Sai, can we have a roll call 3 vote, please? 4 5 Dr. Yealy, aye; Dr. Ripchinski, aye; 6 Dr. Woodland, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Mr. 7 Eisenhauer, aye; Dr. Bonacci, aye; Dr. 8 Six, aye; Dr. Kutz, aye; Ms. Okereh, 9 aye. 10 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 11 Miscellaneous 12 13 MS. ARCHER: 14 The last item for voting right now is 15 Agenda Item No. 49. I believe the 16 Board would entertain a motion to grant the Reconsideration Request of Barbara 17 18 G. Matthews, M.D., and to grant her 19 Reactivation Application to Active 20 Retired Status. 21 DR. KUTZ: 22 So moved. 23 DR. RIPCHINSKI: 24 Second. 25 CHAIR YEARLY:

26 We have a motion and a second. 1 2 Any further discussion? Hearing 3 none. Sai, can we have a roll call 4 vote, please? 5 6 Dr. Yealy, aye; Dr. Ripchinski, aye; 7 Dr. Woodland, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Mr. 8 Eisenhauer, aye; Dr. Bonacci, aye; Dr. 9 Six, aye; Dr. Kutz, aye; Ms. Okereh, 10 aye. 11 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 12 MS. ARCHER: 13 14 I believe the Board would entertain a 15 motion to approve the KSTAR Re-entry 16 Program as a Board-Approved re-entry assessment program and update the 17 18 website to list it as such. DR. KUTZ: 19 20 So moved. 21 DR. RIPCHINSKI: 22 Second. 23 CHAIR YEARLY: 24 We have a motion and a second. 25 Any further discussion?

27 I will add that we had a nice 1 2 presentation from this group at our 3 last meeting. A very comprehensive set 4 of opportunities that they offer that 5 is another option for some of the people in the Commonwealth who might 6 7 request or require these services. Seeing no other discussion. 8 9 Sai, may we have a roll call vote, 10 please? 11 12 Dr. Yealy, aye; Dr. Ripchinski, aye; 13 Dr. Woodland, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Mr. 14 Eisenhauer, aye; Dr. Bonacci, aye; Dr. 15 Six, aye; Dr. Kutz, aye; Ms. Okereh, 16 aye. 17 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 18 19 Regulatory Status Report 20 [Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 21 discussed the Regulatory Status Report. 22 Ms. Wolfgang brought the Board's attention to the 23 proposed Physicians Assistants regulation at section 24 16A-4955 of the Regulatory Report. It is a final 25 regulation that was delivered to the Independent

Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and other 1 2 committees on March 3, 2025. It will be presented to 3 IRRC at its May 15, 2025 public meeting. Upon its 4 approval, the regulation would be sent to the Office 5 of Attorney General (OAG) for its final review. An 6 answer from the OAG would then be received by the 7 Board within 30 days. If approved, the regulation 8 will be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin in 9 summer 2025.

Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, asked if the regulation clarifies electronic prescriptions and allows up to 36 hours for off-site approval. Ms. Wolfgang replied that Dana Archer, the drafter of the regulation, could better articulate an answer.

Dana M. Archer, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, confirmed Dr. Woodland's inquiry. She added that a number of updates to the regulations involved updating the regulatory language and to implement Act 9 79 of 2021 as well.

Dr. Woodland then brought up questions about the supervision issues involving the number and activities of the oversight. He also wanted to know what changed on the written agreement due to the updated language.

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Ms. Archer stated that the written agreements are

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1 only filed with the Board and no longer reviewed by 2 the Board. The agreements are kept with the 3 supervising physician and physician's assistant and 4 only go into effect upon their filing of it.

5 Dr. Woodland questioned what the next step in 6 getting the regulation approved was after sending it 7 to IRRC. Ms. Wolfgang responded that if the Agency 8 for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) approves 9 the final regulation, it would then be submitted to 10 the OAG. An approved regulation will get published in the PA Bulletin and officially become a 11 12 regulation.

13 Ms. Wolfgang continued discussing the regulatory 14 status report. She stated that the Board has a fee 15 regulation on its regulatory report that was 16 initiated several years ago. The fee regulation's purpose is to decrease renewal and biennial fees 17 18 while increasing application fees to get the fees 19 more in line with the cost to process initial 20 applications. This regulation has been put on hold 21 at various stages. The Board has historically 22 carried a surplus or remaining balance that is 23 somewhat in excess of the expenses in the biennial 24 period.

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Ms. Wolfgang explained that this surplus is

1 what the Bureau of Finance and Procurement (BFP)
2 reviews. A board should generally maintain a balance
3 in their surplus which would cover those expenses
4 during the biennial period.

5 Ms. Wolfgang asked whether the Board wanted her 6 to pursue this fee regulation for them. She 7 mentioned that the Board has periodically waived its 8 renewal fees in an effort to decrease that surplus, 9 which is an option pursuing their proposed fee 10 regulation. If the Board pursued it, it would have 11 to revise the fee regulation since the recommended 12 fee increase was done years ago and BFP would have to 13 review it.

14 Dr. Woodland commented that the Board's surplus 15 was helpful during the pandemic and allowed the Board 16 to enhance providers to be in the Commonwealth. He asked what the switching of reducing one fee and 17 18 upping the other fee would do to the Board's annual income. He wanted to know if their income would 19 20 still surpass the regular expenses if the regulation 21 was put into effect.

Ms. Wolfgang explained that the increase in the application fee would not have a major impact on the bottom line. She estimated that application fees are less than 5% of the Board's budget. The reason BFP

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1	has been pursuing this issue across all boards is due
2	to an excess of fees. Many fee amounts in this Board
3	were set years ago. Ms. Wolfgang's department
4	considers initial application fees and sets those
5	fees to cover the cost to process those applications.
6	Some time ago, BFP looked at all initial application
7	fees across all boards and made various
8	recommendations to increase those fees. Most boards
9	have increased their fees when a biennial increase is
10	needed, but this Board has not considered that.
11	Ms. Wolfgang added that when BFP looked at this
12	Board years ago, they recommended that it should
13	possibly decrease its biennial fee. Under its
14	Practice Act, the Board is obligated to have
15	sufficient revenue to cover its expenses. If the
16	Board gets to the point where its revenue is
17	insufficient, it is mandated to do a fee increase. A
18	fee decrease, however, is not mandated. The Board
19	was willing to entertain the proposed fee decrease,
20	but it was never put into effect.
21	Chair Yealy asserted that this could be an ideal
22	time to reassess the Board's inflow and outflow of
23	cash and offer solutions that would include both
24	initial application and reapplication fees. He
25	recognized that the Board should focus not only on

what money comes in and how it comes in, but also whether their spending is efficient. He then asked if the act of processing, particularly of reapplications, has gotten easier over time due to electronic solutions. He commented that everything does not have to become more expensive.

7 Chair Yealy noted that the Board should work 8 through what new conditions might look like moving 9 forward and consider both the revenue and the expense 10 side of the equation.

Dr. Woodland agreed with Chair Yealy's approach. 11 He added that the Board should also be conscious of 12 13 changes happening within the country. Federal or 14 state changes that the Board might feel could warrant 15 a response requiring defense or support in some way 16 may take necessary funds from their surplus. He 17 stated that the Board has always maintained their 18 surplus for a reason.

Dr. Woodland acknowledged that the Board's surplus has grown to a point where it could be creative with it and facilitate giving something back to the Commonwealth. He again agreed with Chair Yealy's idea to look at potential action plans involving the surplus instead of changing the application fees.

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Ms. Wolfgang reminded the Counselors that their 1 2 Board is a standalone fiscal board and not part of 3 the Professional Licensing Augmentation Account. Ιf 4 their Board needs additional funding or if the Board 5 gets sued, it must rely on their surplus, whereas other boards are part of the Augmentation Account 6 7 with 25 other boards contributing to the funds. She stated that the Board's surplus is very important due 8 9 She added that from a legal standpoint, it to this. 10 is important to note that pursuing the regulation would decrease biennial fees while increasing fees 11 12 for applicants beginning their careers.

Ms. Wolfgang stated that her department has presented ideas similar to Chair Yealy's to IRRC that did not go over well. She cautioned the Board that there could be a resistance to their plans. Chair Yealy expressed that that is why a fresh assessment of inputs and outputs and a menu of choices are necessary. One choice could be no change at all.

Ms. Wolfgang changed the topic to Regulation 16A-4960, the Continuing Education and Volunteer License regulation. She then brought up that the regulatory report indicated the Board did not receive any comments, but it received one comment from the Pennsylvania Medical Society. The comment focused on

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some issues that overlap with another regulatory
package being drafted by Ms. Archer. She and Ms.
Wolfgang are working together to make sure the
language is consistent with both of these
regulations. Ms. Wolfgang expressed hope for this
regulation to be finalized and presented at the next
Board meeting.

8 Chair Yealy thanked Ms. Wolfgang for undertaking 9 this issue since many activities and opportunities 10 are done with good intent, but with blinders on about how it may interact with an individual physician's 11 12 practice training and ongoing education or with other 13 requirements. He commented that that is how boards 14 can end up with collective requirements that seem 15 burdensome and without the same level of return as 16 was thought of in their initial drafts.

Dr. Woodland asked Ms. Wolfgang if their 17 18 discussion was in reference to Regulation 16A-4960. 19 Ms. Wolfgang affirmed. Chair Yealy added that many 20 of the requirements in the regulation sound good, but 21 when put into context with other physician 22 requirements from the Commonwealth or elsewhere, may 23 not deliver the desired impact. He stated that being 24 thoughtful about that issue before moving forward 25 would pay off.

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1 Dr. Woodland brought up a poster that the Board 2 prepared looking at the mandatory continuing medical 3 education (CME) across all medical boards. While 4 many different topics are chosen, none have been 5 studied in their efficacy in terms of their impacts 6 on health outcomes of communities. The topics may 7 raise awareness to issues like opioid use disorder, 8 but none have been studied to see their real-world 9 results.] 10 \* \* \* 11 Other 12 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., FACEP, Chair, asked if anyone 13 wanted to comment on any of the four different House 14 or Senate bills listed in the Agenda. 15 Dr. Woodland commented that Item No. 20 on the Agenda, FYI-SB 507 (regarding Certified Midwives), 16 17 has recently come back up in discussions. He wanted 18 people to raise awareness of the discussion about 19 this particular legislative action. He added that a 20 section of the American College of Obstetricians and 21 Gynecologists, located in Pennsylvania, has worked 22 hard with nurse-midwives to bring some of this 23 modernization forward. 24 Dr. Woodland then expressed his support for 25 Agenda Item No. 21, FYI-SB 421, regarding Disclosure

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of Complaints. He explained to the Board that once 1 2 someone has filed a complaint with the State Medical 3 Board, they are required to disclose that complaint, 4 even if the outcome finds the complaint unfounded and 5 no further actions are taken. The complaint can 6 raise an undue bias against one's skill set even if 7 it goes away without any action. He found the 8 legislation to be very positive for providers who 9 expressed a desire to have the complaint erased or to 10 not have to disclose the complaint.

11 Mr. Dillon asked if the physician is required to 12 report the complaint if it is ongoing. Shana M. 13 Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, replied that 14 this is a Senate bill and has been referred to 15 committee. The Board as a whole does not necessarily 16 opine on the acts of the legislature, unless it has 17 been specifically asked to do so. This bill refers 18 only to physicians and allows them the ability to not 19 disclose a complaint where no discipline or 20 corrective action has been imposed or the complaint The bill only refers 21 has been closed with no action. 22 to cases in which a decision has been made. 23 Dr. Woodland acknowledged Ms. Walter's clarification. He remarked that his understanding is 24 25 an individual must disclose an ongoing complaint

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1	against themselves. The bill facilitates when a
2	complaint has been dismissed or has no action taken
3	on its behalf, the complaint will be erased from
4	their record moving forward. He noted that this
5	would be helpful for those with unfounded complaints
6	against them as it would affect things like insurance
7	applications.]
8	* * *
9	For the Board's Information - Discussion
10	Board Meeting Dates
11	[Donald M. Yealy, M.D., FACEP, Chair, brought up the
12	upcoming Board meeting dates. The next Board meeting
13	will be on May 20, 2025. This will be followed by
14	meetings on July 1, 2025 and August 19, 2025. Three
15	more Board meetings will take place after the August
16	2025 meeting.
17	Chair Yealy stated that the Board would likely
18	begin to develop the 2026 Board meeting schedule at
19	the end of 2025. A draft of the 2026 calendar is
20	available for anyone who wants knowledge on the
21	dates, including people across the Commonwealth. He
22	noted that the Board's hybrid approach allows more
23	people to participate or at least be aware of
24	contemporaneous Board activity. He expressed a

desire to welcome people from the Commonwealth to 1 2 participate by joining the group virtually.] 3 \* \* \* 4 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications -5 None \* \* \* 6 7 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 8 and Review 9 [Michael Ripchinski, M.D., MBA, CPE, FAAFP, noted the 10 need to update the members of the Committee on the 11 Agenda to reflect changes in their positions. 12 Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, brought up 13 Agenda Item No. 22, FYI-HB 157, the Rural Health Care 14 Grant Program. He suggested that the Board could use 15 some of their surplus to help fund the program. 16 Dr. Woodland mentioned the annual Federation of 17 State Medical Boards (FSMB) meeting is coming up at 18 the end of April 2025 in Seattle, Washington. The 19 Board will be presenting a poster on Mandatory CME for State Medical Board that will be focused on 20 21 cultural competency. He announced that the final 22 poster will be available for the next Board meeting. 23 Dr. Woodland stated the poster will be 24 informational and will not endorse any opinions 25 regarding proposals or legislation. It will,

however, feature opinions about cultural competency 1 2 expressed by New Jersey and Connecticut as two states 3 that have mandatory CME regarding cultural 4 competency. Their state boards hosted a meeting of 5 providers to review what cultural competency means to 6 them, which will be presented on the poster as well. 7 He concluded the report by adding that the 8 Board's poster will also present how mandatory CME 9 gets instated. It can come into being by various 10 methods, though mostly through legislative means.] \* \* \* 11 12 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -13 None 14 \* \* \* 15 Report of Department of Health 16 [Robert Bonacci, M.D., gave the report on behalf of Debra L. Bogen, M.D., FAAP, FABM. 17 18 Dr. Bonacci first provided a brief update about 19 the epidemiologic situation regarding the various 20 measles outbreaks occurring across the country as 21 well as some information from the Department of 22 Health. He announced that as of April 6, 2025, there 23 have been 636 confirmed cases of measles across the 24 United States in 22 jurisdictions. Six outbreaks, which are defined as three related cases or more, 25

1 have occurred this year, and 92% of the confirmed 2 cases are outbreak-associated. He stated that there 3 was recently a third death from measles in 2025, the 4 second of which was related to the Texas outbreak.

He reported that there have been six confirmed 5 6 cases of measles in Pennsylvania in 2025. Three 7 cases were in Erie County, one in Bucks County, one 8 in Montgomery County, and one in Philadelphia County. 9 Most of these cases involved travel to countries with 10 known outbreaks, such as some countries in Southeast 11 Asia and possibly Canada. The MMR vaccine, which 12 prevents measles, is 93% effective after the first 13 dose and 97% effective after two doses. While some 14 people who get vaccinated may acquire measles, the 15 symptom severity is lessened in individuals who 16 received the vaccination. Vaccinated individuals are 17 also less likely to spread measles.

18 Dr. Bonacci encouraged all healthcare providers 19 to make sure they are routinely vaccinating their 20 patients for MMR. He also urged the general public 21 in the meeting to make sure their vaccinations stay 22 up to date. He supplied a link in the chat for a PA 23 Health Alert Network (PA-HAN) Health Advisory 24 released on March 13, 2025 by the Pennsylvania 25 Department of Health regarding the measles outbreak.

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The Health Advisory gave detailed information for clinicians and encouraged them to have a heightened awareness around the issue. This included having measles as a differential diagnosis for individuals presenting with fever and rash, especially those who are unvaccinated or who may have traveled to countries with ongoing outbreaks.

8 Dr. Bonacci then gave a brief update on the State 9 Health Improvement Plan which is run out of the 10 Department of Health. The State Health Improvement 11 Plan (SHIP) is a multi-year strategic plan that was 12 developed in collaboration with a diverse group of 13 stakeholders across the Commonwealth. There are 14 three primary focus areas: health equity, chronic 15 disease prevention, and whole-person care. He posted 16 another link showing that the SHIP dashboard is live 17 on the Department of Health (DOH) website. This 18 allows others to view how the Commonwealth is 19 performing in relation to the goal statistics set 20 forth in the SHIP.

21 Dr. Bonacci stated that on March 25, 2025, the 22 Pennsylvania Department of Health, along with the 23 Department of Human Services and the Department of 24 Drug and Alcohol Programs, received notices from the 25 U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

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1	outlining the immediate termination of funds			
2	associated with three federal grants. The			
3	termination notices were specific to supplemental			
4	grant awards awarded in response to the COVID-19			
5	pandemic and its impacts. On April 1, 2025, Governor			
6	Josh Shapiro joined a multi-state lawsuit against the			
7	Department of Health and Human Services challenging			
8	the termination of the funding. A temporary			
9	restraining order was granted on April 3, 2025.			
10	Donald M. Yealy, M.D., FACEP, Chair, inquired as			
11	to if Dr. Bonacci knew the percentage of measles			
12	cases and deaths involving unvaccinated individuals.			
13	Dr. Bonacci stated that according to the CDC's			
14	report from the week prior, 97% of the cases in the			
15	outbreak had unknown or unvaccinated vaccine status.			
16	Dr. Woodland asked Dr. Bonacci if this week was			
17	Health Equity Week or Health Equity Month in			
18	Pennsylvania and, if so, were any activities planned.			
19	Dr. Bonacci responded that he was not sure if it was,			
20	but relayed that the Health Equity Conference is			
21	coming up in May 2025. The Health Equity Conference			
22	that the department is running is virtual-only but			
23	people are able to register and join online. Dr.			
24	Bonacci stated that it is Public Health Week but he			
25	was unsure if it was Health Equity Week nationally as			

well. Dr. Woodland asked for a link to join the 1 2 Health Equity Conference. Dr. Bonacci obliged. 3 Chair Yealy asked Dr. Bonacci to thank Secretary 4 Debra L. Bogan, whom Dr. Bonacci was filling in for. 5 She was working with Allegheny County spreading the 6 message about the impact of public health efforts and 7 activities on the health of the public. Chair Yealy commended her efforts and stated that he thinks the 8 9 positive reporting on her work is a good thing for 10 both the county and the Commonwealth.] \* \* \* 11 12 Report of Acting Commissioner 13 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 14 Professional and Occupational Affairs, provided a 15 report to the Board. He began by mentioning that a few meetings ago, 16 17 the Board discussed whether it was releasing doctors' 18 personal data to the FSMB. Acting Commissioner 19 Claggett initially responded that they did not do 20 that, but he discovered that the street addresses of 21 Medical Board licensees and Osteopathic Board 22 licensees were released. 23 Acting Commissioner Claggett then met with the 24 FSMB and explained the Board cannot release this 25 information. The Board considers it an invasion of

1 privacy and moving forward the Board would provide 2 the FSMB with only the city, state, and the license 3 status. The FSMB will not be provided with the email 4 addresses or actual street addresses of the 5 licensees.

6 He ended his report by announcing that the Board 7 received the final approval for the FBI to start 8 accepting FBI fingerprint-based background checks. 9 They are hoping push the compact live for the medical 10 licensees in June 2025.

11 Chair Yealy thanked Acting Commissioner Claggett 12 for clarifying information with the FSMB and creating 13 boundaries with them. Chair Yealy emphasized Acting 14 Commissioner Claggett moving forward on the 15 interstate licensure compact as well. Chair Yealy 16 expressed that the Board wants to encourage people with the appropriate skills to help serve the 17 18 citizens of the Commonwealth, and this is one way to 19 accomplish that.] 20 \* \* \* 21 Report of Vice Chair 22 [Michael R. Ripchinski, M.D., MBA, CPE, FAAFP, Vice 23 Chair, provided a report. 24 Dr. Ripchinski noted that he appreciated hearing

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about the progress they are making regarding

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interstate medical licensure. He reminded the 1 physicians across the Commonwealth and the licensees 2 3 this board oversees about the importance of 4 connecting with their senators and local 5 representatives regarding several of the bills on the 6 Agenda. He reiterated that the Board often does not 7 have direct control over how much CME is mandated for 8 their licensees and is often done through the 9 legislative process. Dr. Ripchinski emphasized the 10 importance of staying connected to their professional associations across the Commonwealth as well as 11 12 connecting themselves to their local senators and 13 representatives regarding the support for or against proposed legislation. 14

15 Dr. Ripchinski concluded his report by nothing 16 how much work is done by the members of the State 17 Board of Medicine. He expressed his appreciation and 18 thanks toward the Board members for their thoughtful 19 engagement and diligent review of all the items on 20 their Agenda. He stressed that only through thorough 21 analysis and discussion were they able to bring forth 22 a seemingly quick series of votes during the meeting. 23 Dr. Ripchinski asserted that the Board's deliberation 24 process is strong and it has a very consistent 25 membership who are engaged and detail-oriented in

1 their review of the applications and cases before 2 them.] 3 \* \* \* 4 Report of Board Chair [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., FACEP, Chair, gave the final 5 6 report of the meeting. 7 Chair Yealy noted his appreciation for the Board 8 members' hard work and stated that he was proud to be 9 a part of it. 10 Chair Yealy relayed that March 30, 2025 was 11 Doctor's Day. He noted that since one of the Board's 12 major functions is licensing physicians across the 13 Commonwealth, it was important to recognize the role 14 that physicians take in the Commonwealth and across 15 the country. He remarked that the Board works together with many professionals to make sure people 16 17 can attain or maintain the health that they want and 18 deserve. Chair Yealy congratulated the Board and 19 thanked them for Doctor's Day. 20 He mentioned the recent shooting at a York County 21 hospital that brought focus to healthcare workplace 22 violence. He stated that individuals, organizations, 23 systems, peace officers, and the Commonwealth are 24 working through solutions to prevent these types of 25 incidents.

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Chair Yealy emphasized that it is not about a 1 2 specific device or singular action. Rather, it is 3 about education, identification and de-escalation as 4 much as it is about deterrence and peace officer 5 responses. The Board doesn't have a specific role in 6 this, except to say they hear and know how important 7 it is. He emphasized that he wants physicians and 8 patients to feel safe while receiving care and having 9 access to providers in a way that facilitates optimal 10 health.

Chair Yealy concluded his report by mentioning 11 12 that it was Match Day across the Commonwealth of 13 Pennsylvania a week or two prior to the meeting. 14 Match Day allows medical students to move on to the 15 next stage of their career. He stated that it went 16 exceptionally well across the Commonwealth and that 17 an overwhelming majority of students finishing their 18 last year of medical school are entering into 19 programs.

He called Pennsylvania a powerhouse for both undergraduate medical education and graduate medical education. Chair Yealy said the Pennsylvania Board of Medicine is a leader in their approach toward licensure and re-licensure of people. He emphasized his pride in being a part of the state of

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Pennsylvania. He stated his well wishes for the new 1 2 graduates in the upcoming months and his hopes for 3 more of them to become interested in the State Board 4 of Medicine and the oversight of care.] \* \* \* 5 6 Adjournment 7 CHAIR YEALY: 8 There is one final motion that I'd be 9 happy to entertain, and that's 10 adjournment of the meeting. 11 DR.
