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   Appointment - Westmoreland County Community College's
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        Proposal for a Practical Nursing Diploma Program
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   [Sue Snyder, MSN, RN, Director of Nursing Program,
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   and Dr. Paul Currie, Dean, School of Health
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   Professions, Culinary Arts & Hospitality,
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   Westmoreland County Community College, presented the
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   Board with information regarding the proposed
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   Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) program at
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   Westmoreland County Community College (Westmoreland).
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        She noted Westmoreland was approached two years
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   ago by the McKenna Foundation in Latrobe,
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   Pennsylvania to reestablish the LPN program.
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   program was discontinued 12 years ago due to a lack
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   of enrollment. She noted the model within nursing
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   has changed, and LPNs now play a vital role in health
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   care teams. The proposed program will be held at
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   Westmoreland's Latrobe Education Center.
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   anticipated a January 2026 start to the program with
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an initial class of 16 students.

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Ms. Snyder stated a job offer has been made for a full-time faculty person. In addition, Westmoreland has interviewed several applicants.

Some of the clinicals at the various sites will be for medical, surgical, OB, pediatrics, home health care, behavioral health, and geriatric care. Ms. Snyder added Westmoreland plans on clinical experience ratios of one to eight.

Ms. Snyder was asked if the program would use simulation. She reported purchasing a Geriatric Anne manikin from Laerdal. She noted the manikin can be adjusted through skin changes to non-geriatric. She added there will be access to the main campus for a birthing simulation with a birthing mom. There is also a portable newborn manikin which can be brought to the Latrobe campus. She noted the program will use a live actor as a suicidal patient for behavioral health.

Chair Hunsberger asked what the current pass rate was with the Associate Degree of Nursing (ADN) program at Westmoreland. Ms. Snyder stated the ADN program has a 96 percent passing rate.

When asked if she would remain the director of both programs, Ms. Snyder stated the grant for the program does allow for and will pay for a full-time

director for the LPN program. She added the college
was hesitant to post for a full-time director until
the program was approved. She will remain the
interim director of the LPN program until a full-time
director can be named.

Chair Hunsberger asked if the person Westmoreland had made a job offer to as faculty had experience in practical nursing. Ms. Snyder confirmed the applicant was a practical nurse who now has a master's degree in nursing. The applicant currently teaches at a different college to BSN students so she has experience in education. She has not taught at the LPN level. Ms. Snyder added all faculty has access to NurseTim for resources. Westmoreland has an onboarding process for new faculty which includes training, exam writing, student debriefing, and clinical education. If the applicant takes the position, she would also be assigned a mentor from the ADN program.

Ms. Snyder confirmed the curriculum for the program was completed.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked what simulation scenarios would be covered during the eight hours of simulation in Medical/Surgical. Ms. Snyder provided several examples including a diabetic patient, a

patient found on the floor, and a GI bleed. She noted there is an intro to simulation which involves students asking questions of a SimMan. She explained the program also has access to Laerdal simulation scenarios. A simulation near the end of the program will involve multiple patients with similar names to add an extra level of complexity to the simulation.

Chair Hunsberger inquired if the LPN and RN students would be utilized together for simulation.

Ms. Snyder confirmed it was a possibility but was not yet planned. She noted the ADN program involves different programs like radiology, dental, phlebotomy, and surgical tech for their simulations.

Chair Hunsberger inquired as to the Micro

Computer Concepts course in the planned curriculum.

Ms. Snyder stated the course is designed to teach

students the basics of computers, but the focus of

the course may change going forward. It currently

teaches students such topics as how to send an email,

how to send an attachment to an email, and how to use

Adobe.

Dr. Hellier asked if there was an ethics part to the course, particularly related to being professional on social media. Dr. Currie responded there is an ethics portion to the class which is a

major argument for keeping the course as part of the overall college curriculum. He noted students may know how to use a phone but may not understand how to use it in a professional setting. He added the course teaches how to type a professional email as well as how to use Word, Excel, and PowerPoint.

Dr. Hellier pointed out that very distasteful practices were occurring in healthcare setting with phones and photographs. She added that students should be taught at the beginning what not to do.

Ms. Snyder stated the ADN program has an entire course, Introduction to the Role of Professional Nurse. Ethics, professionalism and what is appropriate as a licensed professional will all be taught at the beginning of the NPN101 course for the practical nursing program. She added Westmoreland holds nursing students to the same standard that a licensed person is held to for code of conduct. Violations of the code of conduct can lead to dismissal from the program.

Ms. Pachter Schulder thanked Ms. Snyder and Dr. Currie for the presentation. She noted a decision would be voted on at the end of the meeting following Executive Session.]

- 15 change. The implementation date of May 1, 2026, will
- 16 also coincide with the new licensure system.
- Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Regulation 16A-5145,
- 18 regarding CRNAs, would be discussed at the next Board
- 19 meeting. She noted the public comments for the
- 20 regulation had one comment in opposition with the
- 21 remainder being favorable comments. The Board also
- 22 received comments from IRRC to review.
- Ms. Pachter Schulder stated regarding 16A-5150
- 24 | Certified Registered Nurse Practitioners (CRNPs)
- 25 Prescribing and Dispensing, she continues to work on

the preamble and regulatory analysis form.

Regulation 16A-5151 regarding LPN Pronouncement of Death, the Board received one opposition comment with mostly favorable comments.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted Regulation 16A-5152 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) and indicated that formation of an annex will begin in earnest at the beginning of 2026. There are temporary regulations in place for the NLC until 2027, three years from publication. She noted the Board is waiting to work on the regulation to see what issues arise while NLC applications were being processed. She added the regulation will likely need clearer language regarding background checks and proof of primary state of residence.]

If the NCSBN Board decides to change the passing standard, it would also go into effect in April 2026. She noted there was interesting discussion at the meeting surrounding AI. She added there were also discussions regarding the regulation of education for advanced practice nurses.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked if there was any discussion regarding the role of the boards in developing AI standards. Ms. Miller stated there was not discussion on the role of the boards at NCSBN. She noted discussion at the EO Summit on how generative AI programs draw references from the

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patient has a valid DNR order; the LPN conducts a 1 2 focused assessment to identify the cessation of 3 circulatory and respirator functions; and the LPN has to complete three hours of training from the hospice 4 5 on vital signs, post mortem care, grief and 6 circumstances requiring a coroner's investigation. 7 New subsection (h) would address when an LPN can release a body specifically to a coroner or funeral director after having given notice to the attending 10 physician or CRNP and notifying the family as soon as 11 practicable. 12

In Section 21.146, prohibited acts, new subsection (b) would add a prohibition against determining the cause of the patient's death even if the LPN is legally authorized to pronounce death.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the Board received only one public comment to the exposure draft about the focused assessment language. She stated the focused assessment language matches what the Board will have in the Nursing Education requirements. She added that if the Nursing Education Programs regulations, which contain assessment definitions, are not finalized when these regulations are ready to be published, the assessment definitions will be incorporated within this

2.4 1 regulation. 2 3 MS. PACHTER SCHULDER: 4 Does anyone have any questions before I 5 ask if there would be a motion to adopt 6 16A-5151 in proposed form? 7 DR. BUCHER: 8 So moved, Bucher. 9 DR. HERSHBERGER: 10 Second, Hershberger. 11 CHAIR HUNSBERGER: All those in favor? Opposed? 12 13 Abstentions? 14 [The motion carried unanimously.] 15 16 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel 17 summarized the comments and changes the Board desired 18 to make to the Nursing Education Programs 19 requirements regulations, 16A-5141. She noted the 20 Board received comments stating the proposed 21 regulations would reduce innovation and flexibility, 22 and instead the Board should limit everything to 23 output measures like pass rates and job placements. 24 She added the response from the Board is that it is 25 looking at what makes programs successful, thereby

making nursing students successful in school during examination, after graduation, and while in practice.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained there were also concerns about whether the proposed regulations would exacerbate the nursing shortage by setting up additional barriers for licensure, including admission and completion requirements and additional faculty and administrator qualifications. She stated the Board had made changes to a number of sections to address the concerns.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that Section 21.912 would be amended to permit a nursing program to remain on provisional status for two years or the length of the full-time nursing education program, whichever is longer. This change means that even programs that are shorter than two years will have a minimum of two years on provisional status without having to seek an extension from the Board.

The Board chose not to amend the additional standards placing a RN, PN, and CRNP program on provisional status in Section 21.915. She pointed out that under subsection (a)(1), if a program does not meet the pass rate standard, the program automatically goes on provisional status. However, if a program does not meet the remaining proposed

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standards in subsection (a) (2)-(11), then Prosecution has to file an Order to Show cause, and the programs have an opportunity to file an Answer, provide evidence at a formal hearing, and receive an Adjudication and Order with the Board's findings and conclusions that is appealable to Commonwealth Court before the program is actually put on provisional status.

- Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the next area of concern related to programmatic accreditation. The Board received comments that programmatic accreditation should not occur. The Board looked at the seven justifications in the preamble for Section 21.916 and decided institutions should decide on what kind of accreditation there is. Significantly, programmatic accreditation helps with Title IX funding which allows more people to get federal financial aid. Therefore, the Board decided to not make any changes to proposed section 21.916 despite the comments.
- Proposed Section 21.917 requires controlling institutions to be accredited by an entity approved by the United States Department of Education, approved by the Board, and authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The

institution must grant a generic master's, baccalaureate, or associate degree in professional nursing. She noted there were comments received that stated that there is no difference between an associate degree and an associate degree in specialized technology (AST); however, the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) confirmed that an AST is not an academic degree like a regular associate's degree. Further PDE opined that an AST

does not confer a degree in professional nursing.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised that the Board decided not to amend proposed Section 21.918 regarding minimum student requirements despite commentors objections that nursing students should not have to meet the controlling institution's requirements. The Board explained that the controlling institute confers the degree so the student should meet the institution's requirements.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the Board had significant prior discussion regarding commencement requirements of math and physical sciences in proposed Section 21.918(a)(1). Commentators insisted that this should not be required for incoming practical nursing students. Owing to the many concerns, the Board determined it would not require

incoming students to practical nursing programs to 1 2 complete two math courses, one in algebra and two 3 science courses with a lab, prior to commencing the 4 Rather, the Board amended Section 21.942 by program. 5 adding in a requirement of a lab for anatomy and 6 physiology in subsection (a)(1)(i), as well as 7 requirement of algebra in the curriculum for both RN 8 and PN programs in subsection (a)(3)(iii). She noted 9 many practical nursing programs commented that this 10 curriculum is already part of their programs, so it was duplicative to make it an admission standard. 11 12 Because programs already teach this information the 13 number of hours should not have to be increased to 14 comply with this change.

Regarding minimum staff requirements in 21.932, Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that based upon comments, the Board decided to amend paragraph (5) to require nursing education programs to have access to support staff even if the support staff is shared within the programs of an institution.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder remarked that for administrator qualifications in 21.933, the Board discussed at the prior meeting adding an exception to the new requirements for PN and CRNP administrators who are currently approved by the Board. She

reviewed the current requirements for approved PN directors. The Board wanted to make sure that current faculty and current directors were not timing out.

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Chair Hunsberger and Dr. Hershberger discussed possible scenarios in which someone might take a lapse in employment. Dr. Hershberger noted if an administrator had a heart attack, for example, the administrator should be able to return to the current position without needing additional education. Board discussed that maternity leave, for example, is different than an administrator taking leave to pursue a different job opportunity. The Board debated whether current administrators should be granted an exception under the new regulations. Considerations included if the administrator is making a lateral move, if the administrator is moving to a new program to advance their career but staying in administrator role, and if the administrator should be required to stay in their current role. Ms. Wendy Miller pointed out the Board could look at it from the same perspective as with CRNP licensure by endorsement, where the administrator's education is judged by what was required at the time they completed their program and not by current

requirements. The Board also discussed whether to

put a time limit on who qualifies for the exception,

specifically how long an administrator could leave an

administrator role before returning and still falling

within the exception.]

7 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of 8 Professional and Occupational Affairs exited the 9 meeting at 10:54 a.m.]

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[Nursing Education Advisor, Tracy Scheirer, PhD, MSN, RN, CMSRN, CNE, noted researching the current list of PN program directors and learning that there is currently only one administrator of a PA-approved PN program who has a bachelor's degree, and the administrators from the remainder of the PA-approved PN programs are masters prepared. It was noted the new regulations would require at least a masters.

Because all but one current PN administrators have a master's degree of some kind, the Board determined that it is not burdensome to require a master's degree.

Ms. Pachter Schulder summarized the requirements for CRNP administrators, which include an earned doctorate degree or specific plan for or evidence

towards completion of the doctorate degree within five years. Anyone not already approved as a CRNP administrator prior to the effective date will also need a graduate degree in nursing in addition to the doctorate degree within five years.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reviewed current and proposed regulations for practical nurse faculty members. The proposed regulations would require faculty not approved by the effective date to either hold a bachelor's degree in nursing at the time the faculty member is approved or obtain at least a bachelor's degree in nursing within five years.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the Board will be able to determine whether a faculty member falls within the exception or has to complete the education required in the new regulations. She explained that a report can be run showing all of the approved administrators and faculty for RN, PN, and CRNP programs prior to the effective date.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained the regulations setting out the qualifications to be a CRNP faculty member are not as clear as the prelicensure faculty requirements. She noted CRNP faculty need to have a graduate degree from an approved nurse practitioner program in their area of specialization. She noted

that the regulations permit classes to be taught by
other specialists like medical doctors and CRNAs and
that those practitioners would likely not have
graduate degrees in nursing. She stated there could
be confusion whether medical doctors and CRNAs, for
example, qualify as faculty for CRNP programs.

Dr. Bucher noted specialists who teach a course in their field are not necessarily faculty within the CRNP school. He added if a pharmacist was teaching a course, the Board would not be the entity approving the pharmacist.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the regulation language speaks only to qualifications for nurses who teach and does not seem to allow for non-nurses. She proposed copying language from another section which essentially stated the person has a degree matching the course they are teaching.

The Board debated what language might be used to describe faculty who are qualified in their field but do not have graduate nursing degrees. The Board discussed creating a definition for qualified faculty.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted taking language for qualified faculty from another section and copying into the Nursing Education Programs regulation will

not mean anything as there will still need to be explanations to understand the regulation. She added faculty for clinical courses is a separate issue.

Dr. Hellier pointed out the language surrounding clinical courses helps to protect faculty positions, as a program is not permitted to use a bachelor's prepared person to teach a course.

Dr. Hershberger asked if the regulation could separate nursing education and non-nursing education. She suggested courses like anatomy and physiology might fall under non-nursing as it usually is not taught by a nurse.

Dr. Hellier asked if courses in the CRNP program could be split into core classes and other categories with the core classes being taught by nurses. It was stated the programs are already split into different sections such as graduate core, advanced practice core, and specialty.

The Board discussed that the current regulation gives programs flexibility to have experts in other fields teach nurse practitioners, such as a pharmacist teaching advance pharmacology or an ethicist teaching ethics.

Dr. Hellier expressed concern if the regulation is made too generic to say any graduate degree,

programs may take advantage and start using anyone with a PhD to teach CRNP courses instead of nurse practitioners. She added she thinks there has to be some aspect in the regulations to ensure some classes are taught by nurse practitioners.

Chair Hunsberger asked if the language could read "Faculty within a CRNP program who demonstrate evidence of expertise in a particular area who are not licensed as a CRNP may include Pennsylvania a licensed pharmacist with an earned doctorate degree; a medical doctor; doctor of osteopathic medicine; nurse anesthetist with an earned doctorate degree; nurse midwife with an earned master's degree." He added the regulation could list out what courses they would not be allowed to teach. Dr. Hellier stated his list would need to be added to.

Dr. Hellier stated there needed to be language about expertise in the area and not just language about a degree to ensure the instructor is qualified in the area being taught. She cited concern as faculty retire and schools are not hiring new faculty due to money concerns. She noted schools may become creative on who can be plugged in to teach a course.

Ms. Pachter Schulder directed the Board to the definition for interprofessional faculty which is a

faculty member other than a nurse who has specialized knowledge, skills and abilities in the area being taught and holds at lease one graduate degree.

The Board discussed if in addition to referring to interprofessional faculty, the regulation should also indicate what courses could or could not be taught by the interprofessional faculty member. It was suggested that interprofessional faculty would only be permitted to teach non-clinical courses while clinical courses need to be taught by a nurse practitioner.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reviewed possible language for the regulation including clinical versus non-clinical, interprofessional faculty, and different degrees and certifications.]

\* \*

[Aaron Shenck, Executive Director, Mid-Atlantic
Association of Career Schools, requested to give
input on Associate in Specialized Technology (AST)
degrees related to RNs. He noted that since the last
Board meeting, he had dialogue with the Pennsylvania
Department of Education (PDE). He added his
Association strongly disagrees with the PDE's opinion
of the AST being a terminal degree with issues of
credit transferability.

Mr. Shenck stated through discussions his
Association had a potential compromise, to which PDE
might agree. The potential compromise would be if
the Board allowed ASTs to offer RN programs provided
that upon program submittal, the program must
demonstrate either articulation agreements in place
or demonstrate credit transferability before the
program can be approved.

Mr. Shenck offered to draft language for the compromise before the next Board meeting to provide to the Board and PDE.

Mr. Shenck explained the difference between the two kinds of associate degrees. In the Pennsylvania Code, according to PDE, an academic degree requires 66 percent of the program be in the field of study and 33 percent in other academic classes. For ASTs, the degree is occupational rather than academic. State law requires 70 to 80 percent of an AST to be in the field of study with the remaining 20 to 30 percent in other areas. He argued having a larger percentage of the curriculum being in the field of study supports the AST degree.

Mr. Shenck relayed a number of bordering states to Pennsylvania which allow AST degrees for RN programs. He added Pennsylvania has a nursing

1 shortage and his Association thinks approving ASTs 2 for RNs would help close the shortage.

Dr. Bucher asked if the AST degree was for practical nursing or registered nursing. Mr. Shenck confirmed it is currently for LPNs, but they are asking for approval for RN programs.

Dr. Bucher also inquired how many states currently allowed ASTs for RN programs. Mr. Shenck did not have exact numbers, but he stated West Virginia, Ohio, and New Jersey were among the states which allow it.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the number of states had been discussed at the prior meeting and had been thoroughly considered at that time. She noted the new wrinkle in Mr. Shenck's argument was to allow ASTs to offer RN Programs but make a condition of approval the articulation agreement. She explained the Board had two options. One option is to keep the requirement for an academic degree in nursing, thereby precluding ASTs from offering RN education. The second option is to allow ASTs to offer RN education but require articulation agreements.

Dr. Bucher stated fundamentally the RN degree should be an academic degree.

Mr. Scher agreed with Dr. Bucher. He added as

someone who works clinically and teaches 1 2 academically, the RN skill set requires a combination 3 of both didactic and in practice learning. He added 4 it needs to be academic. Dr. Hellier inquired if 5 diploma schools are considered academic degrees. 6 Pachter Schulder clarified that diploma schools are 7 specifically authorized by Section 21.51(a)(2)of the 8 Board regulations. Mr. Schenk commented in the 9 hierarchy of credentials, ASTs are generally higher 10 than a diploma program. Ms. Pachter Schulder stated 11 the determination permitting hospital-based programs 12 under diploma programs was made years ago. It was 13 also noted that in order to graduate from a diploma 14 program, the student must have completed their general education courses at colleges or universities 15 16 as an admission requirement or before graduation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that Mr. Scher, Dr. Bucher, and Ms. Capiotis also indicated not being in favor of ASTs for RN programs even with articulation agreements. Chair Hunsberger agreed. He added, if the issue comes before the Board again, it would be beneficial to have a list of schools who currently offer AST RN programs and their NCLEX® pass rates as well as letters from employers.

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Chair Hunsberger stated that on Mr. Shenck's

Dr. Hellier concurred that ASTs should not be permitted to offer RN education. She noted concern over the number of pathways to be a professional nurse and potentially adding another way to splinter the professional nurse degree.]
