3 | Appointment - Annual Prosecution Report

4 [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,

5 Prosecution Division, presented the Annual

6 Prosecution Report. He reported a little over

7 | 120,000 active licensees for the State Board of

8 Medicine. He noted 4,194 cases were opened in 2024.

9 He reported 4,341 cases are currently open and 3,349

10 cases were closed.

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Mr. Smith stated prosecution focuses on closing more cases than they open to prevent a backlog. He mentioned the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) cases are included in those cases. He provided an overview of MCARE cases, where

professionals are obligated to notify the Board or prosecution of being sued in court.

Mr. Smith noted the average age to close a case was 320 days in 2024 and 308 days in 2023. He addressed factors that determine how long it takes to close a case and the process. He reported hiring more in-house doctors to consult on cases in 2024, which lessened the amount billed and decreased the length of time it takes to close a case.

Mr. Smith addressed discipline and noted 22

fines, 25 reprimands, 5 revocations, 16 suspensions, and and a considerable number of voluntary surrenders.

Mr. Smith addressed cases without discipline and reported a little over 2,100 Z02 prosecution not warranted cases, where prosecution looks at whether they have the evidence and documentation to prove the case. He reported around 2,300 Z02 cases in 2023.

Chair Woodland referred to the Public Citizen
Report stating that Pennsylvania did not have as many
cases as other states, where the extent of the ones
evaluated are prosecution not warranted. He noted
the number cannot be generated and about 50 percent
of the cases were found to be prosecution not
warranted. He believed Public Citizen was
questioning the number of cases opened, and the Board
can only open cases reported to it.

Mr. Smith noted being aware of that but believed the Citizen did not have accurate numbers because they would not have all of the information in terms of everything prosecuted. He noted some of the cases come from the Board but mostly from the public. He believed the Board will continue to see a large number of cases fall by the wayside in terms of prosecution not warranted.

Mr. Smith reported 263 warning letters, where prosecution also looks at whether they can prove the case and severity of the violation. He referred to Z16 administrative closings, noting he was not sure of all of the types of cases represented and offered to get back to the Board. He noted they are typically cases opened in error but seem like a fairly high number.

Mr. Smith referred to Z04 withdrawal of complaints and Z08 violation corrected, where it may be a recordkeeping-type issue, here the licensee is allowed to correct the error. He also noted 14 Unit 1 VRP cases and 18 discharges.

Dr. Yealy noted the importance of recognizing the contemporaneous and the high-fidelity data when public reports come out that open up questions about the functioning of the Department of State and the Board of Medicine.

Chair Woodland commented that the Board is committed to protecting the citizens of the Commonwealth and also noted the importance of being upfront and transparent when an organization like the Public Citizen criticizes their work.

Mr. Dillon asked whether there has ever been any effort, on behalf of the Commonwealth, to look at

people who have repeat discipline over a period of time to give some sense of the effectiveness of the disciplines themselves.

Mr. Smith stated prosecution has historical records of a licensee's discipline over time but do not have a statistical measurement of how many times someone has come back repeatedly in their case management system. He reported the case management is being rebuilt to capture more types of activity.

Mr. Dillon suggested that be added to the list of potential improvements, noting other boards may also be interested in expanding discipline categories.

Chair Woodland thanked Mr. Smith for the presentation, given the Public Citizen Report and noted the importance of correcting some of that information, since the Board received some national attention.

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referred to House Bill 76 regarding the right to practice medicine, surgery, and medically-related acts for the Board's review.

Susan DeSantis, PA-C, Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants, informed Board members that House Bill 76 is up for a vote on Monday by the Professional Licensure Committee. She mentioned recently meeting with Representative Venkat to discuss the bill and raise concerns about the bill.

Ms. DeSantis provided an overview of the bill, noting it was introduced in 2024 and went through the House but did not make it through the Senate. She explained the bill would allow a physician assistant (PA) licensed under one board to be able to have a written agreement under either board. She provided a scenario.

Ms. DeSantis expressed concern that the PA in her scenario, working under a medical doctor with a doctor of osteopathic medicine primary would be practicing under the Osteopathic Board because that is the board the written agreement was under. She noted if an issue was raised that she would then be disciplined by the Medical Board. She noted it to be found confusing because there was enough difference between the Medical Practice Act, the Osteopathic

Act, and the regulations.

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Chair Woodland commented that one of the nuances in their state is the legacy Osteopathic Board and Medical Board and noted trying to resolve some of the items over the years.

Ms. Walter explained that it is with the legislature at the current time and thanked Ms.

DeSantis for keeping updated on acts and legislation affecting the Board.

Mr. Dillon also expressed concern that it is confusing and would require much thought in terms of striking that balance between the two boards.

Chair Woodland commented on considering this over the years for multiple issues to make sure the boards are somewhat equivalent in not only the information provided but also the judgments rendered.]

19 | [Robert Bonacci, M.D., on behalf of Debra Bogen,

20 Secretary of Health, informed Board members that

21 respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) activity and COVID-

22 | related emergency department visits have been

23 elevated but are decreasing. He encouraged

24 clinicians to discuss influenza, RSV, and COVID

25 vaccination status with their patients and offer

those vaccinations.

Dr. Bonacci also encouraged patients and family members to receive their vaccines for respiratory virus season. He reported a high respiratory virus activity level in terms of the highly pathogenic avian influenza. He noted Pennsylvania had its first case among the poultry population in Pennsylvania but did not believe any cases have been diagnosed among the population of cows across the state.

Dr. Bonacci referred to the Health Alert Network (HAN) and noted an alert on December 18, 2024, regarding hospitals and behavioral health providers reporting severe and worsening presentations among people who use drugs in Philadelphia. He expressed concern with the adulterated drug supply with other substances, not just fentanyl or other opioid-containing drugs.

Dr. Bonacci also noted the Department of Health released a health advisory on January 13, 2025, regarding resources for health care professionals on health effects of environmental exposures. He mentioned that HAN details some of the training resources available for health care providers interested in receiving more information concerning education and awareness.

   [Michael R. Ripchinski, M.D., MBA, CPE, FAAFP,
25
   provided a follow-up of comments made at the December
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meeting. He informed Board members that the December 2024 issue of the Journal of Medical Regulation contained a briefing from the Oregon Medical Board recently adopting a statement of philosophy on IV hydration therapy.

- Dr. Ripchinski noted prior Board discussion at the last meeting in reference to Vermont but reported Oregon also has put out a statement of philosophy, where IV hydration therapy is considered within the scope of practice of medicine in Oregon. He also noted the statement specifically stressed that any medications added to IV hydration need to adhere to applicable laws within that state.
- Dr. Ripchinski stated licensees functioning as medical directors over IV hydration therapy clinics must avoid issuing standing orders that allow untrained or unqualified personnel to practice medicine or operate outside of their scope of practice.
- Dr. Ripchinski noted licensees must also ensure that any person or business engaged in dispensing, delivery, or distribution of compounded drugs in Oregon possess the required Oregon Board of Pharmacy oversight and the requirements related to the same. He reminded licensees in the Commonwealth to be aware

of additional regulations thought about in other states regarding IV hydration therapy.

Dr. Ripchinski referred to Oregon's comment regarding licensees operating as medical directors for IV hydration locations. He advised licensees in the Commonwealth serving as medical directors of these locations to understand their standing order policies and rules and regulations regarding their locations within the Commonwealth.

Dr. Ripchinski believed it is important for the Board of Medicine in Pennsylvania and all of their members to take this into account as locations continue to grow across the Commonwealth and to consider a statement of policy or at least working with legislators around any opportunities that may exist for future legislative acts and/or regulations.

Chair Woodland also noted the importance of licensees understanding their role in the Commonwealth as they become more aware of what is happening with the hydration clinics, Botox clinics, and other use of illicit drugs. He reported college kids are now doing ketamine balloons as part of the party thing.

Mr. Dillon stated he would be in support of broadcasting a public statement, along the same lines

as Vermont and Oregon, reminding licensees and the public what they consider to be the rules from the Board's perspective.

Chair Woodland commented that it is a wide-open field for all of the states and has been discussed many times at the Federation of State Medical Boards. He agreed that guidance is going to be big moving forward.]

Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, reported it to be common for people across the Commonwealth to believe entry into practice is restricted to only people who have done United States-based training and reported that to not be the case. Dr. Yealy explained that the committee looks at many applications that do not require retraining in the U.S. or only recognize U.S. training. He mentioned that there is a clear set of guidelines and pathways the committee deals with directly and then

Chair Woodland reported KSTAR provides physician reentry programs, and the Board is constantly looking for resources for citizens who need a reentry program to facilitate their process in reentry.]

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6 Report of Board Chair

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7 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair,

8 addressed the inauguration of President Donald Trump,

9 | who became the 47th President of the United States,

10 on January 20, 2025. He referred to Washington's

11 | first inauguration in 1789, noting March 4 became the

12 official date for the start of the administration,

13 which the Twentieth Amendment moved to January to be

14 closer to the start of new Congress.

Chair Woodland reported William Henry Harrison was the only president who died of a health-related issue 30 days after his inauguration in cold weather, leading some to now believe another illness like typhoid fever or flu may have killed this president.

Chair Woodland addressed the National Health
Observances for January and February, including
Cervical Cancer Awareness, Glaucoma Awareness, and
Maternal Health Awareness Day. He noted the
importance of reviewing the effect of vaccines to
reduce the risk of not only cervical cancers but also

anorectal cancers and oral and pharyngeal cancers as well.

Chair Woodland stated the National Eye Institute observes National Glaucoma Awareness Month every January to raise awareness of glaucoma, which is the leading cause of vision loss and blindness in the United States.

Chair Woodland noted Maternal Health Awareness
Day and Maternal Health Awareness Month looks to
highlight the importance of the health outcomes for
mothers during pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding,
and postpartum. He mentioned this year's emphasis is
on no kids at stake. He noted the American College
of Obstetricians and Gynecologists works with all the
states to represent Maternal Health Awareness Day on
January 23, 2025.

Chair Woodland announced FSMB has a call for abstracts, highlighting they are applying for an abstract from Pennsylvania concerning continuing medical education and mandatory continuing medical education. He noted the Black Maternal Health Caucus has brought forth the issue of potentially putting forward mandatory cultural sensitivity training to influence maternal health in the state of Pennsylvania.

Chair Woodland looking at the continuing medical education requirements in other states and how many other states require cultural sensitivity training, and he would present that information to the Board of Medicine.

Chair Woodland reported burnout rates represent about 50% of all healthcare workers with pharmacy professionals having the highest burnout.

Chair Woodland noted the American Medical Association (AMA) looked at major stressors for physicians and is looking at the issue of prior authorizations, where more than three-quarters of physicians reported patients abandoned treatment because of their inability to get prior authorization.

Chair Woodland also noted the AMA released their June survey, where 95% of physicians reported the prior authorizations processes either somewhat or significantly increases physician burnout.

Chair Woodland mentioned that the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) issued a policy and advocacy statements regarding the change in the administration and President Trump's executive actions that will affect academic institutions in the state.]
