7 2025. Colby P. Hunsberger, DNP, RN, CNEcl, Chair,
8 called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m.

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, reviewed regulation updates for the Board.

Regulation 16A-5139, Volunteer License, is in the process of being prepared.

Regulation 16A-5141, Nursing Education Programs, was adopted at the September Board meeting. Ms. Pachter Schulder stated she is working on the Preamble and Regulatory Analysis Form.

Regulation 16A-5146, Opioid Prescription and Education and Organ Donation Education, was delivered to the Legislative Reference Bureau and will soon be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. She noted it would not go into effect until May 1, 2026.

Regulation 16A-5151, LPN Pronouncement of Death, was adopted by the Board at the September 2025

1 meeting. Ms. Pachter Schulder is working on the
2 Preamble and Regulatory Analysis Form.]

22 Report of Executive Secretary

23 [Wendy J. Miller, MSN, RN, Executive Secretary,
24 reported the October 2025 renewal period ends on
25 October 31, 2025. She noted Child Abuse Continuing

1 Education (CE) is required. She recommended everyone
2 who submits a renewal makes sure their license
3 changes to 2027.

4 Ms. Miller reported on attending several meetings
5 with the Education Advisors. The meetings included
6 the Pennsylvania Higher Education Nursing Schools
7 Association (PHENSA), Pennsylvania Coalition of
8 Associate Degree Nursing (PCADN), and the
9 Pennsylvania Association of Practical Nursing
10 Administrators (PAPNA). She noted the meetings
11 included providing updates to the associations and
12 allowing the associations to match faces with names.
13 In addition, the program director orientations
14 occurred. The orientations included face-to-face
15 meetings between the Nursing Education Advisors and
16 new RN and PN directors.

17 Ms. Miller reminded CRNP and pre-licensure
18 nursing education programs that the Annual Report is
19 open and closes on December 15, 2025. She asked the
20 programs to reconcile faculty lists to ensure
21 accuracy before submitting reports. She noted for
22 problems related to pre-licensure, programs could
23 reach out to Dr. Scheirer, Dr. Kmetz, or Ms. Hoffman.
24 For problems related to CRNP programs, Ms. Bolig, Dr.
25 Frantz, or Ms. House could be contacted.

1 Ms. Miller noted the 2024-2025 NCLEX® exam year
2 concluded on September 30th, 2025, for RN and PN
3 programs. Results were sent to programs during the
4 first week of October, and programs had until October
5 23, 2025, to review lists and confirm all of the
6 people on their lists were in their program. She
7 added students can accidentally select incorrect
8 information when registering with Pearson Vue. Abbie
9 McCormick, clerical support for the Board, will
10 assist with incorrect information.

11 Ms. Miller followed up with the Board regarding
12 programs that do not require high school graduation
13 for entry, particularly proficiency certificate level
14 (PCL) programs in Nepal and technical and vocational
15 education and training (TVET) programs in Ethiopia.
16 She reminded the Board that TruMerit requested an
17 opportunity to review these programs to determine
18 comparability. TruMerit had since provided a
19 comparability statement and described the changes in
20 their reports.

21 Ms. Miller summarized the PCL and TVET programs.
22 She noted, in June 2025, TruMerit had suggested if
23 the student entered the TVET program after completing
24 all 12 years of education, TruMerit deemed the
25 programs equivalent to a practical nursing program.

1 However, if the person entered the TVET program
2 without high school completion, TruMerit does not
3 deem there to be an equivalency.

4 Ms. Miller stated some of the countries with
5 similar programs also have a transition-type program
6 known as post-basic programs. After reviewing the
7 programs, she noted a person who had completed a PCL
8 program, and a post-basic program would be
9 equivalent. She suggested the question is what the
10 path to licensure is for a person who attended the
11 PCL program but not the post-basic or someone who did
12 the TVET program but did not graduate from high
13 school first.

14 Regarding the PCL program, she added a potential
15 solution may be for the person to be evaluated by a
16 Board-approved pre-licensure RN program to determine
17 what the applicant might need to remediate any
18 deficiency. She noted another suggestion was for the
19 graduate to obtain a GED, but she was unsure how a
20 retrospective GED helps if the foundation was not
21 confirmed. She also suggested graduates of TVET who
22 did not graduate high school could be evaluated by a
23 pre-licensure or practical nursing program.

24 The Board discussed the merits of remediating
25 with a GED after completing a nursing program. Chair

1 Hunsberger asked if the Board might be limiting
2 nurses who have been trained. He questioned why the
3 Board would prevent an individual from being licensed
4 with a science background.

5 Ms. Pachter Schulder pointed out that different
6 countries have different educational structures.

7 Chair Hunsberger stated if the nursing education
8 meets the equivalency of education in the United
9 States, the Board should consider allowing these
10 individuals to be licensed.

11 Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the law
12 requires licensed nurses to have a high school degree
13 or GED. She noted the Board might approve an
14 applicant if they had completed a nursing program
15 while also achieving a high school degree.

16 Dr. Bucher noted that from the perspective of
17 other licensed disciplines, a doctor could go to
18 medical school in another country but would still
19 take tests when applying for a license in the United
20 States in addition to a residency and additional
21 training. He also stated that the Board cannot have
22 two different opinions when considering TruMerit
23 versus Joseph Silny & Associates.

24 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated that when the Board
25 has developed their opinion, both TruMerit and Joseph

1 Silny will be informed of the opinion. Ms. Miller
2 noted both companies would likely state their
3 opinions were advisory, and it was up to the Board to
4 make final decisions.

5 Ms. Miller pointed out that the content breakdown
6 on applications allows the Board to determine if
7 there is a content deficiency in the applicant's
8 education.

9 Dr. Bucher stated it was helpful to view the
10 example transcripts provided to the Board; however,
11 he wanted to review the entire report presented.

12 Ms. Pachter Schulder suggested foreign
13 applications that meet similar criteria to that being
14 discussed be sent to the Application Committee for
15 review. The Committee could report to the Board on
16 their review and explain their recommendations.

17 Dr. Bucher stated if the standard is a high
18 school diploma or GED, then it should be the
19 standard. Chair Hunsberger noted seeing foreign
20 programs as different pathways not different
21 standards.

22 Ms. Pachter Schulder suggested the Board decide
23 if applicants who have completed both nursing
24 programs and GEDs or high school can automatically be
25 approved without being reviewed by the Application

1 Committee provided there are no deficiencies. Dr.
2 Bucher agreed the suggestion seemed reasonable.
3 Other members did not voice an objection.

4 Ms. Pachter Schulder added for this month, the
5 Application Committee could review all of the other
6 PCL and TVET equivalent applications, and then the
7 Board could have another discussion.]

8 ***

9 Old Business - Executive Order Regarding Vaccines
10 Access

11 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
12 reviewed Executive Order 2025-02 regarding vaccines
13 access. She pointed out the Order commits to
14 ensuring vaccines are available; updating policies to
15 ensure evidence-based vaccine guidelines; assuring
16 Pennsylvanians will have access to accurate and
17 reliable information; working with local, state and
18 national leaders towards a uniform vaccine policy;
19 providing accurate guidance for doctors and nurses;
20 ensuring Pennsylvania Medicaid programs cover vaccine
21 costs; guaranteeing insurance coverage for vaccines;
22 using PACE to assure older Pennsylvanians have access
23 to vaccines; ensuring school and childcare vaccine
24 requirements are based upon evidence-based
25 recommendations, receiving reports from the

1 Department of Health about implementation of the
2 Executive Order and requiring agencies to cooperate
3 with one another.

4 Dr. Bucher was in total agreement with the
5 Executive Order. He suggested a nurse be appointed
6 to the committee mentioned as nurses are public
7 health champions.]

8 ***

9 Committee Meetings - RN/PN Practice, Education &
10 Regulation/Advanced Practice - Nurse
11 Associations' Updates on Legislative Efforts
12 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
13 explained that each October, the Board asks
14 stakeholders from various associations to update the
15 Board about their associations' legislative agendas,
16 what they are working on, their priorities, and noted
17 difficulties.

18 Jordan Fuhrman, Director of Government Affairs,
19 Pennsylvania State Nurses Association (PSNA), shared
20 PSNA has four legislative priorities. The Patient
21 Safety Act is co-sponsored in both the House and
22 Senate. He noted the Patient Safety Act was passed
23 through the House during its last session, and it has
24 not moved in the Senate. The Act will set nurse-to-
25 patient ratios in healthcare settings and will vary

1 by department.

2 Mr. Fuhrman stated House Bill 739 and Senate Bill
3 25, both regarding Full Practice Authority, has been
4 introduced as a bipartisan issue. House Bill 739 is
5 currently in the Professional Licensure Committee.
6 He reported the bill was stuck on its third
7 consideration, and PSNA is considering how to
8 navigate negotiations. One consideration is another
9 pilot program.

10 The third priority is House Bill 926, the
11 Workplace Violence Prevention Act, passed the House
12 by a 124 to 79 vote. The bill would establish
13 committees within healthcare settings to identify
14 areas of weakness that can be improved. The
15 companion bill, Senate Bill 709, is with the Senate
16 Labor and Industry Committee.

17 PSNA's last priority is House Bill 27, which
18 would mandate operating room smoke from cauterization
19 tools be evacuated in some manner. Mr. Fuhrman noted
20 significant concerns for the health of nurses in the
21 operating room if the smoke is not evacuated. The
22 bill passed the House and is now with Senate
23 Appropriations.

24 Mr. Fuhrman shared PSNA is also monitoring the
25 Grow PA Act, which helps fund students and keep them

1 in the state every year that they receive funding.]

2 ***

3 [Elizabeth Menschner, DNP, MAS, MSN, RN, Executive
4 Director, Pennsylvania Organization of Nurse Leaders
5 (PONL), reported PONL supports Senate Bill 25 for
6 Full Practice Authority. She noted PONL stated
7 another pilot program was not necessary. She also
8 noted because full practice authority is not in
9 place, especially for rural areas, Pennsylvania
10 receives less money through the Rural Health
11 Transformation Plan.

12 Dr. Menschner mentioned PONL is watching House
13 Bill 389, supporting the education of the healthcare
14 workforce.

15 Dr. Menschner explained PONL supports House Bill
16 812, protecting hospital workers from workplace
17 violence. Highlights of the bill include grant
18 funding to hospitals who qualify to institute
19 workplace violence prevention programs and sharing
20 resources relative to workplace violence.

21 Dr. Menschner stated PONL does not support House
22 Bill 926, the Healthcare Workplace Violence
23 Prevention Act, as they suggest it will place an
24 administrative burden on facilities, and their
25 membership has shared many of the facilities already

1 have committees in place.

2 Dr. Menschner informed the Board PONL opposes the
3 nurse-to-patient staffing ratios due to a lack of
4 evidence. She noted not every medical-surgical unit
5 or critical care unit is the same.

6 She noted PONL is considering supporting the co-
7 sponsor memo regarding the Nurse Education Capacity
8 Expansion Grant program.

9 Dr. Menschner reported from a federal
10 perspective, PONL supports Senate Bill 1600 and House
11 Bill 3178, which are the Save Healthcare Workers
12 Acts. PONL also opposes House Bill 2531 and Senate
13 Bill 1232 regarding Workplace Violence Prevention,
14 which duplicate other regulations. PONL supports
15 Senate Bill 1874 and House Bill 3593 regarding Title
16 VIII Nursing Workforce Reauthorization Act. She
17 noted PONL also supports Senate Bill 266 and House
18 Bill 929, which are the Dr. Lorna Breen Health Care
19 Provider Protection Reauthorization Act. The Act is
20 intended to prevent suicide, burnout, mental health,
21 and substance abuse disorder challenges among
22 healthcare workers.

23 Dr. Menschner shared that PONL has focused on
24 legislative engagement, building relationships with
25 legislators, attending town halls, and providing

1 expert testimony. She noted future plans include
2 lobby days in Harrisburg and mobilizing regular
3 meetings between members and legislators. She added
4 PONL encourages grassroots efforts which seem to
5 produce the most effective results.

6 Mary O'Connor, PhD, MSN, RN, Pennsylvania
7 Organization of Nurse Leaders (PONL) Legislative
8 Committee, Professor Emeritus (Retired), PennWest
9 University, noted PONL keeps in touch with their
10 members on a regular basis, including twice monthly
11 updates. The email updates include legislative
12 information. PONL has also kept members updated on
13 the Nurse Licensure Compact.

14 Dr. O'Connor shared that the PONL website has a
15 tab specifically for legislative matters, which is
16 kept updated. She also mentioned the website is kept
17 up to date with conference information for members.]

18 ***

19 [Jessica Poole, CRNA, State Government Relations
20 Director, Pennsylvania Association of Nurse
21 Anesthetists (PANA), stated PANA represents nearly
22 4,000 certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs)
23 and student registered nurse anesthetists across
24 Pennsylvania. She reported PANA has two pieces of
25 legislature pending.

1 The first piece is House Bill 1323, which is
2 being considered in the House Professional Licensure
3 Committee. The bill would permit CRNAs, nurse
4 practitioners, and clinical nurse specialists to be
5 recognized and utilize the advanced practice
6 registered nurse (APRN) term. She noted the bill
7 would not impact or change the scope of practice for
8 any advanced practice providers.

9 Ms. Poole explained PANA is also circulating co-
10 sponsorship memos for a scope of practice bill that
11 would eliminate unnecessary barriers to the way CRNAs
12 can practice in Pennsylvania. She added much of the
13 bill's language is consistent with waivers received
14 during the COVID 19 pandemic, allowing CRNAs to
15 practice with full scope and working in cooperation
16 with physicians. PANA believes that this bill will
17 alleviate the artificial CRNA shortage in
18 Pennsylvania.]

19 ***

20 [Mary Marshall, Senior Director, Workforce &
21 Professional Development, Hospital and Healthsystem
22 Association of Pennsylvania (HAP), reported HAP
23 supports Senate Bill 998 establishing the Nurse
24 Education Capacity Expansion Grant Program. The
25 Program would provide targeted funding for accredited

1 nursing programs, enabling them to expand nursing
2 faculty and increase the number of nurse preceptors.

3 Ms. Marshall shared HAP is holding a virtual
4 career fair on November 13, 2025, for junior and
5 senior high school students exploring healthcare
6 careers. She noted nursing is being highlighted as
7 one of the careers. She added the virtual format
8 will allow a behind-the-scenes experience to
9 understand the day-in-a-life of someone in the
10 careers.]

11 ***

12 [The Board recessed from 10:15 a.m. to 10:25 a.m.]

13 ***

14 Regulation Update - 16A-5145-CRNA Licensure
15 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
16 reported Regulation 16A-515, CRNA Licensure, was
17 published as proposed and received comments from
18 IRRC, PSNA, PANA, the Pennsylvania Society of
19 Anesthesiologists (PSA) and the public. She reviewed
20 the comments received thematically for the Board.

21 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted current § 21.17 is the
22 provision which addresses when CRNAs may provide
23 anesthesia services since CRNAs are currently not
24 certified as CRNAs, only licensed as registered
25 nurses.

1 She explained that § 21.17 would essentially be
2 deleted with the new regulations. IRRC was concerned
3 there could be a void if § 21.17 was deleted prior to
4 the CRNA licensure construct being in place. The
5 recommendation was made to extend § 21.17 for an
6 entire year to cover any scenarios where the new
7 licensing system was not ready on time. She noted
8 there would be an Editor's Note added to the Annex
9 noting the deletion of § 21.17 effective one year from
10 the date of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

11 She added information would be sent out in an email
12 blast to all licensure classes advising of the
13 regulation change, the associations would let their
14 memberships know of the change, and information would
15 be posted on the Board's website.

16 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the next area of
17 comment was about the definition of "overall
18 direction" in § 21.1001 on page five of the Annex.
19 She explained that PSA and IRRC commented that the
20 definition for "overall direction" should be amended to
21 replace "health care provider" with "qualified provider" and
22 add the requirement that the provider be present and
23 available to the CRNA. Based on comments, she
24 recommended the regulation be amended to read,
25 "Oversight of anesthesia services and medical

1 management of patient care by a qualified health care
2 provider as identified under § 21.1020(a)(1)-(4)
3 (relating to CRNA practice) who is present and
4 available onsite, but not necessarily present in the
5 same procedure room as the CRNA performing anesthesia
6 services for the duration of the services provided."
7 She added PSA recommended the Board also add a
8 prohibition against independent practice. Ms.
9 Pachter Schulder recommended against adding the
10 language, as CRNAs are specifically authorized under
11 section 8.9(b)(1) of the RN Law to provide brief periods of
12 care in the event of an emergency that temporarily prevents
13 or interferes with the overall direction, as add to §
14 21.1021(b). She also noted PANA was opposed to adding
15 independent practice language.

16 Dr. Hershberger asked if the proposed language
17 meant that the qualified healthcare provider could be
18 present via telephone or virtually like telemedicine.

19 Ms. Pachter Schulder replied the statute was not
20 set up for telehealth. Ms. Poole confirmed that at
21 the time the legislation was promulgated,
22 stakeholders agreed to the language presented, but
23 virtual was not part of the discussion.

24 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the next sections to
25 review were §§ 21.1020, CRNA Practice, and 21.1021,

1 CRNA standards of conduct. IRRC and PSA commented
2 that because CRNAs are only permitted to perform specific
3 procedures involving anesthesia case and services, the terms
4 "procedure" and "specific procedure" should be replaced.
5 Ms. Pachter Schulder recommended "procedure" be
6 replaced with "anesthesia service" based on where it
7 made sense to do so.

8 Dr. Bucher asked if changing "procedure" would
9 limit CRNAs in what they currently are able to
10 provide. Ms. Pachter Schulder and Ms. Poole
11 confirmed there would not be limitations on the scope
12 of practice for CRNAs based on the language change.

13 Regarding § 21.1030, Biennial renewal of
14 certification, Ms. Pachter Schulder reported IRRC
15 questioned why the 30 hours of continuing education
16 (CE) required for RN renewal was mentioned. She
17 noted the provision was designed to parallel CNS and
18 CRNP requirements, both of which also require an RN
19 license as a condition of biennial renewal. Due to
20 the concern raised, she recommended combining
21 paragraphs (1) and (2) to read "Renew the CRNA's
22 registered nurse license including verification of
23 completion of a minimum 30 hours ..." She also noted
24 IRRC asked if CRNAs should be required to complete 30
25 hours specifically applicable to anesthesia

1 education. She stated as an additional condition of
2 biennial renewal, CRNAs are required to demonstrate
3 current National certification or recertification, which
4 requires completing 100 hours of anesthesia specific
5 continuing education in nurse anesthesia every four years and
6 passing NBCRNA's Continued Professional Certification
7 Assessment (CPCA) every eight years.

8 Ms. Poole added that starting in 2026, the
9 recertification program is changing to include the
10 requirement of completing a maintaining anesthesia
11 certification (MAC) check. The MAC Check is a
12 quarterly longitudinal assessment provided by the
13 NBCRNA. In addition, CRNAs are required to have 100
14 hours of CE every four years.

15 Ms. Pachter Schulder recommended, based on IRRC
16 comment that CRNAs whose certifications on inactive status
17 under § 21.1032(a) are not required to complete continuing
18 education, the Board add in language of "continues to
19 practice as a CRNA but ..." in § 21.1031(b) (1).

20 Ms. Pachter Schulder noted another change
21 recommended by IRRC was in § 21.1032, where IRRC
22 suggested that subsections (b) and (c), regarding
23 reactivation after suspension or reactivation after
24 revocation, be moved to their own section. She
25 recommended that the Board move those provisions to

1 new § 21.1041, Reactivation Following Discipline.]

2 ***

3 [Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of
4 Professional and Occupational Affairs, exited the
5 meeting at 10:46 a.m.]

6 ***

7 [Ms. Pachter Schulder, reported, concerning § 21.1033,
8 IRRC recommended that subsection (a) be amended to include a
9 sentence that specifies that a list of Board-approved
10 continuing education providers is available on the Board's
11 website similar to the statement contained in §
12 21.1010(a)(2). Ms. Pachter Schulder recommended that
13 this change be made. She noted that additional
14 citations would also be added to § 21.1033(b) to
15 satisfy IRRC concerns about specific citations for
16 the General Rules of Administrative Practice and
17 Procedure.

18 Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the final IRRC
19 comment was for § 21.1034 where IRRC asked for the
20 word "provider" to be inserted.

21 Ms. Poole commented PANA supports the Board's
22 revisions and thanked the Board for the extensive
23 time spent to get the regulation correct.]

24 ***
