- 22 Appointment Pennsylvania Department of Health
- 23 [Robert Bonacci, M.D., Department of Health, reported
- 24 | that the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices
- 25 (ACIP) has provided the Center for Disease Control

(CDC) and the nation with expert recommendations 1 2 about the use of vaccines since it was founded in the 3 1960s. He noted that for many years ACIP has used 4 the Evidence to Recommendations framework, an 5 evidence-based and standardized approach, to evaluate 6 the many dimensions related to immunization 7 recommendations. The process was intended to foster 8 transparency, consistency, and clear communication 9 about public health recommendations to clinicians and 10 the public. He noted recent changes to the membership and function of ACIP have left many health and 11 12 medical professionals and the public concerned about 13 the integrity of the review process and the 14 trustworthiness of new recommendations.

Dr. Bonacci stated that in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Department of Health (DOH) is charged with promoting healthy behaviors, preventing injury, and assuring the safe delivery of quality healthcare for all people in Pennsylvania. The DOH released new recommendations on September 22, 2025, to provide clear, evidence-based guidance and ensure vaccines remain accessible for Pennsylvanians. Dr. Bonacci shared a link to the guidance that is available on the DOH website.

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Dr. Bonacci explained that the DOH guidance

recommends Pennsylvanians follow the most recent 1 2 immunization recommendations issued by the American 3 Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the American Academy of 4 Family Physicians (AAFP), and the American College of 5 Obstetrics and Gynecology (ACOG). AAP, AAFP, and 6 ACOG are all trusted medical organizations that have 7 provided evidence-based immunization schedules and 8 recommendation for many years. He noted the newly 9 released guidance does not change the vaccine 10 requirements issued by the DOH through regulation for 11 childcare groups and school age students. Dr. Hellier asked if the CDC documents received 12 13 by the Board reflected the old or new 14 recommendations. Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the CDC 15 documents reflect the old guidelines. Dr. Bonacci noted ACIP had met September 18-19, 2025, to make 16 17 their recommendations. He was not sure when the CDC 18 would update their quidance. He added there are several steps in between ACIP making their

several steps in between ACIP making their
recommendations and the CDC publishing updated
guidelines. He noted historically ACIP's
recommendations are usually accepted by the CDC
anywhere from a couple of days after the meeting to a
couple of weeks. The time period has varied with the

25 new administration, and the acting director of the

CDC had not accepted the recommendations as of the time of the Board meeting.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Dr. Bonacci to summarize ACIP's recommendations. He stated ACIP voted to not recommend the use of the combined MMRV vaccine for children under four years of age. added ACIP did not address recommendations around MMR and Varicella as separate vaccines. He noted ACIP tabled consideration for a recommendation for Hepatitis B vaccines for children under one month. ACIP also considered a series of votes related to the 2025-2026 COVID vaccine. Among the considerations were directions to the CDC about addressing risk information in the vaccine information pamphlet as well as recommendations to physicians. He noted the considerations were unusual recommendations, and ACIP normally does not make recommendations of that nature.

Dr. Bonacci stated ACIP recommended adults 65 and older consider COVID vaccination an individual decision or shared decision with their healthcare provider. Similar recommendations regarding COVID vaccinations were made for children six months to adults 64 years of age. He noted the additional emphasis on risk benefit profiles.

Dr. Bonacci reported ACIP voted no on requiring a prescription for the COVID vaccine. He added ACIP does not have the authority to require or not require a prescription. He also noted it was the first time other public health officials and he had seen a vote on prescriptive authority from ACIP.

Dr. Hellier asked for clarification as to whether the letter of support was recommending following the old MMR vaccine recommendations for children. Dr. Bonacci reiterated DOH is recommending people to follow the immunization recommendations from AAP, AAFP, and ACOG, all of which largely mirror previous CDC guidelines but do deviate from some of the current vaccine recommendations.]

New Business - Letter of Support

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
presented the Board with a Letter of Support for the
immunization guidance issued by DOH earlier in the
week. She noted the letter was prepared by Board
Counsel for the Board of Nursing along with the State
Board of Medicine and the State Board of Osteopathic
Medicine. The letter is in response to uncertainty
within the licensed community about immunization
standards—to confirm the role of DOH in recommending

and setting various guidelines for the Commonwealth and to confirm the role of reliable state and national associations in providing guidance to practitioners.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the letter emphasizes that immunizations are essential to protecting individual and public health. The letter also commends DOH for providing clear evidence-based guidance to practitioners and the public. She added the letter affirms that medical doctors and other board-regulated practitioners should be knowledgeable in evidence-based immunization schedules and practices.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that by adopting the letter, the Board would express strong support for DOH's leadership, reinforce the importance of clear, consistent immunization guidance, and confirm that such guidance is a valuable resource in the Board's oversight of professional practice.]

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the document was

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meant to be an open letter and would be posted under Announcements on the Board's website. She added the letter is signed to avoid confusion due to the kind of questions that have been asked. She noted the letter provides information to licensees, especially CRNPs, that they might need. She suggested the letter could be sent to licensees in an email blast, which was supported by Dr. Hellier.

Ms. Kerns expressed confusion about the format of the document. She noted the document seemed to be a statement on behalf of the Board rather than a letter. She asked who the letter is addressed to.

Ms. Pachter Schuler reiterated the letter is intended to be sent out to CRNPs but will be published as an open letter for anyone to review. She added the State Board of Nursing only speaks to its licensees, but other people may find it appropriative to know what licensees are being told. Ms. Kerns noted she thought the letter needed to have an addressee in order to be clear for the public.

Chair Hunsberger noted he did not think the letter needed an addressee but supported it being sent to all of the Board's licensees.

Ms. Kerns expressed her continued concern about having the letter be addressed to a specific person

or group. Acting Commissioner Claggett stated there was no need to edit the letter.

Mr. Scher stated the letter was pretty straightforward. He added he believed it was incumbent on the Board to make sure all clinicians are informed as patients often have questions regarding immunizations.

Dr. Hellier asked if the Boards of Medicine and Osteopathic medicine were using a similar letter.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted similar letters would be

posted to all three Board websites; however, the Board of Nursing was the only one considering an

email blast.

Chair Hunsberger noted nurses at the bedside needed to be able to say that the CDC has made recommendations, but professional organizations are showing recommendations based on research.

Mr. Scher stated the big picture is to make sure people recognize that organizations are utilizing data backed by peer reviewed research.]
