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6 Appointment - Early MPJE Program - Wisconsin Board of Pharmacy

[Tiffany O'Hagan, Vice Chairperson, Wisconsin Board of Pharmacy, presented the Board with a slideshow regarding the early MPJE pilot program Wisconsin is participating in with North Dakota. Ms. O'Hagan provided the Board with a background of the pilot program with Wisconsin. Wisconsin has three schools participating, and this is the second full year students have been allowed to take the MPJE as soon as their didactic learning is complete.

Ms. O'Hagan noted the feedback has been largely positive of the program. Students report feeling less overwhelmed by separating the NAPLEX and MPJE exams. In addition, exam sites are not overwhelmed with students. Students are also able to be licensed quicker as the only post-graduation exam is the NAPLEX. She also reported, in the second year of the program, almost full participation from eligible students.

Ms. O'Hagan reviewed the pilot workflow for the Board. She noted, if a student needs to make a second attempt at the MPJE, there is a manual process to return to an unverified status due to it being a pilot program. NABP is considering expanding the process and making it more automated but are working to ensure there are no gaps where students can apply for an exam they are not yet eligible. In addition, if a second attempt is needed, the student has to wait until after graduation.

Ms. O'Hagan noted, in Wisconsin, 96 percent of students applied, and 126 students were granted eligibility. Wisconsin noticed a shorter time frame from registration to purchasing the examination with the biggest spike of taking the exam in September. The pilot passing rate was 74 percent, down from an average of 80.5 percent, however Ms. O'Hagan stated the rate has risen in the second year. She provided the Board with a slide showing the passing curve.

Chair Roussel asked if there were any regulatory changes needed in Wisconsin to use the pilot program.

Ms. O'Hagan reported Wisconsin regulations were written in a way where regulatory changes were not needed. Wisconsin regulations state the law exam must be taken but do not specify when the exam is to

be taken.

Anthony Bixler, R.Ph., Staff Pharmacist, Wellspan York Hospital, asked if there was a commonality between students who were not granted eligibility to test. Ms. O'Hagan did not have that information from NABP, but it could be investigated.

Chair Roussel and Ms. Trimmer discussed the number of pharmacy students who graduate in Pennsylvania each year. Ms. Trimmer noted students may graduate in Pennsylvania but go to other states for licensure.

Ms. O'Hagan noted students from the 2024 graduating class were the first to be eligible to take the MPJE in late 2023. She added it would be too early to determine if there was any increase in disciplinary actions. She also noted schools have reported early examination has helped students prepare and be more alert of rules and regulations while in clinical rotation.

Mr. Barrett asked if there has been an increase in passing the NAPLEX due to potentially having more time to prepare between exams. Ms. O'Hagan stated she had not seen any data but would check with NABP.

Chair Roussel asked for confirmation the process for students is a bit more streamlined for NAPLEX

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   registration as NABP registration is completed

21 [Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, stated the

22 PA Support Curriculum is a curriculum contracted by

23 the Department of Education with Temple University

24 for the opioid continuing education (CE). Mr.

25 Barrett was currently working on the Pharmacy Board's

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   opioid CE regulation and plans to have the draft
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   annex at the November meeting. He stated all of the
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   other relevant Boards have adopted the PA Support
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   Curriculum. He added the curriculum is not mandatory
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   in that it would not be required for providers to
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   issue it. The curriculum, if offered by a provider,
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   would be Board approved.

Mr. Farrell stated his office is drafting the 15 remainder of the package and hoped to send it to the Governor's Office for review by the end of the year. 16 17 Mr. Barrett noted the Board sees the Annex and 18 Preamble but does not see the additional Regulatory 19 Analysis Form, which covers justifications for 20 changes and legalities. He added the form is 28 or 21 32 questions and varies based on the complexity and 22 scope of the regulation package. 23 Child Abuse Reporting Requirements, 16A-5430, is 24 in the final rulemaking stage. Mr. Farrell reported,

since the last meeting, the package had been approved

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by the Governor's Office and delivered to IRRC and the Legislative Standing Committees. He noted the package is on IRRC's meeting agenda for October 16, 2025. He added the package is deemed approved and will likely be completed by the next Board meeting.

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Licensure by Endorsement (Act 41), 16A-5432, is currently with the Governor's Office and is expected back soon. Mr. Farrell explained the next step will be the Attorney General's Office for review before proceeding to IRRC and being published as proposed.

COVID-19 or Immunization Updates, 16A-5434, is being executed as final omitted. The regulation will bring the regulations into alignment with Act 80 of 2022 and Act 77 of 2024. The final omitted process eliminates some of the regular steps in the regulation process. He added the final regulation might be published by the end of the year or shortly thereafter.

Mr. Barrett reported the last regulation, 16A-5435 regarding the ABC-MAP Opioid Education, will be presented soon to the Board as a draft Annex.]

23 Discussion - Executive Order 2025-02

24 [Sean C. Barrett, Esquire, Board Counsel, introduced

25 Executive Order 2025-02, signed by Governor Shapiro

- 1 on October 1, 2025. The Executive Order, Protecting
- 2 | Pennsylvanians' Health and Freedom by Ensuring Access
- 3 to Safe and Effective Vaccines, reaffirms
- 4 | Pennsylvania's commitment to evidence-based vaccine
- 5 guidance and keeping vaccines accessible and
- 6 affordable for all residents of the Commonwealth.
- 7 The order is in response to recent federal changes to
- 8 | vaccine policy, which have created uncertainty around
- 9 | national vaccine recommendations.
- 10 Mr. Barrett explained, under the Executive Order,
- 11 | the Department of Health will develop a state-based
- 12 program to ensure children continue to receive
- 13 recommended vaccines even if federal coverage
- 14 changes; create a central public website with
- 15 accurate evidence-based vaccine information; and
- 16 convene a vaccine education workgroup that will
- 17 | include state agencies, health professionals and
- 18 community representatives to advise on vaccine access
- 19 and education.
- 20 Mr. Barrett noted the Board of Pharmacy had
- 21 already acted to be ahead of the Executive Order by
- 22 preapproving other competent authorities. He added
- 23 the Boards of Medicine, Osteopathic Medicine, and
- 24 Nursing were considering possibilities to help
- 25 implement the Executive Order, but no immediate

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- 1 action is required by the Board of Pharmacy.
- 2 Agencies such as the Insurance Department, Department
- 3 of Human Services, and Department of Aging have been
- 4 directed to ensure vaccines remain covered and
- 5 accessible for all populations, including Medicaid
- 6 recipients and older adults.
- 7 Mr. Barrett noted the order serves to reinforce
- 8 | the importance of the Board's continues collaboration
- 9 with the Department of Health and the Board's role in
- 10 supporting clear, evidence-based vaccine information
- 11 for licensees and the public.
- 12 Chair Roussel expressed appreciation for the
- 13 order and for Governor Shapiro.]
- 14
- 15 Discussion Pharmacy Technician Registration
- 16 [Christine Roussel, Pharm.D., BCOP, BCSCP,
- 17 | Chairperson, asked for an update on the progress of
- 18 the pharmacy technician registrations and insights
- 19 from Ms. Trimmer.
- 20 Ms. Trimmer noted the office is receiving an
- 21 average of ten applications a day. She shared adding
- 22 a snapshot of requirements to the website has not
- 23 been forgotten and will be posted once approved.
- 24 She stated one of the biggest issues is, if a
- 25 person fails to put their high school education in

when starting the application, their diploma or transcript has to be sent into the office.

Ms. Trimmer also noted applicants are given a specific code for IdentoGo, which must be provided for Ms. Trimmer to access their information, including the FBI background check.

Chair Roussel had received complaints stating the Board will not accept fingerprinting done by their employer. She stated, for the Board to have access to a person's fingerprinting, the access has to be granted at the time of the fingerprinting. She stressed the importance of the codes used by IdentoGo.

Chair Roussel also stated Ms. Trimmer had thoughtfully worked on FAQs for the website. Chair Roussel explained the FAQS have to go through an approval process before they can be posted on the website.

Mr. Bixler asked for clarification surrounding the self-query. He added technicians have half an hour to download the file needed for submission to PALS. He had a couple of technicians print and submit to PALS the face sheet from the data bank showing the number of inquiries. Ms. Trimmer stated she needed the actual file that was sent to the

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applicant. She noted the applicant can take a picture and send that in. She has to be able to verify the information matches what is in the system, there are no data bank reports, and it is within six months.

- Mr. Barrett noted a recent House Bill being worked on will hopefully help grandfather some people into the workforce as registered pharmacy technicians. Jill Rebuck, Executive Director, Pennsylvania Society of Health-System Pharmacists, asked if there was an estimated timeframe for when the FAQs would be posted on the website. Mr. Barrett hoped it would be in the next couple of weeks.
- Mr. Bixler noted several technicians have gone through the registration process with no issues.
- Ms. Rebuck reported PSHP drafted their own FAQs after receiving some clarifications from the Board. She noted a recent question required an attorney as it was related to her record. The person was advised to go through the process, and the Board would determine their eligibility for registration.
- Mr. Barrett explained pharmacy technicians' applications use the same Act 53 determination for offenses that applies to pharmacists in terms of criminal history.]

Chair Roussel stated the curriculum is through the Katz School of Medicine at Temple University and perhaps talking to a pharmacist at university might be a good idea.

Ms. Elliott asked if the child abuse regulation would change any of the requirements. Mr. Barrett noted everything should remain the same as the regulation is intended to run the same way as everything under the Act.

Ms. Elliot questioned the impetus was for the opioid regulations and what the expectations would be. Mr. Barrett stated the Act has been passed several years ago to require the opioid education. The regulation is taking the Act and turning into the regulations. The regulation is updating the CE requirements to reflect opioid education as a requirement.

Ms. Elliott stated PPA reached out to the Governor's Office since the Executive Order and thanked them for bringing clarification to vaccine guidance. She noted there is still some confusion surrounding vaccines and eligibility.

Mr. Barrett acknowledged there is uncertainty surrounding vaccines as different pharmacies are doing different things depending on what their

physicians will authorize. He noted the Board will do what it can to allow vaccine access, but the Board cannot control what policies pharmacies have.

Chair Roussel received similar concerns regarding vaccines. She noted every pharmacy, especially independent pharmacies, have the right to choose to practice and do what they feel comfortable with based on their own scope.]

current MPJE after graduation, changing to the UMPJE,
allowing students to take the law exam before
graduation or removing the law exam requirement

Mr. Barrett reported, according to the NABP website, 45 boards require the passing of the MPJE. Four boards, Arkansas, California, Nevada and Puerto

Rico have their own jurisprudence exam. Five boards,
Alaska, Idaho, Michigan, Vermont and the Virgin
Islands have eliminated the jurisprudence exam. He
suggested the Board invite one or more boards for
insights if it wants to consider eliminating the
exam.

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Mr. Reed asked if the UMPJE as a universal test would also have state-specific modules similar to CE requirement. Chair Roussel there was an option with the UMPJE to require state-specific modules. Another option with no UMPJE would be just a required statespecific process like a Pennsylvania law review CE with follow-up questions. She noted the process would be similar to what is required for child abuse CE in Pennsylvania. She also stated the logistics between doing both the UMPJE and the Pennsylvania module might be cumbersome. However, she added a Pennsylvania specific module might be useful for new pharmacists coming from other states. She noted the Board has the purview to contract with someone to create a state-specific module.

Ms. Rebuck stated PSHP would likely be supportive of a state-specific CE module. She reiterated PSHP's opposition to requiring any pharmacy jurisprudence exam which is consistent with the American Society of

Health-System Pharmacists. She added Governor
Shapiro has made addressing healthcare worker
shortages a priority and has generally spoken about a
desire to ease the process for medical professionals.

Chair Roussel posed the question if the pharmacists recently issued temporary licenses to practice in Pennsylvania had any discipline acted against them.

Mr. Barrett stated the licenses were only three months old and investigations into conduct take time, so he has not heard of any issues. He added, under Act 41, the MPJE is not required due to the caveat of the applicant having been a practicing pharmacist in their state for two of the last five years. He would not use a lack of discipline for temporary licensees as an impetus to eliminate the exam.

Chair Roussel noted NABP would be providing an update on the UMPJE at the Philadelphia meeting. She added the current intention is for the exam to be ready for 2026 or 2027.

Mr. Farrell noted his office has tried to advance the regulation changes for the UMPJE by adjusting the regulation to read "or other pharmacy jurisprudence examination" instead of just "the multi-state jurisprudence exam."

Chair Roussel stated, with the wording added to the regulation, the discussion should be on allowing early testing or in lieu of a test, doing an education CE type program.

Mr. Barrett found it interesting to hear the perspective of Wisconsin. He would like to know if separating the jurisprudence from the NAPLEX leads to a higher pass rate on NAPLEX. He suggested it would be beneficial to do early testing.

Chair Roussel will extend invitations to states who have eliminated the exam to the next Board meeting.

Daniel Longyhore, Pharm.D., System Director,
Knowledge Management, Enterprise Pharmacy, Geisinger,
stated a cursory review showed Idaho enacted their
legislation in 2018 and Michigan in 2023, so Idaho
would have more experience to speak on.

Ms. Rebuck added PSHP is working on polling their membership with questions around the jurisprudence exam. She asked the Board to be thoughtful if adding a Pennsylvania CE modal on top of the exam as it could delay licensure to add another barrier.

Chair Roussel noted the CE would be lieu of an exam. The CE would likely be available online, 24 hours a day and people would receive a certificate

1 | similar to child abuse. She wondered if PSHP might

2 gain better information if they polled people who had

4 two to three years as opposed to someone who took it
