Servicemember's 10 weeks of basic combat training and 11 weeks of advanced individual training is insufficient in satisfying educational requirement for Veterinary Technician certification. However, candidate's advanced individual training and specialty credentials earned during time of service may count towards some degree credit from an academic institution. Additionally, the Veterinary Medicine Board permits unlicensed veterinary assistants to practice, which may be an appropriate route for individuals who do not hold an associate degree in veterinary technology.
