- 10 which is a slight increase from 2023 at around 748
- 11 cases. He reported 954 cases are currently open and
- 12 | 638 were closed in 2024.
- Mr. Smith informed Board members that prosecution
- 14 likes to see the number of closed cases near the
- 15 number of cases opened for the year to avoid a
- 16 backlog. He noted the prosecution team would be
- 17 | looking at moving some of the cases through the
- 18 system a little faster for their Board. He mentioned
- 19 the average age to close a case was around 330 days
- 20 in 2024, noting prosecution would like to have a case
- 21 disposed of within 365 days.

- 23 2 fines, 1 probationary case, 5 public reprimands, 2
- 24 revocations, 7 suspensions, and 3 voluntary
- 25 surrenders.

25 Report of Board Counsel - Other - House Bill 75

[Ashley B. Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed House Bill 75, noting the proposed legislation would amend the Board's law and the Medical Practice Act to allow physician assistants to work with either classification of physician, meaning they could work with a medical doctor (MD) or doctor of osteopathic

7 medicine (DO) without having to align with the

8 | physician's license type.

Ms. Goshert informed Board members that House Bill 75 was referred to the House Professional Licensure Committee on January 15, 2025.

Ms. Snyder commented that the Board's previous discussion still stands, and the process can be discussed if they are worried about people receiving licensure quickly. She stated choosing the Board with which they are licensed under and then having either physician as their supervising physician would be difficult in practice.

Ms. Goshert informed Board members that all of their comments were relayed to the legislative staff, and she would reach out to Board members for feedback if there is any new iteration of House Bill 75.

Ms. DeSantis informed Board members that Shana Walter met with the executive director from the Professional Licensure Committee to discuss some of

the things Ms. Snyder was alluding to, and there would be further investigation at the Department of State level.

Ms. DeSantis commented that the implementation of it as written is one of the bigger areas of concern, as well as the risk of discipline based on practicing under the Practice Act of a different Board other than the Board someone is licensed under.]

21 by the Department of Health. He noted Resources for

22 | Health Care Professionals on Health Effects of

23 | Environmental Exposures was released on January 13

24 and has a number of educational resources for

25 providers when answering questions about the impacts

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1 of environmental health on patients.

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Report of Board Counsel - Other - Sunshine Act and
Recusal Presentation

[Ashley B. Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, provided
a PowerPoint presentation on the Pennsylvania
Sunshine Act. She stated the general purpose of the
Sunshine Act is for transparency and to assure

8 stakeholders and the public can be part of the 9 conversation when the Board is making important 10 decisions.

Ms. Goshert explained that meetings must be open to the public after public notice of the meeting anytime an agency holds a meeting at which deliberations or official action takes place. She provided a definition of agency, deliberation, and official action. She discussed public notice and special meetings.

Ms. Goshert discussed Act 65 of 2021 additions to the Sunshine Act and encouraged Board members to notify Ms. Turek in advance if there is a topic they wish to discuss for it could be placed on the agenda.

Ms. Goshert addressed the recording of votes for all open meetings and the requirement of minutes.

She mentioned that the only applicable exceptions to open meeting requirements are executive sessions and

conferences, noting agency business may not occur at a conference. She explained that executive session is an exception and may be held to discuss personnel issues, consulting with legal counsel, and to review and discuss agency business that would violate a lawful privilege or lead to disclosure of information or confidentiality protected by law if held in public.

Ms. Goshert addressed legal challenges for violations, noting anyone can challenge a meeting based on a violation of the Sunshine Act but must be filed within 30 days of the date of the meeting or discovery of any action in which the Sunshine Act was violated. She also discussed penalties for violating the Sunshine Act.

Ms. Goshert noted Board business should be conducted in open meetings, and Board members should not be discussing agency business outside of an official Board meeting. She stated committee meeting deliberations to formulate policy, regulations, etc., should take place at an open meeting with appropriate public notice. She mentioned that any committee performing administrative functions or prosecutorial functions are not subject to open meeting requirements.

Ms. Goshert addressed mandatory recusals, where a Board member may have a prosecutorial role or direct personal or financial interest in the outcome of the matter.

- Ms. Goshert addressed strongly suggested recusals, where a Board member has a personal affection or outside knowledge and cannot make a fair and unbiased determination.
- Dr. Kersey-McMullen commented that the executive meeting prior to the public meeting actually fits one of the caveats where they do not have to have it in a public session even though they are discussing things for the next meeting.
- Ms. Goshert explained that the Board would be deliberating, discussing, and asking counsel advice, which would be exempt from having to be done in public session.
- Ms. Goshert noted that discretionary recusals are when a Board member cannot hear and dispose of the case or participate in a decision on a subject fairly and without prejudice. She encouraged Board members who are uncertain whether to recuse themselves to discuss the matter with counsel.
- Ms. Goshert addressed abstention, noting abstention means someone is withholding their vote

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but does not affect quorum requirements. She noted
the Board member is unable to vote with recusal and
can affect the quorum requirement.

Ms. Goshert discussed conflicts of interests, where no member of any professional examining or licensing board shall at the same time be an officer or an agent of any statewide association or organization representing the profession or the occupation subject to the Board's actions.

Ms. Goshert also mentioned public members cannot have any connection to the profession.

Ms. Goshert announced Jason Giurintano is the new Deputy Chief Counsel and helped construct the PowerPoint presentation.]

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[Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, referred to Chair Bulger's question earlier concerning reappointments, noting Dr. Kersey-McMullen and Dr. Dardarian are slated to be reappointed and confirmed in the spring. He reported no public members have been identified to join the Board at this time.]
