8 purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on

10 the Board and to receive the advice of counsel. The
11 Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.]

12 ***

13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
14 Board of Psychology was held on Monday, June 12,
15 2023. Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, called the
16 meeting to order at 10:31 a.m.

17 ***

18 [Tyesha C. Miley, Esquire, Board Counsel, advised
19 everyone that the meeting was being held in a hybrid
20 format pursuant to Act 100 of 2021 where virtual
21 meetings are permitted and taking place in a public
22 forum to effectuate the business of the Board.

23 She noted the meeting was being recorded, and
24 those who continued to participate were giving their
25 consent to be recorded.

1 Ms. Miley also noted the Board met in Executive
2 Session to have attorney-client consultation and for
3 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial
4 deliberations.]

5

6 Introduction of Board Members

7 [Catherine S. Spayd, Ph.D., Chair, requested an
8 introduction of Board members.]

9

10 Introduction of Attendees

11 [Thomas Leech II, Board Administrator, provided an
12 introduction of attendees.]

13

14 Approval of minutes of the April 3, 2023 meeting

15 CHAIR SPAYD:

16 We are going to go ahead and approve
17 the minutes from our last meeting on
18 April 3.

19

20 Any discussion or any concerns
about the draft minutes as written?

21

22 Is there a motion to approve the
minutes?

23 DR. BRADLEY:

24

I'll make a motion to approve.

25

MS. HARRISON:

1 Second.

2 CHAIR SPAYD:

3 Thomas, can you do a roll call, please?

4

5 Dr. Spayd, aye; Commissioner Claggett,

6 aye; Dr. Bradley, aye; Ms. Harrison,

7 aye; Dr. Maynard, abstain.

8 [The motion carried. Dean Maynard abstained from

9 voting on the motion.]

10

11 Report of Board Prosecution - No Report

12

13 Report of Board Counsel

14 [Tyesha C. Miley, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted Board

15 Counsel had nothing to report.]

16

17 Report of Regulatory Counsel

18 [Cynthia K. Montgomery, Esquire, Deputy Chief

19 Counsel, Counsel Division, Department of State, noted

20 the Board voted to promulgate the proposed rulemaking

21 for 16A-6322 regarding child abuse reporting

22 requirements on August 3, 2020. She provided the

23 proposed rulemaking as published in the Pennsylvania

24 Bulletin on October 22, 2022, for public comment.

25 She informed Board members that no public comments

1 were received during the 30-day public comment
2 period, after which the Independent Regulatory Review
3 Commission provided their letter 30 days later
4 indicating that they had no comments on the proposed
5 rulemaking.

6 Ms. Montgomery also mentioned that no comments
7 were received from the House Professional Licensure
8 Committee or Senate Consumer Protection and
9 Professional Licensure Committee. She informed Board
10 members that the regulation would be deemed approved
11 if they redeliver the regulation unchanged under the
12 Regulatory Review Act, noting there have been no
13 changes made to the rulemaking after it was published
14 as proposed.

15 Ms. Montgomery presented the final rulemaking
16 adopting the final regulations updating the Board's
17 child abuse reporting requirements regulations and
18 requested the Board vote to promulgate the final
19 rulemaking.

20 Chair Spayd asked Ms. Montgomery to provide a
21 summary of the updates.

22 Ms. Montgomery informed Board members that an
23 overview of the updates was included in the preamble.
24 She explained that beginning in 2014 and continuing
25 through 2019 was the last amendment to the Child

1 Protective Services Law that impacted Board
2 regulations. She informed everyone that Board
3 regulations are being updated at § 41.1 under
4 definitions to include updated definitions from the
5 Child Protective Services Law to be consistent with
6 the amendments to the Child Protective Services Law.

7 Ms. Montgomery informed everyone that sections of
8 the Board's regulations regarding licensure,
9 reactivation, obtaining a license, and continuing
10 education are being updated to incorporate the 3
11 hours of training in child abuse recognition and
12 reporting that is required as a condition of
13 licensure and to include at least 2 hours of
14 continuing education as a condition of licensure
15 renewal.

16 Ms. Montgomery stated all of the regulations
17 regarding mandated reporting requirements § 41.71
18 through § 41.76 were all updated to incorporate the
19 changes to the Child Protective Services Law. She
20 noted the law used to say that anyone who came across
21 a child in the performance of their profession that
22 they suspected was a victim of child abuse had to be
23 reported.

24 Ms. Montgomery explained that the law now says
25 that just by virtue of holding a license that it must

1 be reported, not only if they come into contact with
2 someone they suspect was a victim of child abuse in
3 their profession but also if they come in contact
4 with someone through a regular program, activity, or
5 service. She mentioned that it also pertains to
6 someone who is directly responsible for the care,
7 supervision, guidance, or training of a child or an
8 agency or institution they are affiliated with and
9 would be directly responsible for the care of the
10 child as a mandated reporter.

11 Ms. Montgomery noted that if a person makes a
12 specific disclosure to someone that an identifiable
13 child is the victim of child abuse, where someone
14 just tells them they think there may be child abuse
15 that they have the duty to make the report if they
16 can identify the children.

17 Ms. Montgomery also noted they have a duty to
18 report if an individual 14 years of age or older
19 tells them that they have committed child abuse
20 against a child. She stated the regulations are
21 being codified and is really for notice and
22 enforcement to let everybody know and to be
23 consistent with the Child Protective Services Law, so
24 the Board could enforce the regulations if a licensee
25 were to willfully fail to report suspected child

1 abuse.

2 Ms. Montgomery addressed changes regarding
3 members of an institution or organization, where they
4 used to report it to the organization and the
5 organization was responsible for reporting it to
6 ChildLine or to Department of Human Services, noting
7 they now have a personal duty to report and then tell
8 the institution or organization that they made the
9 report.

10 Ms. Montgomery referred to updates regarding the
11 requirement to provide medical summaries of any
12 photos, X-rays, or medical tests to law enforcement
13 and to the immunity from liability section to clarify
14 that if they make a report, they are immune from
15 liability, civil liability, and the board will also
16 uphold the same good faith presumption in making a
17 report.

18 Ms. Montgomery addressed the update to the
19 confidentiality section to clarify that privileged
20 communications under the Child Protective Services
21 Law do not apply if somebody tells them about
22 suspected child abuse, so notwithstanding any other
23 ethical provision to the contrary, a mandated
24 reporter has to make a report of suspected child
25 abuse.

1 Ms. Montgomery noted an update to the
2 noncompliance section, where criminal penalties have
3 increased for willful failure to report suspected
4 child abuse, along with the addition of § 41.71 to set
5 forth mandatory training requirements and § 41.78 to
6 set forth requirements for course providers to get
7 approved. She mentioned the course content is
8 approved by the Department of Human Services because
9 they administer the Child Protective Services Law.
10 She noted the provider's report is sent
11 electronically to the Bureau of Professional and
12 Occupational Affairs (BPOA) and is attached to the
13 licensee or applicant's record.

14 Ms. Montgomery apologized for the delay, noting
15 the Board would now be current with the requirements
16 of the Child Protective Services Law.]

17 MS. MONTGOMERY:

18 If there are no other questions, it
19 would be appropriate for the Chair to
20 accept a motion from a member to
21 promulgate the final-form rulemaking
22 16A-6322 Child Abuse Reporting
23 Requirements.

24 DR. BRADLEY:

25 I'll make a motion.

11 Appointment - Pennie & Medicaid Unwinding

12 Presentation

13 [Scott Yeager, Outreach Manager, Pennie, presented to

14 the Board to provide information about the

15 Pennsylvania Health Insurance Exchange Authority,

16 commonly known as Pennie, which is the official

17 state-based replacement for the federal marketplace

18 at HealthCare.gov.

19 Mr. Yeager stated Pennie launched November 1,

20 2020, and is the only source for financial assistance

21 in the individual health insurance market to help

22 individuals and families who do not have access to

23 employer-sponsored coverage but make too much to

24 qualify for Medical Assistance in Pennsylvania. He

25 noted it is also available for someone who retired a

1 couple of years early but do not have access to
2 Medicare options.

3 Mr. Yeager reported migrating about 280,000
4 customers over from HealthCare.gov and have steadily
5 grown to about 371,000. He pointed out that 9/10
6 Pennie customers qualify for some form of financial
7 assistance. He addressed the tax credit that helps
8 reduce the monthly premium, along with cost-sharing
9 reductions aligned with silver plans to reduce
10 copays, deductibles, and coinsurance.

11 Mr. Yeager stated one out of four Pennie
12 customers are paying less than \$1 a day and 40
13 percent pay less than \$75 a month. He mentioned that
14 Pennie has done a lot to create an affordable
15 insurance that provides choice by having a
16 competitive marketplace.

17 Mr. Yeager addressed the reinsurance program
18 regarding rates in Pennsylvania to help ensure
19 affordability.

20 Mr. Yeager addressed Pennie's open enrollment
21 period from November 1 to January 15, noting it also
22 has a special enrollment period throughout the course
23 of the year for individuals who have a qualifying
24 life event and provided a list of qualifying events.

25 He noted creating a qualifying life event for

1 individuals and families at or below 150 percent of
2 the federal poverty level not eligible for Medical
3 Assistance.

4 Mr. Yeager addressed a program called the Path to
5 Pennie, which is a partnership between Pennie and the
6 Pennsylvania Department of Revenue to help uninsured
7 tax filers in Pennsylvania. He explained that Form
8 REV-1882 could be completed and attached to their
9 state tax return and then the Pennsylvania Department
10 of Revenue securely shares that individual or
11 family's information with Pennie. He noted Pennie
12 then sets up an account, informs the individual of
13 their eligibility for financial assistance, and
14 connects them with resources to help them get
15 protected.

16 Mr. Yeager noted that individuals and families
17 who may lose coverage through Medical Assistance can
18 review options at Pennie to see if they qualify for
19 financial assistance and alleviate that notion of not
20 being able to afford insurance.

21 Mr. Yeager pointed out that the Department of
22 Human Services and Pennie have put together
23 communications and educational materials but also
24 developed two resource sites, where individuals
25 impacted by the end of continuous coverage could

1 learn about resources.

2 Mr. Yeager informed Board members that he would
3 follow up with copy of the presentation and
4 educational resources for review. He mentioned that
5 a toolkit is available at Pennie for anyone who wants
6 to order educational materials free of charge. He
7 also offered to provide executive briefings to
8 organizations and professional associations
9 throughout Pennsylvania. He encouraged anyone who
10 encounters someone who needs insurance to refer them
11 to 844-844-8040.

12 Chair Spayd asked whether the individuals know
13 when Medicare would possibly disenroll them over the
14 course of the year.

15 Mr. Yeager noted that the Department of Human
16 Services and the Insurance Department have been
17 planning and communicating.]

18 ***

19 Appointment - Department of Human Services and
20 Pennsylvania Health Insurance Exchange
21 Authority - Pennie Insurance Presentation
22 [Alexis Deisenroth, Executive
23 Assistant/Communications Coordinator, Office of
24 Income Maintenance (OIM), Department of Human
25 Services, presented to the Board to provided

1 information regarding the unwinding of continuous
2 coverage for Medicaid, communications associated with
3 the renewal process and outreach strategy, and how
4 everyone can help.

5 Ms. Deisenroth stated a Federal Public Health
6 Emergency was declared in 2020 as a result of the
7 coronavirus pandemic, and Congress passed a law for
8 states to receive additional Medicaid funding
9 regardless of status of eligibility known as the
10 continuous coverage requirement.

11 Ms. Deisenroth explained that the Department of
12 Human Services (DHS) continued to communicate and
13 send renewal paperwork to individuals, but
14 individuals were not disenrolled if they did not meet
15 eligibility criteria or provide information. She
16 reported 3.6 million Pennsylvanians were enrolled in
17 Medicaid as of March 31, 2023 and approximately
18 632,000 were ineligible based on their information.

19 Ms. Deisenroth noted Congress passed the
20 Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 at the end of
21 2022, which separated the continuous coverage
22 requirement from the public health emergency. She
23 noted continuous covered ended on March 31, 2023, and
24 the state returned to pre-pandemic renewal process.

25 Ms. Deisenroth stated all individuals who have

1 maintained their eligibility would have the
2 opportunity to renew benefits and would be reviewed
3 over a 12-month period until March 31, 2024, and not
4 lose coverage. She mentioned that they have the
5 ability to renew coverage based on information on
6 file through exchanges with other programs and may be
7 able to renew eligibility even before paperwork is
8 issued.

9 Ms. Deisenroth noted that Medicaid recipients
10 receive a renewal every year and DHS added
11 communications during the unwinding period to
12 emphasize the importance of completing the renewal.
13 She noted DHS sends communications about 90 days
14 ahead of the renewal requesting updated information,
15 60 days ahead of renewal prompting individuals to
16 start the renewal process early, a renewal packet 30
17 days before renewal, a text message reminding them
18 the renewal is coming, and another text message 5
19 five days before the renewal is due. She stated
20 noted the lists could be found at
21 dhs.pa.gov/staycovered.

22 Ms. Deisenroth addressed the renewal
23 communications process following the renewal process,
24 where the household receives an eligibility notice
25 whether they are still eligible for coverage at their

1 current coverage level, as well as an appeal and
2 reconsideration processes.

3 Ms. Deisenroth stated information would be
4 securely and automatically transferred to Pennie for
5 anyone found ineligible. She noted that anyone who
6 does not complete the renewal would receive a mailing
7 informing them that they have the ability to return
8 the renewal late to avoid loss of coverage. She
9 mentioned that the information would also be given to
10 Pennie.

11 Mr. Yeager explained that anyone financially
12 ineligible for Medical Assistance in the special
13 enrollment period from January 1 to December 31 and
14 in the process of being transferred from the
15 Department of Human Services to Pennie would also
16 have a communication cycle on Pennie's end that
17 includes setting up an account, making sure they know
18 their estimate of financial assistance, and
19 enrollment deadlines to secure coverage without a gap
20 in coverage.

21 Mr. Yeager stated the special enrollment period
22 is typically 60 days for individuals who lost
23 coverage through Medical Assistance. He noted
24 Pennie's Board of Directors created a 120-day special
25 enrollment period specifically for anyone impacted by

1 the end of continuous coverage and loss of Medical
2 Assistance.

3 Mr. Yeager mentioned that customers could receive
4 help online, through Pennie's contact center, and
5 through local assistance from Pennie brokers and
6 assistors. He stated everything is part of their no
7 wrong door policy to ensure individuals are aware of
8 options. He stated the most important number for
9 individuals impacted by the loss of health insurance
10 is 844-844-8040 and through pennie.com/connect.

11 Ali Fogarty, Communications Director,
12 Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, Office of
13 Press & Communications, addressed the long-term
14 advertising campaign with Pennie and DHS through
15 commercials, radio, outdoor billboards, mass transit
16 ads, and social media in several languages. She also
17 mentioned they would be engaging in a grassroots
18 outreach effort and encouraged everyone to visit
19 their website at dhs.pa.gov/staycovered for a wealth
20 of resources.

21 Ms. Fogarty noted the helper portal could be
22 accessed through dhs.pa.gov/staycovered and explained
23 it to be a Listserv ran through DHS in partnership
24 with Pennie and encouraged everyone to sign up as a
25 helper.

1 Chair Spayed thanked the Department of Human
2 Services for their presentation.]

3

5 [Tyesha C. Miley, Esquire, Board Counsel, addressed
6 questions Dr. Erickson presented at the last meeting
7 regarding regulations. She provided the most recent
8 annex for 16A-6317 pertaining to continuing
9 education, noting no change from the prior
10 submission. She noted the last documentation
11 reviewed indicated the preamble and annex had been
12 moving forward in the process but has not been
13 published. She explained that the Board would be
14 able to present for purposes of action at the next
15 meeting regarding the proposed rulemakings, which
16 would be on the next agenda.

17 Ms. Miley noted no changes have been made to 16A-
18 6320 pertaining to general revisions and would also
19 be on the next agenda for action.

20 Ms. Miley addressed 16A-6324 Code of Ethics, also
21 noting no change because the regulation would not be
22 changed unless the American Psychological Association
23 (APA) changes their Code of Ethics.

24 Ms. Miley referred to 16A-6327 regarding the
25 Psychological Clinical Science Accreditation System

1 (PCSAS) parity. She mentioned that the annex is
2 currently in the internal review process and is
3 hopeful that action could be taken at the next
4 meeting.]
