5 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act,
6 at 9:00 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session
7 with Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, for the
8 purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations
9 and to receive advice of counsel on the matters upon
10 which the Board would later vote. The Board
11 commenced open session at 10:30 a.m.]

12 ***

13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
14 Board of Massage Therapy was held on Tuesday, March
15 31, 2026. Bryan Strawser, LMT, Chair, called the
16 meeting to order at 10:30 a.m.

17 ***

18 [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the
19 meeting was being recorded, and those who continued
20 to participate were giving their consent to be
21 recorded.

22 Mr. Davis also noted the Board entered into
23 Executive Session at 9:00 a.m. for the purpose of
24 conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number
25 of matters currently pending before the Board and to

1 receive the advice of counsel.]

2 ***

3 Roll Call of All Attendees and Presenters

4 [Paul Keller, Board Administrator, provided a roll
5 call of Board Members, staff and attendees. A quorum
6 of Board Members was present.]

7 ***

8 Approval of Board Minutes - February 10, 2026

9 CHAIR STRAWSER:

10 Item No. 2 on the Agenda is approval of
11 last Board meetings minutes.

12 MR. KELLER:

13 Are there any changes that need to be
14 made to the minutes from the February
15 10th meeting?

16 No? Call for a motion to approve.

17 May I have a motion to approve?

18 ACTING COMMISSIONER CLAGGETT:

19 So moved.

6 Appointment - Annual Budget Presentation

7 [Taylor Koch, Fiscal Chief, Bureau of Finance and
8 Procurement, provided information on the Board's
9 annual financial report with a fee package proposal.

10 He informed the Board for the current biennium,
11 fiscal year '24 and '25, the Board averaged about
12 8,800 licensees, a decrease from the previous
13 biennium. Massage therapists are the only license
14 class with this Board.

15 Mr. Koch reminded the Board it had just renewed
16 in January of 2025 and had another renewal coming up
17 in January of next year of \$175 for their biennial
18 renewal.

19 He addressed the Board's renewals by stating in
20 the previous biennial, fiscal years '22 and '23, the
21 Board brought in about \$1.6 million. He projected a
22 slight increase to \$1.65 million for the current
23 biennium for fiscal years '24 and '25. The majority
24 of the Board's revenue comes from renewals and
25 applications, totaling about 94% of the overall

1 revenue.

2 Expenditures were about \$1.62 million for the
3 prior biennial period, fiscal years '22 and '23. He
4 projected \$2.9 million in expenses for the current
5 biennium.

6 Mr. Koch advised that the Board's expenditures
7 were outpacing their revenues, and there was a
8 negative biennial balance projected for this and
9 future biennium periods. He stated the Bureau of
10 Finance and Procurement determined that it was in the
11 best interest of the Board to delay an increase until
12 2029 as opposed to the increase the Board approved
13 for January 2027. He acknowledged that gaining
14 additional revenue for the Board as soon as possible
15 was important, but it was more important to get the
16 Board as close to solvency as possible.

17 Mr. Koch presented an updated fee package
18 proposal. The numbers were still the same, a
19 depiction of their last six fiscal years of license
20 counts. He noted there were approximately 8,800
21 licensees for the current biennium. He referenced
22 the breakdowns on how the license counts and
23 application types affected their revenue. He
24 informed the Board, of the 94% revenue referred to
25 earlier, about \$1.5 million came from their renewals

1 over fiscal years 2024 and 2025 applications. He
2 presented a visual of how their applications were
3 calculated into their revenue and how many
4 applications were being received in a fiscal year.

5 Mr. Koch stated the average biannual non-renewal
6 revenue from civil penalties was projected at
7 approximately \$44,000. He noted the updated proposal
8 by addressing the applications and renewal fees for
9 January 2027. He stated the current fee cost to
10 process the applications would remain the same until
11 January 2029. At that point, with the cost of
12 processing the applications rising, the Board would
13 be looking at an increase of \$169,000. Further out,
14 there would be a 5% increase on the cost of
15 processing those applications just to stay within the
16 cost-of-living increases.

17 As far as the cost of renewals, Mr. Koch proposed
18 a 40% increase for those beginning January 2029.
19 With that increase, the Board would be looking at an
20 anticipated \$2.1 million in renewal revenue.

21 Chair Strawser questioned Mr. Koch as to why the
22 increases could not be enacted for January 2027.
23 Marc Farrell, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, explained,
24 in order to get fee changes to occur via the
25 regulatory process in Pennsylvania, it would take a

1 number of steps and sequences to happen at certain
2 intervals. For a January 2027 fee increase to pass,
3 it would have to reach publication by the end of
4 November 2026 at the very latest. He advised there
5 was not enough time between now and November to get
6 the entire regulatory process completed.

7 Mr. Koch continued his report with presenting a
8 slide showing, with the new fees beginning January,
9 2029, the Board would be \$110,000 in the black. The
10 Board would be continuously growing from that point
11 on to \$155,000 and then even to \$207,000. It would
12 start to chip away at its negative deficit and see
13 some relief then in the 2028-2029 biennial.

14 Mr. Koch noted an interim annual financial report
15 with updated expenditures would be presented.
16 Prosecution counsel would be contacted, those that
17 oversee the hearing examiners, and all parties in
18 terms of the caseload in anticipation of whether the
19 costs would be coming down or staying the same. Mr.
20 Koch stated, when this report was generated, it was
21 everyone's best guess as to where the trend was
22 going. Increasing the renewal cost to \$275 in
23 January 2029 brings in an additional \$613,000.
24 Overall, that would be about a \$2.1 million increase.
25 With those fees and the updated application fees, it

1 would amount to a total of about \$2.33 million.

2 All of the other boards have their expenditures
3 and their revenues. The higher the licensee counts,
4 the more revenue the board can bring in, but the
5 licensing modernization project costs had a big
6 impact all boards.

7 Mr. Koch added the accuracy with which new
8 applicants are coming in is a projection only; the
9 Board administration could monitor it and collaborate
10 accordingly. The costs of prosecution and
11 investigations are the two biggest costs for this
12 Board.

13 Mr. Koch requested the Board vote on the new
14 proposal.

15 Mr. Davis noted the proposed rulemaking before
16 the Board to be different than the one the Board
17 voted to approve in February. The Policy Office
18 disapproved the February version ten days after the
19 February meeting. He noted that the proposed
20 rulemaking before the Board this date reflects the
21 updated fee package as presented by the Bureau of
22 Finance and Procurement.]

24 Regulatory Report - Status Report

25 [Thomas Davis, Esquire, Board Counsel, stated he had

1 served as the Board's Regulatory Counsel for the past
2 three years. He would now be the Board's Counsel, a
3 position he held prior to serving as Regulatory
4 Counsel. Addie Abelson from the Office of General
5 Counsel will be the Board's new Regulatory Counsel.]

7 Regulatory Report - Status Report

8 [Thomas Davis, Esquire, stated Marc Farrell, Esquire,
9 Regulatory Counsel, informed him the proposed Child
10 Abuse Reporting regulation (16A-722) was published by
11 the Board about a year ago, and the final form
12 rulemaking would soon be published.

13 Mr. Davis referenced the new proposed fee
14 schedule and explained that a onetime 40% increase
15 was being proposed to take effect as of February
16 2029. He explained that the current \$100 application
17 fee will be increased to \$136. This too was a
18 onetime proposal of a 37% increase. Additional fee
19 increases were noted, including but not limited to,
20 temporary practice permits, and restoration after
21 suspension.

22 Mr. Davis noted should the Board vote to approve
23 the proposed rulemaking as presented, next step after
24 a few ore internal approvals would be for a 30-day
25 comment period at which time the public would be

1 asked to comment on the proposed rulemaking. He
2 commented that all fees under this act shall be fixed
3 by the Board by regulation and subject to the Notice
4 requirements of the Regulatory Review Act. He noted
5 that the Massage Therapy Law requires that, should
6 the revenues from the fees, fines, and civil
7 penalties not be sufficient to offset expenditures
8 over a two-year period, the Board is required to
9 increase those fees by regulation. Additionally, if
10 the Board did not increase its fees, the Bureau will.

11 Chair Strawser opined the fact, had they been
12 able to increase fees in 2027 by \$35 and again in
13 2029 by \$35, that would have added up to a \$70
14 increase. Mr. Davis agreed but added that this would
15 have had to have been done by regulation, a very
16 lengthy and drawn-out process, and Reg Counsel stated
17 it would be nearly impossible to get a fee reg in
18 place for this 2027 renewal cycle. Since the new
19 numbers are so much higher, the entire package had to
20 be reworked.

21 Chair Strawser inquired if the projection took
22 into consideration the negative impact the increase
23 might have on their licensee numbers. Mr. Davis
24 acknowledged that the fee increase was likely to lead
25 to a decrease in the Board's overall licensee count.

1 Mr. Koch stated their projections had already
2 factored that into the final numbers.]

3 MR. DAVIS:

18 [Thomas Davis, Esquire, stated this was the same

20 No. 5, the 2025 FSMTB Report. He noted a document
21 entitled "A Decade of Disparity: Examining the
22 Coexistence of the MBLEx and Rising Unlicensed and

7 there was an exam called the board certification exam
8 that allows or offers for massage therapists. But
9 this exam was only for those that were already
10 therapists.]

19 Massage Therapy Boards, wanted to make clear the fact
20 that it does support the current Compact legislation,
21 but there was now a second compact that had been
22 introduced with revisions to the current language.

23 Camille Baughman MA, BSed, LMT, American Massage
24 Therapy Association Pennsylvania Chapter, inquired if
25 there would be any movement by the Compact being

1 looked at by the Board, prior to being initiated by
2 the legislature. She was told, no, the legislation
3 had to be initiated.

4 Natalie Cook, Government Affairs Specialist,
5 McNees Government Relations, stated that there was no
6 compact legislation currently in the legislature for
7 massage therapy. Mr. Davis thanked her for the
8 comment.

9 Jada Thompson, American Massage Therapy
10 Association, clarified further the updated Compact
11 language that had been more recently introduced was
12 the language that is supported by the Department of
13 Defense / Department of War.]
