presented to discuss the Fair Contracting for Health
Care Practitioners Act (HB 1633) regarding noncompete agreements for selected health care
providers.

Mr. Muskovitz stated the PHC4 was created in 1986 to address the rising cost of healthcare. The PHC4 collects data totaling about 5 million records per year from all Pennsylvania hospitals and ambulatory surgery centers. The data collected is available to different entities. He stated hospitals and health systems use the data for needs assessments while researchers use the data for their own papers.

Mr. Muskovitz advised the Board that the PHC4 would be completing a three-year study, based the passage of this ACT, regarding the limits of non-compete agreements and then provide their findings to the legislature in 2028.

He explained there is a clause within an employment non-compete agreement, stating any doctor no longer employed, either by voluntary resignation or involuntary termination, agrees not to practice within a 20 mile radius of his former employment location for the time period of 24 months.

Mr. Muskovitz stated the criteria within the clauses of the non-compete agreements are applied

only if and when a dispute over same enters into the legal system.

Mr. Muskovitz continued, since the law passed, all non-compete agreements for a specific group of health care providers have been limited to a single year at most and only enforceable if the employee departs voluntarily. If the employee is terminated for cause, the non-compete agreement becomes void.

MDs, DOs, PAs, CRNPs and CRNAs are the five licensed practitioners included in the law specifically for this one year maximum on their non-compete agreements.

He discussed PHC4's approach to their study of this healthcare issue. The Federal Trade Commission first worked through a rule concerning non-compete agreements and then asked for and received over 25,000 public comments. That data revealed that almost every single public comment to the FTC was focused on patient access to healthcare. The PCH4 created their own model for public comment data as well, and another round of public comments would be collected in 2027. The PCH4 also conducted their own surveys amongst healthcare providers and received a number of various comments.

Mr. Muskovitz presented a sample specific to DOs'

responses to the surveys sent by PCH4 in order to
illustrate the geographical differences between those
DO providers with and without non-compete agreements.
He mentioned the issue of NPI (National Provider
Identifier) numbers held by healthcare facilities was
being addressed.

He commented the PCH4 was asked by the legislature to determine if the healthcare non-compete agreements were burdening the judicial system. The PCH4 has, in response, been collaborating with the prothonotary offices in the 67 counties that make up the Commonwealth. It is collecting data on the number of lawsuits filed that fit the categories requested by the legislature.

Mr. Muskovitz stated the Department of Health publishes a facility report containing a significant amount of information of interest to the PCH4. This data allows the PCH4 to learn about the numbers of practitioners and providers that are coming into the Commonwealth or leaving it. The PCH4 is attempting, with the Hospital and Health Association of Pennsylvania, to obtain information from hospital employers on the impacts of Act 74 on their audience. The PCH4 is planning to develop a similar employer focused survey as well.

Dr. Litman questioned the requirement for facilities to update their records on currently employed physicians. Mr. Muskovitz stated the Department of Health's facility reports are based off a survey that runs annually. However, the PCH4 collects its data differently and the criteria for contributing data to the PCH4 is listed in the founding legislation that established it as an organization. He had no legislative authority to collect the data, so PCH4 was asking nicely and dependent on the availability of public data.

Dr. Latronica commented on completing the survey and was curious in terms of the legislation and how it was crafted. He specifically mentioned concerns about how the legislation would be affecting physicians, their salaries, their families, etc. with the non-compete agreements. He questioned whether PCH4 was considering more tangible results as to how the legislation, as such, would impact a physician on a personal level.

Mr. Muskovitz responded with verbal appreciation for Dr. Latronica's comments and suggested the surveys for 2027 would be seeking this kind of feedback from the public.]

The Board adopted this Annex at its last meeting. She advised the Board of an additional amendment to be added, the effective date for organ donation being
