesthetic scope of practice in  
9 Pennsylvania. Additionally, she commented that Hand  
10 and Stone would value the Board's advice and counsel  
11 on how to navigate the next appropriate steps in  
12 achieving regulatory clarity as well as advancing  
13 legislative action on this issue. She requested that  
14 Hand and Stone be placed on the agenda for the June  
15 8, 2026 meeting in order to discuss the subject  
16 matter more thoroughly.

17 Ms. DeLutis Parys spoke on behalf of Ms. Penny  
18 Patterson-Smith, the owner of the Lancaster and  
19 Harrisburg locations. Ms. DeLutis provided a  
20 statement in which Ms. Patterson-Smith described her  
21 business as one with integrity, professional  
22 excellence, trust, etc. Ms. Patterson-Smith, in her  
23 statement, informed the Board that the issue of  
24 dermaplaning and its uncertainty had been  
25 increasingly unsettling to her staff. She advised

1 that dermaplaning was a service that her guests  
2 requested on a regular basis. She stated, since the  
3 service had been dropped, it had affected her  
4 business and disrupted their operations.

5 Ms. Patterson-Smith depended on clear and  
6 specific guidance from the Board to ensure that she  
7 and her company was in good standing with local and  
8 state regulations.

9 Mr. Merten thanked the group for attending the  
10 public session. He advised the group that, at the  
11 moment, dermaplaning was beyond the scope of  
12 practice. He commented, by law, the Board was not  
13 permitted to offer any kind of advisory opinion on  
14 the interpretation of their act or interpretation for  
15 the public.

16 Mr. Merten stated the Hand and Stone group was  
17 taking the proper route in their investigative  
18 research for change. He noted his appreciation for  
19 what the group was trying to do. He added that  
20 legislation was probably the way they would want to  
21 proceed with their goal of obtaining some clarity on  
22 the regulation.

23 Ms. Stinson asked if the Board could provide any  
24 contacts with the legislators. Mr. Merten  
25 recommended reaching out to the representative for

1 the local area. Acting Commissioner Claggett offered  
2 to speak with the Hand and Stone group after the  
3 meeting about not receiving responses from the Board  
4 on their request for information.

5 Ms. Trautwein asked the group about a possible  
6 former bill in the House or the Senate, Bill 1581,  
7 currently House Bill 61, Marlo Brown. Mr. Merten  
8 replied that 1581 was probably carried over from  
9 prior legislation. Ms. Iezzi suggested that nothing  
10 was ever done with it. Ms. Trautwein stated it had  
11 died on the floor but had since been re-introduced.

12 Jordan Kelly was then recognized and stated she  
13 knew that tanning beds that were used in spas can  
14 cause cancer. She questioned why they were still  
15 used. Mr. Merten stated the Board could not provide  
16 an interpretation of their act or their regulations.  
17 He further suggested, if there was a concern about  
18 the use of tanning beds, the proper person to reach  
19 out to would be their local legislator.

20 Ms. Palmieri acknowledged that the Board could  
21 not give counsel, but questioned where in the laws,  
22 specifically which line item declares that  
23 dermaplaning is prohibited. Mr. Geschwindt, as the  
24 Senior Prosecutor in Charge of the team that handles  
25 cosmetology cases, noted Board regulation at 49 PA

1 Code, section 7.77 stating that a cosmetology or  
2 esthetician salon may not have activities in it that  
3 are outside the scope of its license. The  
4 definitions of these restrictions could be found at  
5 63 PS Section 507. Mr. Geschwindt noted being bound  
6 by the rules of the Board against giving advisory  
7 opinions to the public. Ms. Palmieri commented on  
8 the misunderstanding due to the lack of specificity  
9 for either dermaplaning or tanning beds.

10 Ms. DeLutis Parys asked if complainants were  
11 permitted to add or modify a report after it had been  
12 submitted; if so, how are additions documented and  
13 timestamped with the investigative process?

14 Mr. Geschwindt explained the information  
15 available as part of the complaint and investigation  
16 process is received by the prosecutors. The decision  
17 to prosecute depends on the reliability of the  
18 evidence of an actual violation having occurred that  
19 they could prove at a hearing.

20 Ms. DeLutis Parys questioned, if a complainant  
21 was not happy with the results of an investigation or  
22 case, what protections did they have in place as a  
23 business? Mr. Geschwindt advised, if a complainant  
24 was not happy with the resolution of a case and there  
25 is evidence that the prosecutors did not receive

1 during the investigation, the investigation could be  
2 re-opened. Additional complaints could be filed if  
3 new evidence came to light after an investigation had  
4 ended. It was also asked if additional verification  
5 of an investigator could be required by a business  
6 other than one just holding themselves out to be  
7 same. Mr. Geschwindt suggested the question be  
8 addressed to the Bureau of Enforcement and  
9 Investigation (BEI).]
