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   [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,
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   Prosecution Division, presented the Annual
25
   Prosecution Report. He reported 139,251 active
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licensees for the State Board of Cosmetology. He
noted 1,944 cases were opened in 2024. He reported
just under 1,200 cases are currently open and 1,830
were closed in 2024.

Mr. Smith informed Board members that the goal is to see the number of closed cases near the number of cases opened for the year to avoid a backlog. He mentioned the average length of time to close a case for the Board was 188 days in 2024 and 251 days in 2023.

Mr. Smith addressed discipline cases and reported 45 fines, 500 citation, 13 probations, 34 reinstatements, 21 reprimands, and 60 suspensions.

Mr. Smith also addressed cases without discipline, including prosecution not warranted at 362 cases. He noted prosecution looks at the strength of the evidence, documentation, witnesses, and expert opinion for prosecution not warranted. He also noted 48 complaints were withdrawn.

Mr. Smith addressed warning letters in 2024. He noted prosecution also looks at the strength of the case, witnesses, discipline history, and seriousness of the allegations for warning letters.

Mr. Smith noted 42 cases were closed by an order or adjudication in 2024.]

5 Bureau of Finance and Procurement, Department of 6 State, presented the Annual Financial Report. Sh

7 referred to the license population over the last

8 seven years and breakdown of different classes.

Ms. Laudenslager reported the first biennial license population at 127,925 and second at 129,071. She noted the three braiding classes did not require a license in FY24-25 and an increase of 1,145 licensees as of February 12, 2025.

Ms. Laudenslager addressed renewal fees, noting the Board renews every January. She noted the Board is in the last incremental increase for their last Board fee increase, which was in 2022.

Ms. Laudenslager provided a breakdown of biennial sources of revenue for licensees, showing renewals and applications make up 94.6% of their revenue.

Ms. Laudenslager noted expenses can hit the Board through timesheet-based charges, direct charges, and license population. She reported on the expenses in the prior biennial period and the current biennial period.

Ms. Laudenslager explained that the increase in expenses for this period is due to the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) modernization.

Ms. Laudenslager addressed expenses and revenue, noting the Board started with a negative balance and the revenue with expenses, noting the biennial.

Ms. Laudenslager noted going into FY24-25 and FY25-26 that there is a negative biennial balance due to a one-time cost for PALS modernization. She explained that removing the PALS modernization cost would show a positive biennial balance. She stated a fee increase is not necessary at this time but will continue to look at the license count for a possible future fee increase.]

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[Michael P. Merten, Esquire, Board Counsel, stated the purpose of the Sunshine Act is the right of the public to be present at all meetings of agencies and to witness the deliberations, policy formulation and decision-making. He provided a definition of agency, deliberations, and official action.

Mr. Merten addressed public notice concerning regular and special meetings. He mentioned that

public notice is not required for emergency meetings or conferences. He noted Act 65 of 2021 added the agenda be posted on a publicly accessible website no later than 24 hours in advance. He also noted the agenda must be made available to individuals in attendance at the meeting and include a listing of each matter of agency business that will or may be the subject of deliberations or official action.

Mr. Merten addressed the recording of votes and minutes. He stated conferences and executive sessions are the only applicable exceptions to the open meeting requirements. He provided a definition of conference, noting the deliberation of agency business may not occur at a conference. He provided an overview of when executive session may be held. He noted executive session may not be used as subterfuge to defeat the purposes of the act.

Mr. Merten addressed legal challenges under the Sunshine Act, noting they shall be filed within 30 days from the date of the meeting or within 30 days from the discovery of an action that occurred at a meeting which was not open, at which the Sunshine Act was violated. He mentioned that no action may be commenced more than a year from the date of the meeting at which an alleged violation occurred. He

1 discussed penalties for violations of the Sunshine 2 Act.

Mr. Merten emphasized the importance of Board business, deliberations, and official action being conducted in open meetings. He noted Board members should not discuss agency business, especially executive session matters, outside of an official Board meeting. He noted committee meetings for the role in formulating policy, regulations, etc., should take place at an open meeting with appropriate public notice. He mentioned that a committee performing administrative functions and performing a prosecutorial function are not subject to open meeting requirements.

Mr. Merten addressed mandatory recusals, where a Board member may have a prosecutorial role or direct personal or financial interest in the outcome of the matter.

Mr. Merten addressed strongly suggested recusals, where a board member has a personal affection for someone or outside knowledge and cannot make a fair and unbiased determination.

Mr. Merten noted that discretionary recusals are when a Board member cannot hear and dispose of the case or participate in a decision on a subject fairly

and without prejudice. He encouraged Board members who are uncertain whether to recuse themselves to discuss the matter with Board Counsel privately.

Mr. Merten addressed abstention, noting abstention means someone is withholding their vote but does not affect quorum requirements. He noted the Board member is unable to vote with recusal and can affect the quorum requirement.

Mr. Merten discussed conflicts of interests, where no member of any professional examining or licensing board shall at the same time be an officer or an agent of any statewide association or organization representing the profession or the occupation subject to the Board's actions.

Mr. Merten further explained that a public member of the licensing board or commission designated as representing the public at large shall be a private citizen and shall not be a member of any profession or occupation regulated by the licensing board, commission, or Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs. He noted they cannot be related to or part of an immediate family of any member of the profession or occupation to be licensed or regulated by that particular board or commission.

Mr. Merten stated public members may not be

13 [Mallory Strawser asked Board members whether it is 14 legal for an esthetician to wax legs.

Mr. Merten explained that the Board is not allowed to give legal advice. He referred her to the regulations and recommended she obtain counsel to receive advice on the official regulations.

Carla Gus presented to the Board with colleague,
Emily Bundy, and stated Hannah Kerr, who is a
licensed cosmetologist, would like to have a salon to
perform waxing in their current building. She noted
their variance request was denied and requested
information concerning an appeal.

Mr. Merten informed Ms. Gus that she would be

receiving a paper version provisional denial in the mail and outlining ways to appeal if she chooses to do so. He offered to discuss the issue after the meeting.

Kyra Benz referred to a list being made of what estheticians can and cannot do. She asked whether the list has been completed and where the list can be found.

Mr. Merten stated the Board is not aware of a list and would not know where it could be found.

Ms. Benz further mentioned being told that Thomas Davis was making the list and asked whether he has published anything.

Mr. Davis also stated he is not aware of any list. He noted the regulations detail what cosmetologists and estheticians may do. He mentioned former counsel was working on possibly a statement of policy or something along those lines and believed a decision was made against that because it should be a regulation.

Ms. Eaton read a question in chat requesting information on House Bill 61, dermaplaning for estheticians.

Mr. Merten noted House Bill 61 was submitted to the legislature, and Ms. Eaton thanked Ms. Walter for

answering that question on chat.

Acting Commission Claggett read another question asking who on the Board is an esthetician.

Ms. Iezzi noted they are all cosmetologists and estheticians.

Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that the Board reviews and creates the scope and regulations but cannot speak on them.

Mr. Merten further explained that regulatory interpretation oftentimes requires legal advice to the person asking, and it is not the Board's role or counsel's role to give legal advice to the licensees.

Ms. Eaton referred to another question asking whether there are bios of the Board somewhere.

Acting Commissioner Claggett stated bios for Board members are not public information.

Ms. Eaton noted the Board website lists the names of the members and how long they have been a member. She read another question asking how to become a public member of the Board.

Acting Commissioner Claggett suggested anyone interested in becoming a public Board member to reach out to their local Senator and ask them to write a letter of reference.

Acting Commissioner Claggett referred to a

question from Melissa asking how they would clarify scope so they do not have to hire an attorney.

Mr. Merten referred her to the regulations, noting they cannot provide legal advice.

Melissa further commented that they cannot clarify scope but create the regulation and asked what the process is of clarify the regulation so the person they are intended for can read them.

Mr. Merten stated all of the final regulations are published for the public in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Melissa mentioned cosmetologists and estheticians repeatedly have regulation questions but are told to hire attorneys. She asked how the regulations could be amended, so the Board would be able to speak on them and where non-attorneys, like cosmetologists and estheticians, would be able to interpret them in a cosmetology or esthetics level versus having regulations that the Board cannot speak on and regulations that they cannot understand.

Mr. Davis stated all of the boards receive that question very often. He explained that the Board promulgates regulations and says what is and is not allowed but oftentimes will leave questions as to exactly what X means. He noted the Board only has

the power to draft and amend and draft and redraft regulations and/or speak when it comes to adjudications.

Mr. Davis noted the rule of thumb when it comes to regulations or any law is to read it and do the best they can with it as written. He mentioned they could also hire an attorney for their legal opinion based upon any case law.

Mr. Davis stated case law is available to the public and the kind of thing the Board comes out with when they talk about adjudications and orders. he noted they sometimes touch on the regulations and clarify through those, which are readily available in the Prothonotary's Office at the Department of State but difficult to get to them.

Mr. Davis stated the document could be provided if Board Counsel is aware of anything that has come down the pike that specifically addresses someone's concern. He suggested she email the Board directly and state the particular regulations that require clarification, noting the Board can work to clarify those but takes quite a bit of time.

Melissa stated the frustration of hearing they cannot comment is really they need to research this for someone and asked whether he is saying they could

clarify and interpret it at the next meeting with case law.

Mr. Davis explained that an attorney could do the research if she hires an attorney, but he and Board Counsel work for the Board and cannot start doing research for licensees because that would be on the Board's dime.

Mr. Davis further explained that it takes the Board directing counsel to do something; however, they would provide the information if something came down the pike in the recent past that would address her issue. He again mentioned that case law is out there, and she could hire an attorney or ask them to try to clarify the regulations with an email.

Melissa asked how the Board has authority over a fine or an interpretation by an inspector when they are already getting fined, shutdown, and denied variances, which are affecting their work.

Mr. Davis explained that the Board can speak through regulations or adjudications. He stated the prosecution put forward charging documents when they feel someone has violated a regulation or law, which are used as an adjudication before a hearing examiner. He noted the hearing examiner then puts together a proposed order saying it is their belief

that the individual violated a particular regulation.

Mr. Davis further explained that the Board looks at it and either agrees or does not agree or amends it and is where the clarification can come from. He again suggested individuals contact an attorney for clarification.

Melissa asked Mr. Davis to explain their relationship with the inspectors and people who review licenses and variances.

Mr. Davis stated detectives and investigators do not write the law nor do they work for the judges. He noted the Board is like the judge and jury, and the prosecutors and inspectors work together to find out whether everybody is doing what they are supposed to do under the laws and regulatoins.

Mr. Davis explained that the hearing examiner or Board hear the charging document if it is believed someone has violated the laws and regulations. He mentioned the inspectors work for the prosecution arm but are paid by the Board.

Melissa asked whether anything happens to the inspectors who shut down a business for a month between Board meetings that incorrectly interpret the law, noting there are many places dermaplaning and getting fined depending on the mood of the inspector.

Mr. Merten explained that questions concerning how inspectors are disciplined would be a question for prosecution because counsel works closer with the Board side of things.

Debbie Eckstine-Weidner, Cosmetology Instructor,
DeRielle Cosmetology Academy, noted being licensed
almost 50 years in this industry and having a school
since 1991. She mentioned that she has been pleading
with the Board for direct answers for students
for many years. She stated it is difficult for her
to teach when the Board will not say whether it is
legal to do dermaplaning, body treatments, and bikini
waxing but students are saying it is being done in
salons.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner noted the Board always tells her to get legal counsel to get it defined and clarified as to what that regulation actually says. She mentioned there was a policy manual for \$25 that broke down the regulations when she started the school.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner commented that she has been asking the question for 20 years, and it is not fair for anyone teaching or for salons not to be able to get answers without hiring an attorney when all they need is an answer as to whether they can do body

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treatments, bikini waxes, or dermaplaning.

Ms. Eckstine-Weidner reported writing to Ms.

Eaton in January of last year because somebody was
