        Mr. Farrell mentioned the three main components
25
```

to rulemaking are the annex, preamble, and regulatory analysis form. He explained the annex and preamble are normally what the Board will vote on and approve and the regulatory analysis form really does not involve the Board's input.

Mr. Farrell addressed engineer intern Act 32 amendments. He noted 90% of rulemaking packages will start out as a proposed rulemaking package, published in the *PA Bulletin* for comment, and then go through the final rulemaking stage.

Mr. Farrell explained that there are certain limited circumstances where the proposed stage could be omitted, like Act 32, where it fits the definition of final-omitted rulemaking and goes straight to final rulemaking. He further explained that they are incorporating statutory requirements and no Board discretion is being used. He noted the Attorney General's Office may sign off on that and that will shave at least 2 months off of the process.

Ms. Hennessy Hemler referred to Act 32 wording of engineer-in-training, which will now be considered engineer intern. She thought that would be reversed because they have a surveyor-in-training, geologist-in-training, and always had an engineer-in-training to coincide with all others. She asked whether that

1 is something that is actually going to change now
2 that the title of the engineer-in-training (EIT) will
3 now be engineer interns.

Mr. Farrell noted Ms. Hennessy Hemler to be correct, noting that is even in the face of the fact that they did decouple the experience requirements for land surveyors and for engineers but only changing what they refer to the in-training individuals as interns for engineers. He noted surveyors will still be surveyor-in-training.

Ms. Hennessy Hemler noted she wanted to know what to do on her end and to educate staff to now refer to EITs as engineer interns (EIs).

Dr. Peterson commented that they use the term engineering intern very frequently and it can mean a nongraduated engineer, which are jobs people hold as engineering interns during their college years of becoming an engineer. She believed the terminology is very confusing. She noted engineer-in-training has one meaning and is associated with the professional engineering licensure path.

Dr. Helmke requested an overview of the process for these types of regulatory changes.

Mr. Farrell explained that whatever the Board decides and approves will be sent to the Independent

1 Regulatory Review Commission and then the Legislative

2 Reference Bureau who publishes the complete

3 submission in the PA Bulletin, which starts a 30-day

4 window for public comment to formally be submitted on

5 | that regulation.

Mr. Farrell further explained that when that window closes, then the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) has a 30-day window to provide comments. He mentioned regulations can move fast or slow once that closes. The regulations may receive many comments and take a while to convert the proposed rulemaking into the final rulemaking. He also mentioned receiving no comments is the best to be able to quickly convert the rulemaking to final.]

Mr. Michalowski stated the Board has the ability to impose immediate temporary suspensions, which will be brought before the committee when somebody may be a danger to the safety and welfare of the community, their clients, or industry.

Mr. Michalowski mentioned those suspensions would be very rare for their Board, where a petition for appropriate relief for a violation of their probation might be more likely to be brought before the committee.

Mr. Michalowski explained that with either of those cases there would have been either a violation of the Board's existing order or of the Act that could considered a danger to public health and safety.

Mr. Michalowski noted the committee member would be the initial person to make a call on that case and then recuse themself from hearing the case further because they played a prosecutorial role. He also mentioned the committee is kept small so there are not so many recusals going forward.

Mr. Luciani volunteered to be a member of the committee, and Dr. Peterson volunteered to be the alternate.]

She 24 further explained that the program is a \$5,000

scholarship grant to one student from each state and

- 6 Prosecution Report. He reported 57,987 active
- 7 licensees for the State Board of Professional
- 8 | Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists. He noted
- 9 172 cases were opened in 2024, and currently there
- 10 were 76 open cases. He also noted closing 170 cases
- 11 in 2024. He reported 2024 numbers are very close to
- 12 | 2023 numbers.
- Mr. Smith mentioned the average length of time to
- 14 close a case was 158 days in 2024, noting prosecution
- 15 strived to dispose of a case within 365 days.
- 16 Mr. Smith addressed discipline cases and reported
- 17 7 fines; 10 Act 48 citations; a few probations,
- 18 revocations, and reprimands; and 5 suspensions.
- 19 Mr. Smith also addressed cases closed without
- 20 discipline, including prosecution not warranted and
- 21 warning letters. He noted prosecution looks at the
- 22 facts of the case, witnesses, and strength of the
- 23 case for prosecution not warranted. He also noted
- 24 prosecution looks at the strength of the evidence and
- 25 seriousness of the allegations for warning letters.

He noted 67 warning letters were issued in 2024 and 2 and 71 in 2023.

Mr. Michalowski noted seeing an uptick in falsely sealed documents in the western part of the state for all of the design boards and all three of their professions, especially architect and engineer. He stated most of the cases have already been reported to law enforcement authorities.

Mr. Michalowski mentioned that any cases not reported to law enforcement can be referred to the Attorney General's Office to be handled by them or referred to the federal agencies or another state. He encouraged Board members to make others in their organizations aware of the issue.]

16 | Public Comment/Discussion

[John G. Fuehrer II, PE, PLS, Pennsylvania Society of Land Surveyors, asked whether the Final Adjudication and Orders are now not going to include the person, their license, and penalty.

Ms. Goshert explained that the Board reviewed the drafted orders and approved them as final, which will then be made public.

Mr. Fuehrer presented to the Board to discuss and provide information concerning the Wilkes-Barre

Surveying Engineering program, noting it was one of the best programs in the United States some years ago. He mentioned that the person who ran and built the program retired, which caused some problems and concerns about maintaining the program and then COVID further diminished the attendance and support from the institution.

Mr. Fuehrer reported there have been actions to improve the program. He noted Wilkes-Barre was a community college with an administration and a chancellor, which is now going to a larger model. He mentioned there are three community colleges in that area with Hazleton being the lead one, which will be an administration for the three colleges.

Mr. Fuehrer explained that Wilkes-Barre, because of the way Penn State was set up with that program, could only recruit students from a small area around that college. He stated now the program will be able to recruit throughout the state and nationally.

Mr. Fuehrer noted being the chair of the Pennsylvania Land Surveyors' Foundation and meeting with Penn State administrators at a recent conference for that campus program as well as Dimitrios Bolkas, who is running a surveying program. He mentioned that everyone seems to be on board but believed there

needed to be an online program because students are going to the University of Maine or another institution that offers online education.

Mr. Fuehrer stated they are committed to working with Penn State in developing that program. He referred to information written by Dr. Bolkas discussing the program and the need for an online program.

Mr. Fuehrer mentioned the program is unique because it is an engineering surveying-accredited program, where many surveying programs throughout the country are just surveying-accredited programs. This gives the student more ability to become an engineer later or get better jobs in the process.

Mr. Fuehrer addressed the importance of funding the online 2-year and 4-year accredited program. He believed Penn State is supporting development of the first part of the program in 2025, where there will be courses prepared this summer for online courses and available online in 2026. He reported Penn State University is submitting a letter of inquiry to NCEES for a grant to prepare the 2026 program of online courses.

Mr. Fuehrer stated the Pennsylvania Society of Land Surveyors (PSLS) and Pennsylvania Land

Surveyors' Foundation have agreed to provide in-kind services as well as some monetary contributions to the program. He noted there were not many surveying programs in the area and the importance of developing the program.

Mr. Fuehrer also noted it to be his understanding that the letter requires NCEES review them by March 1, 2025, and by April 2025 contact whoever applied for the grant and ask them to submit what they need for the grant. He mentioned that any support the Board can give is appreciated.

Acting Commissioner Claggett informed Mr. Fuehrer that the Board would need to review the information but could provide thoughts on the program at the next meeting.]

17 Report of Board Counsel - Miscellaneous - Sunshine
18 Act

[Ashley B. Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided a presentation on the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act. She stated the purpose of the Sunshine Act is for transparency and to assure stakeholders and the public can be part of the conversation when the Board is making decisions.

Ms. Goshert stated meetings must be open to the

public after public notice of the meeting anytime an agency holds a meeting at which deliberations or official action takes place. She provided a definition of agency, deliberations, and official action. She discussed public notice and special meetings.

Ms. Goshert discussed Act 65 of 2021 additions to the Sunshine Act and encouraged Board members to let Ms. Harris know in advance if there is a topic they wished to discuss, so it could be placed on the agenda.

Ms. Goshert addressed the recording of votes for all open meetings and the requirement of minutes.

She mentioned that the only applicable exceptions to open meeting requirements are executive sessions and conferences, noting agency business may not occur at a conference. She explained that executive session is an exception and may be held to discuss personnel issues, consulting with legal counsel, and to review and discuss agency business that would violate a lawful privilege or lead to disclosure of information or confidentiality protected by law if held in public.

Ms. Goshert addressed legal challenges for violations, noting anyone can challenge a meeting

based on a violation of the Sunshine Act but must be filed within 30 days of the date of the meeting or discovery of any action in which the Sunshine Act was violated. She also discussed penalties for violating the Sunshine Act.

- Ms. Goshert noted Board business should be conducted in open meetings, and Board members should not be discussing agency business outside of an official Board meeting. She stated committee meeting deliberations to formulate policy, regulations, etc., should take place at an open meeting with appropriate public notice. She mentioned that any committee performing administrative functions or prosecutorial functions are not subject to open meeting requirements.
- Ms. Goshert addressed mandatory recusals, where a Board member may have a prosecutorial role or direct personal or financial interest in the outcome of the matter.
- Mr. Snyder asked whether he should recuse when he is presented with problems from other people in his role as a maintenance engineer for the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT).
- Ms. Goshert explained that he should contact counsel to discuss how much he actually knows about

the issue because it may fall in a gray area but knowing everything about it would require him to recuse.

Mr. Michalowski stated people should send the complaint in themselves rather than a Board member reporting it to lessen the chance of recusal.

Ms. Goshert addressed strongly suggested recusals, where a Board member has a personal affection or outside knowledge and cannot make a fair and unbiased determination.

Ms. Goshert noted that discretionary recusals are when a Board member cannot hear and dispose of the case or participate in a decision on a subject fairly and without prejudice. She encouraged Board members who are uncertain whether to recuse themselves to discuss the matter with counsel.

Ms. Goshert addressed abstention, noting abstention means someone is withholding their vote but does not affect quorum requirements. She noted the Board member is unable to vote with recusal and can affect the quorum requirement.

Ms. Goshert discussed conflicts of interests, where no member of any professional examining or licensing board shall at the same time be an officer or an agent of any statewide association or

organization representing the profession or the occupation subject to the Board's actions.

Ms. Goshert mentioned that public members of a licensing board or commission designated as a representative of the public at large shall be a private citizen and not be a member of any profession or occupation that is regulated or licensed by the board, commission, or Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA).

Ms. Goshert also mentioned public members may not be affiliated in any way with the profession or occupation to be licensed or regulated or hold any other appointed or elected public office or position within the Commonwealth, another state, or the United States government.

Ms. Goshert announced Jason Giurintano is the new Deputy Chief Counsel and constructed the Sunshine Act presentation.]
