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15 Report of Board Counsel - Other

16 [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted  
17 Senate Bill 674 of 2023 and Senate Bill 677 are  
18 identical bills, but one is for the State Board of  
19 Osteopathic Medicine and the other is for the State  
20 Board of Medicine. The bills are entitled Disclosure  
21 of Complaints Filed Against Physicians.

22 Ms. Wucinski stated complaints against physicians  
23 found by the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation  
24 (BEI) to either be frivolous or meritless still must  
25 be disclosed by physicians when asked if their

1 license has ever been subject to an investigation or  
2 complaint.

3 Ms. Wucinski mentioned that physicians lack the  
4 ability to explain the nature of the complaint  
5 because details of the internal investigations are  
6 confidential. She explained that the legislation  
7 would no longer require physicians to acknowledge the  
8 existence of a complaint filed against their medical  
9 license if the case was closed without any formal  
10 action and no Board action is taken.

11 Ms. Wucinski reminded Board members that she and  
12 Ms. Walter would ask for their position on any bills  
13 that begin to gain traction if they are asked to  
14 complete a bill analysis.

15 Ms. Walter informed Board members that Senate  
16 Bill 710 of 2023 is regarding a prohibition on  
17 telemedicine for prescribing drugs that are on the  
18 Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) list for risk  
19 evaluation and mitigation strategy.

20 Chair Woodland noted the difficulty of staying in  
21 the lanes of what can and cannot be done with  
22 telemedicine. He commented that summary statements  
23 would be needed at some point as far as what states  
24 permit in each jurisdiction.

25 Ms. Walter informed Chair Woodland that there is

1 a website and Bill 710 was referred to the committee  
2 in May.]

3

4 For the Board's Information - Meeting Dates  
5 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted  
6 the remaining 2023 meeting dates are July 18,  
7 September 12, October 24, and December 12. He also  
8 noted 2024 meeting dates are listed on the agenda.]

9

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10 Miscellaneous

11 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, referred  
12 to the Annual Report on the agenda for the Board's  
13 information.]

14

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15 Report of Board Chair

16 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, thanked  
17 everyone for participating in the State Board of  
18 Medicine Meeting.]

19 Chair Woodland acknowledged Flag Day and  
20 Juneteenth, as well as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual,  
21 Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ)+ Pride Month in June.

22 He also noted the government's June medical  
23 awareness issues include Alzheimer's and Brain  
24 Awareness, Men's Health, Migraine and Headache  
25 Awareness, LGBTQ+ Health Awareness, Posttraumatic

1 Stress Syndrome Awareness, and Vision Research  
2 Awareness.

3 Chair Woodland addressed topics from the  
4 Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) website at  
5 fsmb.org, including continued reporting on the  
6 Interstate Medical Licensure Compact for physicians  
7 who wish to practice in multiple states. He  
8 mentioned they are currently in the process of  
9 establishing a bill to lift some of the restrictions  
10 preventing states like Pennsylvania from fully  
11 enacting and participating with the Interstate  
12 Medical Licensure Compact (IMLC).

13 Chair Woodland addressed artificial intelligence  
14 (AI), noting it is starting to grow in the daily  
15 lives of everyone and medical care and regulatory  
16 areas. He noted one of the issues is developing a  
17 realistic map to protect everyone from abuse and  
18 misuse. He stated they qualify things regarding AI  
19 as the current discussion around the ethics involved,  
20 regulation, and responsibility of all parties  
21 involved, including providers and patients.

22 Chair Woodland provided a map for clinical  
23 practice with AI, looking at challenges and concerns,  
24 winners and losers, and the future. He stated he is  
25 currently chairing the Ethics Committee for FSMB and

1 would be providing a position statement on AI this  
2 year.

3 Dr. Yealy commented that it is going to be a  
4 topic in evolution, where everyone would have to be  
5 willing to adopt and adapt to it from both sides of  
6 the equation.

7 Chair Woodland noted that scams are increasing  
8 and is something everyone should be careful about,  
9 especially with privacy issues related to protected  
10 health information.

11 Chair Woodland stated mental health providers is  
12 still a big topic at the American Medical Association  
13 (AMA), FSMB, and others. He mentioned that some of  
14 the surveys show electronic medical record and  
15 productivity issues are a concern of providers, along  
16 with finances of healthcare, which is something to  
17 watch because of people leaving the workforce because  
18 of finances and other issues.

19 Chair Woodland informed everyone that FSMB has a  
20 lot of teaching modules for all providers to assist  
21 with understanding medical regulations in the United  
22 States and include the Introduction to Medical  
23 Regulation, Understanding Medical Licensure, and  
24 Understanding Physician Assistants Licensure, along  
25 with many other modules.

1           Chair Woodland reported utilizing those modules  
2 to help educate students and residents and encouraged  
3 others to utilize those as well.

4           Chair Woodland addressed reports from AMA,  
5 including shortages in this country with the most  
6 recent being chemotherapeutics that have been in  
7 short supply and noted it to be incumbent upon them  
8 to keep aware of shortages.

9           Chair Woodland addressed a bill in Maine's  
10 legislature that would have the medical practice  
11 statute of limitations clock start running when the  
12 patient discovers the negligence, not when the  
13 negligence occurs, which means it could be an open-  
14 ended statute of limitations on malpractice cases.

15           Chair Woodland referred to the change in  
16 Pennsylvania's venue in August 2022 and its impact on  
17 the cost of medicine from the malpractice premiums,  
18 noting it to be something to watch, especially given  
19 the financial situation and many of the healthcare  
20 issues.

21           Dr. Yealy commented that the venue changed and  
22 also means that people involved in any kind of  
23 medical care related to work might have to go great  
24 distances and do this in front of people who are not  
25 anywhere near their community or their lives in order

1 to adjudicate in addition to the potential  
2 implications it has for healthcare delivery  
3 organizations or sites.

4 Dr. Yealy mentioned that the shortages give them  
5 a chance to think about how they use agents, noting  
6 oxycodone is a short-acting, very common opioid used  
7 for pain management and its supply is going to be in  
8 short use that will enable each prescribing provider  
9 to think longer about whether an opioid is the right  
10 choice. He noted there are silver linings in some of  
11 the shortages that allow them to reflect on practice.

12 Dr. Yealy mentioned that the same thing is true  
13 of many of the injected corticosteroid preparations,  
14 where there are often alternatives. He noted there  
15 are opportunities to tighten that up but also  
16 opportunities to ask why they do what they do.

17 Chair Woodland agreed, stating that the  
18 unintended consequences of anything could be  
19 something better and they may need to rethink the  
20 thought process.

21 Mr. Dillon noted that one of the things FSMB does  
22 every two years is a fairly detailed census of  
23 physicians practicing in the United States that  
24 should be released soon. He mentioned FSMB also has  
25 an interactional infographic that is very interesting

1 as well on their website.

2 Chair Woodland stated physician assistants also  
3 have a huge data collection base that is very  
4 important to Pennsylvania because they have such a  
5 large constituent of physician assistant providers in  
6 the state.

7 Chair Woodland addressed graduate medical  
8 education, recognizing they are in an interesting  
9 period of time when all of the graduate medical  
10 education (GME) trainees are graduating and new  
11 people are coming in. He reported this year to be  
12 the largest match ever with Pennsylvania having one  
13 of the largest cohorts of graduate medical education  
14 trainees coming into the state. He noted the state  
15 medical boards have done a good job of getting those  
16 licensures up to date.

17 Mr. Ali informed Board members that the division  
18 has been modifying standard operating procedures in  
19 order to account for the influx of graduate training  
20 applications. He reported being on track and  
21 continuing to process applications, including  
22 overtime, to ensure residents can begin their  
23 training in a reasonable time frame. He encouraged  
24 applicants and licensees to check their emails and  
25 their Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) account

1 regularly for any updates and to resolve any  
2 outstanding discrepancies with their applications.

3 Ms. Wray thanked Board staff for their hard work  
4 and noted appreciation to all of the applicants and  
5 licensees for their patience. She commented that  
6 they are still on track despite the influx of  
7 applications and decrease in staff.

8 Chair Woodland mentioned that the most common  
9 reasons applications are held up would be  
10 inconsistencies or not providing enough information  
11 about those inconsistencies, so the Board could  
12 figure out what is going on with licensure. He noted  
13 being straightforward and forthcoming are the two  
14 most important things to ensure a license goes  
15 through.]

24 things go through the process and thanked Board staff  
25 for doing a fabulous job.]
