INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Trustees of Esperanza Cyber Charter School:

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and the major fund of Esperanza Cyber Charter School ("the School") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2024, and the related notes to financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of governmental activities and the major fund of the School as of June 30, 2024 and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS") and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the School and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Change in Accounting Principle

As discussed in Note 2 to the financial statements, the School changed the treatment of salary accrual of 10-month employees for the year ended June 30, 2024. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the School's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly after.



Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include
 examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
 appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of
 the School's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the School's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that management's discussion and analysis, the schedule of revenues, expenditures and change in fund balances budget and actual, the schedule of proportionate share of Public School Employees' Retirement System ("PSERS") net pension liability and contributions, and the schedule of proportionate share of PSERS postemployment benefits other than pensions ("OPEB") liability and OPEB contributions on pages 4 through 7 and pages 31 through 33 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with GAAS, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.



Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR") Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* ("Uniform Guidance"), is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 18, 2024, on our consideration of Esperanza Cyber Charter School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management of Esperanza Cyber Charter School (the "School") offers readers of the School's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the School for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the School's financial statements.

Financial Highlights

- During the year ended June 30, 2015, the School was required to adopt GASB 68 relative to its participation in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Public-School Employees' Retirement System ("PSERS") Pension Plan. Charter schools are required to offer this retirement plan to their employees as a condition of their charter. The Commonwealth controls all aspects of the plan including assets and administration. The School makes contributions as defined by the Commonwealth. With the adoption of GASB 68, the School is required to record a liability for its proportionate share of the PSERS plan and expenses related to the performance of plan administration against its goals. The School also recorded \$769,653 in non-cash expense related to plan administrative performance in addition to the required cash contributions of \$868,038. PSERS is reporting a total net pension liability of \$44,486,380,000 as of June 30, 2023. All public schools in Pennsylvania are required to record a proportionate share of the liability in their financial statements. The net pension liability is being funded through annual required contributions and is not likely to be callable in full at any point in time.
- During the year ended June 30, 2018, the School was required to adopt GASB 75 relative to its participation in the PSERS' Health Insurance Premium Assistance Program. The Commonwealth controls all aspects of the plan including assets and administration. The School makes contributions as defined by the Commonwealth. With the adoption of GASB 75, the School is required to record a liability for its proportionate share of the PSERS other postemployment benefit plan ("OPEB") and expenses related to the performance of plan administration against its goals. The School also recorded \$25,436 in non-cash expense related to plan administrative performance in addition to the required cash contributions of \$26,681. PSERS' Health Insurance Premium Assistance Program is reporting a total net OPEB liability of \$1,809,226,000 as of June 30, 2023. All public schools in Pennsylvania are required to record a proportionate share of the liability in their financial statements. The net OPEB liability is being funded through annual required contributions and is not likely to be callable in full at any point in time.
- At the close of the current fiscal year, the School reported ending net position of \$19,053,544. There was an increase in net position of \$4,522,521 for the activities of the year ended June 30, 2024.
- The School's cash balance at June 30, 2024 was \$21,127,748, representing an increase of \$5,136,515 from June 30, 2023.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The School's basic financial statements as presented comprise three components: government-wide financial statements, fund financial statements, and notes to the financial statements. This report also includes supplementary information intended to furnish additional detail to support the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the School's assets, deferred outflows, liabilities, and deferred inflows with the difference between them reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating. However, with the implementation of GASB 68 and GASB 75 and the entries required to record PSERS liabilities, the net position is negatively skewed.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the School's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows.

The government-wide financial statements report on the function of the School that is principally supported by subsidies from school districts whose constituents attend the School.

Fund Financial Statements

A *fund* is a group of related accounts that are used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or purposes. The School, like governmental type entities, utilizes fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The School has two governmental funds - general and student activities which are combined and presented as the general fund.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a school's financial position. However, in the case of the School, as a result of the application of GASB 68 and GASB 75, net position is not a useful indicator of the School's financial position because deferred inflows, deferred outflows, net OPEB liability and net pension liability caused a reduction of \$3,520,380 for the year ended June 30, 2024. The deficit in the School's net assets for these items is due to the required recording of its proportionate share of the entire PSERS plan for both pension and OPEB offset by expense related to the performance of plan administration in fiscal year 2023. Assets and deferred outflows exceed liabilities and deferred inflows by \$19,053,544 as of June 30, 2024, inclusive of the pension and OPEB obligations.

Governmental Funds

The focus of the School's *governmental funds* is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In particular, *fund balance* may serve as a useful measure of net resources available for spending for program purposes at the end of the fiscal year.

The School's governmental funds (the general fund) reported an ending fund balance of \$19,053,544. For the year ended June 30, 2024, the School's revenues \$24,750,550 exceeded its expenditures \$20,228,029 by \$4,522,521. There was also an effect of a change of accounting principle regarding the accrual of summer wages that decreased net position by \$1,165,655.

Governmental Fund Budgetary Highlights

Some categories of revenues and expenditures vary from the prior year. The differences between the years were primarily due to changing enrollment and per pupil funding and the forgiveness of the Paycheck Protection loan.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

As of June 30, 2024, the School's net investment in capital assets for its governmental activities totals \$4,786,057 (net of depreciation). This investment in capital assets consists of building improvements, furniture and equipment, right-of-use assets – building and right-of-use assets – equipment.

There was \$315,409 worth of fixed assets purchased during the year ended June 30, 2024.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The School's primary source of revenue, the subsidy provided by the School District of Philadelphia, is expected to increase for fiscal year 2024-2025 due to an increase in subsidy per student and an increase in the number of students enrolled for the year. The per student payments received from the School District will increase to \$12,754 per regular education student and \$40,053 per special education student.

1. ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE OF CORPORATION

In 1987 the Hispanic Clergy of Philadelphia founded and incorporated the non-profit Nueva Esperanza, Inc. ("NEI"), dba Esperanza, to provide support to Hispanic communities. For more than 30 years NEI's efforts have focused on creating opportunities for Hispanic children and families living in Philadelphia's Hunting Park community. NEI's intentional focus on creating quality education delivery systems and facilities included founding Esperanza Cyber Charter School as a continued effort to raise the economic and social levels of the Hispanic community through quality education.

Esperanza Cyber Charter School is a charter school located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The School serves grades kindergarten through twelve. The School was established and operates under the provisions enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1997. Esperanza Cyber Charter School began operations in July 2012. The School provides instruction in the form of interactive distance learning classrooms, one-to-one tutoring, computer-supported collaborative learning, project-based learning, and instruction tailored to each student's individual education needs. Students access their courses online where worksheets, study material, quizzes and tests are all provided for the student to either read and complete on the computer or print for their own reference or completion by hand.

The Cyber Charter School contract was approved effective June 2012 and expired in June 2017. A charter renewal application was submitted to the Commonwealth on October 1, 2016 and is pending approval. The Commonwealth is significantly behind in its renewal reviews and the Cyber Charter School continues to operate under the original agreement. Esperanza Cyber Charter School has financial accountability and control over all activities related to the students' education. The School receives funding from local, state, and federal government sources and must comply with the requirements of these funding source entities. However, the School is not included in any other governmental "reporting entity" as defined by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") pronouncement. In addition, there are no component units as defined in the standards established for defining and reporting on the financial reporting entity.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of the School have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The GASB has issued a codification of governmental accounting and financial reporting standards. This codification and subsequent GASB pronouncements are recognized as U.S. generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP") for state and local governments.

Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report on the School as a whole. The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of the School's function are offset by program revenues.

The fund financial statements (governmental funds balance sheet and statement of governmental funds revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances) report on the School's general and student activities funds which are combined in the general fund as they do not meet the criteria for any other governmental fund type.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements – The statement of net position and the statement of
activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of
accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is
incurred regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as
soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by providers have been met.

Net position represents the difference between assets and deferred outflows of resources less liabilities and deferred inflows of resources.

• Fund Financial Statements – Governmental funds financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they have been earned and they are measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the School considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service principal and interest expenditures on general long-term debt, including lease liabilities, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences, and claims and judgements, post-employment benefits and environmental obligations are recognized later based on specific accounting rules applicable to each, generally when payment is due. General capital asset acquisitions, including entering into contracts giving the School the right to use leased assets, are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Issuance of long-term debt and financing through leases are reported as other financing sources. The government reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund: The General Fund is the operating fund of the School and accounts for all revenues and expenditures of the School, including food services and student activities.

Method of Accounting

The School has adopted the provision of the accounting pronouncement on financial reporting for state and local governments. The accounting pronouncement on financial reporting for state and local governments established standards for external financial reporting for all state and local governmental entities, which includes a statement of net position, and a statement of activities and changes in net position. It requires the classification of net position into three components - invested in capital assets; restricted; and unrestricted.

These classifications are defined as follows:

• Invested in Capital Assets – This component of net position consists of capital assets, including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation plus related deferred outflows of resources and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, leases or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets and related deferred inflows of resources. If there are significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end, the portion of the debt attributable to the unspent proceeds is not included in the calculation of invested in capital assets, net of related debt. Rather, that portion of the debt is included in the same net asset's component as the unspent proceeds.

- Restricted This component of net position consists of constraints placed on net asset use through
 external constraints imposed by creditors such as through debt covenants, grantors, contributors, or
 laws or regulations of other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional
 provisions or enabling legislation. The School presently has no temporarily or permanently restricted
 net position.
- Unrestricted This component of net position consists of net positions that do not meet the definition
 of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets".

In the Fund Statements – Governmental funds report non-spendable portions of fund balance related to such items as prepaid expenses and long-term receivables. Restricted funds are constrained by outside parties (statute, grantors, bond agreements, etc.). Committed fund balances represent amounts constrained for a specific purpose by a governmental entity using its highest level of decision-making authority. Committed fund balances are established and modified by a resolution approved by the Board of Trustees. Assigned fund balances are intended by the School to be used for specific purposes but are neither restricted nor committed and are assigned by the Board of Trustees. Unassigned fund balances are considered to be the remaining amounts.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

Budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles in the United State of America. An annual budget is adopted for the governmental funds.

The Budgetary Comparison Schedule should present both the original and the final appropriated budgets for the accounting period. The School only has a governmental funds budget. The original and final budgets are required supplementary information. The Board of Trustees has ultimate legal level control over the budget.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Periodically, the School may maintain deposits in excess of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation's limit of \$250,000, with financial institutions in interest bearing accounts. Any loss incurred or a lack of access to such funds could have a significant adverse impact on the School's financial condition, results of operations, and cash flows. In addition, contributions and grants receivable potentially subject the School to concentrations of credit risk. The School received 80% of its total revenue from one source for the year ended June 30, 2024.

Cash

The School's cash is considered to be cash on hand and demand deposits.

Prepaid expenses

Prepaid expenses include payments to vendors for services applicable to future accounting periods such as rental payments and insurance premiums.

Receivables

Receivables primarily consist of amounts due from the Pennsylvania Department of Education for federal and state subsidy programs. Receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. As of June 30, 2024 and 2023, no allowance for doubtful accounts was deemed warranted based on historical experience.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include furniture, are reported in the government-wide financial statements. All capital assets are capitalized at cost, except for the right-to-use leased assets which are further described below, and updated for additions and retirements during the year. The School does not possess any infrastructure. Improvements are capitalized. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's useful life are not. Capital assets of the School are depreciated using the straight-line method over the useful lives of the assets. The estimated useful lives of machinery and equipment range from five to seven years, and the right of use leased assets from 3 to 30 years. Leasehold improvements are amortized over the life of the lease.

Income Tax Status

The School is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code. Accordingly, no provision or liability for income taxes is recorded in the financial statements. The School adopted the accounting pronouncement dealing with uncertain tax positions as of the date of inception in July 2012. Upon adoption of this accounting pronouncement, the School had no unrecognized tax benefits. Furthermore, the School had no unrecognized tax benefits at June 30, 2024. In addition, the School had no income tax related penalties or interest for the period reported in these financial statements.

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

Deferred outflows of resources represent a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until that time.

Deferred inflows of resources represent an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time.

Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources to pensions and pension expense, information about the fiduciary position of the Public-School Employees' Retirement System ("PSERS" or the "System") and additions to or deductions from PSERS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported in PSERS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Other Postemployment Benefits

For purposes of measuring the OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary position of PSERS and additions to or deductions from PSERS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported in PSERS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Leases

The School is a lessee for a noncancellable lease of equipment and buildings. The School recognizes a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset (lease asset) in the government-wide financial statements.

At the commencement of a lease, the School initially measures the lease liability at the present value of payments expected to be made during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease liability is reduced by the principal portion of lease payments made. The lease asset is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for lease payments made at or before the lease commencement date, plus certain initial direct costs. Subsequently, the lease asset is amortized on a straight-line basis over its useful life.

Key estimates and judgements related to leases include how the School determines (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease payments to present value, (2) lease term, and (3) lease payments.

- The School uses the interest rate charged by the lessor as the discount rate. When the interest rate charged by the lessor is not provided, the School generally uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the noncancellable period of the lease. Lease payments included in the
 measurement of the lease liability are composed of fixed payments and purchase option price that
 the School is reasonably certain to exercise.

The School monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease and will remeasure the lease asset and liability if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease liability. Lease assets are reported with other capital assets and lease liabilities are reported separately on the statement of net position.

Adopted Governmental Accounting Pronouncements

GASB Statement 100 - Accounting Changes and Error Corrections - an amendment of GASB 62 is effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2023. The objective of this statement is to provide consistency for changes in accounting principles, accounting estimates, and the reporting entity and corrections of errors. The adoption of this pronouncement did not have a material impact on the financial statements, however the following note addresses the provisions of GASB Statement 100.

Change in Accounting Principle

During the year 2024, the School began accruing salaries for 10-month employees. Some of the employees at the School have elected to receive their pay over the 10-month period of the school year rather than the 12-month calendar year. In prior years, the School had not accrued these salaries for the employees. The change was made to more accurately reflect the statement of financial position and activities related to the academic school year. This change resulted in a decrease to opening fund balance and position of \$(1,165,655). The change in accounting principle impacted accounts payable and accrued expenses and instruction expenses.

3. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the School's deposits may not be returned to it. The School does have a policy for custodial credit risk. For the year ended June 30, 2024, the School's bank balance exposed to custodial credit risk was \$21,127,748, as follows:

Depreciation and amortization expense for the year ended June 30, 2024 was \$256,570. Depreciation and amortization expense was unallocated in the statement of activities for the years ended June 30, 2024.

5. RISK MANAGEMENT

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The School carries commercial insurance for such risks. There have been no settled claims resulting from these risks which have exceeded commercial insurance coverage.

6. LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCY REVENUE

Charter schools are funded by the local public-school district in which each student resides. The rate per student is determined annually and is based on the budgeted total expenditure per average daily membership of the prior school year for each school district. The majority of the students of the School reside in Philadelphia. For the year ended June 30, 2024, the rate for the School District of Philadelphia was \$11,569 per year for regular education students plus additional funding for special education students. The annual rate is earned monthly and paid when billed to the School District of Philadelphia or other local school district. It is prorated if a student enters or leaves during the year. Total revenue from local sources was \$20,202,812 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024.

7. GOVERNMENT GRANTS AND REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAMS

The School participates in numerous state and federal grant and reimbursement programs, which are governed by various rules and regulations of the grantor agencies. Costs charged to the respective grant programs and reimbursement programs for retirement (pension) expense are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that the School has not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grants and reimbursement programs, refunds of any money received may be required and the collectability of any related receivable at June 30, 2024 may be impaired.

In the opinion of the School, there are no significant contingent liabilities relating to compliance with the rules and regulations governing the respective grants; therefore, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements for such contingencies.

10. RELATED PARTY

The School and the related organizations have two common board members.

The School made payments to Nueva Esperanza, Inc. ("NEI") under a Board approved services contract for human resources management, legal representation, financial accounting, reporting and audit, development and funding, real estate development, public relations, government relations, information technology support, management support, and other administrative services provided by NEI in the amount of \$1,918,089 for the year ended June 30, 2024. For the year ended June 30, 2024, the School owed NEI \$99,731. Additionally, NEI owed the School \$222,153.

As described in Note 8, the School leases a portion of 199 Hunting Park Corporation's building under a renewable operating lease. In connection with the operation of its charter school, the School made payments to 199 Hunting Park Corporation in the amount of \$269,539 for the year ended June 30, 2024. This payment includes payment for utilities, repair and maintenance, and rental payments. At June 30, 2024, the School owed 199 Hunting Park Corporation \$51,637.

The School advertised under a Board approved contract with Impacto Ads LLC ("Impacto"). The School incurred expenditures of \$46,000 for advertising costs, for the year ended June 30, 2024.

The School incurred expenses of \$30,366 to Teatro Esperanza for the year ended June 30, 2024 for rental of a property for events. The School owed Teatro Esperanza \$68,498 as of June 30, 2024.

Nueva Esperanza Academy Charter School ("NEA") paid various operating expenses for the School during the year ended June 30, 2024. The School owed NEA \$234,727 at June 30, 2024.

11. COMMITMENTS

Grants received are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenses which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the School expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

12. PENSIONS

Esperanza Cyber Charter School offers two (2) retirement plan options, the Public-School Employees Retirement System ("PSERS") and a 403b Plan. Beginning in fiscal year 2015, new employees who are not members of the PSERS retirement plan are automatically enrolled in the 403b Plan. New employees who were participants in PSERS can opt for the 403b Plan or PSERS. Existing employees who are participants in the PSERS Plan remain in that plan.

The 403b Plan is a defined contribution plan. Employees in the 403b Plan contribute a mandatory 5% deferral amount and can contribute a higher percentage up to the maximum dollar amount allowed by the IRS. The School provides matching contributions dollar for dollar up to 5% of compensation based on payroll compensation. Deferrals over 5% of salary are not matched. The 403b Plan has an immediate vesting schedule. The plan offers a diversified lineup of employee directed investment options. The default investment option, if one is not selected at the time of enrollment, is a Target Date Fund corresponding with the employee's age. Investment options can be changed at any time by the employee. Employer contributions to the 403b Plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024 were \$384,031.

General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description

PSERS is a governmental cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that provides retirement benefits to public school employees of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The members eligible to participate in the System include all full-time public school employees, part-time hourly public school employees who render at least 500 hours of service in the school year, and part-time per diem public school employees who render at least 80 days of service in the school year in any of the reporting entities in Pennsylvania. PSERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at www.psers.pa.gov.

Benefits Provided

PSERS provides retirement, disability, and death benefits. Members are eligible for monthly retirement benefits upon reaching (a) age 62 with at least 1 year of credited service; (b) age 60 with 30 or more years of credited service; or (c) 35 or more years of service regardless of age. Act 120 of 2010 (Act 120) preserves the benefits of existing members and introduced benefit reductions for individuals who become new members on or after July 1, 2011. Act 120 created two new membership classes, Membership Class T-E (Class T-E) and Membership Class T-F (Class T-F). To qualify for normal retirement, Class T-E and Class T-F members must work until age 65 with a minimum of 3 years of service or attain a total combination of age and service that is equal to or greater than 92 with a minimum of 35 years of service.

Act 5 of 2017 (Act 5) introduced a hybrid benefit with two membership classes and a separate defined contribution plan for individuals who become new members on or after July 1, 2019. Act 5 created two new hybrid membership classes, Membership Class T-G (Class T-G) and Membership Class T-H (Class T-H) and the separate defined contribution membership class, Membership Class DC (Class DC). To qualify for normal retirement, Class T-G and Class T-H members must work until age 67 with a minimum of 3 years of credited service. Class T-G may also qualify for normal retirement by attaining a total combination of age and service that is equal to or greater than 97 with a minimum of 35 years of credited service.

Benefits are generally between 1% to 2.5%, depending upon membership class, of the member's final average salary (as defined in the Code) multiplied by the number of years of credited service.

For members whose membership started prior to July 1, 2011, after completion of five years of service, a member's right to the defined benefits is vested and early retirement benefits may be elected. For Class T-E and Class T-F members, the right to benefits is vested after ten years of service.

Participants are eligible for disability retirement benefits after completion of five years of credited service. Such benefits are generally equal to 2% or 2.5%, depending upon membership class, of the member's final average salary (as defined in the Code) multiplied by the number of years of credited service, but not less than one-third of such salary nor greater than the benefit the member would have had at normal retirement age. Members over normal retirement age may apply for disability benefits.

Death benefits are payable upon the death of an active member who has reached age 62 with at least one year of credited service (age 65 with at least three years of credited service for Class T-E and Class T-F members) or who has at least five years of credited service (ten years for Class T-E and Class T-F members). Such benefits are actuarially equivalent to the benefit that would have been effective if the member had retired on the day before death.

Member Contributions

Member contributions are as follows:

- Active members who joined the System prior to July 22, 1983, contribute at 5.25% (Membership Class T-C) or at 6.5% (Membership Class T-D) of the member's qualifying compensation.
- Members who joined the System on or after July 22, 1983, and who were active or inactive as of July 1, 2001, contribute at 6.25% (Membership Class T-C) or at 7.5% (Membership Class T-D) of the member's qualifying compensation.
- Members who joined the System after June 30, 2001 and before July 1, 2011, contribute at 7.5% (automatic Membership Class T-D). For all new hires and for members who elected Class T-D membership, the higher contribution rates began with service rendered on or after January 1, 2002.

- Members who joined the System after June 30, 2011, automatically contribute at the Membership Class T-E rate of 7.5% (base rate) of the member's qualifying compensation. All new hires after June 30, 2011, who elect Class T-F membership, contribute 10.3% (base rate) of the member's qualifying compensation.
- Membership T-E and Class T-F are affected by the "shared risk" provision that in future fiscal years could cause the Membership Class T-E contribution rate to fluctuate between 7.5% and 9.5% and Membership Class T-F contribution rate to fluctuate between 10.3% and 12.3%.

Employer Contributions

The School's contractually required contribution rate for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2024 was 33.09% of covered payroll, actuarially determined as an amount that, when combined with employee contributions, is expected to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability. Contributions to the pension plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024 were \$973,345. As a result of the changes in the net pension liability, the GASB 68 expense for the year ended June 30, 2024 was \$769,653.

13. PENSION LIABILITIES, PENSION EXPENSE, AND DEFERRED OUTFLOWS OF RESOURCES AND DEFERRED INFLOWS OF RESOURCES RELATED TO PENSIONS

At June 30, 2024, the School reported a liability of \$6,628,000 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2023, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by rolling forward the System's total pension liability as of June 30, 2022 to June 30, 2023. The School's proportion of the net pension liability was calculated utilizing the employer's one-year reported contributions to the plan as it relates to the total one-year reported contribution to the plan for the plan as a whole. At June 30, 2023, the School's proportion was 0.0149%, which was an increase of 0.0049% from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2022. For the year ended June 30, 2024, the employer recognized pension expense was \$1,673,691.

Actuarial Assumptions

The Total Pension Liability as of June 30, 2023 was determined by rolling forward the System's Total Pension Liability as of June 30, 2022 to June 30, 2023 using the following actuarial assumptions, applied to all periods included in the measurement:

- Valuation Date June 30, 2022
- Actuarial cost method Entry Age Normal level % of pay.
- Investment return 7.00%, includes inflation at 2.50%.
- Salary growth Effective average of 4.50%, comprised of inflation of 2.50% and 2.00% for real wage growth and for merit or seniority increases.
- Mortality rates were based on a blend of 50% PubT-2010 and 50% PubG-2010 Retiree Tables for Males and Females, adjusted to reflect PSERS' experience and projected using a modified version of the MP-2020 Improvement Scale.
- The discount rate used to measure the Total Pension Liability was 7.00% as of June 30, 2022 and as
 of June 30, 2023.
- Demographic and economic assumptions approved by the Board for use effective with the June 30, 2021 actuarial valuation:
 - Salary growth rate decreased from 5.00% to 4.50%.
 - Real wage growth and merit or seniority increases (components for salary growth) decreased from 2.75% and 2.25% to 2.50% and 2.00%, respectively.
 - Mortality rates Previously based on the RP-2014 Mortality Tables for Males and Females, adjusted to reflect PSERS' experience and projected using a modified version of the MP-2015 Mortality Improvement Scale. Effective with the June 30, 2021 actuarial valuation, mortality rates are based on a blend of 50% PubT-2010 and 50% PubG-2010 Retiree Tables for Males and Females, adjusted to reflect PSERS' experience and projected using a modified version of the MP-2020 Improvement Scale.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2023 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study that was performed for the five year the period ending June 30, 2020. The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation.

The pension plan's policy in regard to the allocation of invested plan assets is established and may be amended by the Board. Plan assets are managed with a long-term objective of achieving and maintaining a fully funded status for the benefits provided through the pension.

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.00%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members will be made at the current contribution rate and that contributions from employers will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

14. OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Esperanza Cyber Charter School offers a post-retirement health insurance premium assistance plan option through the PSERS.

General Information about the Pension Plan

Health Insurance Premium Assistance Program

The System provides Premium Assistance which, is a governmental cost sharing, multiple-employer other postemployment benefit plan (OPEB) for all eligible retirees who qualify and elect to participate. Employer contribution rates for Premium Assistance are established to provide reserves in the Health Insurance Account that are sufficient for the payment of Premium Assistance benefits for each succeeding year. Effective January 1, 2002 under the provisions of Act 9 of 2001, participating eligible retirees are entitled to receive premium assistance payments equal to the lesser of \$100 per month or their out-of-pocket monthly health insurance premium. To receive premium assistance, eligible retirees must obtain their health insurance through either their school employer or the PSERS' Health Options Program. As of June 30, 2023 there were no assumed future benefit increases to participating eligible retirees.

Premium Assistance Eligibility Criteria

Retirees of the System can participate in the OPEB plan if they satisfy the following criteria:

- Have 24½ or more years of service, or
- Are a disability retiree, or
- Have 15 or more years of service and retired after reaching superannuation age.

For Class DC members to become eligible for premium assistance, they must satisfy the following criteria:

- Attain Medicare eligibility with 24 ½ or more eligibility points, or
- Have 15 or more eligibility points and terminated after age 67, and
- Have received all or part of their distributions.

Pension Plan Description

See description of the PSERS Plan in Note 11.

Benefits Provided

Participating eligible retirees are entitled to receive premium assistance payments equal to the lesser of \$100 per month or their out-of-pocket monthly health insurance premium. To receive premium assistance, eligible retirees must obtain their health insurance through either their school employer or the PSERS' Health Options Program.

Employer Contributions

The School's contractually required contribution rate for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023 was 0.75% of covered payroll, actuarially determined as an amount that, when combined with employee contributions, is expected to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability. Contributions to the other postemployment benefit plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024 were \$21,275. As a result of changes in net OPEB liability, the GASB 75 expense for the year ended June 30, 2024 was \$26,433.

15. OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS LIABILITIES, EXPENSE, AND DEFERRED OUTFLOWS OF RESOURCES AND DEFERRED INFLOWS OF RESOURCES RELATED TO OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

At June 30, 2024, the School reported a liability of \$268,000 for its proportionate share of the net OPEB liability. The net OPEB liability was measured as of June 30, 2023, and the total OPEB liability used to calculate the net OPEB liability was determined by rolling forward the System's total actuarial determined OPEB liability as of June 30, 2022 to June 30, 2023. The School's proportion of the net OPEB liability was calculated utilizing the employer's one-year reported covered payroll as it relates to the total one-year reported covered payroll. At June 30, 2024, the School's proportion was .0148%, which was an increase of .0049% from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2023.

Actuarial Assumptions

The Total OPEB Liability as of June 30, 2023, was determined by rolling forward the System's Total OPEB Liability as of June 30, 2022 to June 30, 2023, using the following actuarial assumptions, applied to all periods included in the measurement:

- Actuarial cost method Entry Age Normal level % of pay.
- Investment return 4.13% S&P 20 Year Municipal Bond Rate.

- Salary growth Effective average of 4.5%, comprised of inflation of 2.50% and 2.00% for real wage growth and for merit or seniority increases.
- Premium Assistance reimbursement is capped at \$1,200 per year.
- Assumed Healthcare cost trends were applied to retirees with less than \$1,200 in premium assistance per year.
- Mortality rates were based on a blend of 50% PubT-2010 and 50% PubG-2010 Retiree Tables for Males and Females, adjusted to reflect PSERS' experience and projected using a modified version of the MP-2020 Improvement Scale.

Participation rate:

- Eligible retirees will elect to participate Pre age 65 at 50%.
- Eligible retirees will elect to participate Post age 65 at 70%.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2022 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study that was performed for the five year period ending June 30, 2020.

The following assumptions were used to determine the contribution rate:

- The results of the actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2021 determined the employer contribution rate for fiscal year 2023.
- Cost Method: Amount necessary to assure solvency of Premium Assistance through the third fiscal year after the valuation date.
- Asset valuation method: Market Value.
- Participation rate: The actual data for retirees benefiting under the Plan as of June 30, 2021 was used in lieu of the 63% utilization assumption for eligible retirees.
- Mortality Tables for Males and Females, adjusted to reflect PSERS' experience and projected using a modified version of the MP-2015 Mortality Improvement Scale.

Investments consist primarily of short-term assets designed to protect the principal of the plan assets. The expected rate of return on OPEB plan investments was determined using the OPEB asset allocation policy and best estimates of geometric real rates of return for each asset class.

The OPEB plan's policy in regard to the allocation of invested plan assets is established and may be amended by the Board. Under the program, as defined in the retirement code employer contribution rates for Premium Assistance are established to provide reserves in the Health Insurance Account that are sufficient for the payment of Premium Assistance benefits for each succeeding year.

The above was the Board's adopted asset allocation policy and best estimates of geometric real rates of return for each major asset class as of June 30, 2023.

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the Total OPEB Liability was 4.13%. Under the plan's funding policy, contributions are structured for short term funding of Premium Assistance. The funding policy sets contribution rates necessary to assure solvency of Premium Assistance through the third fiscal year after the actuarial valuation date. The Premium Assistance account is funded to establish reserves that are sufficient for the payment of Premium Assistance benefits for each succeeding year. Due to the short term funding policy, the OPEB plan's fiduciary net position was not projected to be sufficient to meet projected future benefit payments, therefore the plan is considered a "pay-as-you-go" plan. A discount rate of 4.13% which represents the S&P 20 year Municipal Bond Rate at June 30, 2023, was applied to all projected benefit payments to measure the total OPEB liability.

Sensitivity of the System Net OPEB Liability to Change in Healthcare Cost Trend Rates

Healthcare cost trends were applied to retirees receiving less than \$1,200 in annual Premium Assistance. As of June 30, 2023, retirees' Premium Assistance benefits are not subject to future healthcare cost increases. The annual Premium Assistance reimbursement for qualifying retirees is capped at a maximum of \$1,200. As of June 30, 2023, 92,677 retirees were receiving the maximum amount allowed of \$1,200. As of June 30, 2023, 522 members were receiving less than the \$1,200 per year. The actual number of retirees receiving less than the \$1,200 per year cap is a small percentage of the total population and has a minimum impact on Healthcare cost trends as depicted below.

Executive Summary BSE Compliance Monitoring Review of the Esperanza Cyber CS

PART I SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

A. Review Process

Prior to the Bureau's monitoring the week of April 12, 2021, the Esperanza Cyber CS was formally notified of the dates the onsite review would be conducted. Notice and invitation to comment was also provided to the Local Task Force on Right-to-Education. The charter school was informed of its responsibility to compile various reports, written policies, and procedures to document compliance with requirements.

While onsite, the monitoring team employed a variety of techniques to gain an in depth understanding of the charter school's program operations. This included:

- Interviews of charter school administrative and instructional personnel
- Review of policies, notices, plans, outcome and performance data, special education forms and formats, and data reports used and compiled by the charter school (Facilitated Self-Assessment)
- Comprehensive case studies (including classroom observations, student file reviews, and interviews of parents and general and special education teachers).

B. General Findings

In reaching compliance determinations, the Bureau of Special Education (BSE) monitoring teams apply criteria contained in federal and state special education regulations. Specifically, these are:

- Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004
- 22 Pa. Code Chapter 711
- 34 CFR Part 300

This report focuses on compliance with regulatory requirements and also contains descriptive information (such as interview and survey results) intended to provide feedback to assist in program planning.

C. Overall Findings

The team reviewed the FSA submitted by the charter school and conducted onsite verification activities of the information submitted in the FSA. The onsite verification activities included review of policies, notices, procedures, and file reviews.

PART II CORRECTIVE ACTION PROCESS

PART I of this report presented an overall summary of findings. In the Appendix to the report, we have provided the detailed findings for each of the criteria of the compliance monitoring document, i.e. FSA, File Reviews, Interviews and Classroom Observations. The detailed report of findings includes:

- Criteria Number
- Statements of all requirements
- Whether each requirement was met, not met, not applicable or other
- Statements of corrective action required for those criteria not met. *Criteria not met that require corrective action by the charter school are gray-shaded.*

Charter schools are advised that in accordance with requirements of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, all noncompliance must be corrected as soon as possible but in no case later than one year from the date of the monitoring report. The BSE is required to verify timely correction of noncompliance, and must report annually to the federal government and the public on this requirement.

Upon receipt of this report, the charter school should review the corrective action and improvement planning required. The report is formatted so that findings from all components of the monitoring are consolidated by topical area. The report lists the finding, and whether corrective action is required. For certain types of findings, corrective action will be prescribed, and will not vary from charter school to charter school. For example, if the finding is that the charter school lacks a specific required policy, it is reasonable to have the BSE prescribe a standardized remedy and timeline for correcting this deficiency. However, the majority of corrective action activities will be individually designed by the charter school based on their own unique circumstances and goals. Consistent with IDEA's general supervision requirements for states, BSE must approve all proposed corrective action.

With respect to the File Review, because students were selected at random, findings are generalized to the entire population of students with disabilities. During the corrective action review, the BSE Advisor will select students at random and will review updated data, i.e. records that were developed subsequent to the monitoring. Consequently, the charter school should approach corrective action on a systemic basis. As indicated above, the charter school is also required to correct student specific noncompliance identified during monitoring under the ICAP process. If there has been a finding of noncompliance in the Educational Benefit Review component, the individual students are identified to the charter school and, because of the significance of the provision of a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to these students; the charter school must take immediate corrective action.

The BSE Adviser will schedule an onsite visit with the charter school within 60 days following issuance of the monitoring report. The BSE Adviser, charter school, and PaTTAN staff will develop a Charter School Corrective Action Verification/Compliance and Improvement Plan. PaTTAN and IU staff are available to assist the charter school.

Upon conclusion of the corrective action process, the charter school will be notified of its successful completion of the monitoring process.

Services for School-Age Students with Disabilities

Esperanza Cyber Charter School (ECCS) provides a free, appropriate, public education ("FAPE") to eligible students.

To qualify as an eligible student, the child must be of school age, in need of specially-designed instruction, and

 meet eligibility criteria for one or more physical or mental disabilities as set forth in the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act ("IDEA") and Chapter 711 of the Pennsylvania State Regulations.

or

 meet eligibility criteria as an exceptional student under section 1371 of the School Code (24 P. S. § 13-1371) because the student meets the definition of "mentally gifted" in this section, and needs specially designed instruction beyond that required in Chapter 4 (relating to academic standards and assessment)

ECCS uses identification procedures to determine eligibility of students and provide an appropriate educational program consisting of special education, including gifted education, and related services, individualized to meet student needs at no cost to the parents. To identify students who may be eligible for special education, including gifted programming, various screening activities are conducted on an ongoing basis regarding potential signs of developmental delays, exceptionalities, and other risk factors that could indicate the need for special education services. These screening activities include: review of group-based data (cumulative records, enrollment records, health records, report cards, ability, and achievement test scores); hearing, vision, physical, and speech/language screening; and review of data by applicable ECCS teams. When screening results suggest that the student may be eligible for special education services, ECCS seeks written parental consent to conduct a multidisciplinary evaluation because ECCS cannot conduct an evaluation or provide an initial provision of special education services, including gifted programming, without this written permission.

For additional information related to consent, please refer to the Procedural Safeguards Notice on the PaTTAN website, www.Pattan.net.

However, parents who suspect that their child is eligible for special education services may request a multidisciplinary evaluation at any time through a written request to the Principal or Director of Special Education. If the parent disagrees with the Evaluation Report, the parent can request an independent education evaluation at public expense.

Once the evaluation process determines eligibility, an IEP/GIEP team of ECCS professionals and parents meet to discuss and determine services to meet the needs of the student and include the annual development of an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or Gifted Individualized Education Program (GIEP), biannual or tri-annual multidisciplinary re-evaluation, and a full continuum of services, which include Itinerant, Supplemental, or Full-Time Levels of Intervention (re-evaluations are not required for GIEPs). The extent of special education services and the location for the delivery of such services are determined by the IEP/GIEP team and are based on the student's identified needs and abilities, chronological age, and the level of intensity of the specified intervention. ECCS also provides related services, such as speech and language therapy, physical therapy, and occupational therapy, required for the student to benefit from the special education program.

Services for Protected Handicapped Students

In compliance with the state and federal law, namely Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, ECCS will provide to protected handicapped students services or accommodations that are needed to provide equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and extra-curricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. These related services or accommodations are provided without discrimination or cost to the student or family. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability, which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. Services and safeguards for protected handicapped students are distinct from those applicable to exceptional students enrolled or seeking enrollment in special education programs. Confidentiality of Student Records ECCS protects the confidentiality of personally identifiable information for all students in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA"), state law and the ECCS's student records policy.

SPECIAL NEEDS

Esperanza Cyber Charter's Enrollment Department processes all incoming student applications. Students who come to Esperanza Cyber Charter School with special education needs, including Gifted Programming either transferring or enrolling from another district school, may be asked to provide additional supporting documentation. Any special education documentation related to accommodations and services received at their previous school are vital in determining what services the student will need in a cyber school setting. This includes any early intervention services or related services such as speech and language, occupational therapy, etc. In addition to submitting the ECCS Application and Enrollment Packet, parents should submit the following:

- Most recent student IEP/GIEP
- Most recent Evaluation or reevaluation done at the previous school
- Copy of any PTREs (Permission to Reevaluate Notices)
- Copy of any issued NOREP/Prior Written Notice
- Documentation by Physician of medical issues that may interfere with the student's learning or the learning of others

ECCS also requests former schools for copies of all special education-related documents in conformity with school regulations. Once documentation is received the Enrollment team alerts the Special Education Department of any incoming special education students. The Special Education team will then examine the documents and set up a meeting to review the child's services and supports. Lastly, the ECCS Orientation Specialist contacts parents to invite student for his/her first week of orientation and begin attending classes.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

ECCS provides special programs for students with exceptional needs. The English Language Development, Coordinator of Special Education, and Supervisor of Instructional Supports programs can answer questions about eligibility requirements, as well as programs and services offered in the school or by other organizations.

Understanding, Following, & Processing Special Education Documents

It is the responsibility of the classroom teacher and all other instructional staff working with students with exceptionalities to be familiar with their Individual Education Plan (IEP) and to design instruction that appropriately accommodates, modifies and/or differentiates the general education content according to the IEP goals, levels, and specially designed instruction. It is imperative that all teachers understand the significance of IEP and its contents since the

document defines the child's level of support(s), resource(s), and/or related service(s) aligned to his/her academic, developmental and/or behavioral needs to participate in the general curriculum. All teachers must review all IEP documents for indicated students rostered to the course. Completion of this requirement will be an aspect of the teacher evaluation process.

The Special Education Department will work collaboratively with teachers to ensure that all IEP documents are filed promptly, especially with local and state agencies. With this in mind, the Special Education Coordinator may direct teachers to complete and submit specific documents to the Special Education Department by a given date. If this is the case, the Special Education Coordinator will provide the teachers with sufficient time to perform the task [a minimum of five school days]; and will ensure sufficient time to accommodate for uncontrollable or unforeseeable events (i.e., broken appointments, incomplete data, etc.). Nevertheless, if, for any reason, the teacher cannot complete the task within the allotted time, the teacher must communicate with the Special Education Coordinator immediately. In the event of discrepancy or concern, the Principal (DOI) will be invited by the Special Education Coordinator to facilitate the process.

DUAL-ENROLLMENT AGREEMENT WITH ESPERANZA CYBER CHARTER SCHOOL 2024-2025

THIS AGREEMENT, is made this 26th day of **July**, 2024 by and between Esperanza College of Eastern University (hereinafter referred to as "the College") a post-secondary educational institution in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania authorized by the Pennsylvania Department of Education to grant [associates/bachelors) degrees and the ESPERANZA—CYBER CHARTER SCHOOL, located at 4261 North 5th Street, Philadelphia, PA 19140 (herein after referred to as "Charter School" or "Paying Party") (Federal I.D. #).

BACKGROUND

WHEREAS, Esperanza College of Eastern University is an educational institution that provides courses at the higher education level and is desirous of providing such an educational experience to students; and

WHEREAS, the Charter School is desirous of establishing a relationship with Esperanza College of Eastern University whereby its students may receive experience in college-level education subject to the provisions of this agreement (referred to hereinafter as "Agreement" or "Contract"); and

NOW THEREFORE, intending to be legally bound, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

I. PURPOSE

The Purpose of the Dual Enrollment Program and this Agreement is to allow eligible and appropriately qualified high school students the benefit and advantage of enrolling in college classes concurrently with high school classes, the benefit of receiving both high school and college credit, and the benefit of experiencing course work at the college level at a reduced cost to students.

II. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF ESPERANZA COLLEGE OF EASTERN UNIVERSITY

- 1. Selection of Students. Esperanza College of Eastern University shall have the final responsibility for the selection of qualified students to participate in all classes. Selected students must have the appropriate educational experience. Students may be asked to provide appropriate documentation demonstrating that they meet the qualifications to participate. Students who do not provide appropriate documentation by the date designated by Esperanza College of Eastern University will not be enrolled in the class.
- 2. Education of Students. Esperanza College of Eastern University agrees to offer the following classes during the 2024-2025 academic year which

includes the fall 2024, spring 2025, and summer 2025 academic terms based on student course requests:

The list above is subject to change. Some of the courses listed require prerequisite courses which students may or may not have completed. Complete course descriptions are available on the College website in the Esperanza College of Eastern University Catalog. Additional courses that become available during academic terms may also be offered to the students upon the mutual agreement of the Parties hereto. Courses may be cancelled at the discretion of the College.

Esperanza College of Eastern University shall assume full responsibility for the classroom education of its students. Esperanza College of Eastern University shall be responsible for the administration of the program, the curriculum content, the requirements for participation, grading, graduation, maintenance of records, and faculty appointments. All students are subject to College policies detailed in the current Catalog.

- 3. *Provision of Materials*. Esperanza College of Eastern University will be responsible for providing all necessary registration materials to the appropriate Charter School personnel and will provide whatever support is necessary for successful completion of the enrollment process.
- 4. Student Requirements/Eligibility. Students must have successfully completed their sophomore year of secondary education, have been granted junior standing to be eligible for admission and enrollment, and have made satisfactory progress toward fulfilling applicable school graduation requirements as determined by the Charter School based on credits earned. Students must have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 for eligibility. All students must have the recommendation of the high school principal and/or guidance counselor. Eligibility is also determined by (i) Postsecondary placement test scores; (ii) the

results of nationally available achievement tests or other standardized tests included in the participating Charter School's local assessment system as well as demonstrated readiness for college-level coursework, as determined by the Esperanza College of Eastern University.

Esperanza College of Eastern University staff review transcripts to determine eligibility. In order to remain in this program, the student must maintain a minimum high school grade point average of 3.0. The student also must earn a minimum of C in each completed dual enrollment course.

Enrollment is limited to a maximum of six (6) credit hours during the first semester and a maximum of twelve (12) credit hours during each subsequent semester for dual enrollment students. The maximum credit-hour enrollment permitted includes the total of all credit hours of enrollment at all post-secondary institutions of higher learning.

Esperanza College of Eastern University acknowledges and agrees that, in the event a student is suspended or expelled by the Charter School, the student shall not be permitted to participate in the dual enrollment program during the period of said suspension or expulsion.

Under such circumstances and when applicable, Esperanza College of Eastern University shall utilize its withdrawal policies and tuition reimbursement policies in order to determine whether the student, the student's parents/guardians, or the Charter School is entitled to a refund of any portion of the tuition costs paid to Esperanza College of Eastern University.

No Remedial Courses. Dual enrollment students are subject to the same placement standards as all other students as provided by the Esperanza College of Eastern University Catalog. Courses offered to dual enrollment students are identical to those offered to regularly matriculated students. Required prerequisite coursework requirements are identical to those enforced for courses when dual enrollment students are not enrolled.

Direct Contact with Children. Esperanza College of Eastern University shall provide proof of compliance with all applicable requirements of 24 P.S. § 1-111, 24 P.S. §1-111.1, 24 P.S. §12-1205.6 and 23 Pa.C.S.A. §6301, et. seq. for any Esperanza College of Eastern University employee who will have direct contact with children.

III. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CHARTER SCHOOL

1. Establishment of Classroom Facilities. The Charter School authorizes the use of its facilities as may be agreed upon by the Charter School and Esperanza College of Eastern University.

- 2. Student Records. The Charter School shall protect the confidentiality of student records as dictated by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and shall release no information absent written consent of the student or the student's parents/guardians, unless required to do so by law or as dictated by the terms of this Agreement.
- 3. *Recruitment*. The Charter School shall recruit and designate such students that it wishes to enroll in the contracted class.

IV. MUTUAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. Number of Participating Students. The Parties agree that Esperanza College of Eastern University will determine class enrollment limits and enrollment will be contingent in individual classes based upon the space available. Charter School students will be given every consideration for class placement.
- 2. Compensation. Tuition shall be \$229.00 per credit hour (\$ 687.00 per 3-credit course). As with the Charter School's other dual enrollment programs that meet all requirements of 24 P.S. 16-1611-B et. seq. and the eligibility requirements for grant funding, the Charter School, in accordance with the Charter School's Dual Enrollment Resolution and at its sole discretion (unless required to do otherwise by law), may contribute tuition assistance in addition to the Esperanza College of Eastern University scholarship for any Charter School student who chooses to enroll in the program. The remaining tuition amount will be the responsibility of the student/parent(s).
- 3. *Courses*. Courses may be offered in person, online or a combination of in person and online.
- 4. Academic & Attendance. ECEU and Charter School agree to meet monthly to monitor academic performance and student attendance.

Notwithstanding Section V(2) of the Agreement, the Parties agree that the Charter School reserves the right to modify the amount of any Charter School contribution at its sole discretion, without the consent of Esperanza College of Eastern University, and without the necessity of amending this Agreement.

The Parties understanding and agree that said Charter School Contribution is contingent upon a student's voluntary choice and the circumstances under which tuition reimbursement is afforded when a student withdraws from a course, Esperanza

College of Eastern University's withdrawal policies and tuition reimbursement policies will be in effect and shall govern all classes covered by this Agreement. In the event Esperanza College of Eastern University terminates the Agreement for its convenience in accordance with Section V(6)(a) of this Agreement, the Charter School shall be entitled to a pro-rated refund for services that have been paid for but not yet performed by Esperanza College of Eastern University.

- 3. *Textbook Charges*. Textbook costs will be the responsibility of the high school. .
- 4. *Term of Agreement*. The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025.
- 5. Student Credit. In order to successfully complete a course listed in this Agreement, students must earn a minimum grade of "C". The Charter School will award credit (and determine whether it's a core or an elective credit) for and recognize courses that are successfully completed under this Agreement as fulfilling its graduation requirements. The Charter School awards 1 high school credit per 3 credit hour college course completed under the terms of this agreement. However, the Charter School will award a student no more than one credit for courses successfully completed during the Summer (after the completion of the Spring Semester and prior to the start of the Fall Semester), regardless of how many courses are successfully completed and regardless of the fact that July 1 marks the beginning of the Charter School's new year. For example, (i) if a student successfully completes one or more courses after the conclusion of the Spring Semester and prior to July 1 and also successfully completes one or more courses on or after July 1 and prior to the start of the Fall Semester, the Charter School will award only one credit; (ii) if a student successfully completes two or more courses after the conclusion of the Spring Semester and prior to July 1, the Charter School will award only one credit; or (iii) if a student successfully completes two or more courses on or after July 1 and before the start of the Fall Semester, the Charter School will award only one credit.
- 6. Esperanza College of Eastern University will award postsecondary credit, not to exceed 30 postsecondary credits in any academic year, to students who successfully complete courses identified in this Agreement as identified above. Esperanza College of Eastern University will transcript this credit in the same manner other students who take a course at this institution. If a dual enrollment student becomes a regularly enrolled student at Esperanza College of Eastern University following graduation from secondary school, Esperanza College of Eastern University shall recognize those credits as applying to the student's degree requirements

as it would for any regularly enrolled postsecondary student who took the courses.

- 7. Promotional Materials. Both Esperanza College of Eastern University and the School Charter School agree to provide a mechanism for communicating the educational and economic benefits of higher education as well as the requirements for participation and enrollment procedures for dual enrollment to parents and students.
- 8. Termination of Class Offering. Without terminating this Agreement, Esperanza College of Eastern University or the Charter School may terminate any class offering covered by this Agreement for any reason with ten (10) days' notice prior to the commencement of the class. In the event that any class offering is terminated in accordance with this provision, the Parties agree that Esperanza College of Eastern University shall not be entitled to any compensation for said course.
- 9. *Transportation*. Unless otherwise required by law, the Charter School shall have no obligation to, and shall not be required to, transport students to and from the classroom facilities. In the event the Charter School elects to provide transportation, said decision is discretionary and Charter School transportation can be terminated at any time at the sole and unrestricted discretion of the Charter School.
- 10. *Notice*. All notices hereunder shall be deemed to have been delivered immediately upon hand-delivery or, if mailed, then three days after mailing by United States mail when sent by certified or registered mail, to the following address:

V. TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR CONTRACTS WHERE ESPERANZA COLLEGE OF EASTERN UNIVERSITY IS RECEIVING MONEY AND/OR PERFORMING SERVICES

1. *Liability*. Neither of the Parties shall assume any liabilities to each other. As to liability to each other or death to persons, or damages to property, the Parties do not waive any defense as a result of entering into this Contract. This provision shall not be construed to limit the Charter School's claims or defenses which arise as a matter of law pursuant to any provisions of this contract. This provision

- shall not be construed to limit the sovereign immunity of Esperanza College of Eastern University or the Charter School.
- 2. Amendments. This Contract represents the complete agreement between the Parties, superseding any other prior or contemporaneous written or oral agreements. Any changes, corrections or additions to this Contract shall be in writing in the form of a supplemental agreement signed by all necessary Parties, shall set forth therein the proposed change, correction, or addition, and shall be approved by the Charter School's Board of Trustees at a public, advertised meeting held in compliance with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.
- 3. Applicable Law. This Contract shall be governed by, interpreted, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (without regard to any conflict of laws provisions) and the decisions of the Pennsylvania courts. Paying Party consents to the jurisdiction of any court or administrative tribunal of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and any federal courts in Pennsylvania, waiving any claim or defense that such forum is not convenient or proper. The Paying Party agrees that any such court shall have personal jurisdiction over it, and consents to service of process in any manner authorized by Pennsylvania law.
- 4. *Independent Contractor*. In performing the services required by the Contract, each Party will act as an independent contractor and not as an employee or agent of the other Party. The relationship of the Parties to this Contract to each other shall not be construed to constitute a partnership, joint venture, or any other relationship, other than that of independent contractors.
- 5. Conflict in Terms. Should any portion of the Agreement contain terms which conflict with those contained within this page, the terms contained on this page shall unequivocally control.
- 6. *Termination of Contract*. Esperanza College of Eastern University or Charter School has the right to terminate the Contract for any of the following reasons. Termination shall be effective upon written notice to the other Party:
 - (a) Termination for Convenience. Esperanza College of Eastern University or Charter School shall have the right to terminate the Contract for its convenience if it determined termination to be in its best interest. Esperanza College of Eastern University shall be paid for work satisfactorily completed prior to the effective date of the termination.
 - (b) Termination for Cause. Esperanza College of Eastern University or Charter School shall have the right to terminate the Contract upon written notice for the other Party's default as to any of the terms contained in the Contract between the

Parties or by law. If it is later determined that Esperanza College of Eastern University or Charter School erred in terminating the Contract for cause, then, at Esperanza College of Eastern University's or Charter School's discretion, the Contract shall be deemed to have been terminated for convenience under subparagraph (a).

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of sections (a) and (b) of this section, if semester classes have already commenced prior to termination of this Agreement by either Party, and Charter School agree to complete all course offerings for the semester in which notice is given, and Esperanza College of Eastern University shall be paid for work through the completion of the semester in which notice is given.

MOU FOR GRANT FUNDED CONTRACTOR SERVICES

This Contracting Services MOU (hereinafter, "Agreement") is made between Esperanza Cyber Charter School (ECCS), with its principal place of business located at 4261 N. 5th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19140, (hereinafter, "Client") and the Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium, Inc., with its principal place of business located at 5272 River Road, Ste. 340, Bethesda, Maryland 20816, and through its *Collaborative Action for Family Engagement (CAFE)* program funded by a grant from the United States Department of Education (hereinafter "MAEC"). This Agreement sets forth the terms whereby Client and MAEC shall perform and produce the service "deliverables" in **Schedule A –Scope of Work** (hereinafter, the "Work") and Client shall perform the conditions precedent for MAEC to do so.

Purpose, Goals, and Strategies. MAEC will support Esperanza Cyber Charter School (ECCS) in implementing culturally responsive family engagement by creating and facilitating professional development sessions for ECCS staff.

- 1. **Incorporated Schedules.** The following Schedules are incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement.
 - a. Schedule A Scope of Work.
 - b. **Schedule B** 2 C.F.R. Part 3474.20.
 - c. **Schedule C** Procedures for Disclosing and Protecting Confidential Information.
 - d. **Schedule D** Intellectual Property License.
- 2. **Term.** The Agreement term shall begin on the date that it is fully executed by both Parties ("effective date"), with an anticipated work start date of August 10, 2024. The Agreement shall terminate on January 31, 2025, unless terminated earlier in the manner provided elsewhere herein.
- 3. **Performance.** MAEC's staff and its contractors shall perform **Schedule A** Scope of Work (hereinafter, "**Schedule A**" or "Scope of Work"). Client shall perform all Scope of Work conditions precedent required for MAEC to perform the **Schedule A** Scope of Work and to produce the deliverables (alternatively, the "Work" or "deliverables"). MAEC's work and the Client's performance of all conditions precedent shall meet the professional standards MAEC deems applicable. In MAEC's sole discretion, MAEC may suspend or terminate this Agreement and/or its duties to perform Work if Client does not perform the conditions precedent.
- 4. **Scope of Work.** See **Schedule A** Scope of Work.
- 5. Confidentiality and Intellectual Property Rights.
 - a. Confidential Information.
 - Disclosed confidential data, information, documents, and things containing them shall not be used for any purpose other than the performance of the Work. Disclosed confidential data, information, documents, and things

containing confidential information shall not be disclosed to third parties, except as provided in this Agreement and its **Schedules**, or as agreed in writing prior to disclosure. The Parties' confidential information and documents shared to facilitate the Work ("Confidential Information") shall be protected and transmitted in the manner set forth in **Schedule C**.

- b. Intellectual Property Ownership and Licensing.
 - i. Because MAEC's work is funded by the U.S. Department of Education, treatment of intellectual property rights to deliverables is subject to the terms of 2 C.F.R. Part 3474.20, and any amendment thereto, (hereinafter, "Schedule B" or "Part 3474.20"). The Parties shall comply with the provisions of Part 3474.20 in the treatment of new copyrightable deliverables as to third parties and between themselves.
 - ii. MAEC owns all rights including the Copyright to its pre-existing creations, as that term is defined by copyright law, including creations used to facilitate production of the MOU deliverables. Client shall not use MAEC's pre-existing creations except to assist to create the deliverables and shall not allow, enable, or assist others to do so.
 - iii. The Client owns all rights including the Copyright to its pre-existing creations, as that term is defined by copyright law, modified to produce the MOU deliverables. MAEC shall not use the Client's pre-existing creations except to create the deliverable and shall not allow, enable, or assist others to do so.
 - iv. Client and MAEC shall inform each other in a timely manner of any unauthorized use of the other party's pre-existing or grant funded creations, provide all related known or possible information, and as requested, assist the other party to enforce its rights.
 - v. MAEC shall own the copyright and related property rights to deliverables funded by the grant, and which constitute new copyrightable work. The Parties shall label these deliverables as "MAEC Owned Copyright" in the SOW, a later Agreement Addendum, or a mutual confirming written communication.
 - vi. If a Client's pre-existing creation is modified to create or is incorporated into a deliverable, the Client shall own the copyright to the deliverable if the pre-existing creation comprises 51% or more of the deliverable product. The Parties shall label deliverables using Client's pre-existing creation as "MAEC Owned Copyright," if the use is less than 51% or "Client Owned Copyright" if use is 51% or greater.
 - vii. Determination of deliverable copyright ownership shall be stated in the SOW, a later Agreement Addendum, or a mutual confirming written communication. If copyright ownership cannot be determined at the time of the MOU execution, the deliverable shall be identified in the SOW as "Copyright Ownership to be Determined." The Parties shall confirm their later determination of copyright ownership of a deliverable, by addendum or written communication.

- viii. If a deliverable is co-created, MAEC and the client shall co-own the copyright and the deliverable shall be identified in the SOW as "Co-Owned Copyright."
- ix. The Party(ies) owning the deliverable copyright shall grant the other party(ies) a universal, open, and royalty free license, to exploit the grant funded new copyrightable work for which MAEC owns the copyright in a manner compliant with Part 3474.20.
- x. Upon request, the Party(ies) owning the deliverable copyright shall grant third parties a universal, open, and royalty free license to exploit the grant funded new copyrightable work in a manner compliant with Part 3474.20.
- xi. Licenses shall be commercially reasonable in form and content. Licenses shall preclude the licensee and third parties from monetizing the deliverable or allowing, enabling, or assisting others to do so. A copy of the license form is attached hereto as **Schedule D**.
- xii. All versions, formats, or derivatives of deliverables shall provide attribution and/or copyright marking satisfactory to the copyright owner.

6. Representations and Warranties.

- MAEC and Client each warrant to the other that they lawfully may agree to and perform this Agreement and its signatories are authorized to ratify the Agreement and Schedules.
- b. MAEC and Client each warrant to the other that their ratification and performance of this Agreement does not violate or breach any contracts or ownership rights of others.
- c. MAEC warrants that the Work and any related narrative products are its own Work and does not include the work or intellectual property of others absent appropriate attribution, citation, license, or permission.
- d. MAEC warrants that it possesses valid licenses, registrations, and permits necessary to perform the Work.
- e. MAEC represents that it shall perform this Agreement in compliance with applicable Federal and State law and regulations.
- f. MAEC warrants that to prevent the hire of illegal immigrants it complies and requires candidates for employment to comply with I-9 and like legal requirements.
- g. MAEC warrants that it complies and shall comply with all applicable federal and state law Wage and Hour, working conditions, and child labor laws, and treats its employees with dignity and respect.
- h. MAEC and Client each warrant to the other that they shall advise the other of events which cause their representations and warranties to become outdated, untrue or interfere with their ability to comply.
- 7. Expense Reimbursement. MAEC's reimbursable expenses are pre-approved and set forth in Schedule A. Any additional expenses shall be approved by the Client before incurred and invoiced. MAEC shall submit an invoice to the Client that includes MAEC's request for expense

reimbursement with supporting documentation confirming the expense, payment, and its relation to the Work. Client shall pay reimbursement invoices within thirty (30) days of submission.

- 8. **Third Party Claims and Liability.** Each party is exclusively legally responsible or liable for the consequences of its own acts, omissions, and conduct in the performance of this Agreement and production and use of the **Schedule A** Scope of Work deliverables.
- 9. **Insurance and Safety Practices.**
 - a. MAEC shall maintain General Business Liability and workers compensation insurance coverage with \$2,000,000.00 in coverage.
 - b. MAEC and Client shall endeavor to take reasonable health and safety to attempt to mitigate against risks of harm including exposure to viruses, COVID-19, and other contagions; damage to places of work; and harm to employees and third parties arising out of conduct related the performance of this Agreement and its Schedules.
 - c. MAEC shall not allow staff to enter Client facilities if the risk of virus disease infection is viable and Client does not provide generally accepted health and safety protections.
- 10. **Nondiscrimination.** MAEC's principal concentration is in the fields of educational equity, diversity, and non-discrimination. Most of MAEC's work force, management, and board of directors are persons of color and/or women. MAEC represents that it does not discriminate on the basis of any factor prohibited by law in its employment practices, provision of services, or access to website and hardcopy publications.
- 11. **No Conflicts of Interest.** MAEC has not and shall not consider, interview, hire, or engage any Client employee and Client has not and shall not consider, interview, hire, or engage any MAEC employee during the term of this Agreement and for a period of one year thereafter.
- 12. **Political Contributions and Lobbying.** MAEC possesses IRS and Maryland Department of Revenue and Taxation exemptions from paying income tax as an IRS Code Section 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. As such, it does not make political contributions or lobby as that term is defined by applicable law.
- 13. **Retention of Records.** The Parties shall retain and maintain all records, documents, and communications related to this Agreement and the Work for a period of five years after the Agreement termination or longer, if required by law. Upon reasonable request, the Parties shall provide each other with reasonably requested access to all records, documents, and communications for inspection and copying.
- 14. **Termination.** Either party may terminate this MOU at any time and for any reason. Termination shall be implemented by delivery of written notice as provided in Paragraph 19. Termination shall be effective 15 days after notice receipt. MAEC also may terminate this MOU upon receipt of notice that the U.S. Department of Education grantor terminates, suspends, or modifies the grant

or funding, or substantially modifies the grant purposes or permissible work. Upon termination by notice or expiration of the MOU period, MAEC shall complete demobilization prior to the effective termination date. Within twenty (20) days of termination, MAEC shall either deliver or certify destruction of all confidential information in its possession to Client, de-identified. Because MAEC is subject to Federal desk, year-end, and grant-end audits, Client shall maintain all MOU data and work product and provide MAEC with reasonably requested access and possession for a period of five (5) years after termination.

- 15. Non-Employment of Child Sex Offenders and other Criminal Offenders. MAEC complies with Section 6-113 of the Maryland Code Education Article by not employing any persons or engaging any sub-MAEC convicted, pleading guilty, or pleading no-contest to any of the following offenses and/or not knowingly assigning or permitting such person to have any contact with children when providing service, including the performance of this Agreement: (i) a sexual offense in the third or fourth degree under Sections 3-307 or 3-308 of the Maryland Code Criminal Law Article or any like laws of any other State; (ii) child sexual abuse under Section 3-602 of the Maryland Criminal Law Article or any like laws of any other State; or (iii) a crime of violence under Section 14-101 of the Maryland Code Criminal Law Article or any like law of any other State.
 - a. MAEC shall not allow employees to have unsupervised access with students. Client shall provide such supervision when MAEC advises that it is unable to do so.
 - MAEC shall comply with Sections 5-561 5-569 of the Maryland Code Family Law Article
 by first requiring its workforce who work with Client's students to undergo criminal
 background checks including fingerprinting and MAEC review the check results.
 - MAEC does not and shall not knowingly employ an individual registered as a sex offender in compliance Sections 11-704 and 11-722 of the Maryland Code Criminal Procedures Article.
- 16. **Assignment and Delegation of Responsibility.** A party may not assign, delegate, or subcontract its rights and duties under this Agreement without the prior written agreement of the other party. Any person or entity taken rights and duties under this Agreement by assignment, delegation, subcontract, or a trustee or successor in interest shall ratify an agreement to be bound by its terms and in fact be bound by its terms.
- 17. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement constitutes the complete understanding of the Parties and supersedes any other prior agreements, discussions, and representations in any way related to its purpose and/or subject matter.
- 18. **Amendment and Modification.** This Agreement may be modified by the Parties by written amendment to change Agreement terms or addendum to change Agreement Work or scheduling.
- 19. **Notice Procedure** All notices related to this Agreement shall be timely delivered to the Parties at the following addresses:

The Parties shall give timely notice of any change in this notice contact information. Each party shall be fully responsible for any notice that is not received because the party failed to give timely notice of a change in their contact information. Notices transmitted but not received because of a failure of timely notice of a change of information shall be deemed received for all purposes.

- 20. **Force Majeure.** Neither Party to this Agreement shall be deemed in breach because of any delay or failure in performance, to the extent that such delay or failure is due to circumstances beyond their reasonable control, including, but not limited to acts of God, weather, strikes, labor difficulties, war, riots, earthquakes, fires, public disturbances, epidemics, and acts by government or third parties. However, within ten (10) days of notice of the Force Majeure event(s), the affected Party shall give the other party written notice of the particulars of the Force Majeure and the impact upon performance.
- 21. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement, performance or the Work, or application of either is determined to be unenforceable or invalid by law, this shall have no effect on the any other provision, performance, or application and the remainder of the Agreement shall be interpreted to reflect the intent of the Parties implemented in a lawful manner.
- 22. **Governing Law, Rights and Remedies, and Dispute Resolution.** This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of the State of Maryland. Jurisdiction and venue rest in the State and Federal District Courts for the State of Maryland. The Parties shall have all remedies to which they are entitled by law.
 - a. <u>All</u> claims related to this Agreement shall be resolved by alternative dispute resolution (hereinafter "ADR"). The ADR shall be administered by the American Arbitration Association (hereinafter, "AAA").

- b. Neither party may initiate an action in a court of law or an administrative agency except, 1) to complete mediation and arbitration; 2) to enforce an arbitration order, subpoena, or discovery request; 3) to lodge and enforce a mediation agreement or arbitration award; and 4) for injunctive relief. Any other effort to initiate litigation shall be in breach of this Agreement, dismissed by the Court, and the initiating party shall be ordered to pay the opposing party's legal fees and costs.
- c. The ADR procedures shall be initiated by a claimant's written submission to the AAA pursuant to its rules and procedures for Commercial Demand for Arbitration and Request for Mediation. The limitation period for submitting the Demand and Requestion to bring all claims, whether known or unknown, shall be one-hundred and eighty (180) days from the date of the alleged action causing the claimed harm(s).
- d. Within thirty (30) days of the demand, the Parties shall initiate mediation, which if unsuccessful shall be followed by arbitration. The mediation process shall be completed within ninety (90) days of the demand, unless otherwise agreed (the "mediation period").
- e. Within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the mediation period without resolution, a Claimant shall submit its arbitration demand to the AAA and the opposition party.
- f. Arbitration shall be conducted pursuant to the AAA commercial rules, supplemented by reasonable discovery and court-issued subpoenas.
- g. Each party initially shall pay its own filing, legal, AAA, and arbitrator fees and costs.
- h. The arbitrator's award shall include an award of legal fees and costs to the prevailing party for each claim, i.e., a successful prosecution or defense. If the award for a claim is such that each party prevails in part and fails in party, the arbitrator shall make reasonable fee and cost awards based upon the relative values and costs of prevailing in part.
- i. The arbitrator's award shall be lodged with a Maryland court of general jurisdiction and thereafter as necessary lodged with other courts of general jurisdiction for enforcement.

§ 3474.20 Open licensing requirement for competitive grant programs.

For competitive grants awarded in competitions announced after February 21, 2017:

(a) A grantee or subgrantee must openly license to the public the rights set out in paragraph (b)(1) of this section in any grant deliverable that is created wholly or in part with Department competitive grant funds, and that constitutes a new copyrightable work; provided, however, that when the deliverable consists of modifications to pre-existing works, the license shall extend only to those modifications that can be separately identified and only to the extent that open licensing is permitted under the terms of any licenses or other legal restrictions on the use of pre-existing works.

(b)

- **(1)** With respect to copyrightable work identified in <u>paragraph (a)</u> of this section, the grantee or subgrantee must grant to the public a worldwide, non-exclusive, royalty-free, perpetual, and irrevocable license to -
 - (i) Access, reproduce, publicly perform, publicly display, and distribute the copyrightable work;

- (ii) Prepare derivative works and reproduce, publicly perform, publicly display and distribute those derivative works; and
- (iii) Otherwise use the copyrightable work, provided that in all such instances attribution is given to the copyright holder.
- **(2)** Grantees and subgrantees may select any open licenses that comply with the requirements of this section, including, at the grantee's or subgrantee's discretion, a license that limits use to noncommercial purposes. The open license also must contain -
 - (i) A symbol or device that readily communicates to users the permissions granted concerning the use of the copyrightable work;
 - (ii) Machine-readable code for digital resources;
 - (iii) Readily accessed legal terms; and
 - (iv) The statement of attribution and disclaimer specified in 34 CFR 75.620(b).
- **(c)** A grantee or subgrantee that is awarded competitive grant funds must have a plan to disseminate the openly licensed copyrightable works identified in <u>paragraph</u> (a) of this section.

(d)

- (1) The requirements of paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of this section do not apply to -
 - (i) Grants that provide funding for general operating expenses;
 - (ii) Grants that provide support to individuals (e.g., scholarships, fellowships);
 - (iii) Grant deliverables that are jointly funded by the Department and another Federal agency if the other Federal agency does not require the open licensing of its grant deliverables for the relevant grant program;
 - (iv) Copyrightable works created by the grantee or subgrantee that are not created with Department grant funds;
 - (v) Peer-reviewed scholarly publications that arise from any scientific research funded, either fully or partially, from grants awarded by the Department;
 - **(vi)** Grantees or subgrantees under the Ready To Learn Television Program, as defined in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, Title II, Subpart 3, Sec. 2431, <u>20 U.S.C. 6775</u>;

- (vii) A grantee or subgrantee that has received an exception from the Secretary under 2 CFR 3474.5 and 2 CFR 200.102 (e.g., where the Secretary has determined that the grantee's dissemination plan would likely achieve meaningful dissemination equivalent to or greater than the dissemination likely to be achieved through compliance with paragraph (a) or (b) of this section, or compliance with paragraph (a) or (b) of this section would impede the grantee's ability to form the required partnerships necessary to carry out the purpose of the grant); and
- (viii) Grantees or subgrantees for which compliance with these requirements would conflict with, or materially undermine the ability to protect or enforce, other intellectual property rights or obligations of the grantee or subgrantee, in existence or under development, including those provided under 15 U.S.C. 1051, et seq., 18 U.S.C. 1831-1839, and 35 U.S.C. 200, et seq.
- **(2)** The requirements of paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of this section do not alter any applicable rights in the grant deliverable available under <u>17</u> U.S.C. <u>106A</u>, <u>203</u> or 1202, 15 U.S.C. 1051, *et seq.*, or State law.
- **(e)** The license set out in <u>paragraph (b)(1)</u> of this section shall not extend to any copyrightable work incorporated in the grant deliverable that is owned by a party other than the grantee or subgrantee, unless the grantee or subgrantee has acquired the right to provide such a license in that work.
- (f) Definition. For purposes of this section,
 - **(1)** A *grant deliverable* is a final version of a work, including any final version of program support materials necessary to the use of the deliverable, developed to carry out the purpose of the grant, as specified in the grant announcement.
 - (2) A *derivative work* means a *derivative work* as defined in the Copyright Act, <u>17</u> U.S.C. 101.

SCHEDULE C – GENERAL TERMS FOR DISCLOSURE AND PROTECTION OF CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION AND DOCUMENTS.

- 1. This Schedule supplements the Agreement between Esperanza Cyber Charter School ("Principal") and the Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium, Inc. ("Contractor") dated August 10, 2024 (hereinafter, the "Agreement.")
- 2. Proprietary and Confidential documents and information (hereinafter "Confidential Information") shall be clearly identified by the disclosing party at the time of disclosure by:
 - a. Stamps and/or markings on documents, materials, oral disclosure summaries, or things containing confidential information (hereinafter, "confidential documents"); or
 - Written notice transmitting the stamped and/or marked confidential documents, requesting destruction of the previously unmarked disclosures, and delivered within two (2) weeks of the disclosure; or
 - c. Stamps and/or markings shall identify the document(s), page(s), and passages or things containing confidential information.
- A disclosing party who mistakenly fails to mark or identify confidential informationshall
 provide retroactive notice upon discovery. The recipient party shall treat the confidential
 information as such and advise the disclosing party of any non-complaint actions or
 occurrences.
- 4. Party recipients of disclosing confidential information shall not use the confidential information for any purpose other than performance of the Work.
 - a. Party recipients of confidential information shall employ legally required and commercially reasonable safeguards and effort to protect the information from unauthorized use, disclosure, and misappropriation. The receiving party also shall not use safeguards and efforts any less effectively than those it uses to protect its own confidential information. Recipient internal staff disclosures of confidential information shall be restricted to individuals who are required to perform and supervise the Work.
 - b. Neither party shall make any reproduction, disclosure, or use of disclosed confidential information or assist, enable, or allow any third party to do so, except as follows:
 - Such information may be used, reproduced, and/or disclosed bythe receiving party with the disclosing party's prior written consent, but solely for the purpose of performing Work.
 - The consented to third-party shall adopt and ratify in writing the restrictions of use and disclosure contained in the Agreement and Schedules.
 - c. Limitations on reproduction, disclosure, or use of proprietary information shall not apply to, and neither party shall be liable for reproduction, disclosure, or use of

- i. If separate from the receipt thereof under this Agreement, (a) the disclosed confidential information is published or disclosed to others by the disclosing party without restriction; or (b) it has been lawfully obtained, by the receiving part from other sources provided such other source did not knowingly receive it from a source unlawfully in possess; or (c) such information otherwise comes within the public knowledgeor becomes generally known to the public;
- ii. If any part of the confidential information is required by law to be disclosed, the party required to make disclosure shall notify the original disclosing party prior to allow that party to assert whatever exclusions, exemptions, legal claims, and actions may be available to it under bylaw.
- d. The provisions of this Schedule, including limitations on disclosure or use of confidential information, survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, and remain enforceable.
- e. Within twenty (20) days of the termination of this Agreement or receipt of a request from the disclosing party, the receiving party shall return all information in all forms, formats, and documents to the disclosing party, or (ii) destroy the information and cause its chief executive to certify destruction in writing. Because MAEC is subject to and must comply with Federal desk and post-grant audits and must return confidential Principal data and product, for a period of five (5) years after termination, Principal shall preserve and allow MAEC reasonably requested access to and possession of all returned confidential information for compliance purposes.
- f. A recipient of confidential information shall timely and fully inform the disclosing party of all facts, circumstances, and information related to any unauthorized disclosure, use, or misappropriation.

License Agreement for Pre-Agreement and/or Grant Funded New Copyrightable Creations

This License Agreement (hereinafter, "Schedule D" and/or "License Agreement") is entered into between the Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium, Inc., 5272 River Road, Suite 340, Bethesda, Maryland 20816, (hereinafter, "MAEC") and Esperanza Cyber Charter School (ECCS), 4261 N. 5th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19140, (hereinafter, "Client") and is incorporated into and made a part of the Agreement between MAEC and Client, dated August 10, 2024 for the purpose of setting forth the License terms for permissible and prohibited uses of intellectual property (hereinafter, "copyrightable creations") at any time after the Agreement and Schedule D are fully executed.

Recitals.

- R-1. WHEREAS prior to or independent of execution of the Agreement and its **Schedule A** Scope of Work (hereinafter, "Schedule A" or "Scope of Work") MAEC and/or Client developed "copyrightable creations not grant funded" including, but not limited to, materials, writings, works of authorship, software, art, images, information, and data, to which they own the entire right, title, and interest, and copyrights and other property rights which may be used to perform **Schedule A**, *Scope of Work*.
- R-2. WHEREAS the Agreement and **Schedule A** provide that MAEC shall create and produce grant funded new copyrightable creation deliverables (hereafter, "grant funded creations").
- R-3. WHEREAS MAEC and/or Client performance of the Agreement has been funded by the U.S. Department of Education through a grant award to MAEC.
- R-4. WHEREAS the U.S. Department of Education determination of the treatment of intellectual property rights to grant funded creation deliverables is set forth in 2 C.F.R. Part 3474.20, and any amendment thereto (hereinafter, "Part 3474.20").
- R-5. WHEREAS Part 3474.20 acknowledges MAEC and Client ownership of all copyrightable creations not grant funded that are used in the production of the grant funded new copyrightable work deliverables and does not direct their use or licensing terms.
- R-6. WHEREAS Part 3474.20 mandates that MAEC shall own the copyright and all property rights to granted funded new copyrightable work deliverables (hereinafter, "grant funded new copyrightable creations") but mandates certain license terms to facilitate free use by others.
- R-7. WHEREAS the Parties agree that copyright and other property interest grant funded work deliverables shall be owned by MAEC if less than fifty-one percent (51%) of the work is a combination of MAEC copyrightable creations not grant funded and grant funded creations(hereinafter, "MAEC owned funded new copyrightable creations"); and the copyright and all other property interests shall be owned by the Client if 51% or more of the work is their pre-Agreement copyrightable creations (hereinafter, "Client owned funded new copyrightable creations.")

R-8. WHEREAS the Parties agree that regardless of new copyrightable and other property interest ownership, the grand funded deliverables shall be cross licensed between themselves and licensed to third parties in compliance with Part 3474.20 and this License Agreement.

Now, therefore, it is agreed as follows:

- 1. Incorporation. The above Recitals are incorporated into this Agreement and made a part hereof.
- 2. **Effective date.** This License Agreement shall be effective on the date it is fully executed by the Parties.
- 3. License of Copyrightable Creations Not Grant Funded.
 - a. The License.
 - i. License Use. MAEC and/or Client as the property owner and Licensor of copyrightable creations not granted funded hereby grant(s) a limited license or licenses to the party non-owner as Licensee to use licensor's pre-Agreement copyrightable creation(s) for the purpose(s) of (i) performing Schedule A, and, where necessary, to use the Schedule A deliverables and (ii) training of MAEC client staff, families, and students.
 - ii. License Period. The period of a limited license of pre-Agreement creation(s) shall begin the date of execution of the Agreement and end on its termination date.
 - iii. License's Geographical Boundaries. A limited license is restricted to the boundaries of the states in which the **Schedule A** Scope of Work is performed, and grant funded new copyrightable creation(s) is/are delivered, specifically, the state of Pennsylvania.
 - iv. Licensee shall deliver to Licensor a report of each proposed use of Licensor's copyrightable creations not-grant funded and provide copies of all materials containing copyrightable creations not-grant funded proposed to be used no later than thirty (30) days prior to Licensee use.
 - b. Prohibited Uses and Disclosures.
 - Licensee shall not use Licensor's pre-Agreement creations or cause, assist, or enable another to do so without full, complete, and prominent written and verbal disclosure and acknowledgment of Licensor's ownership, creation, development, copyright, and funding.
 - ii. Licensee shall not claim any ownership or creation of Licensor's pre-Agreement copyrightable creations or cause, assist, or enable another to do so.
 - iii. Licensee shall not make modifications, changes, or edits to Licensor's copyrightable creations not-grant funded nor create any derivative products therefrom or cause, assist, or enable another to do so.
 - iv. Licensee shall not make commercial use or otherwise monetize Licensor's copyrightable creations not-grant funded for any reason or in any way including, but not limited to, sale, license or sub-license, publication support for offers of fee

- for service products, contract, sub-contract, consulting contract, or grant proposal; or cause, enable, or assist another to do so.
- v. Licensee shall not copy or transmit Licensor's pre-Agreement creations outside of the Licensee's computer, server, or file share system and distribution to its staff, families, and students.
- vi. Licensee shall not in any way enable, support, or assist a third party to use Licensor's copyrightable creations not grant funded.
- c. Fees for Use of Pre Agreement Creations. Licensee shall pay Licensor for commercial use of Licensor's pre-Agreement creations. The payment shall include both a license fee and annual use royalty.
 - i. Licensee shall deliver a license fee of \$0 to the Licensor together with the returned executed License Agreement.
 - ii. Licensee shall pay an annual royalty of 0 percent (0%) to the Licensor of all gross revenues directly or indirectly derived from every and all use, e.g., service and training fees.
- d. Duty to Report Prohibited Use(s), Disclosure(s), and/or Unauthorized Third Party Use(s) and Duty to Assist in Prosecution. Licensee immediately shall report to Licensor all known details of unauthorized disclosures or use of Licensor's pre-Agreement creations including, but not limited to, time, date, persons engaged, witnesses, and confirming documents and emails. Licensee shall cooperate with LIC as requested in the investigation and enforcement of its legal rights.
- e. Annual License Reporting. Licensee shall deliver to Licensor an annual license accounting and use report on the anniversary of the effective date of this License Agreement.
 - i. Reports shall provide digital and paper copies of copyrightable creations not-grant funded Licensee has used including all forms and derivatives. In addition, reports provide a narrative describing the use, factual circumstances, and anecdotal and data evidence showing impact, results, and areas needing improvement.
 - ii. Reports shall provide an accounting of accrued royalties for each specific and all total usage of copyrightable creations not-grant funded including accrued royalty fees and supporting documentation. The accounting shall align with the uses identified in Section 3.e.2.
- 4. License for Use of Schedule A Deliverables Which are Grant Funded New Copyrightable Creations (hereinafter, "grant funded new copyrightable creations").
 - a. Regardless of the determination of ownership of the copyright and other property rights of granted funded new copyrightable creations, the Parties hereby grant to each other a universal, royalty free license or, where co-developed, a cross-license to use grant funded new copyrightable creation deliverables.

- b. Regardless of the determination of ownership of the copyright and other property rights, upon receipt of a written request, the Parties shall grant to third parties a universal royalty free license to use grant funded new copyrightable creations.
- c. The License to use grant funded new copyrightable creations includes the following requirements and prohibitions:
 - i. Licensee shall not monetize the creation or allow or enable a third party to do so. Monetization includes, but is not limited to, sales, production of other creations for sale; use as an element, tool, or method to produce a deliverable in a service or production contract or to support application for a grant, compensation, or money.
 - ii. All uses shall contain attribution acceptable to the Licensor for its contribution and/or the creation to include an applicable narrative, the creation name and authors, copyright marking, and a statement of the U.S. Department of Education grant funding.
 - iii. Licensee shall deliver to Licensor an annual report of use of grant funded new copyrightable creations and provide copies of all materials containing all or a portion of them. Reports shall be delivered to the Licensor on the anniversary of the execution of the Agreement and this License Agreement.
 - iv. Licensor shall have the exclusive right to disapprove and prohibit any Licensee proposed or actual use if Licensor deems the use to be any of the following: (a) the use is inconsistent with the Licensor's intended purpose for the creation; (b) the use is inconsistent with the Licensor's methodology for the creation; (c) the use is not professionally valid; and/or (d) the use will cause the Licensor professional embarrassment. In a notice of disapproval and prohibition, Licensor shall state its reasons and offer the Licensee an opportunity to submit a proposed, revised use which cures the disapproval and prohibition. The Licensor shall respond to a revised proposed use and approve or disapprove and prohibit use. Alternatively, Licensor may approve use on the condition that any use publication either include an approved statement of concern or removal of all references to the Licensor.

5. Warranty and Disclaimer.

- a. Licensor's non-grant funded copyrightable creation(s) is/are its own original product. The development, publication, and use of Licensor's non-grant funded copyrightable creation(s) do not violate any known third party right, contract, or law.
- b. MAEC's non-grant funded copyrightable creation(s) and grant funded new copyrightable creations and its **Schedule A** deliverables, if any, is/are preliminary tools. MAEC cannot and does not guarantee or warrant the quality, utility, or results of Licensee's use. MAEC employs experienced professionals; methods and skills developed over time; extensive study of the entity to be serviced, surveyed, or audited; objectivity; resources as required; and care when employing its creations, particularly when assessing the results. MAEC has

no knowledge of and cannot be responsible for Licensee's employed resources, methods, level of effort, commitment, control, or oversight of the use of the **Schedule A** deliverables. For these reasons, MAEC cannot guarantee or warrant the results of the Licensee's use of MAEC's creations and deliverables and disclaims responsibility for the License's product, implementation, and community or third-party responses thereto.

6. Liability and Indemnification.

- a. Licensee shall be liable to Licensor for any harm, damages, fees, and costs resulting from Licensee's breach the terms of this License Agreement related to Licensor's licensed creations, including, but not limited to license requirements and prohibited uses.
- b. Licensee shall indemnify Licensor from all third party claims, liability, damages, and costs resulting from Licensee's use of Licensor's creations, except in instances where Licensor has engaged in unlawful conduct.

7. Termination.

- a. This License Agreement and/or any license granted based upon Sections 3 and/or 4 shall be terminated immediately upon the Licensor's determination that the Licensee has breached any License Agreement provision, and particularly provisions in those Sections.
- b. This License Agreement and/or a license granted based upon Section 3 and/or 4 maybe terminated upon either party's delivery of a fifteen (15) days written notice to the other party.
- c. Termination of this License Agreement and/or a license granted based upon Sections 3 and/or 4 shall terminate all granted rights to use of the Licensor's grant funded new creations and not grant funded creations. All other License Agreement and granted license provisions, i.e., those which provide for payment of license and royalty fees, reporting, and protect the Licensor creation copyright and other property rights shall remain in full force and effect.

8. Dispute Resolution.

- a. Severability. If any provision of this License Agreement, performance or the Work, or application of either is determined to be unenforceable or invalid by law, this shall have no effect on any other provision, performance, or application and the remainder of the License Agreement shall be interpreted to reflect the intent of the Parties implemented in a lawful manner.
- b. Governing Law, Rights and Remedies, and Dispute Resolution. This License Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of the State of Maryland. Jurisdiction and venue rest in the State and Federal District Courts for Maryland. The Parties shall have all remedies to which they are entitled by law.
- c. All claims related to this License Agreement, including claims related to an adverse arbitration or decision pursuant shall be resolved by alternative dispute resolution (hereinafter "ADR"). The ADR shall be administered by the American Arbitration Association (hereinafter, "AAA").

- d. Neither party may initiate an action in a court of law or an administrative agency except, (1) to complete mediation and arbitration; (2) to enforce an arbitration order, subpoena, or discovery request; (3) to lodge and enforce a mediation agreement or arbitration award; and (4) for injunctive relief. Any other effort to initiate litigation shall be in breach of this License Agreement, dismissed by the Court, and the initiating party shall pay the opposing party's legal fees and costs.
- e. The ADR procedures shall be initiated by a claimant's written submission to the AAA of both a Commercial Demand for Arbitration and Request for Mediation. The limitation period for submitting the Demand and Request to bring all claims shall be one-hundred eighty (180) days from the date of the alleged action causing the claimed harm(s).
- f. Within thirty (30) days of the Demand, the Parties shall initiate a mediation, which if unsuccessful shall be followed by arbitration. The mediation process shall be completed within ninety (90) days of the demand (the "mediation period").
- g. Within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the mediation period without resolution, a Claimant shall submit its arbitration demand to the AAA and the opposition party.
- h. Arbitration shall be conducted pursuant to the AAA commercial rules, supplemented by reasonable discovery and court-issued subpoenas.
- i. Each party shall pay its own filing, legal, AAA, and arbitrator fees and costs.
- j. The arbitrator's award shall include an award of legal fees and costs to prevailing party for each claim, i.e., a successful prosecution or defense. If the award for a claim is such that each party prevails in part and fails in party, the arbitrator shall make reasonable fee and cost awards based upon the relative values and costs of prevailing in part.
- k. The arbitrator's award shall be lodged with a Maryland court of general jurisdiction and thereafter as necessary lodged with other courts of general jurisdiction for purposes of enforcement.

I. Introduction

A. Parties

The following School Entity or Entities agree to follow the policies and procedures contained in this Memorandum:

 4251 N. 5th Street, Philadelphia, PA 19140
- B. This Memorandum establishes procedures to be followed when certain incidents described in Section II below occur on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on a conveyance as described in the Safe Schools Act (such as a school bus) providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity. This Memorandum does not cover incidents that are outside of those school settings and create no substantial disruption to the learning environment.
- C. The parties seek to foster a relationship of cooperation and mutual support and to maintain a safe school environment.
- D. Legal Authority
 - 1. The parties make this agreement as required by Article XIII-A of the Public School Code of 1949, popularly known as the "Safe Schools Act," as amended, 24 P. S. §§ 13-1301-A-13-1313-A.
 - 2. In so recognizing this legal authority, the parties acknowledge their

respective duties pursuant to the Safe Schools Act and hereby agree to support and cooperate with one another in carrying out their joint and several responsibilities thereunder.

- 3. Information from Student Records.
 - a. The Law Enforcement Authority (Philadelphia Police Department) shall be governed by the following reporting and information exchange guidelines:
 - 1. Criminal History Record Information Act, 18 Pa.C.S. § 9101 et seq.
 - 2. The prohibition against disclosures, specified in section IV(C)(5) of this Memorandum.
 - b. When sharing information and evidence necessary for the Law Enforcement Authority to complete its investigation, the School Entity (The School District of Philadelphia) shall:
 - Comply with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (hereinafter "FERPA"), 20 U.S.C. § 1232g, and its implementing regulations at 34 C.F.R. § 99.1 et seq., and 22 Pa. Code §§ 2.31¬12.33, including any amendments thereto.
 - 2. Comply with the requirements of the Safe Schools Act, 24 P. S. §§ 13-1303-A and 13-1313-A, and any amendments thereto.
 - 3. Complete reports as required by section 1303-A of the Safe Schools Act, 24 P. S. § 13-1303-A, and any amendments thereto.
 - The School Entity may disclose personally identifiable information c. from an educational record of a student to the Law Enforcement Authority if a health or safety emergency exists and knowledge of that information is necessary to protect the health or safety of the student or other individuals. In determining whether a health or safety emergency exists, the School Entity may take into account the totality of the circumstances pertaining to a threat to the health or safety of a student or other individuals. If the School Entity determines that there is an articulable and significant threat to the health or safety of a student or other individuals, it may disclose information from education records to the Law Enforcement Authority, if knowledge of that information is necessary for the Law Enforcement Authority to protect the health or safety of the student or other individuals. The School Entity must record the articulable and significant threat to the health or safety of a student or other individuals so that it can demonstrate—to parents, students and the Family Policy Compliance Office—what circumstance led it to determine that a health or safety emergency existed and why the disclosure was justified.
- E. Priorities of the Law Enforcement Authority
 - 1. Help the School Entity prevent delinquent acts through preventive measures,

- including referrals to support services, diversionary programs, restorative practices, school-wide positive behavior supports, education and deterrence.
- 2. Investigate as appropriate all incidents reported to have occurred on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on a conveyance as described in the Safe Schools Act (including a school bus) providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity. The investigation of all reported incidents shall be conducted in the manner that the Law Enforcement Authority, in its sole discretion, deems appropriate; but any investigation shall be conducted so as to involve as little disruption to the school environment as is practicable.
- 3. Identify those responsible for the commission of the reported incident and, where appropriate, apprehend and prosecute those individuals. Identification and apprehension procedures shall involve as little disruption to the school environment as is practicable.
- 4. Establish and maintain a cooperative relationship with the School Entity in the reporting and resolution of all incidents described in Section II of this document.

F. Priorities of the School Entity

- 1. Help law enforcement prevent delinquent acts through preventive measures, including referrals to support services, diversionary programs, restorative practices, school-wide positive behavior supports, education and deterrence.
- 2. Create a safe learning environment.
- 3. Establish and maintain a cooperative relationship with the Law Enforcement Authority in the reporting and resolution of all incidents described in Section II of this document.
- 4. Provide the Law Enforcement Authority with all relevant information and required assistance in the event of a reported incident.
- 5. The School Entity shall give the Law Enforcement Authority a copy of the School Entity's behavior support services procedures and invite Law Enforcement Authority representatives to behavior support training.

II. Notification of Incident

The School Entity is required to notify law enforcement in specific situations listed in subsection A of this section, and has discretion over whether to notify law enforcement about incidents listed in subsection B of this section. Law enforcement's decision to investigate and file charges may be made in consultation with school administrators.

A. Mandatory Notification

- 1. The School Entity shall immediately notify the Law Enforcement Authority having jurisdiction where the offense occurred by the most expeditious means practicable of any of the following incidents occurring on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on a conveyance as described in the Safe Schools Act (including a school bus) providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity:
 - a. The following offenses under 18 Pa.C.S (relating to crimes and offenses):
 - 1. Section 908 (relating to prohibited offensive weapons).
 - The term "offensive weapon" is defined by section 908 of the Crimes Code as "[a]ny bomb, grenade, machine gun, sawed-off shotgun with a barrel less than 18 inches, firearm specially made or specially adapted for concealment or silent discharge, any blackjack, sandbag, metal knuckles, dagger, knife, razor or cutting instrument, the blade of which is exposed in an automatic way by switch, push-button, spring mechanism, or otherwise, any stun gun, stun baton, taser or other electronic or electric weapon or other implement for the infliction of serious bodily injury which serves no common lawful purpose." See 18 Pa.C.S. § 908(c) (relating to definitions).
 - (b) Consistent with section 908(b) of the Crimes Code (relating to exceptions), this reporting requirement does not apply to one who possessed or dealt with an offensive weapon solely as a curio or in a dramatic performance, or to one who possessed an offensive weapon briefly in consequence of having found it or taken it from an aggressor, or under circumstances similarly negating any intent or likelihood that the weapon would be used unlawfully.
 - 2. Section 912 (relating to possession of a weapon on school property).
 - (a) The term "weapon" is defined by section 912 of the Crimes Code to include, but is not limited to, a knife, cutting instrument, cutting tool, nunchuck stick, firearm, shotgun, rifle and any other tool, instrument or implement capable of inflicting serious bodily injury.
 - (b) Consistent with section 912(c) of the Crimes Code (relating to defense), this reporting requirement does not apply to a weapon that is: (a) possessed and used in conjunction with a lawful supervised school activity or course; or (b) is possessed for other lawful purpose.
 - 3. Chapter 25 (relating to criminal homicide).
 - 4. Section 2702 (relating to aggravated assault).
 - 5. Section 2709.1 (relating to stalking).
 - 6. Section 2901 (relating to kidnapping). Section 2902 (relating to unlawful restraint).
 - 7. Section 3121 (relating to rape).
 - 8. Section 3122.1 (relating to statutory sexual assault).
 - 9. Section 3123 (relating to involuntary deviate sexual intercourse).
 - 10. Section 3124.1 (relating to sexual assault).
 - Section 3124.2 (relating to institutional sexual assault).

- 12. Section 3125 (relating to aggravated indecent assault).
- 13. Section 3126 (relating to indecent assault).
- 14. Section 3301 (relating to arson and related offenses).
- 15. Section 3307 (relating to institutional vandalism), when the penalty is a felony of the third degree.
- 16. Section 3502 (relating to burglary).
- 17. Section 3503(a) and (b)(1)(v) (relating to criminal trespass).
- 18. Section 5501 (relating to riot).
- 19. Section 6110.1 (relating to possession of firearm by minor).
- b. The possession, use or sale of a controlled substance, designer drug or drug paraphernalia as defined in "The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act," as amended, 35 P. S. §§ 780-101-780-144, popularly known as the "Drug Act." For purposes of this Memorandum, the terms "controlled substance", "designer drug" and "drug paraphernalia" shall be defined as they are in section 102 of the Drug Act. See 35 P. S. § 780-102 (relating to definitions).
- c. Attempt, solicitation or conspiracy to commit any of the offenses listed in paragraphs 1 and 2 of this subsection.
- d. An offense for which registration is required under 42 Pa.C.S. § 9795.1 (relating to registration).
- 2. In responding to students who commit an incident listed under section 1303-A(b)(4.1) of the Safe Schools Act (24 P. S. § 13-1303-A(b)(4.1)), a school entity may consider the propriety of utilizing available school-based programs, such as school-wide positive behavior supports, to address the student's behavior. Nothing in this provision shall be read to limit law enforcement's discretion.

B. Discretionary Notification

- 1. The School Entity may notify the Law Enforcement Authority having jurisdiction where the incident occurred of any of the following incidents occurring on school property, at any school sponsored activity, or on a conveyance as described in the Safe Schools Act (including a school bus) providing transportation to or from a school or school sponsored activity:
 - a. The following offenses under 18 Pa.C.S (relating to crimes and offenses):
 - 1. Section 2701 (relating to simple assault).
 - 2. Section 2705 (relating to recklessly endangering another person)
 - 3. Section 2706 (relating to terroristic threats).
 - 4. Section 2709 (relating to harassment).
 - 5. Section 3127 (relating to indecent exposure).
 - 6. Section 3307 (relating to institutional vandalism), when the penalty is a misdemeanor of the second degree.
 - 7. Section 3503(b)(1)(i), (ii), (iii) and (iv), (b.1) and (b.2) (relating to

criminal trespass).

8. Chapter 39 (relating to theft and related offenses).

- 9. Section 5502 (relating to failure of disorderly persons to disperse upon official order).
- 10. Section 5503 (relating to disorderly conduct).
- 11. Section 6305 (relating to sale of tobacco).
- 12. Section 6306.1 (relating to use of tobacco in schools prohibited).
- Section 6308 (relating to purchase, consumption, possession, or transportation of liquor or malt or brewed beverages by a person under 21 years of age).
- b. Attempt, solicitation or conspiracy to commit any of the offenses listed in subsection (a).
- 2. In exercising its discretion to determine whether to notify law enforcement of such incidents, the School Entity may consider the following factors: the seriousness of the situation, the school's ability to defuse or resolve the situation, the child's intent, the child's age, whether the student has a disability and, if so, the type of disability and its impact on the student's behavior, and other factors believed to be relevant.

C. Law Enforcement Response to Notification

- 1. When notified of an incident listed in subsections A or B, law enforcement's decision to investigate and file charges, at the sole discretion of the Law Enforcement Authority, may be made in consultation with school administrators.
- 2. In determining whether to file charges, the Law Enforcement Authority is encouraged to consult with the District Attorney. Where appropriate under the law, part of this consultation may include a discussion about the availability or propriety of utilizing a diversionary program as an alternative to filing charges.
- 3. In no case shall a child who is 11 years old or younger be arrested, with the exception of the following offenses; Murder, Rape, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault. All other criminal offenses committed by children 11 years old and younger, will be diverted to the Philadelphia Police Department Pre-Arrests School Diversion Program.
- D. Notification of the Law Enforcement Authority when incident involves children with disabilities
 - 1. If a child with a disability commits an incident of misconduct, school administrators and the Law Enforcement Authority should take into consideration that the child's behavior may be a manifestation of the disability and there may be no intent to commit an unlawful act. A child with a disability under this subsection shall mean a student with an IEP, a protected handicapped student with a service agreement that includes a behavior support plan, or such student for whom an evaluation is pending under 22 Pa. Code §§ 14.123 (relating to evaluation), 15.5 (relating to school district initiated evaluation and provision of services), 15.6 (relating to parent initiated evaluation and provision of services), or Chapter 711 (relating to charter school and cyber charter school services and programs for children with disabilities).

- 2. In the event a child with a disability commits a mandatory notification offense under Subsection A, the School Entity must provide immediate notification to the Law Enforcement Authority regardless of the disability. Such notification will state that the child has an IEP or a service agreement that includes a behavior support plan and may include the School Entity's recommendation that police intervention may not be required and advisement that the School Entity will act to address the student's behavior need as required by applicable federal and state law and regulations, including 22 Pa. Code §§ 14.133 (relating to positive behavior support), 15.3 (relating to protected handicapped students general) or 711.46 (relating to positive behavior support). The Law Enforcement Authority may take the recommendation under advisement but reserves the right to investigate and file charges.
- In the event a child with a disability commits a discretionary offense under Subsection B and the School Entity does not believe that police intervention is necessary, the School Entity will address the student's behavior need as required by applicable federal and state law and regulations, including 22 Pa. Code §§ 14.133, 15.3 or 711.46.
- 4. In accordance with 34 CFR 300.535 (relating to referral to and action by law enforcement and judicial authorities), nothing will prohibit the School Entity from reporting an offense committed by a child with a disability to the Law Enforcement Authority, and nothing will prevent State law enforcement and judicial authorities from exercising their responsibilities with regard to the application of Federal and State law to crimes committed by a child with a disability.
- 5. The School Entity, when reporting an offense committed by a child with a disability, should ensure that copies of the special education and disciplinary records of the child are transmitted for consideration by the appropriate authorities to the Law Enforcement Authority to whom the incident was reported.
- 6. The School Entity, when reporting an incident under this section, may transmit copies of the child's special education and disciplinary records only to the extent that the transmission is permitted by FERPA.
- E. Upon notification of the incident to the Law Enforcement Authority, the School Entity shall provide as much of the following information as is available at the time of notification.

In no event shall the gathering of information unnecessarily delay notification:

- 1. Whether the incident is in-progress or has concluded.
- 2. Nature of the incident.
- 3. Exact location of the incident.
- 4. Number of persons involved in the incident.

- 5. Names and ages of the individuals involved.
- 6. Weapons, if any, involved in the incident.
- 7. Whether the weapons, if any, have been secured and, if so, the custodian of the weapons.
- 8. Injuries involved.
- 9. Whether EMS or the Fire Department have been notified.
- 10. Identity of the school contact person.
- 11. Identity of the witnesses to the incident, if any.
- 12. Whether the incident involves a student with a disability and, if so, the type of disability and its impact on the student's behavior.
- Other such information known to the school entity and believed to be relevant to the incident.
- F. No later than September 30 of each year, the School Entity shall assemble and make ready for immediate deployment to its Incident Command Post the following information for the purpose of assisting the Law Enforcement Authority in responding to an emergency:
 - 1. Blueprints or floor plans of the school buildings.
 - 2. Aerial photo, map or layout of the school campus, adjacent properties and surrounding streets or roads.
 - 3. Location(s) of predetermined or prospective command posts.
 - 4. Current teacher/employee roster.
 - 5. Current student roster.
 - 6. Most recent school yearbook.
 - 7. School fire-alarm shutoff location and procedures.
 - 8. School sprinkler system shutoff location and procedures.
 - 9. Gas/utility line layouts and shutoff valve locations.
 - 10. Cable/satellite television shutoff location and procedures.
 - Other information the School Entity deems pertinent to assist local police departments in responding to an emergency.

III. Law Enforcement Authority Response

- A. Depending on the totality of the circumstances, initial response by the Law Enforcement Authority may include:
 - 1. For incidents in progress:
 - a. Meet with contact person and locate scene of incident.
 - b. Stabilize incident.
 - c. Provide/arrange for emergency medical treatment, if necessary.
 - d Control the scene of the incident.
 - 1. Secure any physical evidence at the scene.
 - 2. Identify involved persons and witnesses.
 - e. Conduct investigation.
 - f. Exchange information.
 - g. Confer with school officials to determine the extent of law enforcement involvement required by the situation.
 - 2. Incidents not in progress:
 - a. Meet with contact person.
 - b. Recover any physical evidence.
 - c. Conduct investigation.
 - d. Exchange information.
 - e. Confer with school officials to determine the extent of law enforcement involvement required by the situation.
 - 3. Incidents initially reported to the Law Enforcement Authority.

If any incident described in sections IIA or IIB is initially reported to the Law Enforcement Authority, the Law Enforcement Authority shall proceed directly with its investigation, shall immediately notify the School Entity of the incident, and shall proceed as outlined in sections IIA through IIE.

B. Custody of Actors

- 1. Students identified as actors in reported incidents may be taken into custody by law enforcement at the discretion of the investigating law enforcement officer under any of the following circumstances:
 - a. The student has been placed under arrest.
 - b. The student is being placed under investigative detention.
 - c. The student is being taken into custody for the protection of the student.
 - d. The student's parent or guardian consents to the release of the student to law enforcement custody.
- 2. The investigating law enforcement officer shall take all appropriate steps to protect the legal and constitutional rights of those students being taken into custody.

IV. Assistance of School Entities

A. In Loco Parentis

- 1. Teachers, Guidance Counselors, Vice Principals and Principals in the public schools have the right to exercise the same authority as a parent, guardian or person in parental relation to such pupil concerning conduct and behavior over the pupils attending a school during the time they are in attendance, including the time required in going to and from their homes.
- 2. School authorities' ability to stand in loco parentis over children does not extend to matters beyond conduct and discipline during school, school activities, or on conveyances as described in the Safe Schools Act providing transportation to and from school or a school sponsored activity.

B. Notification of Parent or Guardian

- 1. Parents or guardians of all victims and suspects directly involved in an incident listed under Section IIA or IIB shall be immediately notified of the involvement, and they shall be informed about any notification regarding the incident that has been, or may be, made to the Law Enforcement Authority.
- 2. The School Entity shall document attempts made to reach the parents or guardians of all victims and suspects directly involved in incident listed under Section IIA or IIB.

C. Scope of School Entity's Involvement

1. General Principles: Once the Law Enforcement Authority assumes primary responsibility for a matter, the legal conduct of interviews, interrogations, searches, seizures of property, and arrests are within the purview of the Law Enforcement Authority. The School Entity shall defer to the Law Enforcement Authority on matters

of criminal and juvenile law procedure, except as is necessary to protect the interests of the School Entity. The Law Enforcement Authority will keep the chief school administrator, or his designees, informed of the status of pending investigations.

2. Victims

- a. The School Entity shall promptly notify the parent or guardian of a victim when the Law Enforcement Authority interviews that victim. The Law Enforcement Authority shall follow its policies and procedures when interviewing a victim to ensure the protection of the victim's legal and constitutional rights.
- b. In the event a victim is interviewed by Law Enforcement Authority on school property, a guidance counselor or similar designated personnel may be present during the interview.

3. Witnesses

- a. The School Entity shall promptly notify the parent or guardian of a witness when the Law Enforcement Authority interviews that witness. The Law Enforcement Authority shall follow its policies and procedures when interviewing a witness to ensure the protection of the witness's legal and constitutional rights.
- b. In the event a witness is interviewed by the Law Enforcement Authority on school property, a guidance counselor or similar designated personnel should be present during the interview.

4. Suspects and Custodial Interrogation

- a. The School Entity shall help the Law Enforcement Authority to secure the permission and presence of at least one parent or guardian of a student suspect before that student is interrogated by law enforcement authorities.
- b. When a parent or guardian is not present, school authorities shall not stand in loco parentis (in the place of the parent/guardian) during an interview.
- c. If an interested adult cannot be contacted, the School Entity shall defer to the investigating Law Enforcement Authority, which will protect the student suspect's legal and constitutional rights as required by law.

5. Conflicts of Interest

- a. The parties to this Memorandum recognize that if a School Entity employee, contractor, or agent of the School Entity is the subject of an investigation, a conflict of interest may exist between the School Entity and the adult suspect.
- b. Neither the individual that is the subject of the investigation, nor any person

acting as his/her subordinate or direct supervisor, shall be present during Law Enforcement Authority's interviews of student co-suspects, victims or witnesses by the Law Enforcement Authority.

c. Neither the individual who is the subject of the investigation, nor his/her subordinate(s) and/or direct supervisor(s), shall be informed of the contents of the statements made by student co-suspects, victims or witnesses, except at the discretion of the Law Enforcement Authority or as otherwise required by law.

D. Reporting Requirements

- 1. All school entities are required to submit an annual report, which will include violence statistics and reports, to the Department of Education's Office for Safe Schools. This annual report must include all new incidents described in Sections IIA and IIB. Before submitting the required annual report, each chief school administrator and each police department having jurisdiction over school property of the School Entity shall do the following:
 - a. No later than thirty days prior to the deadline for submitting the annual report, the chief school administrator shall submit the report to the police department with jurisdiction over the relevant school property. The police department shall review the report and compare the data regarding criminal offenses and notification of law enforcement to determine its accuracy.
 - b. No later than fifteen days prior to the deadline for submitting the annual report, the police department shall notify the chief school administrator, in writing, whether the report accurately reflects police incident data. Where the police department determines that the report accurately reflects police incident data, the chief of police shall sign the report. Where the police department determines that the report does not accurately reflect police incident data, the police department shall indicate any discrepancies between the report and police incident data.
 - c. Prior to submitting the annual report, the chief school administrator and the police department shall attempt to resolve discrepancies between the report and police incident data. Where a discrepancy remains unresolved, the police department shall notify the chief school administrator and the office in writing.
 - d. Where a police department fails to take action as required under clause a or b, the chief school administrator shall submit the annual report and indicate that the police department failed to take action as required under clause a or b.
 - e. Where there are discrepancies between the School Entity's incident data and the police incident data, the following shall occur:
 - 1. The parties agree to meet and confer in an attempt to resolve or reconcile any discrepancies in school violence data prior to filing the annual report.

V. General Provisions

- A. This Memorandum does not create any contractual rights or obligations between the signatory Law Enforcement Authority, the signatory School Entity, any other signatory authorities or entities, or their respective officers, employees, agents or representatives.
- B. This Memorandum may be amended, expanded or modified at any time upon the written consent of the parties. It must be reviewed and re-executed within two years of the date of its original execution and every two years thereafter.
- C. If changes in state or federal law require changes to this Memorandum, the parties shall amend this Memorandum.
- D. All parties to this Memorandum will communicate fully and openly with each other in order to resolve any problems that may arise in the fulfillment of the terms of this Memorandum.

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU)

CONGRESO DE LATINOS UNIDOS, INC.

Memorandum of Understanding

This document serves as a memorandum of understanding that defines the collaboration between Congreso de Latinos Unidos, Inc. (Congreso) - the lead contractor of the School District of Philadelphia and its partner organization, Esperanza Cyber Charter School, to implement ELECT Programs within the partner organizations non-district schools.

Purpose: The purpose of this initiative is to implement ELECT (Education Leading to Employment and Career Training) and EFI (ELECT Fatherhood Initiative) programs which aim to deliver a broad and comprehensive array of supportive services designed to help pregnant and/or parenting students stay in school, earn a high school diploma, and achieve the self- sufficiency required to make a successful transition to employment.

Activities: Congreso will implement ELECT programming for pregnant and/or parenting students who attend Esperanza Cyber Charter School. The initial service period will be for the 2023-2024 academic year beginning August 2023 through June 30, 2024, with two renewal options upon continued funding for academic years 24/25 and 25/26.

The partners of this MOU agree to implement the following responsibilities:

Esperanza Cyber Charter High School:

Administrative support of the ELECT program will assist both staff and students within the school community. Teachers and other support personnel working in conjunction with the ELECT staff will provide for a stronger link within the program. It is beneficial for principals to support communication between ELECT and school staff members to provide for and maintain educational continuity. In the interest of team building, ELECT staff members should be included in faculty meetings and invited to join school committees.

The following is a list of program assurances:

- SINGLE POINT OF CONTACT (SPOC): Appoint a single point of contact to provide support in achieving program goals and educational continuity (e.g. an Assistant Principal, Nurse or Counselor). This person will meet with ELECT staff, be available to address concerns and make programmatic decisions.
- **STUDENT PARTICIPATION:** Promote building-wide tolerance for the fact that ELECT student participants will need to be excused periodically from regularly scheduled classes in order to engage in key program activities (e.g. state mandated monthly workshops and individual case management sessions that are to be conducted on a biweekly basis).
- OTHER SERVICE PROVIDERS: Refer any inquiries you might receive from service providers interested in working with this population in your building to Jennifer Pitt, ELECT Program Manager in the Office of Early Childhood Education at (215) 400-5744. ELECT is the only official and approved program for pregnant and parenting teen students in the District, and is already working with many community-based organizations and is capable of incorporating more into the design.
- **RECRUITMENT:** Assist/permit ELECT staff opportunities for collaboration with entire school staff on recruitment for the program. Allow presentations to all staff at building meetings. Support an established recruitment plan/procedure at the onset of the school year with staff that will be re-evaluated periodically. Program recruitment will be ongoing throughout the year.
- STAFF ATTENDANCE/ACCOUNTABILITY: Establish in the main office an attendance procedure/sign-in/out log for ELECT staff. Staff is expected to adhere to all building policies as established by the school principal in regards to the sign-in and sign-out process when leaving and re-entering the building.
- BUILDING FACILITIES, EQUIPMENT AND MAINTENANCE: Provide ELECT consideration and inclusion for the use of the building facilities if and when meeting students on site (e.g. library, auditorium, fax and copy machines, etc).

• **INSURANCE:** Esperanza Cyber Charter High School agrees to maintain professional liability insurance with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 in the aggregate to cover any claims arising out of or in any way related to any professional negligence by Esperanza Cyber Charter High School, including, but not limited to, all claims relating to the injury or death of any person or damage to any property, and to fully protect Congreso from and against any and all liability, losses, payments, and expenses incurred or imposed in connection therewith.

Congreso:

- Assign a designated ELECT case manager to complete intakes, enroll, and manage a case load
 of expectant and parenting students (both male and female). *Number of students accepted
 into program based on program capacity.
- Congreso shall obtain and provide to Esperanza Cyber, PA Criminal Background Check, PA
 Child Abuse Clearance and Federal Criminal History Background Check for all ELECT case
 mangers working with Esperanza Cyber students. These checks shall be renewed on a bi annual
 basis by Congreso and provided to Esperanza Cyber.
- Participate in appropriate on-site Staff Meetings/Professional Development when notified by school administration to attend.
- Participate in designated relevant school committees; however, services are limited to pregnant/parenting students either enrolling in or already participating in ELECT.
- Coordinate referral relationships with Esperanza Cyber personnel.
- Communicate necessary and appropriate participant information with the school's roster office, nurse, counseling department, and teachers to address student needs.
- Communicate with school personnel in reference to homebound services, excessive absences due to pregnancy/parenting, and teen parent leave.
- Communicate and collaborate with school personnel in the event of any client crisis intervention efforts, including reports of abuse, or threats to harm self or others.
- Sign in and out and/or notifying main office of presence in the building.

• Complete applicable data reporting/requirements including weekly attendance records of enrolled ELECT students and grades.

Congreso will provide quality educational and social services support, along with parenting skills training, to pregnant and parenting students via individual home visits, as well as through a series of group sessions.

Congreso is a dynamic, comprehensive multi service organization whose mission is to strengthen Latino communities. Founded in 1977, the agency serves more than 12,000 unique clients annually with a budget of \$26 million. Congreso's comprehensive education, employment, health and social services together support the ultimate goal of greater client self-sufficiency.
