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Foreword

The Juvenile Court Judges' Commission (JCJC) is pleased to present the ninth edition of its Juvenile Court Annual Report. This report serves as the Commonwealth's primary source of statewide juvenile court data, offering a comprehensive and transparent view of how youth move through each stage of the delinquency process. It is intended to inform and support courts, juvenile probation departments, policymakers, and system partners in evaluating practice, identifying trends, and strengthening the outcomes for youth, families, and communities.

At its core, this report reflects our ongoing commitment to data-informed decision-making and to the principles that guide Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system: community protection, accountability, and competency development. By examining not only outcomes but also the pathways that lead to those outcomes, we are better positioned to ensure that system responses are fair, effective, and aligned with evidence-based practices.

As in prior years, the report presents both statewide and county-level data through narrative summaries, charts, and graphical displays. Its structure follows the sequential progression of a juvenile case, from allegation through disposition, allowing readers to understand how youth experience the system at each decision point. County-class comparisons further enhance this analysis by enabling jurisdictions to examine their practices alongside similarly situated counties with comparable demographic and operational characteristics. For those seeking a more detailed view, the appendices provide county-level data for nearly every metric in the body of the report.

While this report offers important insights, it is not intended to stand alone. Rather, it should serve as a tool for reflection, discussion, and continuous improvement at both the local and state levels. The data presented herein invites thoughtful inquiry into policy, practice, and resource allocation, and underscores the importance of collaboration among all stakeholders who serve youth.

The JCJC extends its deepest appreciation to the juvenile courts and juvenile probation departments throughout Pennsylvania. Their diligence, professionalism, and commitment to accurate data collection and reporting make this work possible. We also recognize and commend the judges, juvenile probation officers, district attorneys, defenders, victim advocates, service providers, and countless other professionals who work each day to uphold the mission of the juvenile justice system. Their dedication to supporting youth and families, often in the face of complex and challenging circumstances, remains the foundation of this system's strength.

It is with respect and gratitude that we dedicate this report to all who contribute to the fair and effective administration of juvenile justice in Pennsylvania.

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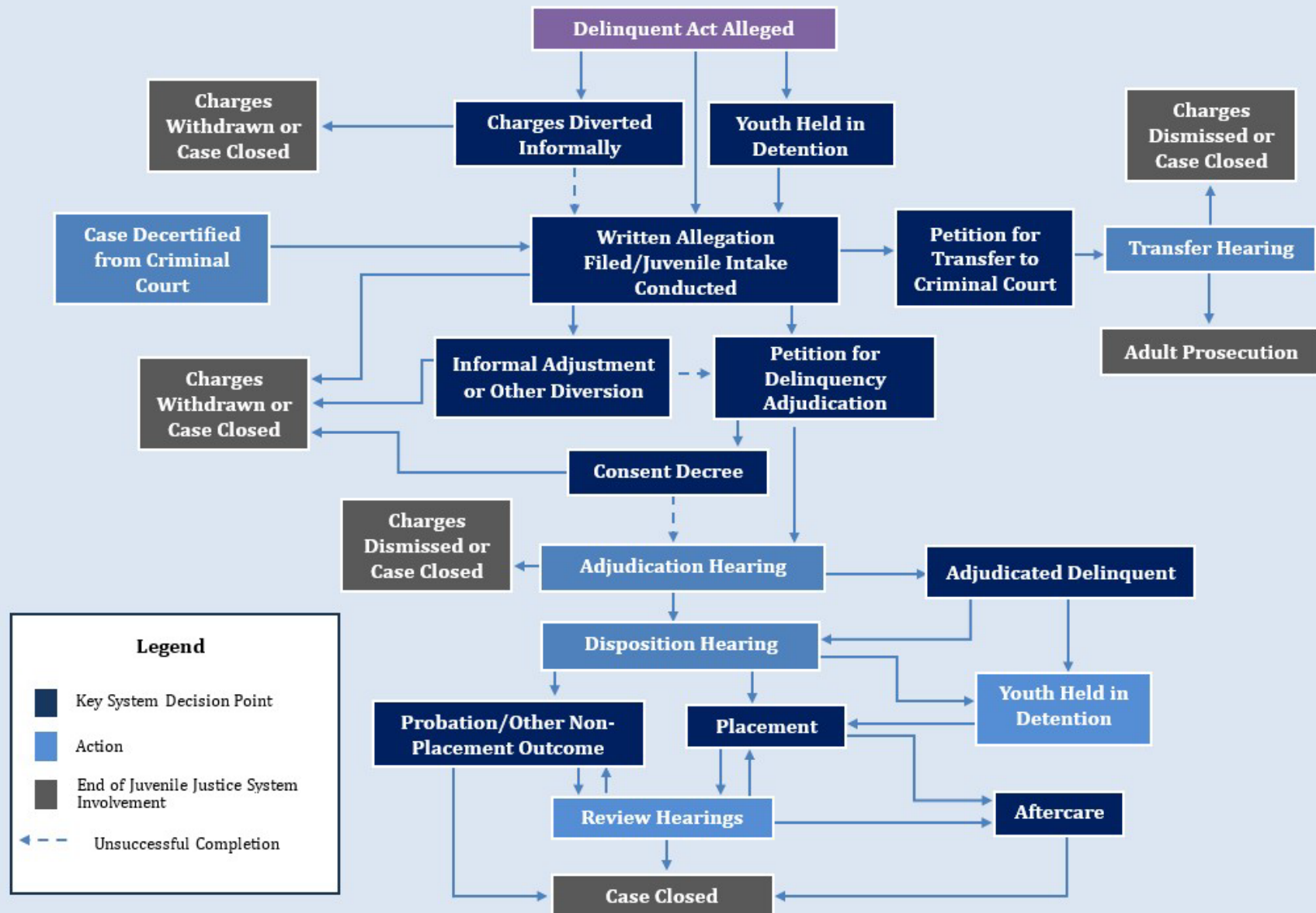
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Pennsylvania Juvenile Justice System Process

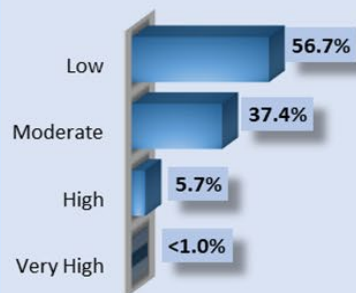

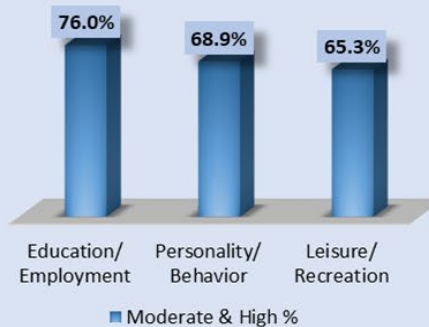

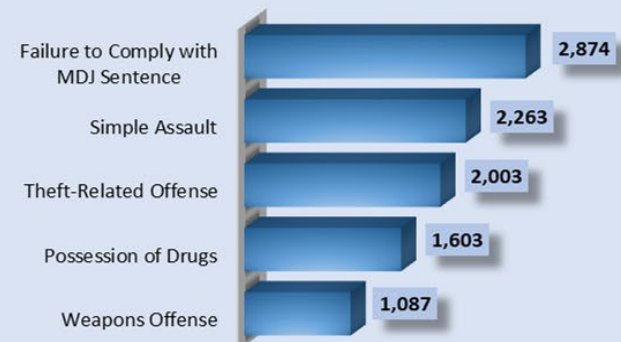
**DISTRIBUTION OF RISK LEVEL

TOP 5 MOST FREQUENT ALLEGED OFFENSE CATEGORIES

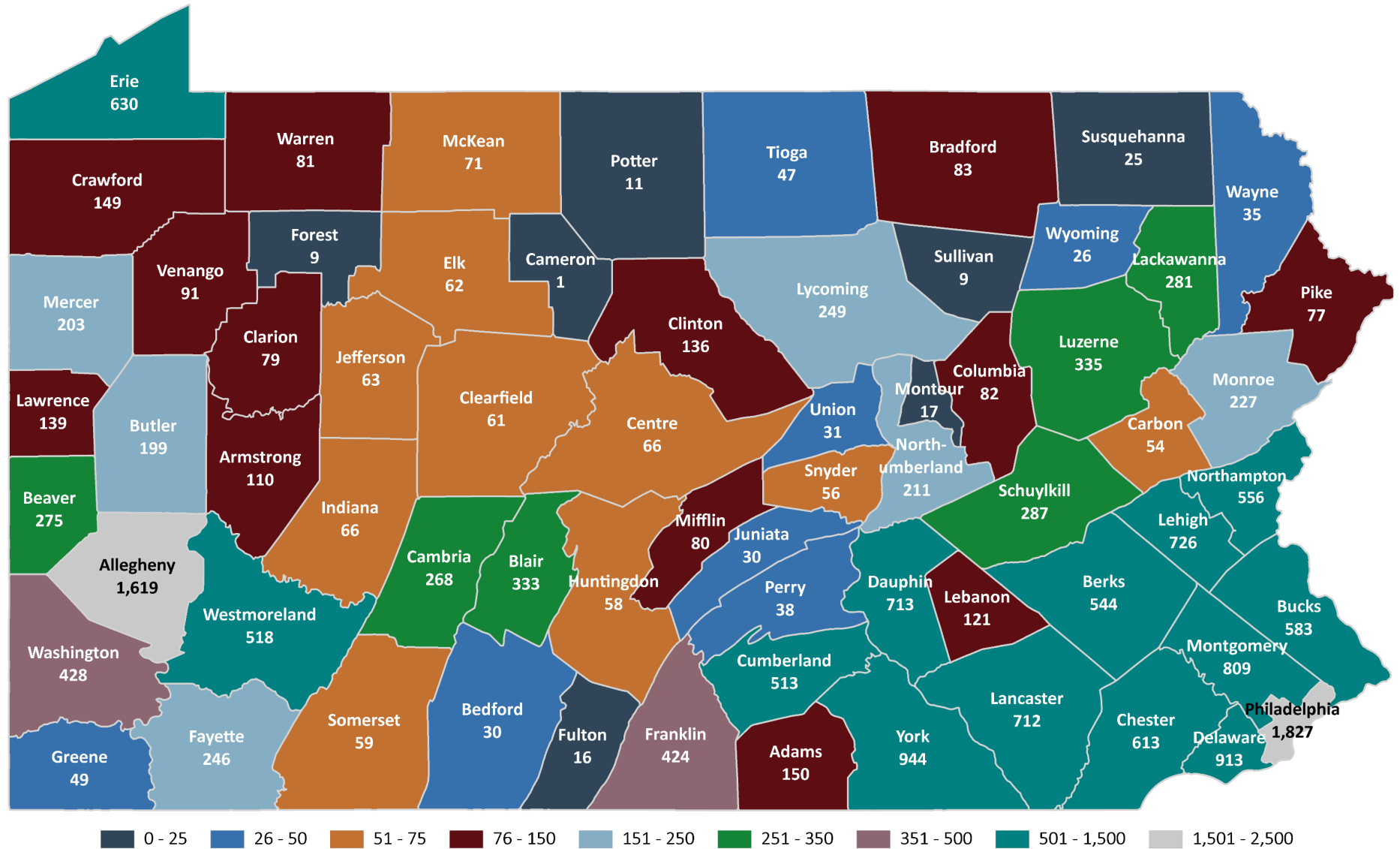


Chapter 1 – Incoming Cases

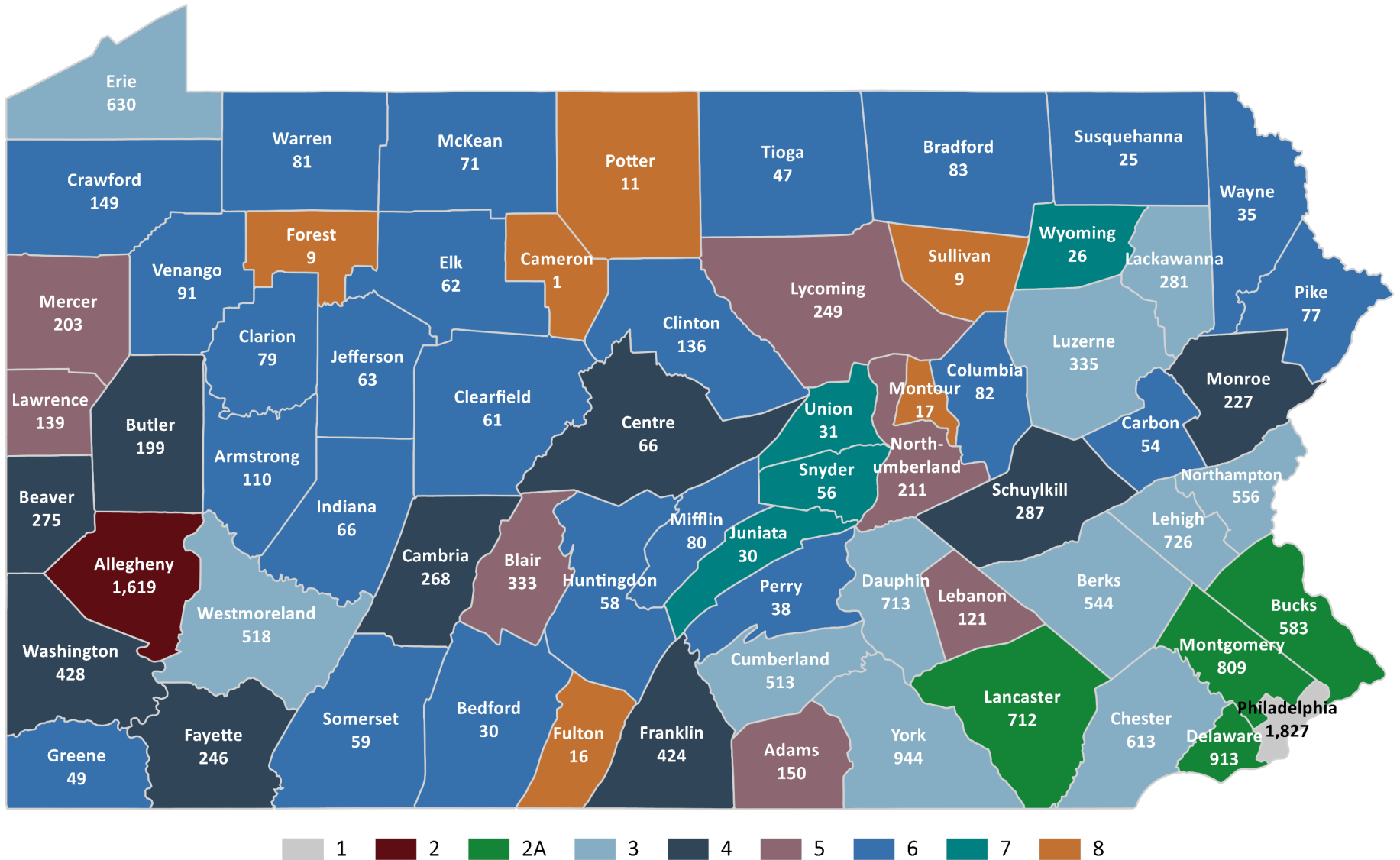
Section 1: Delinquency Allegations

1. The unit of count for this section is a written allegation. A written allegation is the document submitted by a law enforcement officer or other person to allege a youth has committed an act of delinquency. Multiple allegations may result in a single disposition. Allegations are synonymous with the term “case” in the Pennsylvania Juvenile Case Management System (PaJCMS).
2. Written allegations in this section were filed with a juvenile probation department between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.
3. In Pennsylvania, juvenile court jurisdiction extends over individuals who have been alleged to have committed a delinquent act, as defined by 42 Pa.C.S. § 6301 *et seq.*, on or after their 10th birthday and prior to reaching 18 years of age. Juvenile court supervision can extend until the individual is 21 years of age if the individual is currently under supervision. Age, for purposes of this section, was calculated from the youth’s date of birth to the date of the offense in the written allegation.
4. Data for this report were compiled from the PaJCMS on March 12, 2026. Any delinquency allegations received by a juvenile probation department in 2025, and entered into the PaJCMS after this date, may not be included in these statistics. The numbers published in this report, therefore, may not reflect current numbers within the system.
5. Finally, the reader should be cautioned that, beginning in 2020, figures were likely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Figures dropped significantly in 2020 and 2021 before returning close to pre-pandemic levels in 2022.

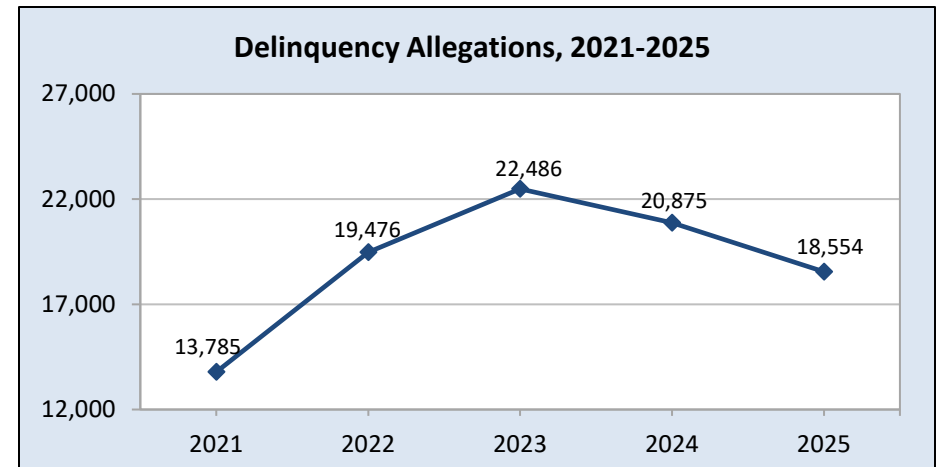
Delinquency Allegations, 2021-2025

The number of delinquency allegations received by juvenile probation departments has decreased for the second consecutive year but remains consistent with pre-pandemic levels.

There were 18,554 delinquency-related allegations in Pennsylvania in 2025. This total represents an 11.1% decrease from 2024.

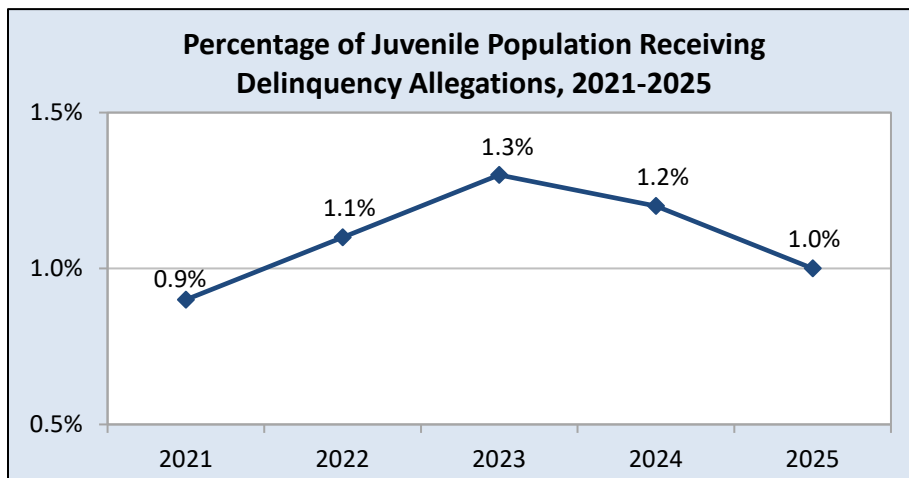
After allegations significantly decreased during the COVID-19 pandemic, allegations generally returned to pre-pandemic levels beginning in 2022. The number of delinquency allegations received in 2025 reflects a 34.6% increase from 2021.

Almost one-third (32.9%) of allegations received in 2025 occurred in the following five counties: Allegheny, Delaware, Montgomery, Philadelphia, and York (see map on page 4).



Percentage of Juvenile Population Receiving Delinquency Allegations, 2021-2025

The percentage of the juvenile population receiving a delinquency allegation in 2025 decreased from 2024.



Between 2021 and 2025, the rate of juvenile delinquency allegations as a percentage of the Pennsylvania juvenile population aged 10-17 increased by 11.1%, from 0.9% to 1.0%.*

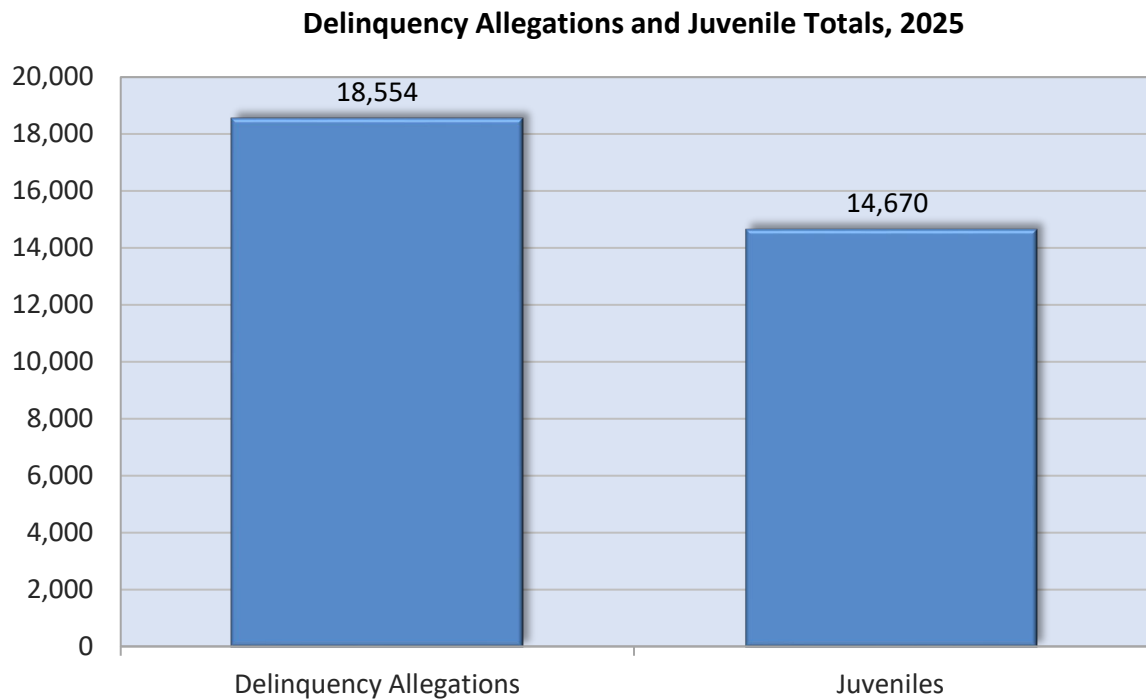
However, the percentage of the juvenile population receiving a delinquency allegation in 2025 was 16.7% lower than 2024 (1.0% vs. 1.2%, respectively). Please refer to Appendix 3 for juvenile population figures.

Delinquency Allegations and Juvenile Totals, 2025

In 2025, 14,670 juveniles accounted for 18,554 delinquency allegations.

In 2025, 14,670 juveniles accounted for 18,554 delinquency allegations in Pennsylvania. This equates to an average of 1.26 delinquency allegations per juvenile. County-level rates of delinquency allegations per juvenile in 2025 ranged from 1.0 to 1.81 (see Appendix 3).

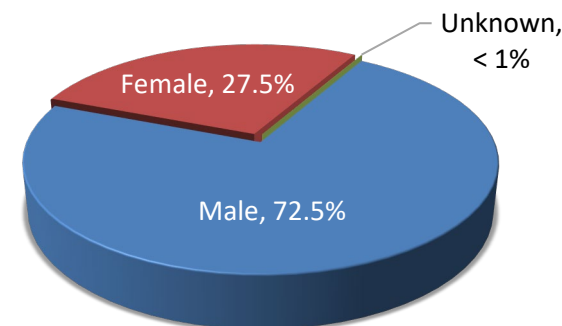


Delinquency Allegations by Gender, 2025

Males consistently account for the majority of delinquency allegations.

In 2025, almost three in four (72.5%) delinquency allegations submitted to juvenile probation departments involved males, compared to 72.3% in 2024. Allegations involving females contributed approximately one-quarter of all allegations, 27.5% in 2025 (see Appendix 4).

Delinquency Allegations by Race and Ethnicity, 2025

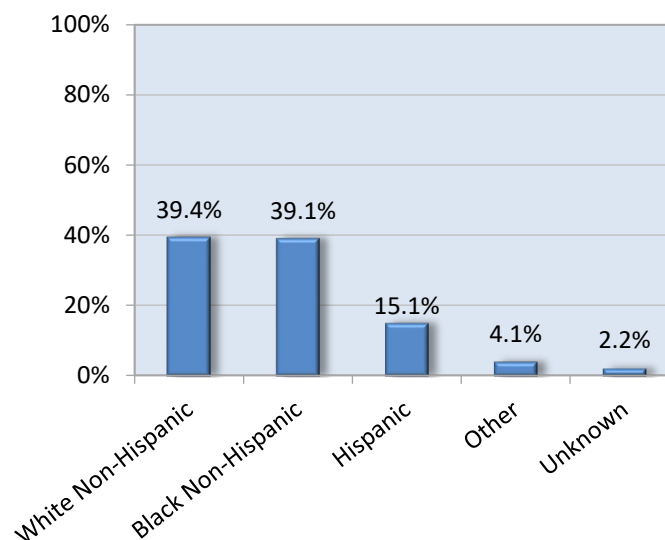
Certain race and ethnicity groups continue to be disproportionately represented at the delinquency allegation decision point.

In 2025, White Non-Hispanic and Black Non-Hispanic youth represented the largest racial/ethnic categories for all delinquency allegations, accounting for nearly the same percentage of all incoming allegations (39.4% and 39.1%, respectively).

However, in comparison to the racial/ethnic distribution of the population in Pennsylvania aged 10-17, both groups are disproportionately represented at this decision point. More specifically, White Non-Hispanic youth account for 55.7% of the total juvenile population, but only 39.4% of the delinquency allegation population, meaning they are under-represented at this decision point. Conversely, Black Non-Hispanic youth account for 12.8% of the total juvenile population, but 39.1% of all delinquency allegations, meaning this group is overrepresented at this decision point.*

Even when excluding Philadelphia County and Allegheny County, this takeaway holds constant. More specifically, excluding these two counties, Black Non-Hispanic youth represent 5.8% of the juvenile population, but 30.8% of all delinquency allegations. 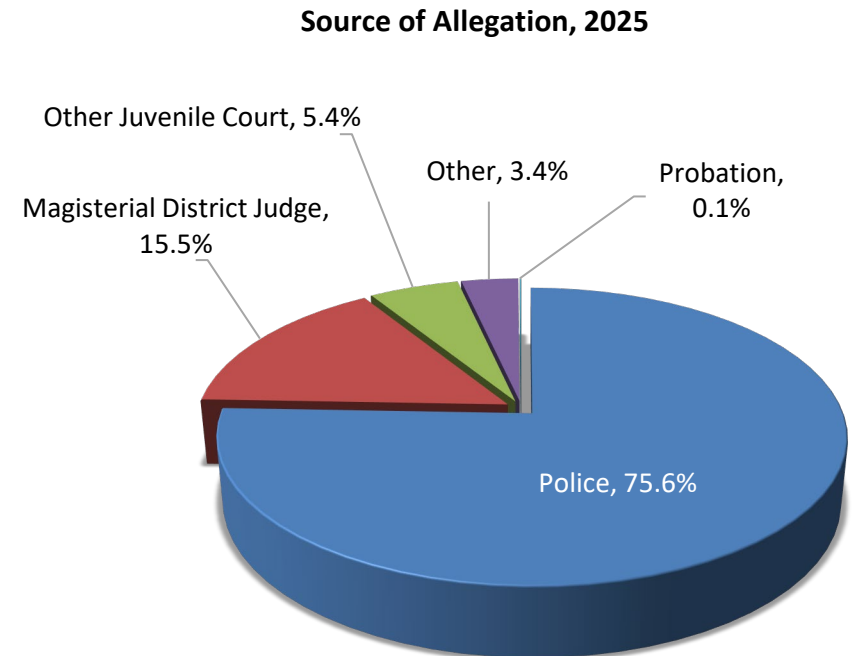
Source of Allegation, 2025

Police continue to be the primary source of delinquency allegations in 2025.

Police and Magisterial District Judges were the primary sources of delinquency allegations in 2025 – 75.6% and 15.5%, respectively.

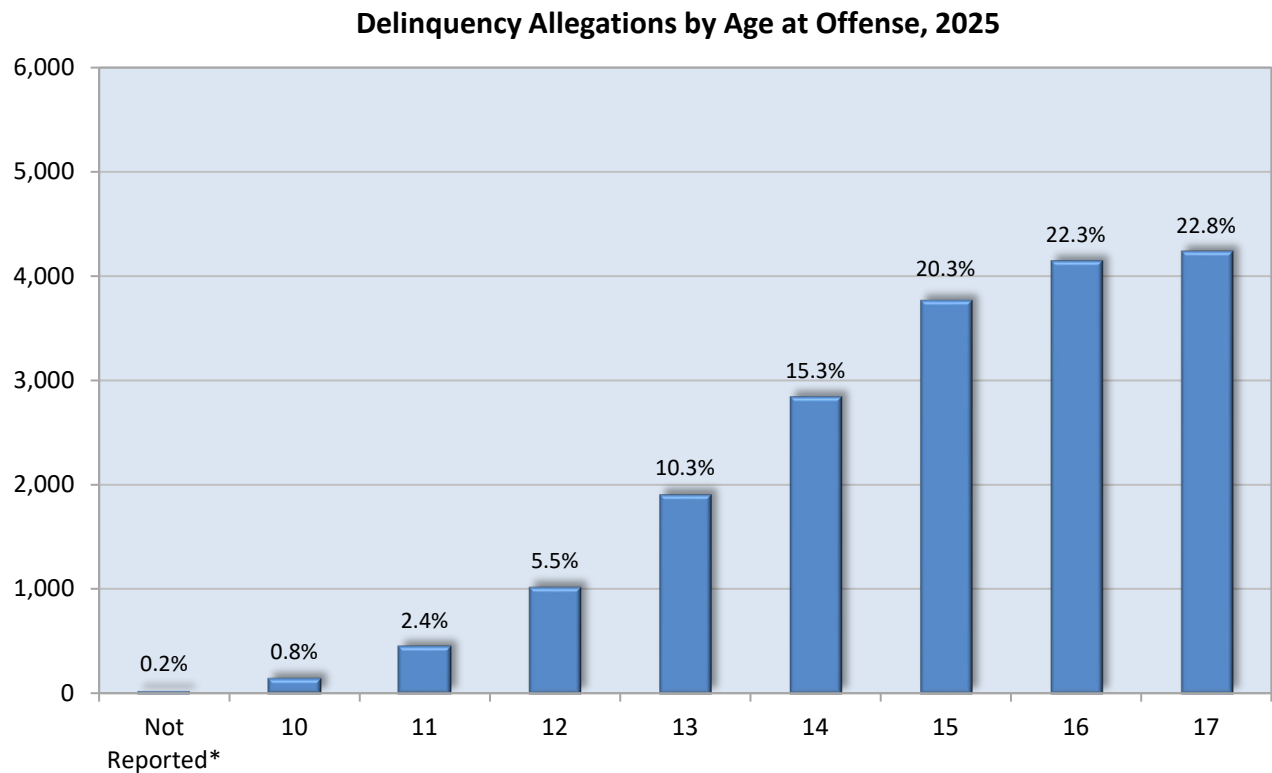

Delinquency Allegations by Age at Offense, 2025

Youth aged 15 and older make up the majority of delinquency allegations.

Seventeen-year-olds accounted for 22.8% of all juvenile delinquency allegations in 2025, representing the most allegations for any age group. Juveniles aged 16 accounted for 22.3% of all juvenile delinquency allegations, while 15-year-olds accounted for 20.3% of all juvenile delinquency allegations. Less than 10% of all delinquency allegations were for youth under the age of 13.

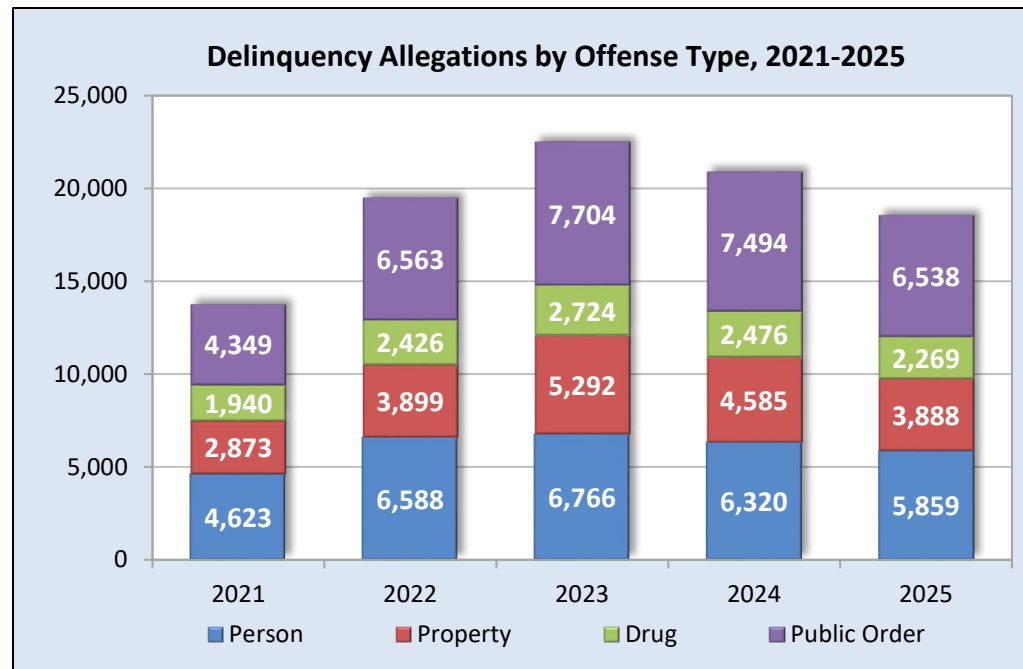
Delinquency Allegations by Offense Type, 2021-2025

All offense types decreased over the last year, with property offenses showing the highest rate of decline.

The following information was compiled based on one offense per allegation, the most serious alleged offense, for each juvenile delinquency allegation received in Pennsylvania between 2021 and 2025. These alleged offenses are broken into four offense categories: Person, Property, Drug, and Public Order.

Between 2021 and 2025, the number of allegations received for Public Order offenses increased at the highest rate (50.3%), followed by Property offenses (35.3%), Person offenses (26.7%), and Drug offenses (17.0%).

From 2024 to 2025, however, the number of allegations received for all offense types decreased. Property offenses decreased at the highest rate (15.2%), followed by Public Order offenses (12.8%), Drug offenses (8.4%), and Person offenses (7.3%).



Note: The Offense Type of Public Order includes offenses such as disorderly conduct, weapon on school property, firearms offenses, and certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense.

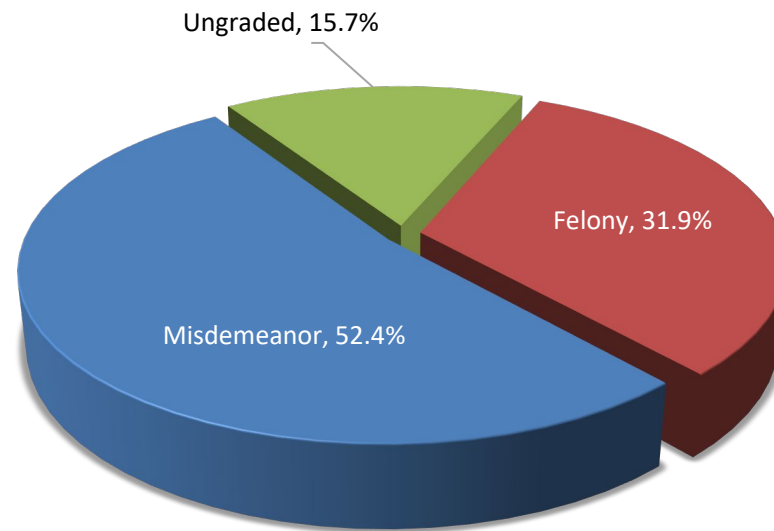
Delinquency Allegations by Most Serious Alleged Offense Grade, 2025

Most delinquency allegations in 2025 were for non-felony offenses.

These alleged offenses are grouped according to the following charge grades: Felony, Misdemeanor, and Ungraded.

More than two-thirds (68.1%) of delinquency allegations received in 2025 were for non-felony offenses. Misdemeanors accounted for slightly more than half (52.4%) of all delinquency allegations, while felonies accounted for 31.9%.

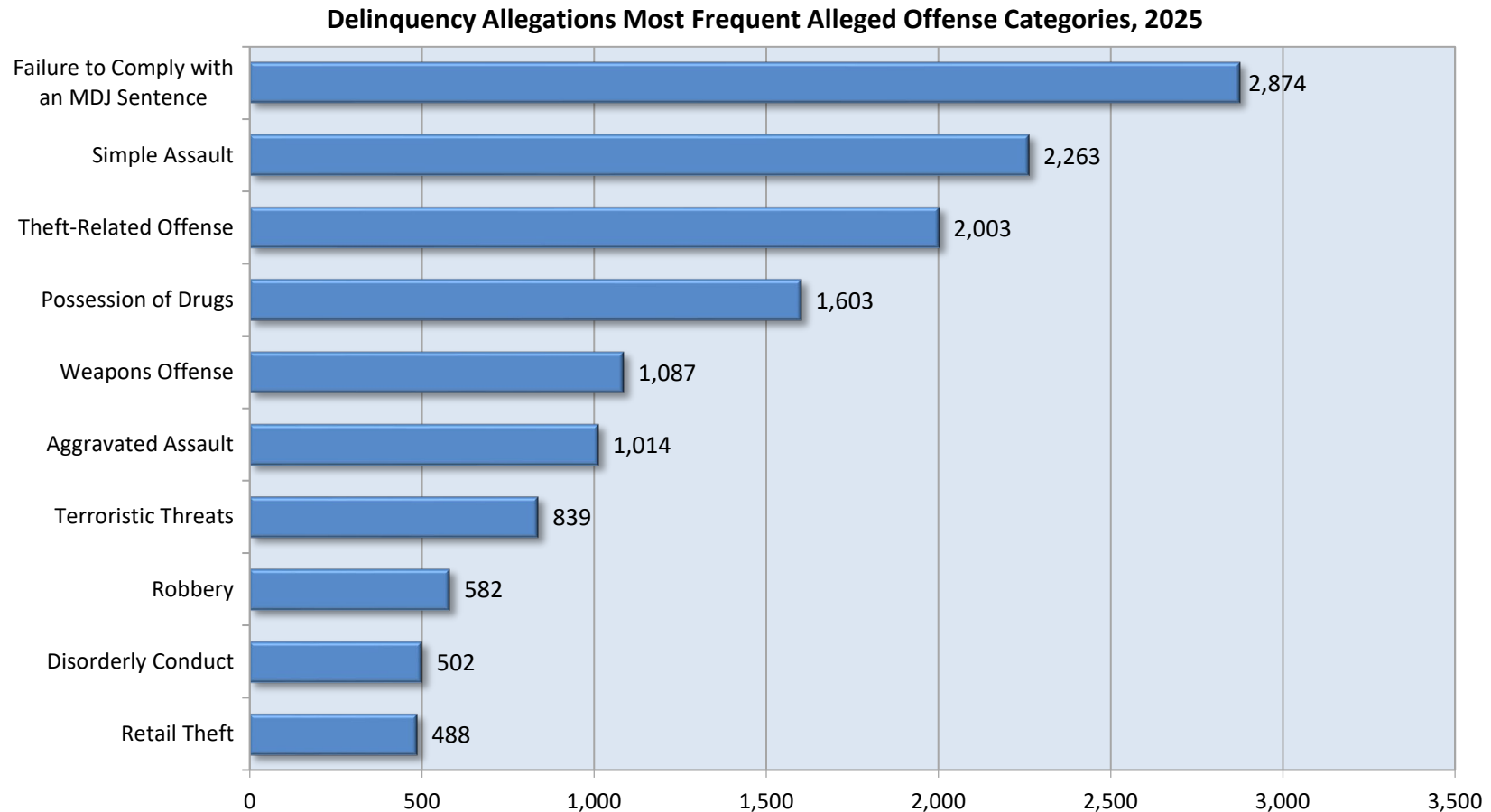
Delinquency Allegations by Most Serious Alleged Offense Grade, 2025



Delinquency Allegations Most Frequent Alleged Offense Categories, 2025

Most delinquency allegations in 2025 were for non-felony offenses.

Failure to Comply with a Magisterial District Judge (MDJ) Sentence, Simple Assault, and Theft-Related Offenses were the most frequently occurring alleged offenses of delinquency allegations received in 2025.



Note: Failure to Comply with an MDJ Sentence includes certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense. Theft-Related Offenses include: Theft, Theft by Unlawful Taking, Theft by Deception, Theft by Extortion, Theft by Receiving Stolen Property, Theft of Services, and Theft from a Motor Vehicle. Weapons Offenses include: Firearm-Related Offenses, Possession of an Instrument of Crime, and Possession of a Weapon on School Property.

School-Related Delinquency Allegations, 2025

School-related delinquency allegations accounted for more than one quarter of delinquency allegations in 2025.

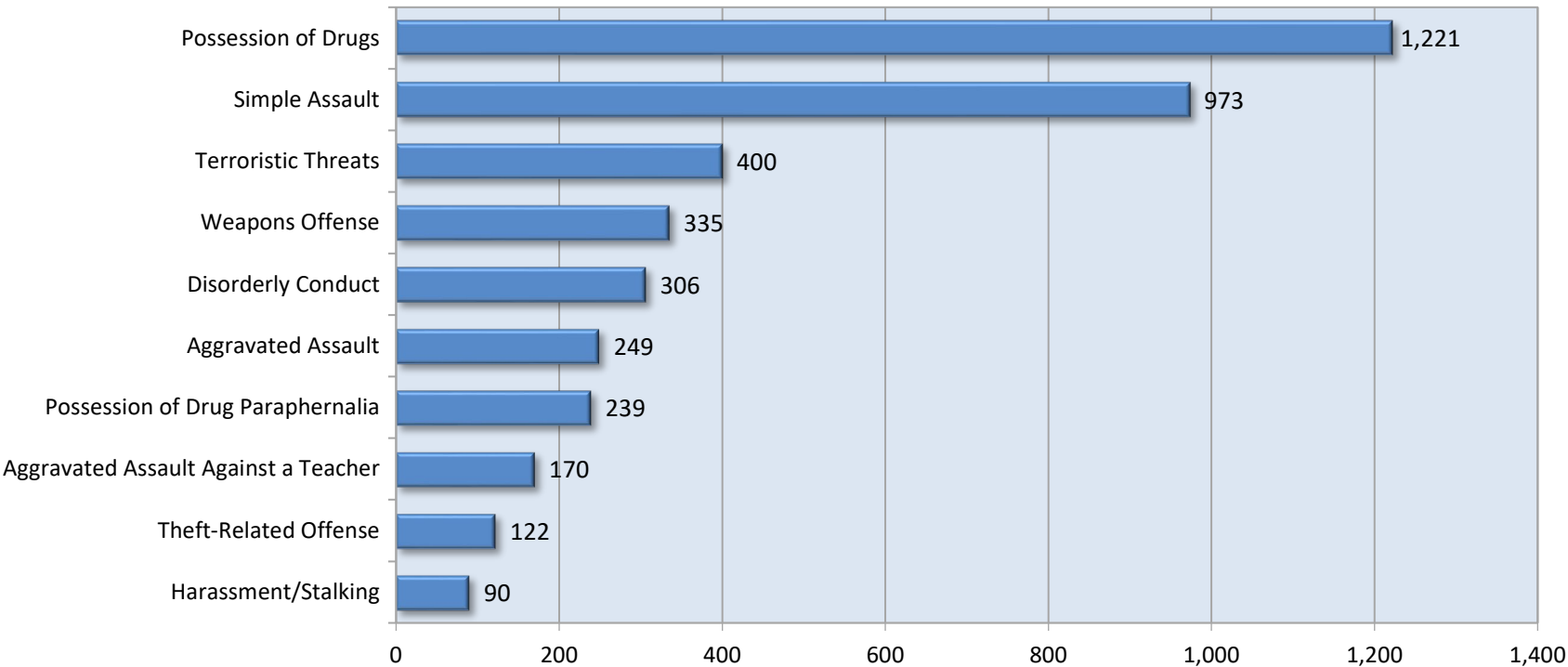
There were 4,858 delinquency allegations received in 2025 with a most serious alleged offense identified as school-related, which is 26.2% of all delinquency allegations.

School-Related Delinquency Allegations Most Frequent Alleged Offense Categories, 2025

Possession of Drugs was the most common offense on school-related delinquency allegations.

Possession of Drugs, Simple Assault, and Terroristic Threats were the most frequently occurring alleged school-related offenses received in 2025, accounting for more than half of school-related delinquency allegations received.

School-Related Delinquency Allegations Most Frequent Alleged Offense Categories, 2025



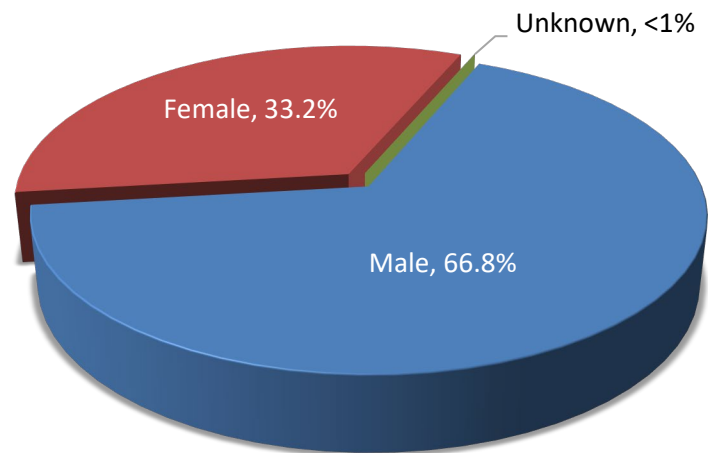

School-Related Delinquency Allegations by Gender, 2025

Females accounted for a disproportionate share of school-based delinquency allegations.

As noted on page 8, in 2025, 27.5% of all juvenile delinquency allegations involved females. However, 33.2% of school-related allegations involved females.

School-Related Delinquency Allegations by Gender, 2025

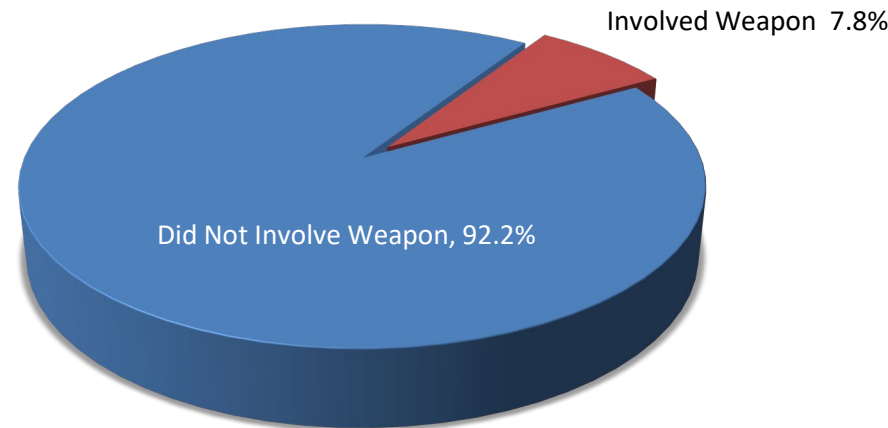


School-Related Delinquency Allegations Involving Weapon, 2025

Very few school-related delinquency allegations involved weapons.

In 2025, only 7.8% of school-related offenses reported involved a weapon (see Appendix 10).

Approximately 1 in 10 delinquency allegations received in 2025 involved a weapon.

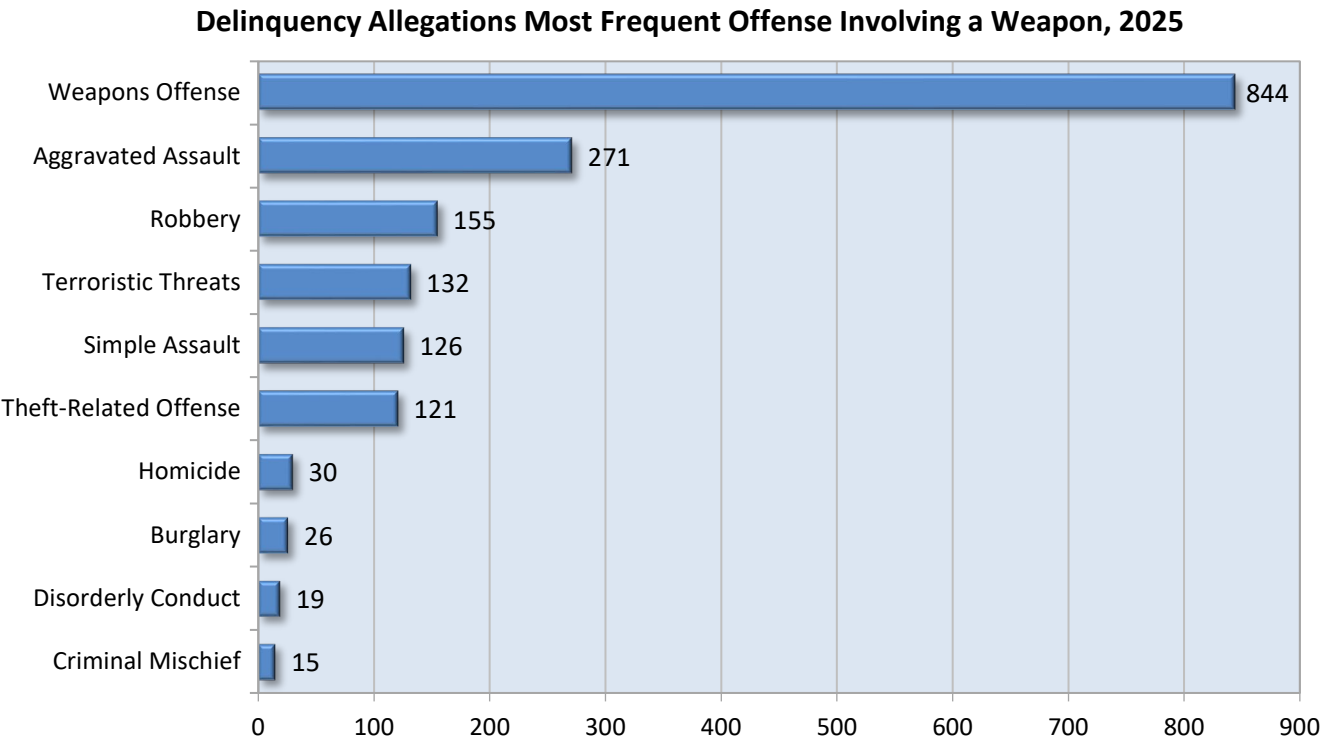
There were 1,950 delinquency allegations received in 2025 with a most serious alleged offense that involved a weapon, which is 10.5% of all delinquency allegations.

Delinquency Allegations Most Frequent Offense Involving a Weapon, 2025

Aggravated Assault and Robbery were the most common offenses to involve a weapon.

Aside from offenses explicitly identified as a Weapons Offense, Aggravated Assault and Robbery were the most frequently occurring alleged offenses involving a weapon.

Note: Theft-Related Offenses include: Theft, Theft by Unlawful Taking, Theft by Deception, Theft by Extortion, Theft by Receiving Stolen Property, Theft of Services, and Theft from a Motor Vehicle. 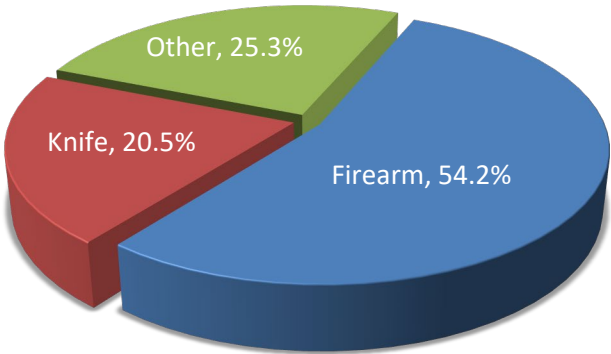


Delinquency Allegations Involving a Weapon by Type, 2025

Firearms were the most commonly reported weapon type used among delinquency allegations involving a weapon.

Among the 10.5% of delinquency allegations received in 2025 with a weapon involved in conjunction with the most serious alleged offense, firearms were the most frequently used weapon, utilized in more than half (54.2%) of incidents.

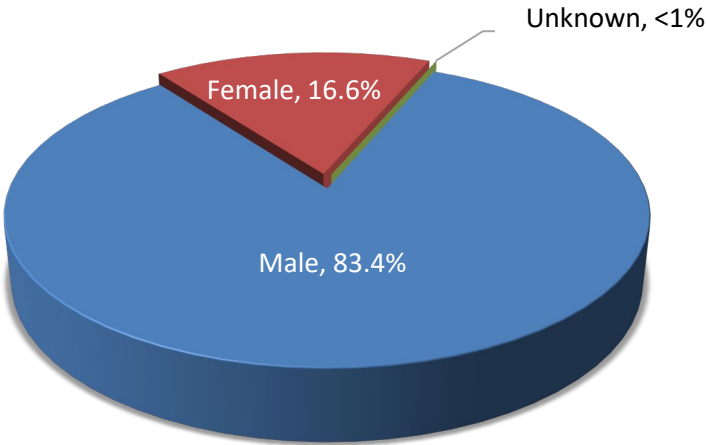
Delinquency Allegations Involving a Weapon by Type, 2025

Females were less likely to use weapons than males.

As noted on page 8, in 2025, 27.5% of all juvenile delinquency allegations involved females. Conversely, only 16.6% of delinquency allegations with weapon use involved females.

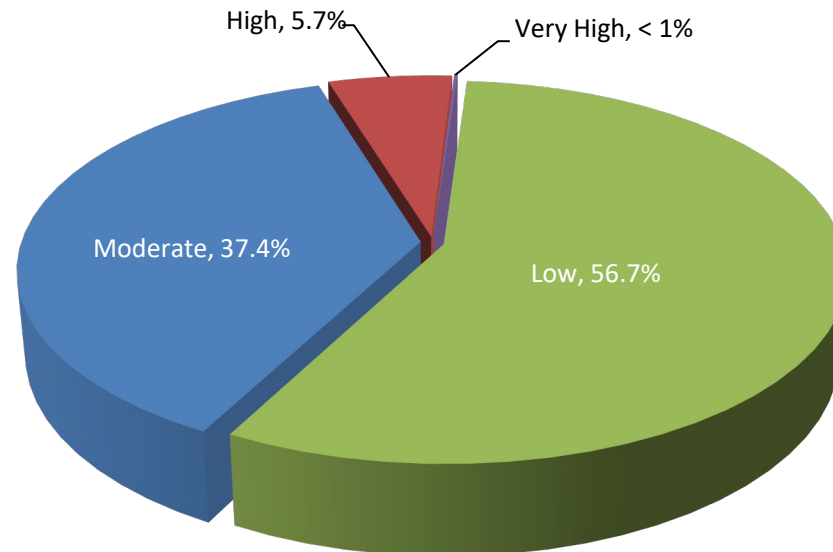
Distribution of Risk Level of Initial Youth Level of Service/Case Management Inventory™ (YLS) Assessments, 2025

More than half of youth entering the juvenile justice system in 2025 were identified as low risk to reoffend.

The use of the YLS is the cornerstone of Pennsylvania's Juvenile Justice System Enhancement Strategy (JJSES). The tool, which is a validated, research-based assessment, is designed to determine a juvenile's risk of reoffense and the presence of criminogenic needs. The YLS measures 42 static and dynamic risk factors, divided into eight domains, that have been identified as most predictive of youthful reoffending. Generally, youth are assessed at the time they enter the juvenile justice system. Upon completion of the YLS assessment, youth are assigned a numeric score and risk level (e.g., low, moderate, high, or very high) and their top criminogenic needs (those factors recognized as driving their delinquent behavior) are identified. These results assist juvenile probation officers in targeting a juvenile's specific needs through treatment, interventions, and services.

In 2025, 56.7% of youth who had an initial YLS assessment scored as low risk to reoffend, while 37.4% scored as moderate risk to reoffend. Approximately 5.7% scored as high risk to reoffend, while less than 1% (0.2%) scored as very high risk to reoffend

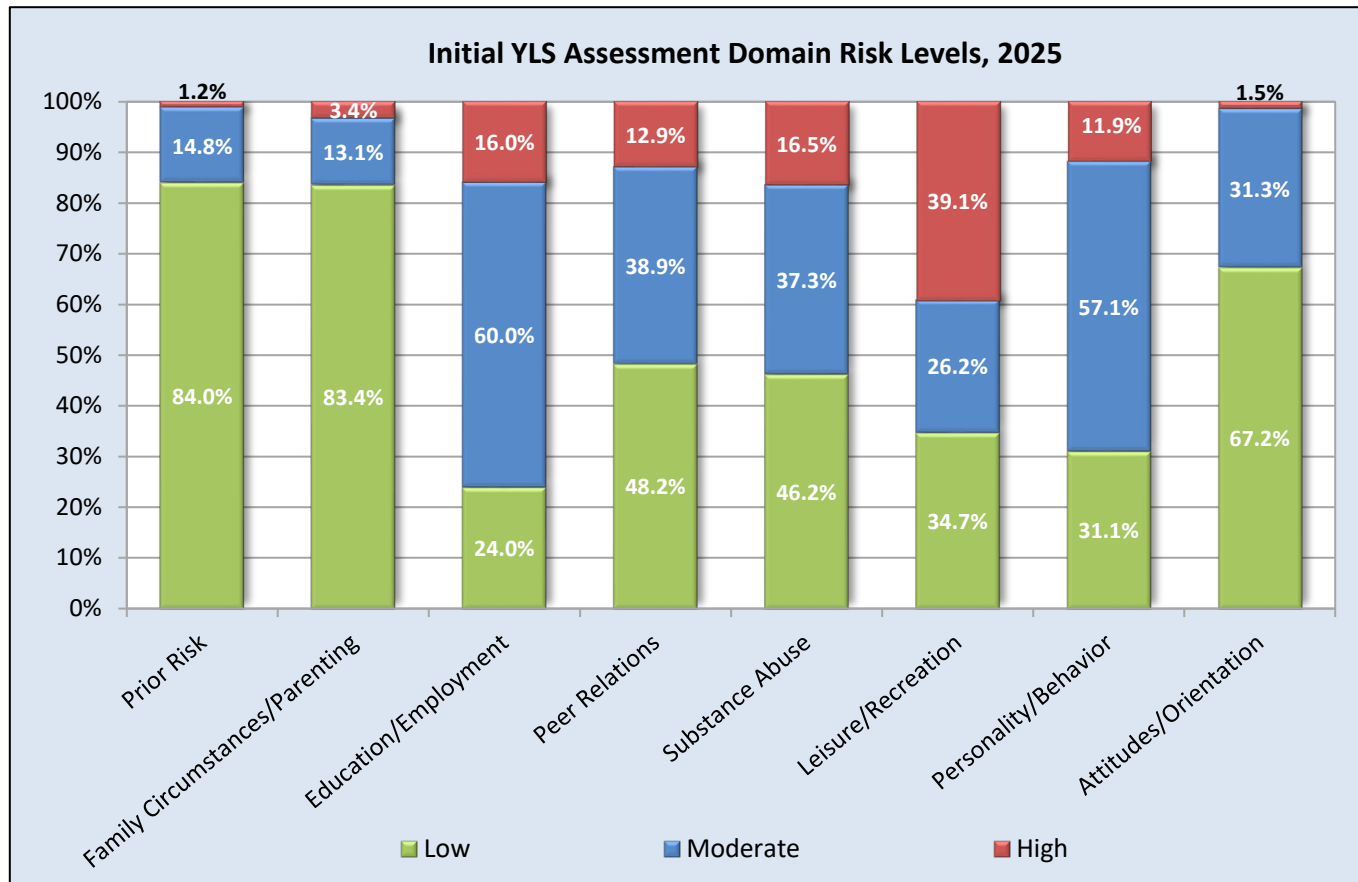
Distribution of Risk Level of Initial YLS Assessments, 2025

The top criminogenic need of youth entering the juvenile justice system in 2025 was Education/Employment.

The domains with the largest percentages of juveniles scoring moderate or high risk were Education/Employment (76.0%), Personality/Behavior (68.9%), and Leisure/Recreation (65.3%). The domains with the highest percentage of juveniles scoring low risk were Prior Risk (84.0%), Family Circumstances/Parenting (83.4%), and Attitudes/Orientation (67.2%).



Section 2: Secure Detention

In accordance with the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Standards Governing Secure Detention, all counties report their secure detention admissions to the Commission. Beginning in 2019, the detention data was extracted from the PaJCMS. Prior to 2019, this data was extracted from the secure detention database at the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research, which was populated with data reported directly from juvenile detention centers each month.

When interpreting the data contained in these tables, the reader should note the following:

- 1) The unit of count is the admission of a youth to a secure detention center.
- 2) A juvenile who is admitted to a secure detention center and subsequently transferred to another secure detention center without release is counted as two admissions.

Codes Related to JCJC Standards Governing the Use of Secure Detention Under the Juvenile Act

Each month, all juvenile detention centers report a Statement of Facts and Reasons that must accompany every probation-authorized admission to secure detention. Below are the Section Codes related to this process.

<i>100 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of an alleged offense or the child's current status with the court or prior record.
<i>200 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of a child's status as an absconder or fugitive, on the basis of a child's record of failing to appear at previous juvenile proceedings, or because of extraordinary circumstances which require secure detention to prevent a child from absconding.
<i>300 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the written request of the child or child's attorney.
<i>400 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be ordered pending disposition, subsequent to a finding that a child committed a delinquent act or is a delinquent child.
<i>500 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be ordered following disposition pending transfer to placement.
<i>600 Codes</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of the child's status, pending or subsequent to a disposition review proceeding.
<i>Code 701</i>	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of extraordinary and exceptional circumstances.

Secure Detention Admissions, 2021-2025

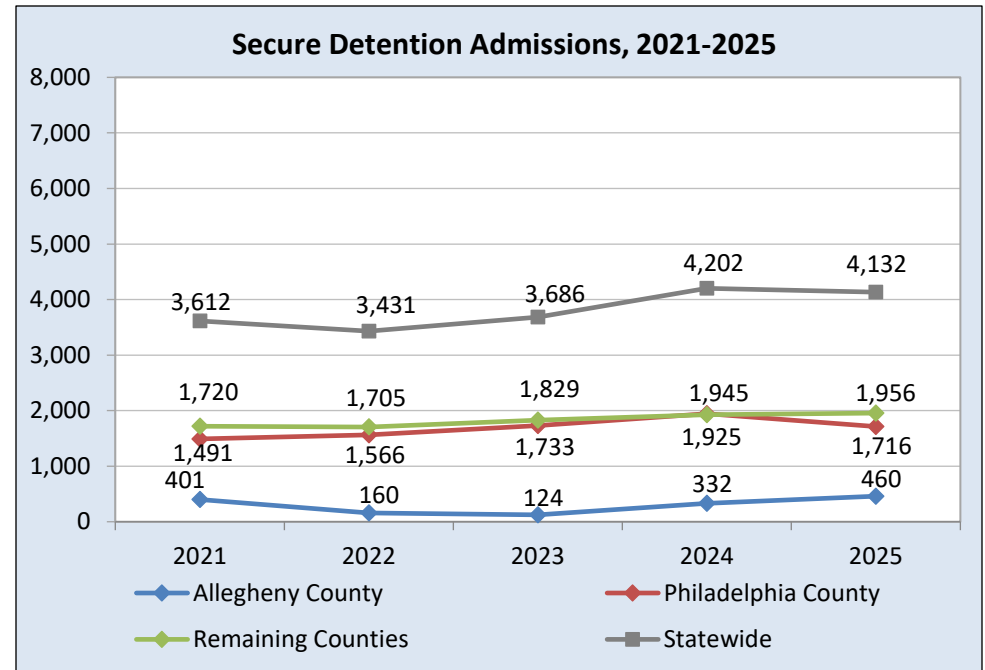
The number of admissions to secure detention decreased from 2024 and remains well below pre-pandemic levels, despite increases in access to detention beds.

Between 2021 and 2022, Pennsylvania experienced a decline in secure detention admissions, with the number of secure detention admissions in 2022 being the lowest recorded in the last decade (see page 71 for more details).

Since then, secure detention admissions slightly increased in 2023 and 2024, before declining again in 2025. Despite these fluctuations, the number of admissions to secure detention remains well below (more than 50% lower) pre-pandemic levels, despite written allegations rebounding to pre-pandemic levels.

Allegheny County saw a significant increase in detention admissions coinciding with the July 2024 opening of the Highland Juvenile Detention Center. From 2024 to 2025, detention admissions in Allegheny County increased 38.6%. Philadelphia County experienced a decline of 11.8% in detention admissions from 2024 to 2025, but an overall 15.1% increase in detention admissions since 2021.

When excluding Allegheny and Philadelphia Counties, overall statewide admissions increased by 13.7% since 2021, and 1.6% from 2024 to 2025. Together, Philadelphia and Allegheny Counties account for 41.5% and 11.1%, respectively, of all secure detention admissions statewide.



Note: Secure detention admissions declined substantially beginning in 2020 due in part to COVID-19-related reductions in accessible detention beds. Since 2023, concentrated efforts to increase residential programming and the number of accessible secure detention beds, including the opening of two new detention facilities in 2024, has increased secure detention bed capacity. Readers should consider these system-capacity changes when interpreting detention data on pages 21–25.

Length of Stay in Secure Detention, 2025

The median length of stay in detention in 2025 was 13 days.

In 2025, the statewide median length of stay in secure detention was 13.0 days, which is two days less than the median in 2024. The table below shows the median length of stay by county, from greatest to least number of days. Multiple counties with identical lengths of stay are listed alphabetically. This data, sorted by greatest to least number of admissions, can be found in Appendix 12.

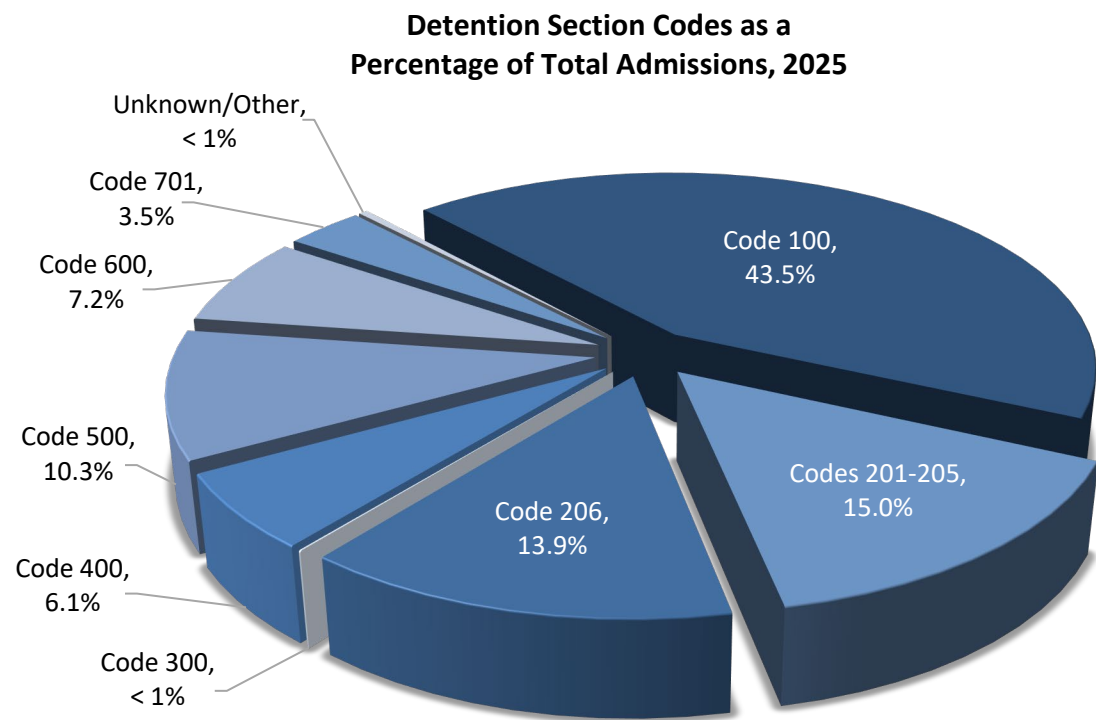

Secure Detention Admissions by Standard Section Codes, 2025

Nearly 60% of detention admissions in 2025 were authorized under 100 and 200 Codes.

In 2025, the majority of secure detention admissions were authorized under the 100 and 200 Codes – 43.5% and 28.9%, respectively. This trend has remained consistent since 2017.



Secure Detention Admissions by Standard Section Codes, 2021-2025

The use of Codes 206 (extraordinary circumstances), 701 (extraordinary and exceptional circumstances), and Unknown/Other to authorize secure detention has not changed significantly over the last five years.

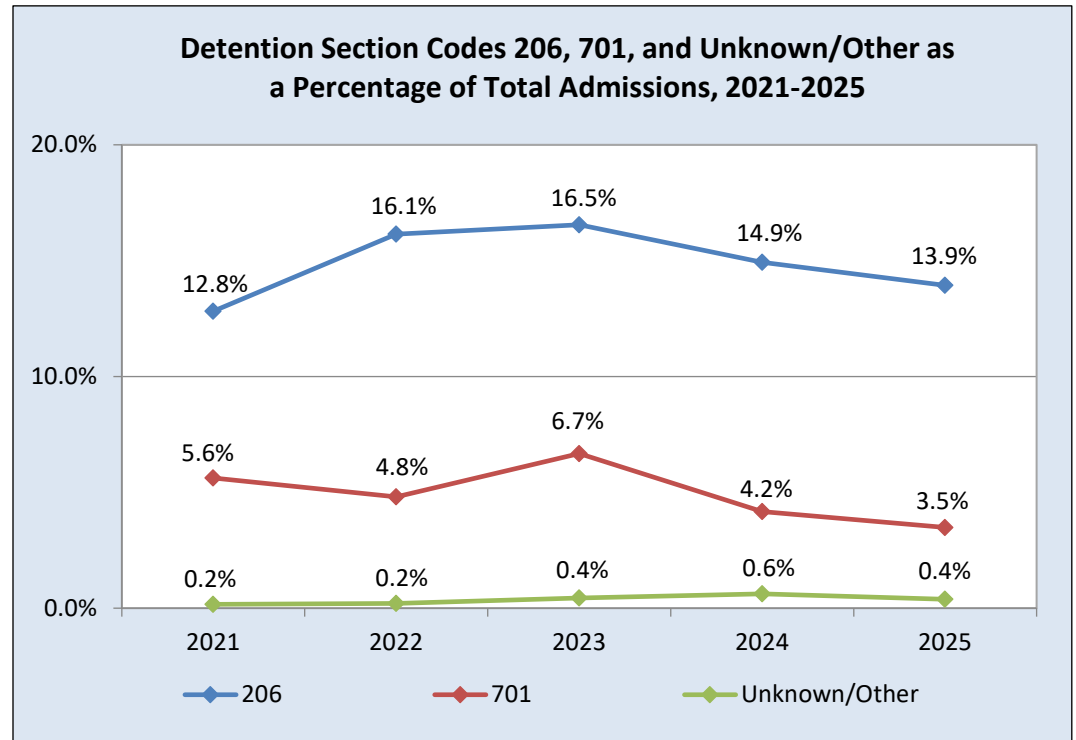
Special attention is given to the utilization of Codes 206 (extraordinary circumstances), 701 (extraordinary and exceptional circumstances), and Unknown/Other. In instances where secure detention is authorized under Codes 206 or 701, the juvenile probation officer is required to provide a detailed written explanation of the reasons that necessitate secure detention. These codes were intended to be utilized in limited circumstances where the other codes are not applicable.

The utilization of Codes 206, 701, and admissions with an Unknown/Other Code accounted for 17.8% of all secure detention admissions in 2025. The utilization of Code 206 decreased from 14.9% in 2024 to 13.9% in 2025. The use of Code 701 decreased from 4.2% in 2024 to 3.5% in 2025. The Unknown/Other Codes* decreased from 0.6% to 0.4% for that same period.

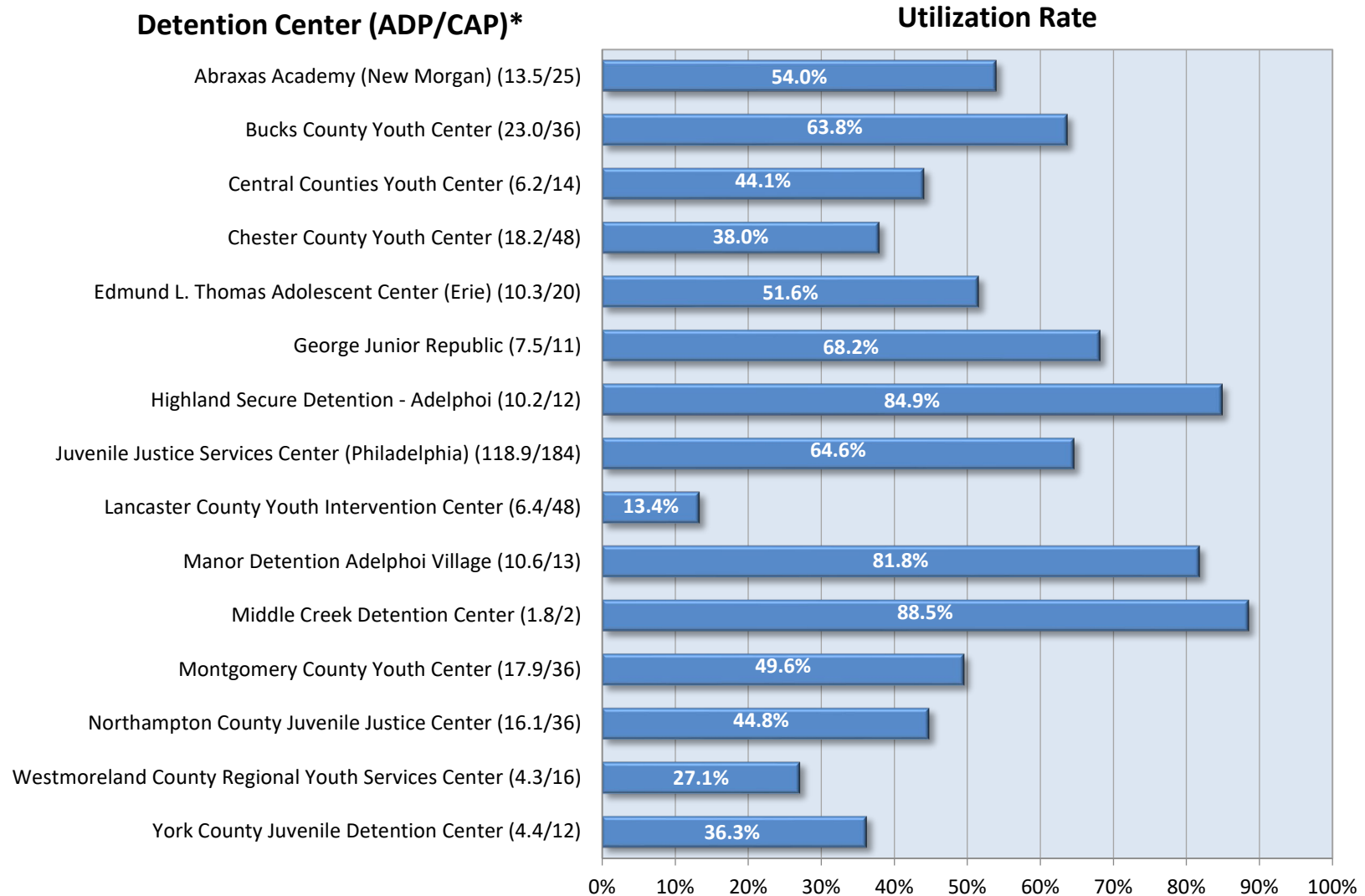
Code 206 - The child presents extraordinary circumstances requiring secure detention to prevent him/her from absconding. (Such circumstances may include, but are not limited to: the child's age, character, mental condition, ties to the community, the nature of the child's family relationships, drug or alcohol addiction, and substance abuse.)

Code 701 - Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of extraordinary and exceptional circumstances.

**Unknown/Other - As reported in the secure detention introduction, since 2020, detention admission data has been extracted from the PaJCMS. This data was validated for accuracy, which resulted in the Unknown/Other code decrease. For the majority of 2025 cases, the county reported the detention admissions were handled via a court order during a hearing, and no secure detention code was appropriate under these circumstances.*

Chapter 2 – Juvenile Court Processing

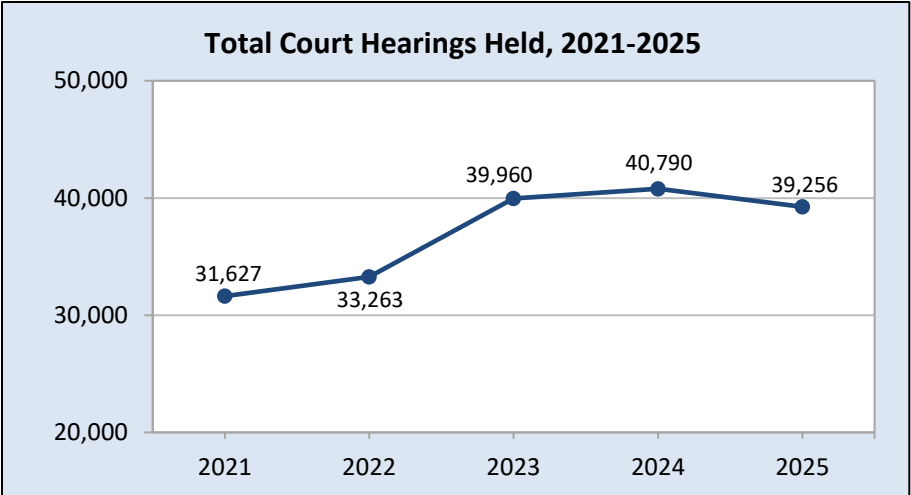
Section 1: Court Hearings

1. The unit of count for this section of the report is a juvenile court hearing, which can be conducted by a judge or a juvenile court hearing officer. A single youth may be involved in a number of hearings within a calendar year containing multiple allegations. In addition, a youth may be referred on more than one occasion and receive only one hearing. Therefore, the reader is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret hearings as the number of youth who are processed by the court or the number of offenses referred to the juvenile justice system. Hearings in this section occurred between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.
2. Data for this report were compiled from the PaJCMS on March 12, 2026. Any hearings conducted by a juvenile probation department in 2025, and entered into the PaJCMS after this date, may not be included in these statistics. The numbers published in this report, therefore, may not reflect current numbers within the system.
3. Finally, the reader should be cautioned that beginning in 2020, figures were likely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Hearing figures decreased significantly in 2020 and 2021 but have increased since 2022.

Total Court Hearings Held, 2021-2025

The number of court hearings held decreased from 2024 to 2025.

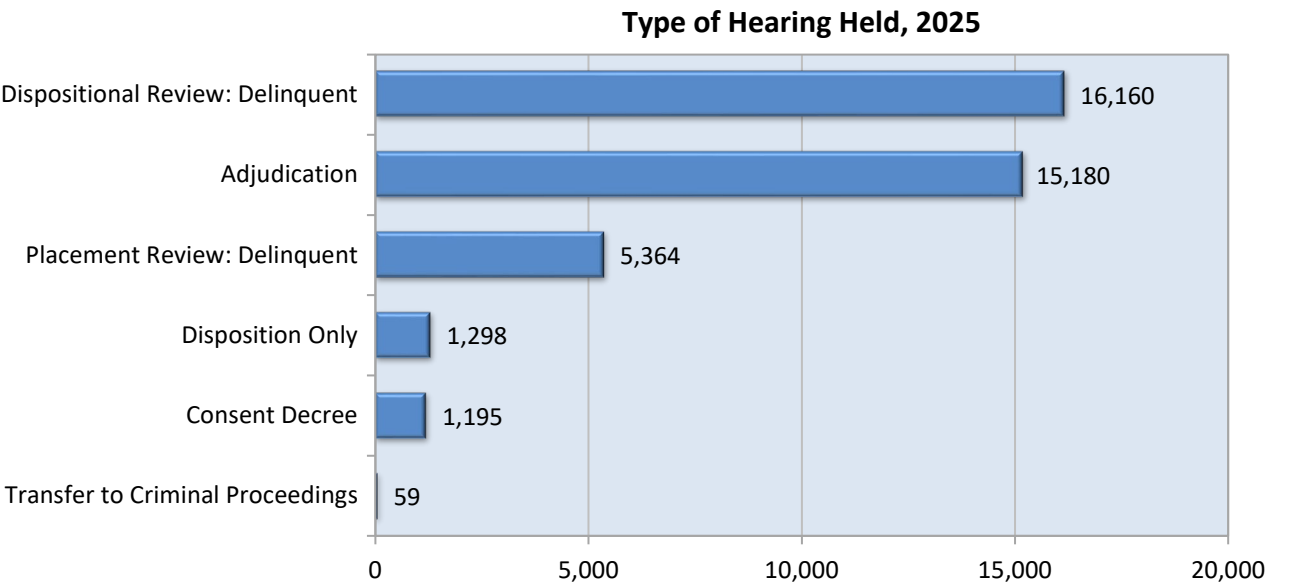
There were 39,256 juvenile court hearings in Pennsylvania during 2025. This represents a 24.1% increase from 2021 and a 3.8% decrease from 2024.



Type of Hearing Held, 2025

Dispositional Review and Adjudication were the most common types of hearings held.

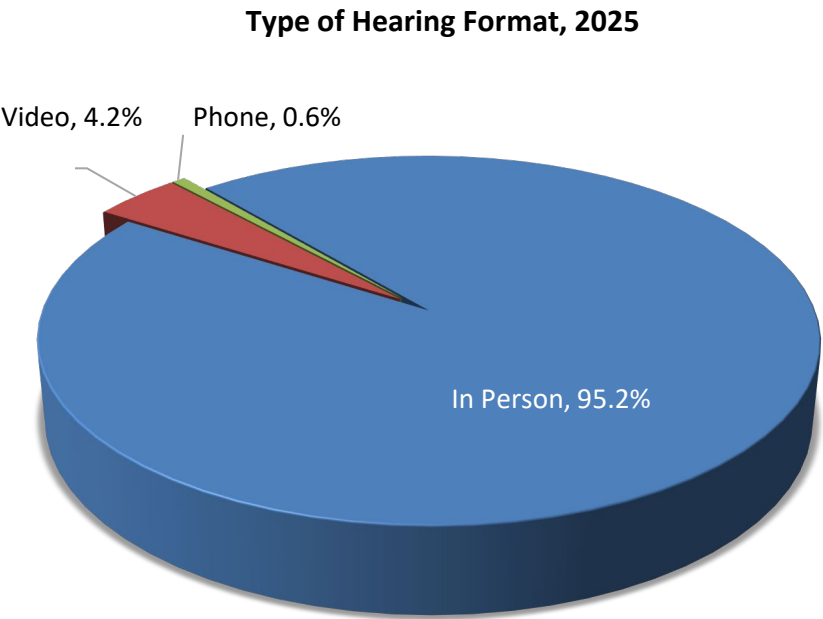
The most common type of juvenile court hearing in 2025 was Dispositional Review (41.2%). Adjudication (38.7%) followed by Delinquent Placement Reviews (13.7%) were the next most common types of juvenile court hearings.

Nearly all hearings were held in person in 2025.

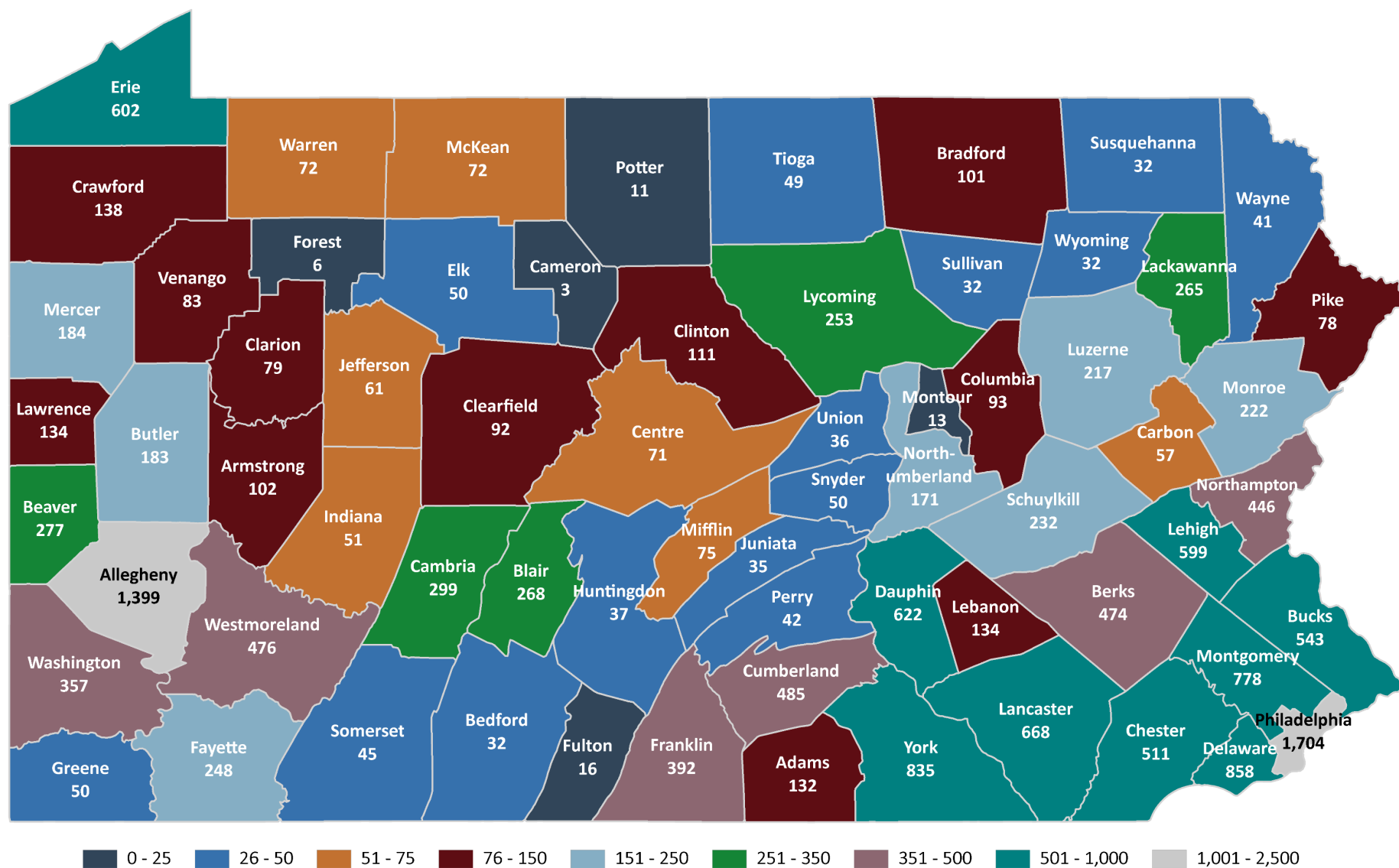
The vast majority of juvenile court hearings in 2025 were conducted in person (95.2%). There were 1,648 juvenile court hearings held over video (4.2%) and 254 hearings conducted over the phone (0.6%).



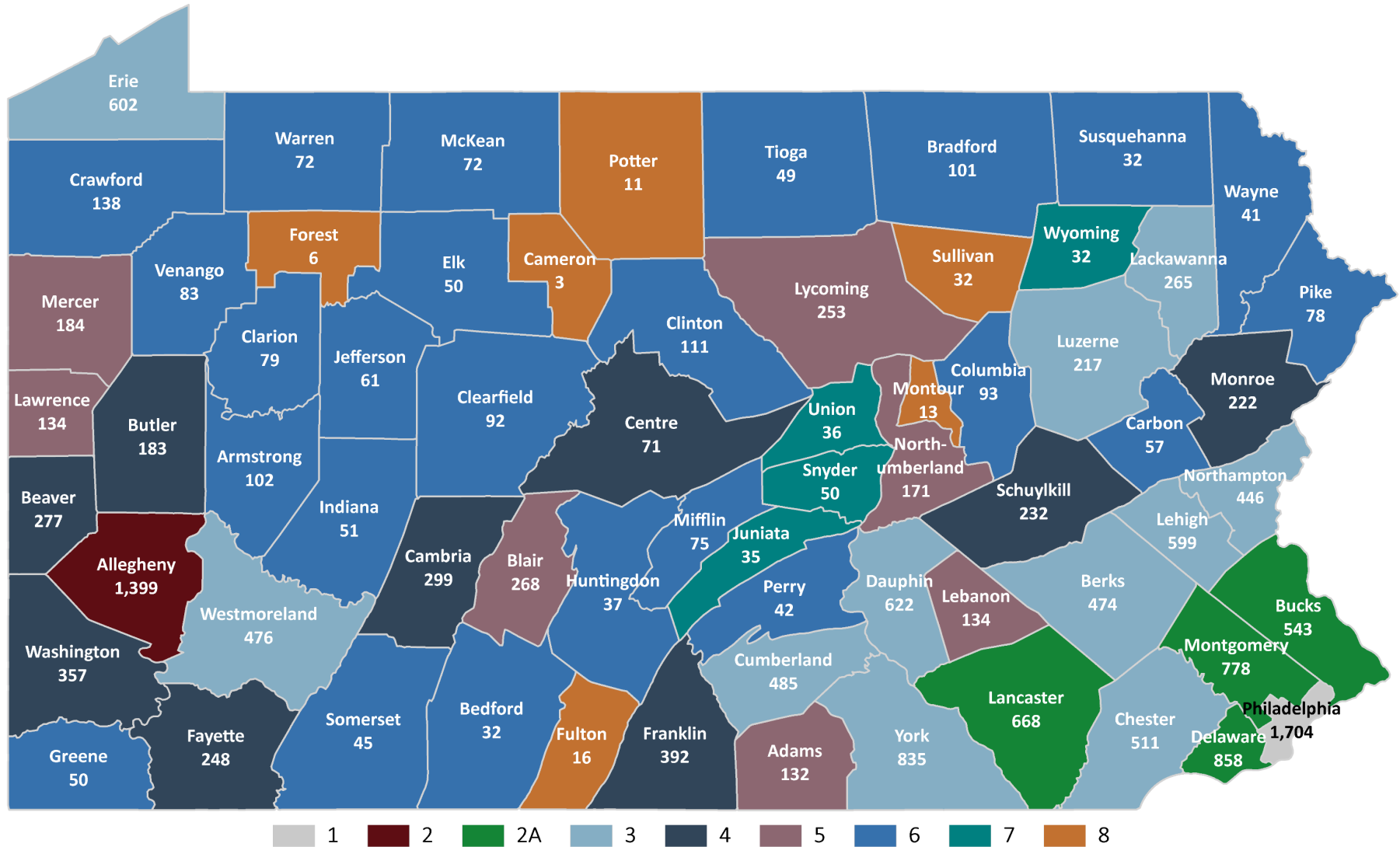
Section 2: Delinquency Dispositions

1. The unit of count for this section of the report is the disposition. A disposition is defined as an allegation of delinquency disposed of by the juvenile probation department and/or the court. Any one youth may be involved in a number of dispositions within a calendar year containing multiple allegations. In addition, a youth may be referred on more than one occasion and receive only one disposition. Therefore, the reader is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret dispositions as the number of youth who are processed by the court or the number of offenses. Dispositions in this section occurred between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.
2. In Pennsylvania, juvenile court jurisdiction extends over individuals who have been alleged to have committed a delinquent act, as defined by 42 Pa.C.S. § 6301 *et seq.*, on or after their 10th birthday and prior to reaching 18 years of age. Juvenile court supervision can extend until the individual is 21 years of age if the individual is currently under supervision. Age, for purposes of this section, was calculated from the juvenile's date of birth to the date of the offense in the written allegation.
3. Only the most serious delinquency offense is captured in the delinquency disposition data.
4. Data for this report were compiled from the PaJCMS on March 12, 2026. Any delinquency dispositions received by a juvenile probation department in 2025, and entered into the PaJCMS after this date, may not be included in these statistics. The numbers published in this report, therefore, may not reflect current numbers within the system.
5. Dispositions of pending/deferred and termination of court supervision/case closed, not court ordered, are not included in these statistics.
6. The unit of disposition count was modified in the 2017 report to more accurately reflect the outcomes of delinquency allegations. If two allegations were disposed of on the same date and resulted in the same disposition, these were counted as one disposition. If two allegations were disposed of on the same date but had two different dispositions, these were counted as two dispositions. The reader is cautioned NOT to compare this year's disposition figures to reports prior to 2017.
7. Finally, the reader should be cautioned that beginning in 2020, figures were likely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Figures dropped significantly in 2020 and 2021 but increased 37.6% between 2021 and 2025.

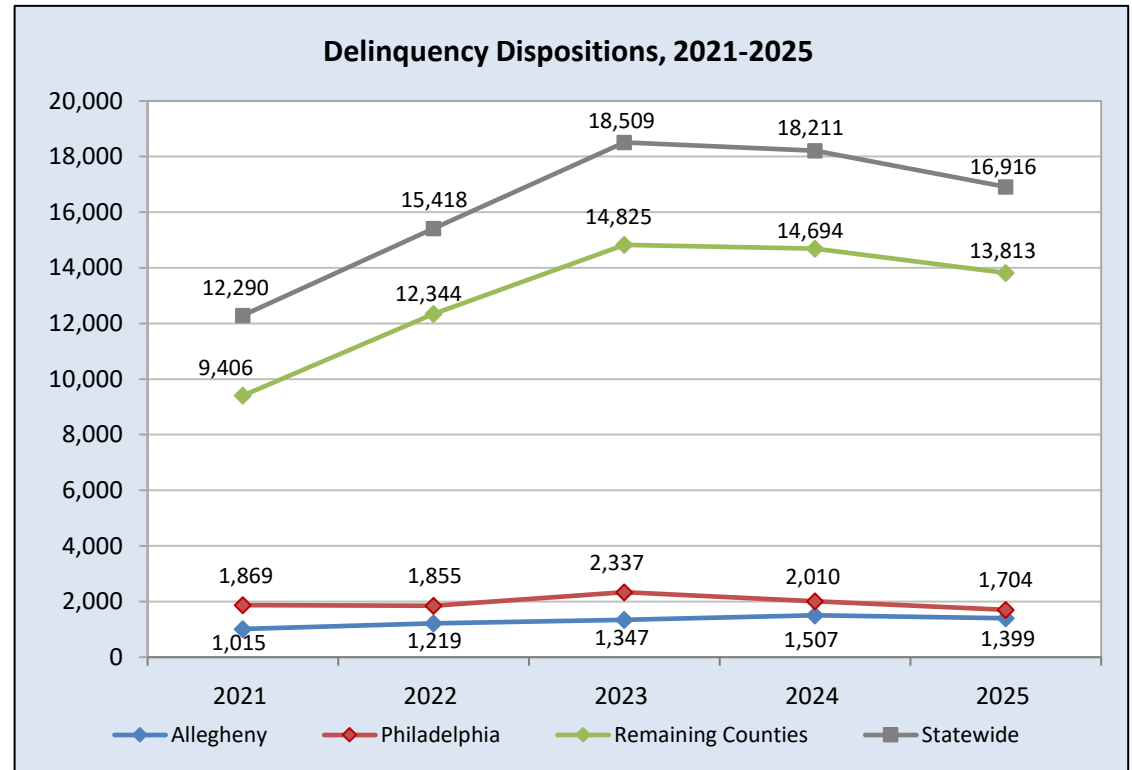
Delinquency Dispositions, 2021-2025

Delinquency dispositions decreased 7.1% from 2024 to 2025.

In 2025, a total of 16,916 delinquency dispositions occurred in Pennsylvania. This represents a 37.6% increase in delinquency dispositions from 2021 to 2025 as delinquency dispositions rebounded from the pandemic. Between 2024 and 2025, however, delinquency dispositions decreased by 7.1%.

Allegheny County reported a decrease of 7.2% from 2024 to 2025, while Philadelphia County reported a 15.2% decrease for this time period. The remaining counties reported a 6.0% decrease.

Note: Dispositions resulting from disposition reviews, placement reviews, and dependency referrals are not included.

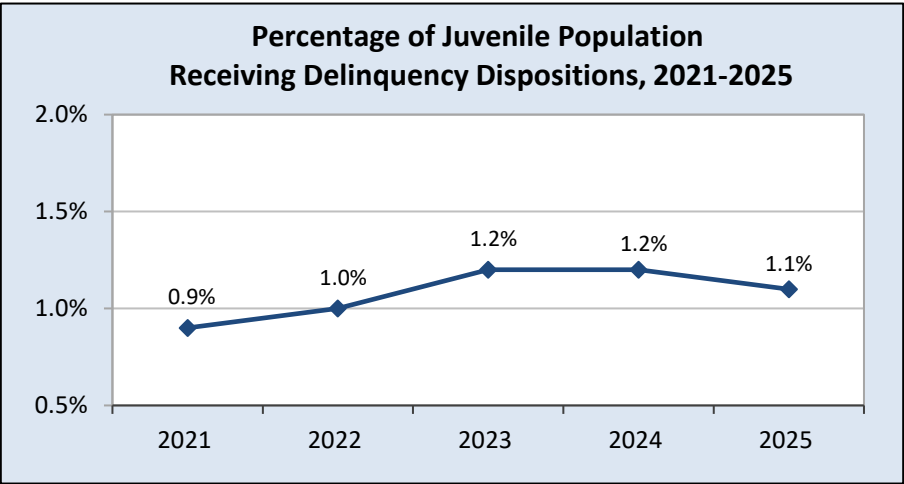


Percentage of Juvenile Population Receiving Delinquency Dispositions, 2021-2025

The rate of juvenile delinquency dispositions as a percentage of the Pennsylvania juvenile population decreased in 2025.

Between 2021 and 2025, the rate of juvenile delinquency dispositions as a percentage of the Pennsylvania juvenile population increased by 22.2%, from 0.9% to 1.1%. Between 2024 and 2025, however, the rate of juvenile delinquency dispositions as a percentage of the Pennsylvania juvenile population decreased 8.3%, from 1.2% to 1.1%,

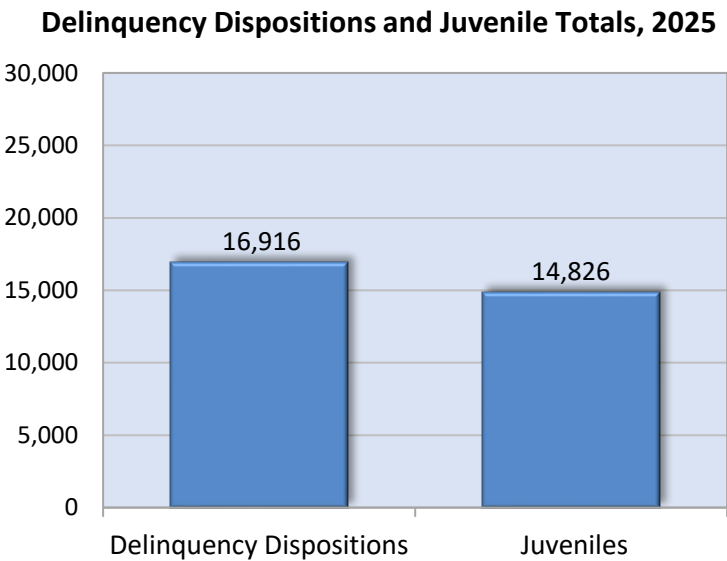

Delinquency Dispositions and Juvenile Totals, 2025

In 2025, there was an average of 1.14 delinquency dispositions per alleged delinquent juvenile.

In 2025, 14,826 youth accounted for 16,916 delinquency dispositions in Pennsylvania. This equates to an average of 1.14 delinquency dispositions per alleged delinquent juvenile. The county-level rates of delinquency dispositions per alleged juvenile in 2025 ranged from 1.0 to 1.32 (see Appendix 21).



Frequencies of Statewide Delinquency Dispositions, 2025

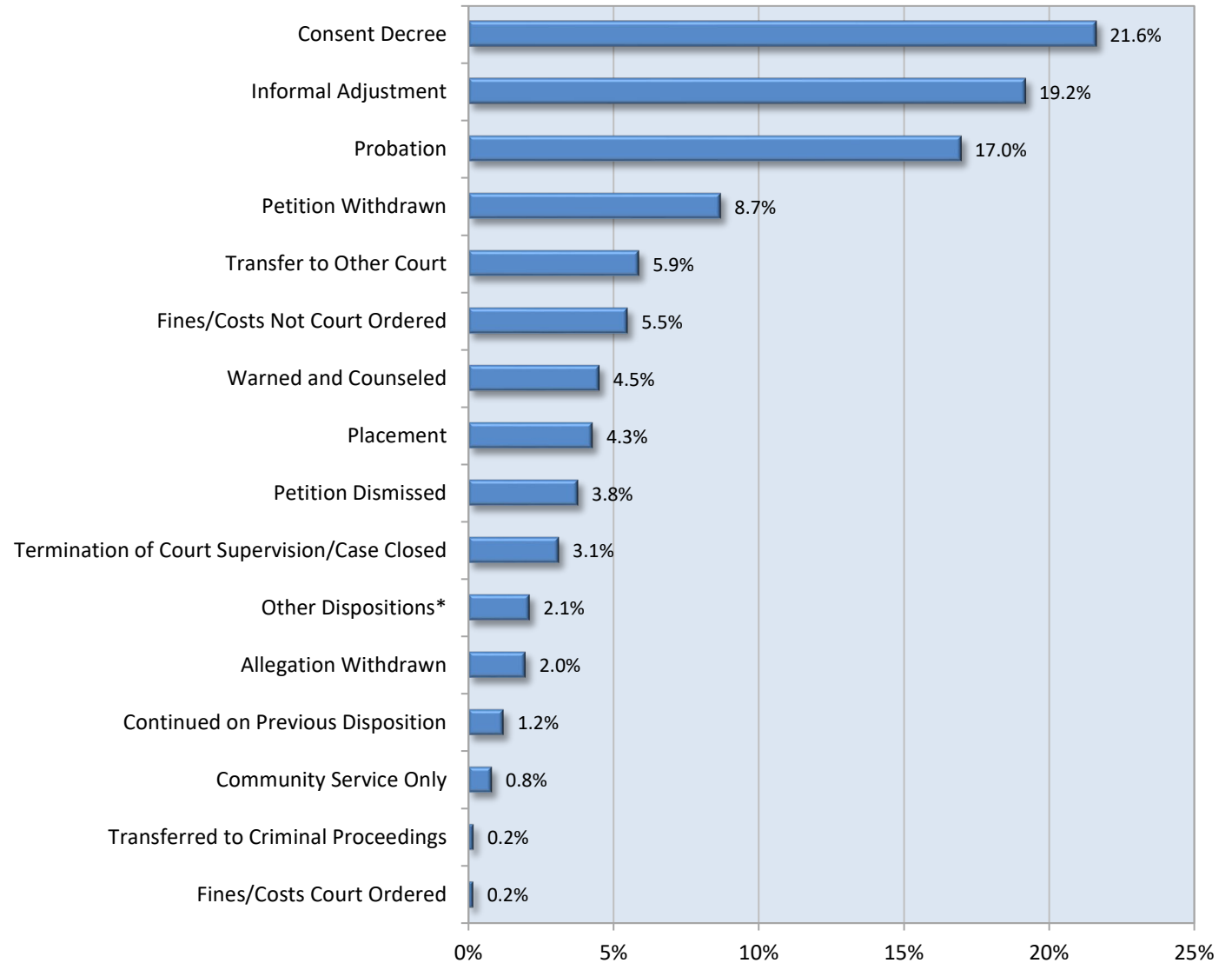
Consent Decrees and Informal Adjustments continue to be the most common dispositions.

Dispositions of Consent Decree, Informal Adjustment, and Probation continued to represent over half (57.8%) of all dispositions.

Frequencies of Statewide Delinquency Dispositions, 2025



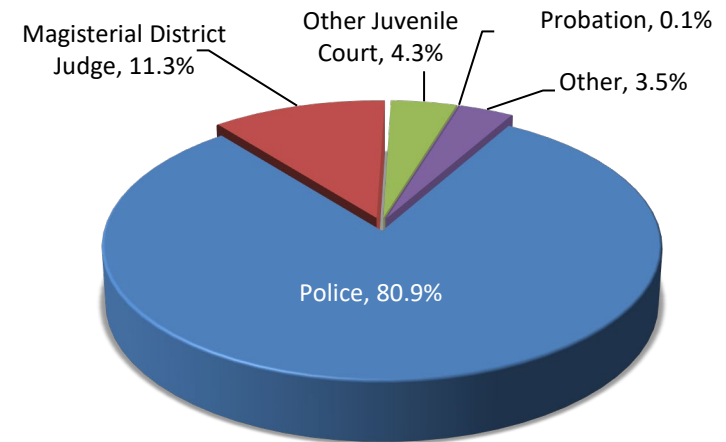
Delinquency Dispositions by Source of Allegation, 2025

Police were the primary allegation sources of delinquency dispositions in 2025.

Police and Magisterial District Judges continued to be the primary allegation sources of delinquency dispositions – 80.9% and 11.3%, respectively.

Delinquency Dispositions by Source of Allegation, 2025

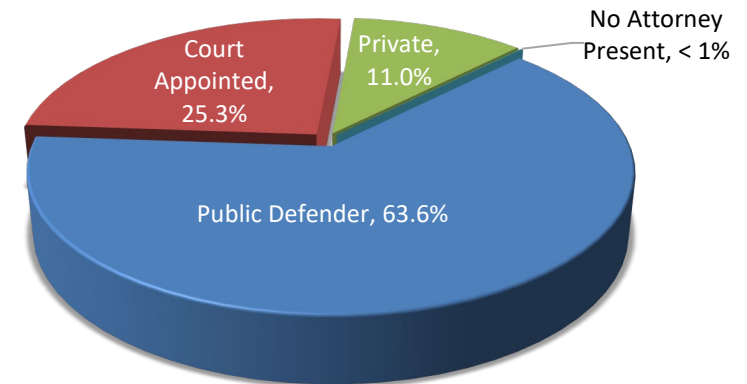


Attorney Representation in Formal Delinquency Proceedings, 2025

Public Defenders were the most common type of legal representation for delinquency proceedings in 2025.

Public Defenders continued to be the most common form of legal representation in delinquency proceedings (63.6%). Legal representation was provided by Court Appointed or Private Counsel in 36.3% of delinquency proceedings. In less than 1% of all delinquency proceedings, the attorney was not present for the proceedings. (*An entry of “Court Appointed” includes cases where counsel other than the public defender was appointed by the court.*)

Most Serious Alleged Offenses by Type, 2025

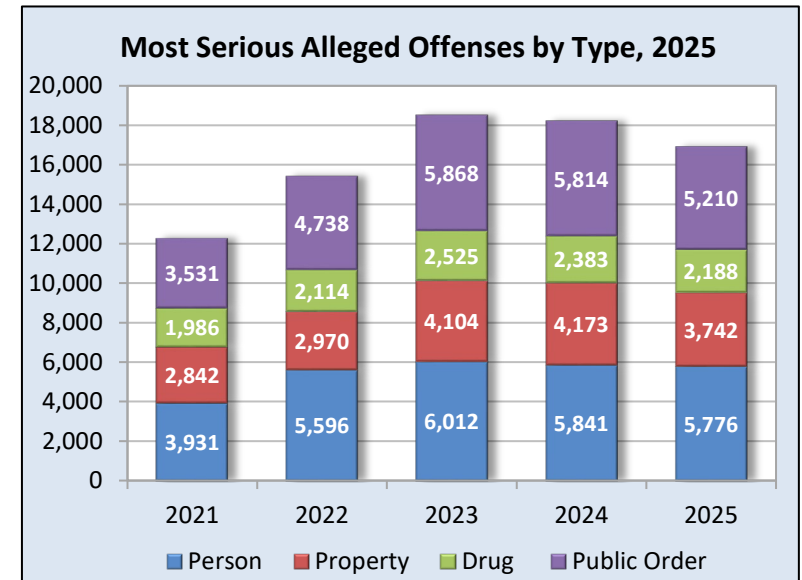
All offense types declined over the last year, with Public Order offenses declining at the highest rate.

The following information was compiled based on one offense per allegation, the most serious alleged offense, for each juvenile delinquency disposition in Pennsylvania between 2021 and 2025. As mentioned previously, the total number of dispositions increased by 37.6% from 2021 to 2025 but decreased by 7.1% from 2024 to 2025.

The number of dispositions in which Public Order (10.4%) and Property offenses (10.3%) were the most serious alleged charge had the largest decreases from 2024 to 2025, followed by Drug offenses (8.2%) and Person offenses (1.1%).

Since 2021, Public Order offenses have shown the largest increase (47.6%). Person offenses have also increased considerably (46.9%), followed by Property (31.7%) and Drug offenses (10.2%).

Note: The Offense Type of Public Order includes offenses such as disorderly conduct, weapon on school property, firearms offenses, and certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense.



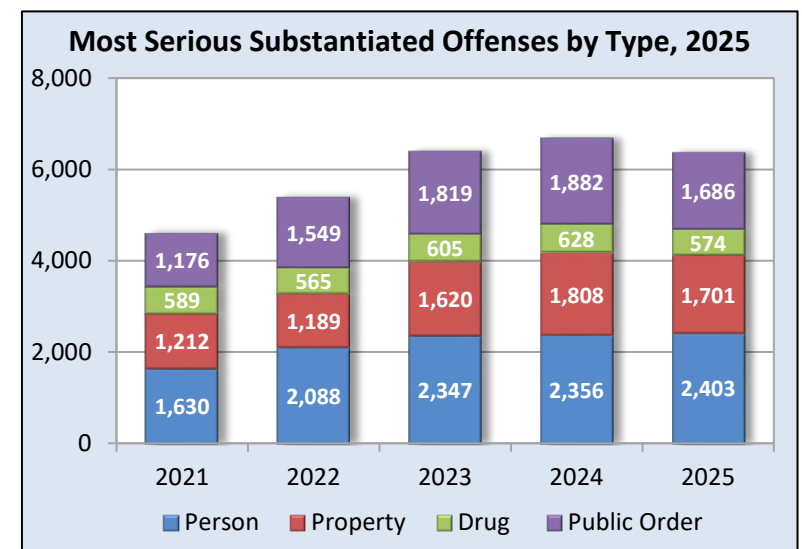
Most Serious Substantiated Offenses by Type, 2025

Substantiated Person offenses increased 47.4% since 2021, while substantiated Drug offenses continue to decrease.

Between 2021 and 2025, the number of dispositions in which a Person offense was the most serious substantiated offense increased 47.4%. Dispositions in which a Public Order offense was the most serious substantiated offense increased by 43.4%, while Property offenses increased by 40.3%. Conversely, the number of dispositions in which a Drug offense was the most serious substantiated offense decreased by 2.5%.

From 2024 to 2025, dispositions with Public Order offenses (10.4%), Drug offenses (8.6%), and Property offenses (5.9%) as the most serious substantiated offense all decreased. Conversely, Person offenses increased 2.0%.

Note: The Offense Type of Public Order includes offenses such as disorderly conduct, weapon on school property, firearms offenses, and certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense.

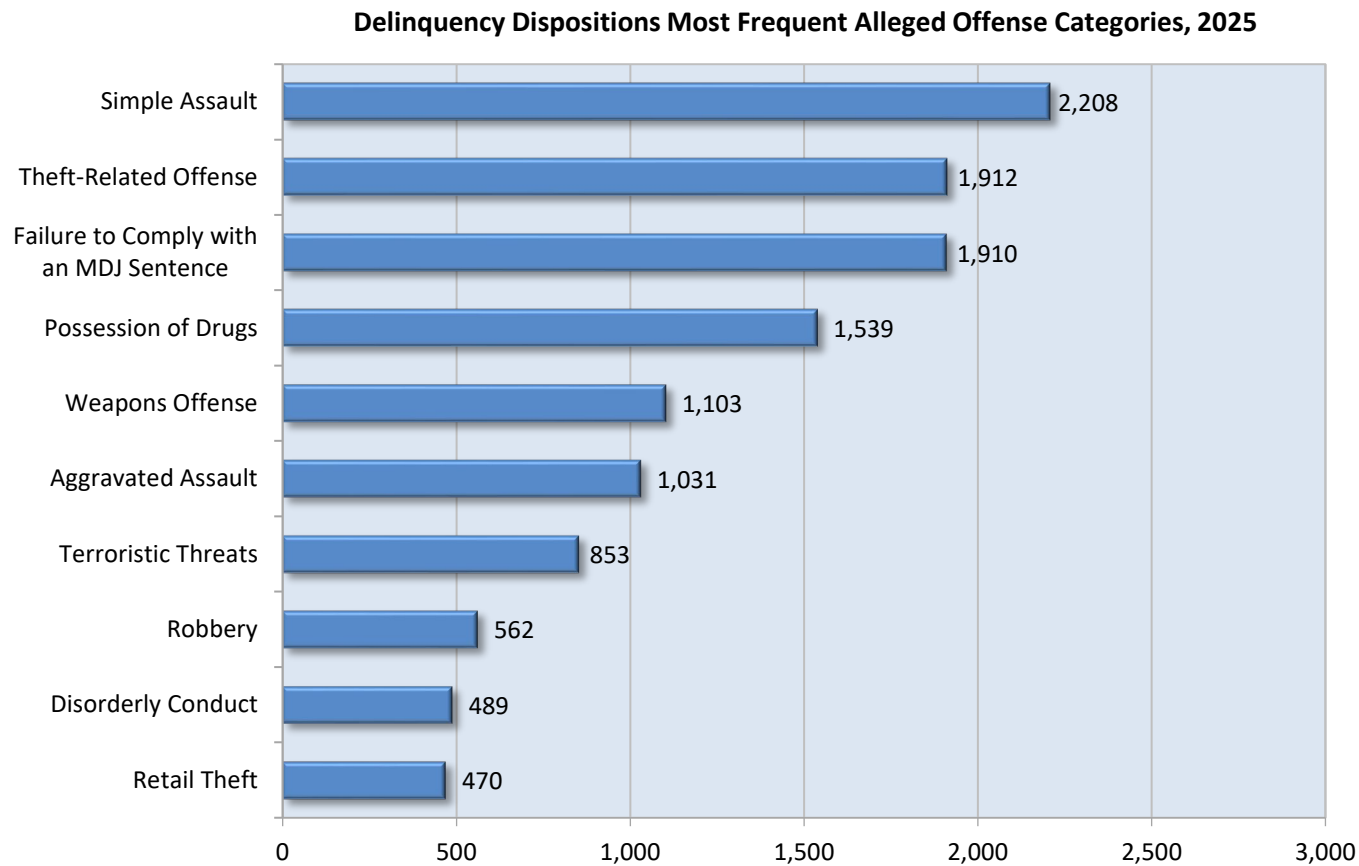


Delinquency Dispositions Most Frequent Alleged Offense Categories, 2025

Simple Assault was the most common offense with a disposition in 2025.

The chart below shows the most frequent alleged offense categories for 2025. Only the most serious charge per disposition is depicted, with the chart showing the top 10 offense categories. Simple Assault was the most frequent charge with 13.1%, followed by Theft-Related Offense and Failure to Comply with an MDJ Sentence (both with 11.3%), Possession of Drugs (9.1%), and Weapons Offenses (6.5%).

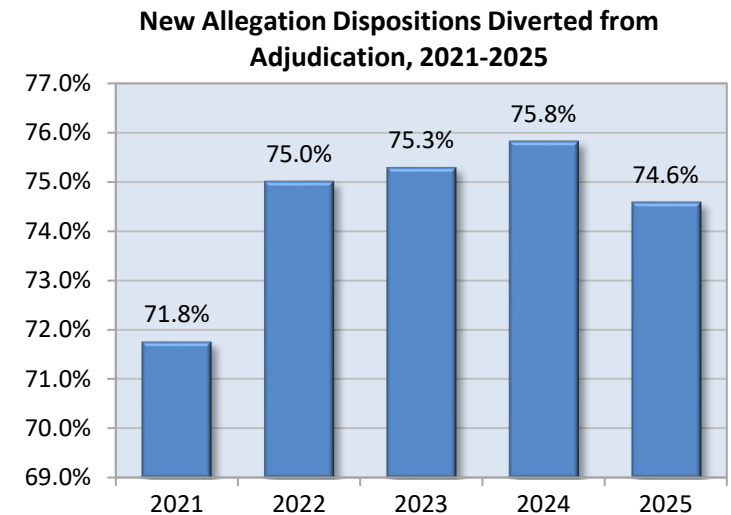

New Allegation Dispositions Diverted from Adjudication, 2025

Three out of four delinquent allegations were diverted from adjudication in 2025.

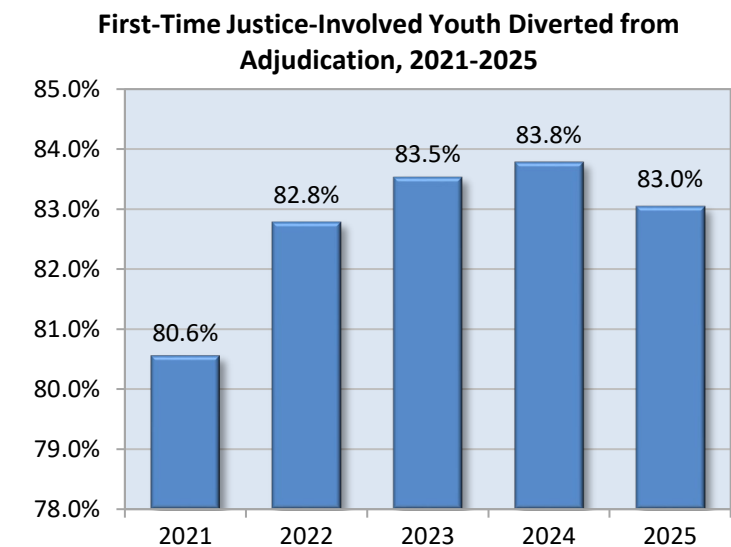
In 2025, 12,617 allegations were diverted from adjudication (74.6%). Between 2021 and 2025, the proportion of new allegation dispositions diverted from adjudication increased by 3.9%, from 71.8% in 2021 to 74.6% in 2025. The proportion of allegations diverted from adjudication decreased 1.6% from 2024 to 2025, however, from 75.8% to 74.6%.



First-Time Justice-Involved Youth Diverted from Adjudication, 2025

The majority of first-time justice-involved youth were diverted from adjudication in 2025.

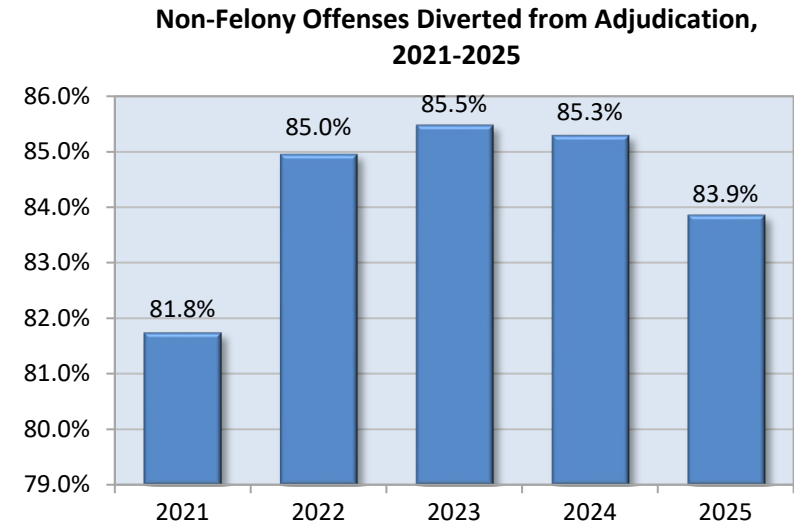
Most youth (83.0%) involved with the juvenile justice system for the first time in 2025 were diverted from adjudication. The percentage of first-time justice-involved youth diverted from adjudication increased 3.0%, from 80.6% in 2021 to 83.0% in 2025. From 2024 to 2025, however, the percentage of first-time justice-involved youth diverted decreased just under 1.0%, from 83.8% to 83.0%.



Non-Felony Offenses Diverted from Adjudication, 2021-2025

The majority of non-felony delinquent allegations were diverted from adjudication in 2025.

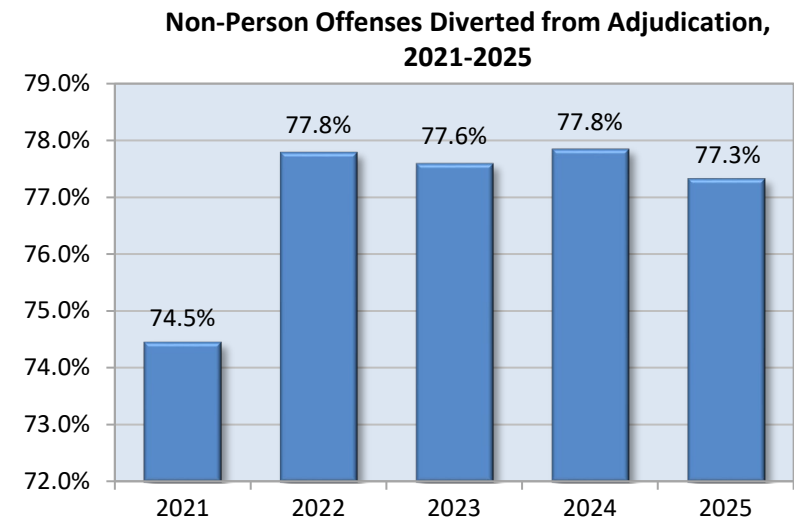
Most (83.9%) non-felony allegations were diverted from adjudication in 2025. Between 2021 and 2025, the percentage of non-felonies diverted increased 2.6%, from 81.8% in 2021 to 83.9% in 2025. Between 2024 and 2025, however, the percentage of non-felonies diverted decreased 1.6%, from 85.3% of all non-felonies to 83.9%.



Non-Person Offenses Diverted from Adjudication, 2021-2025

Three out of four non-person delinquent allegations were diverted from adjudication in 2025.

The majority (77.3%) of non-person allegations were diverted from adjudication in 2025. Between 2021 and 2025, the percentage of non-person allegations diverted increased 3.8% from 74.5% in 2021 to 77.3% in 2025. Between 2024 and 2025, however, the percentage of non-person allegations diverted decreased 0.6%, from 77.8% to 77.3% of all non-person allegations.



Case Processing Metrics

In juvenile justice, it is critical that cases are processed in a timely fashion. Adolescents experience time differently than adults. Prompt case resolution helps a youth maintain the cognitive connection between their actions and the system's response. Case processing delays also disrupt critical aspects of a youth's life, including school, social and peer connections, family stability, and access to needed services. Finally, when a case is continued multiple times, it can prolong uncertainty for youth, often leading them to perceive the system as unfair and unpredictable.

While the Pennsylvania Juvenile Act and the Pennsylvania Rules of Juvenile Court Procedure specify case processing timeframes for certain types of cases, it is imperative that courts monitor the length of time for a case to achieve specific milestones, including:

1. Length of time from receipt of written allegation to first hearing (when applicable).
2. Length of time between first hearing and disposition (when applicable).
3. Length of time from receipt of written allegation to disposition, including by disposition type.

Length of Time Between Allegation and First Hearing, 2025

In 2025, nearly two-thirds of cases had a hearing within 90 days of receipt of the delinquency allegation.

In 2025, among cases in which a hearing was held, 64.1% had their first hearing within 90 days of receipt of the delinquency allegation. An additional 23.2% of cases had their first hearing between 91 days and 180 days after receipt of the delinquency allegation, indicating that nearly 90% of cases had their first hearing within six months of receipt of the delinquency allegation. An additional 6.8% of cases had their first hearing between 181 and 270 days after receipt of the delinquency allegation, while 2.9% of cases had their first hearing between 271 and 365 days after receipt of the delinquency allegation. Only 3.0% of cases had their first hearing more than a year after receipt of the delinquency allegation.

Allegation to First Hearing Median Days by Hearing Type, 2025

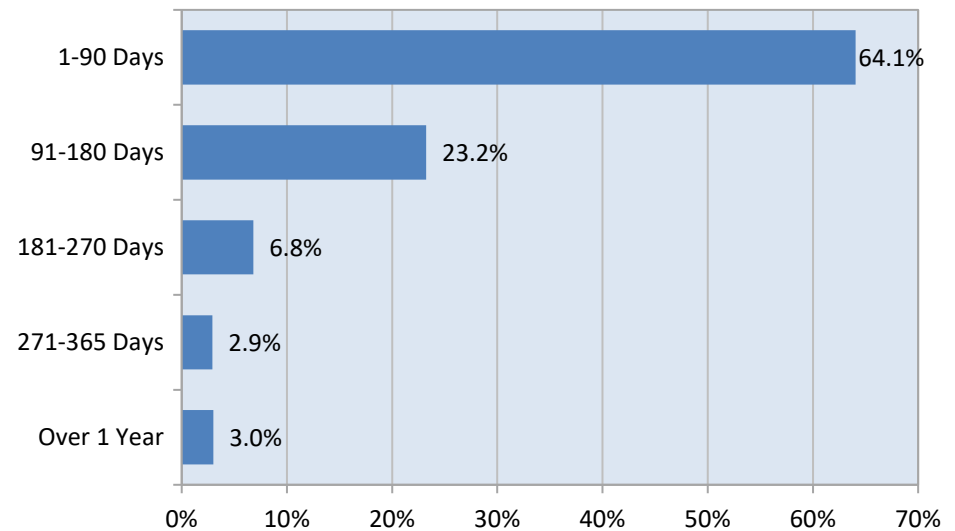
In 2025, the median length of time from receipt of delinquency allegation to first hearing was 67 days.

In 2025, among cases in which at least one hearing was held, the median length of time from the receipt of the delinquency allegation to the first hearing was 67 days. This figure differed substantially depending on the type of hearing held.

The lowest median time (28 days) to first hearing was for Transfer to Criminal Proceedings. For first hearings of Disposition Only and Adjudication, the median length of time to the hearing was 57 days and 60 days, respectively. When the first hearing was a Consent Decree hearing, the median length of time from delinquency allegation to the hearing was 98 days. The longest median time was for Placement Reviews and Disposition Review hearings, which were 63 days and 140 days from receipt of delinquency allegation.

Length of Time Between Allegation and First Hearing, 2025

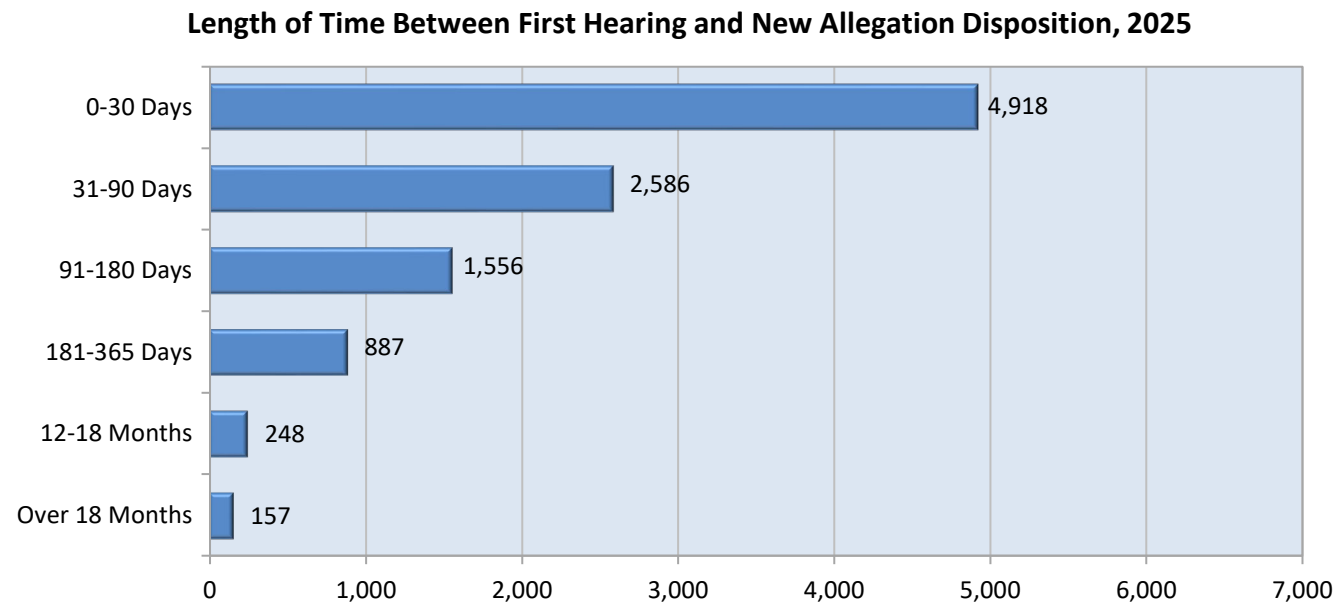

Length of Time Between First Hearing and New Allegation Disposition, 2025

The median length of time from the first hearing on a case to the new allegation disposition was 35 days in 2025.

In 2025, just under half (47.5%) of all new allegation dispositions occurred within 30 days of the first hearing on the case. Approximately 25% of all new allegation dispositions occurred between 31 and 90 days after the first hearing, while 15% of all new allegation dispositions occurred between 91 and 180 days after the first hearing. In less than 13% of dispositions, the first hearing on the case occurred more than 180 days prior to the disposition date. The median length of time to disposition from the first hearing on the case was 30 days.

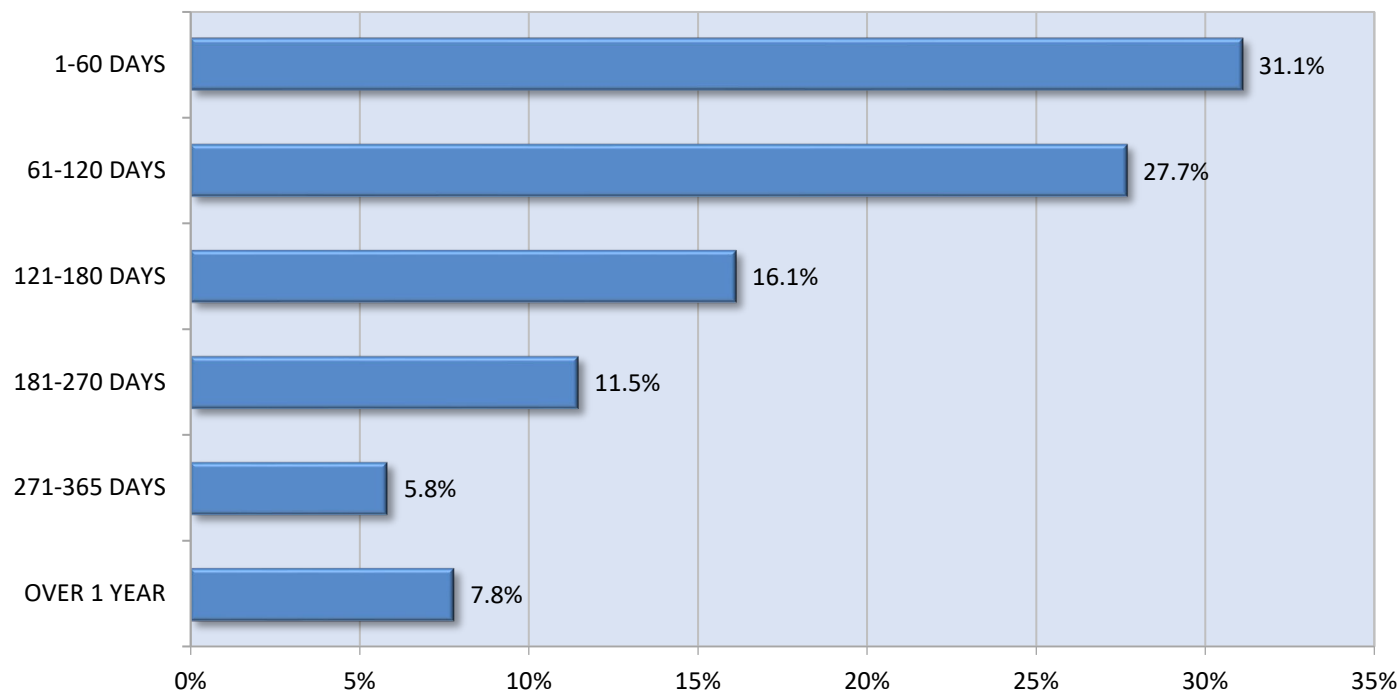


Length of Time Between Allegation and Disposition, 2025

Over half of new allegation dispositions occurred within 120 days of receipt of the delinquency allegation.

In 2025, 31.1% of dispositions occurred within 60 days of the delinquency allegation, while 27.7% of dispositions occurred between 61 days and 120 days after the delinquency allegation. Next, 16.1% of dispositions occurred between 121 days and 180 days after allegation. An additional 11.5% of dispositions occurred between 181 days and 270 days after the allegation, and 5.8% of dispositions occurred between 271 days and 365 days after the delinquency allegation. Only 7.8% of dispositions occurred a year or more after the allegation.

Length of Time Between Allegation and Disposition, 2025

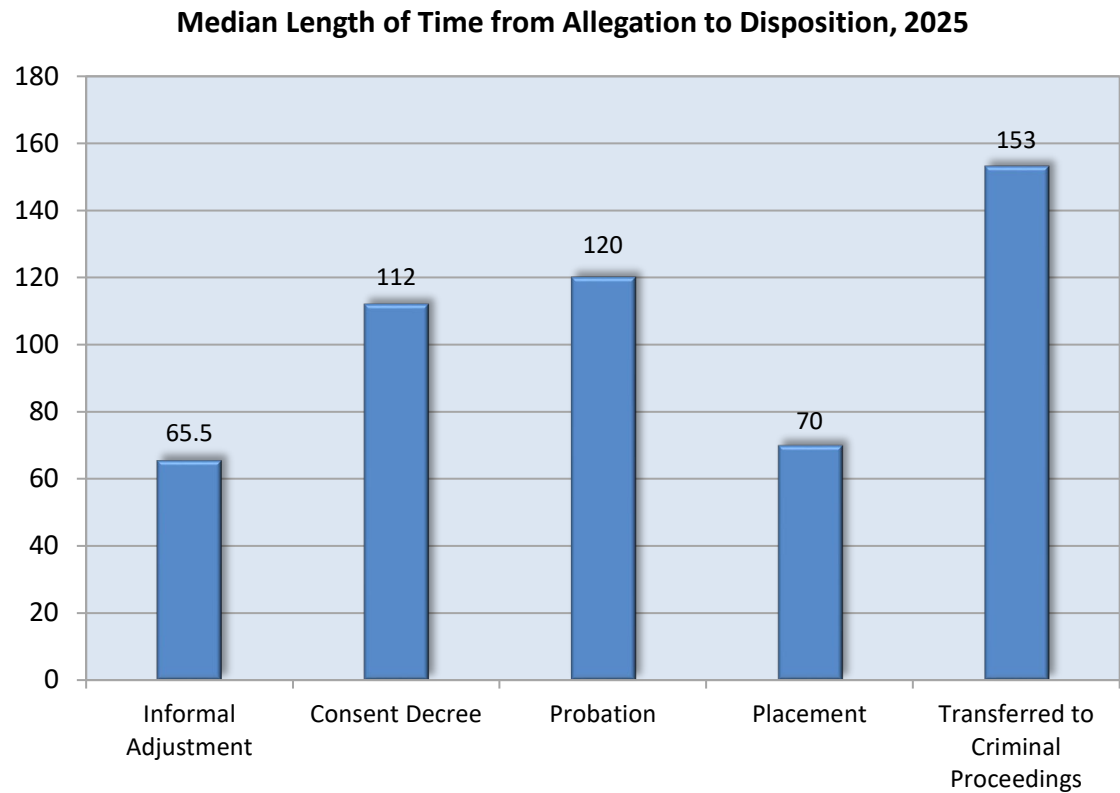

Median Length of Time from Allegation to Disposition, 2025

The median length of time from allegation to new allegation disposition among all dispositions was 99 days in 2025.

In 2025, the median length of time from allegation to disposition was 65.5 days for Informal Adjustment dispositions and 112 days for Consent Decree dispositions. The median length of time to Probation dispositions was 120 days, while the median length of time to Placement dispositions was 70 days. For Transferred to Criminal Proceedings dispositions, the median length of time from allegation to disposition was 153 days.

Section 3: Demographics

Selected Dispositions by Gender, 2025

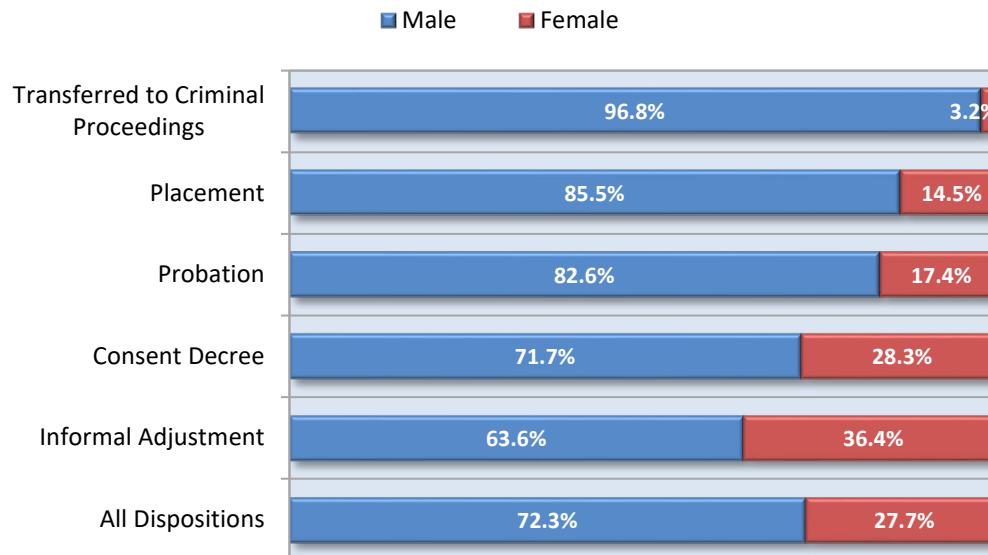
Males accounted for nearly three in four delinquency dispositions in 2025.

Juvenile court dispositions in Pennsylvania continue to primarily involve males (72.3%). As reflected in the charts below, the proportion of males receiving delinquency dispositions related to new allegations increases as the disposition type becomes more restrictive. Females were most likely to receive dispositions of Informal Adjustment (36.4%) or Consent Decree (28.3%). Conversely, males were more likely to receive dispositions of Transferred to Criminal Proceedings (96.8%) or Placement (85.5%).

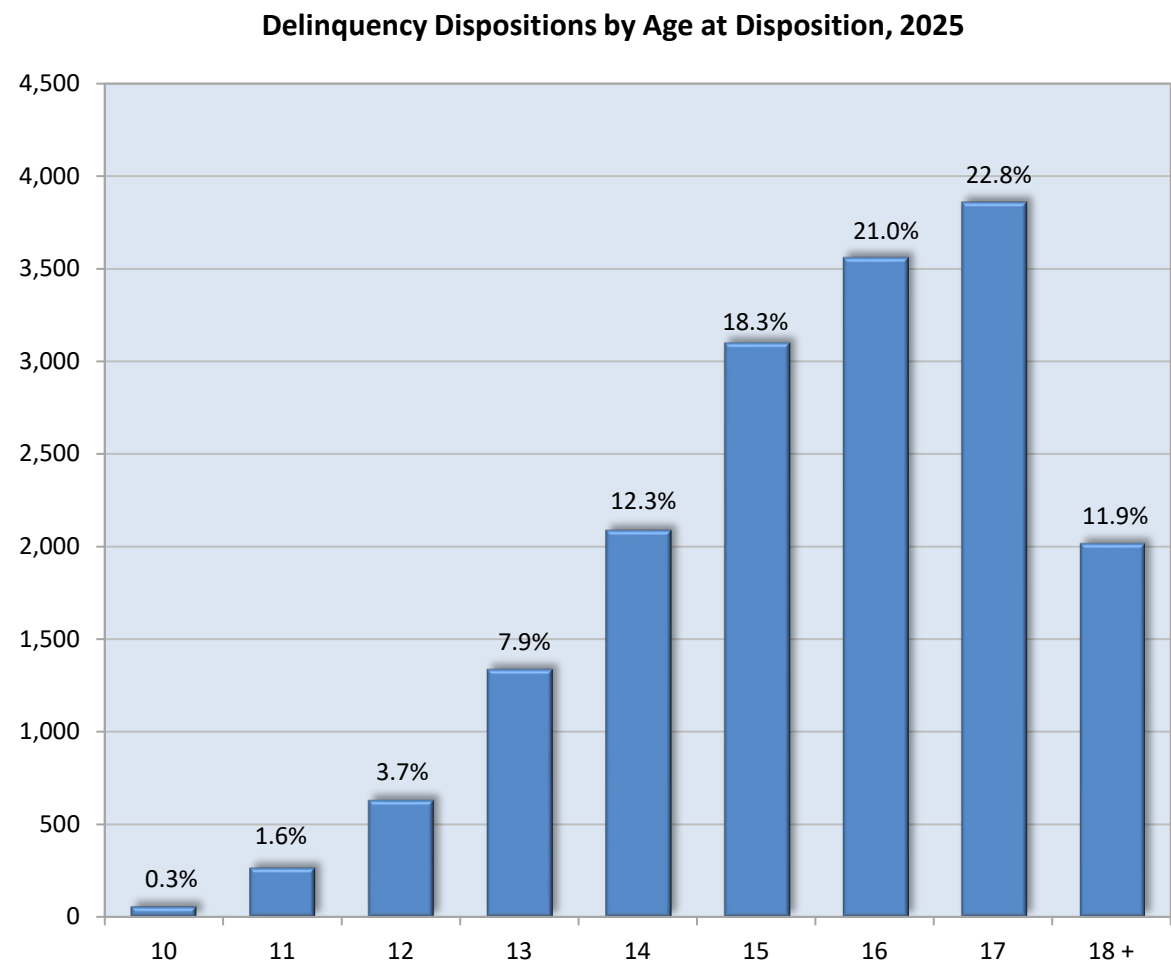


Delinquency Dispositions by Age at Disposition, 2025

The median age of youth at the time of disposition in 2025 was 16.

Juveniles 15 to 17 years old were most likely to receive a delinquency disposition (62.2%) in 2025. Conversely, only 5.7% of youth with a disposition in 2025 were under the age of 13.

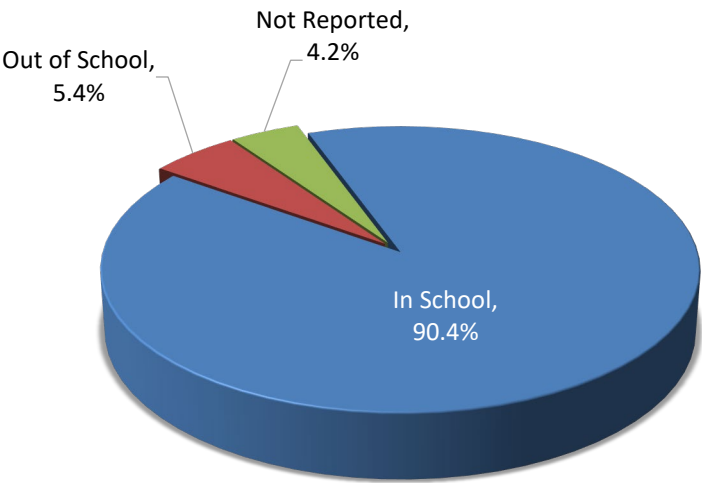
Delinquency Dispositions by Educational Status, 2025

Most youth with delinquency dispositions in 2025 were reported as being in school.

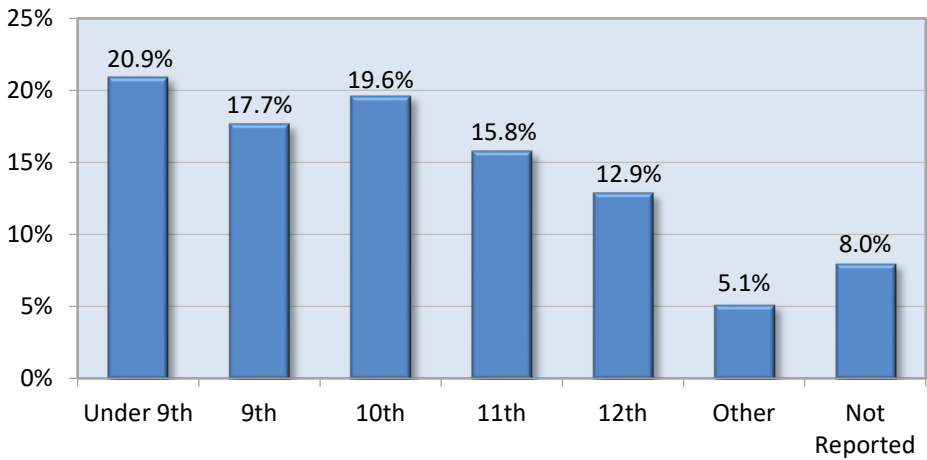

Delinquency Dispositions by Highest Grade Completed, 2025



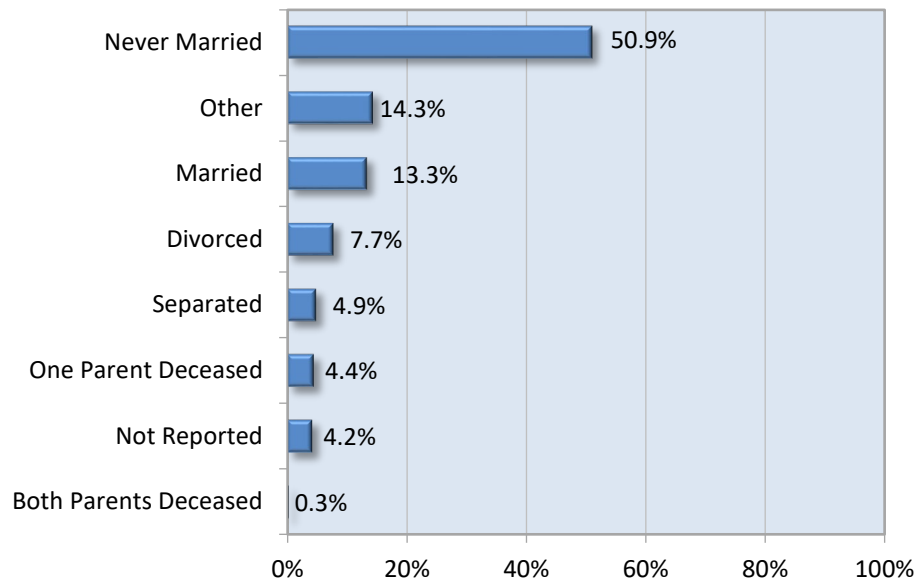
Delinquency Dispositions by Family Status, 2025

In 2025, more than half of youth with dispositions had parents reported as never married, and approximately half lived with their mother only.

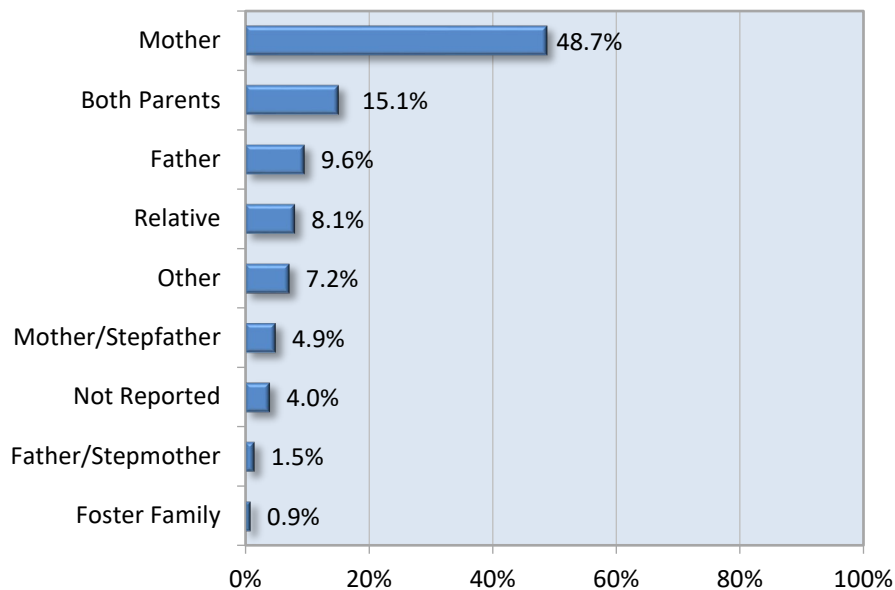
In juvenile delinquency dispositions, youth whose parents were reported as never married represented the largest group (50.9%). In only 13.3% of cases, the parents were reported as married at the time of disposition. The majority of youth (48.7%) resided only with their mother, while only 15.1% of juveniles resided with both parents.

Section 4: Race and Ethnicity

On the following pages, data on race and ethnicity trends related to juvenile court dispositions are provided. A few points of clarification regarding the reading and interpretation of this data should be noted.

The Juvenile Court Judges’ Commission’s Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research collects data on race and ethnicity from each of Pennsylvania’s 67 counties. The collection of this data is done in concert with the protocols outlined in *Guidelines for Collecting & Recording the Race and Ethnicity of Juveniles in Conjunction with Juvenile Delinquency Disposition Reporting to the Juvenile Court Judges’ Commission* (National Center for Juvenile Justice, 2006). As such, race and ethnicity are collected and recorded as two separate and distinct sets of data.

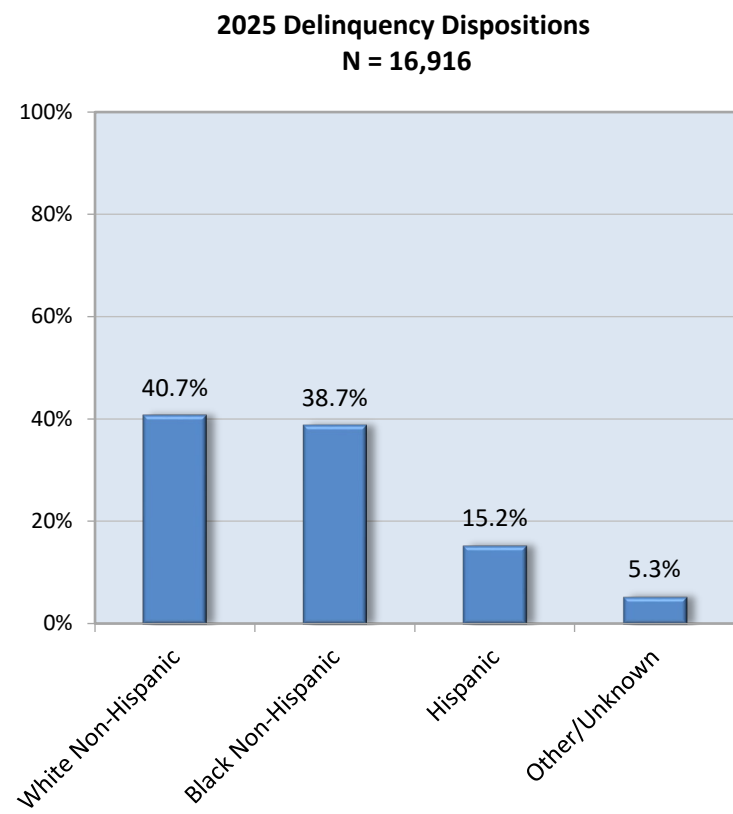
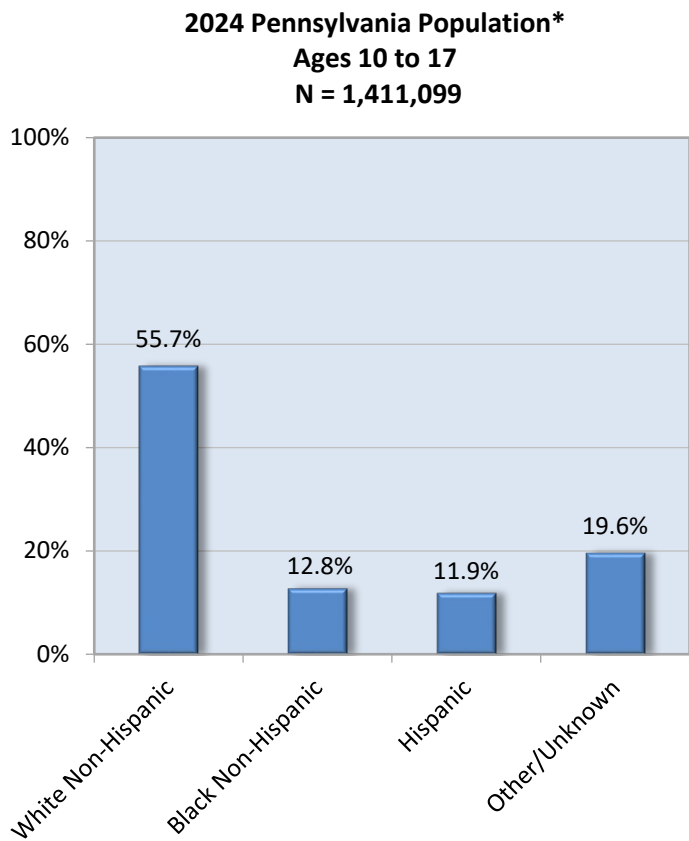

Total Delinquency Dispositions by Race and Ethnicity, 2025

In 2025, Black Non-Hispanic youth were overrepresented at the disposition decision point.

In 2025, White Non-Hispanic youth represented the largest race and ethnicity category for all delinquency dispositions (40.7%), but 55.7% of the juvenile population. In comparison, Black Non-Hispanic youth account for 12.8% of the juvenile population versus 38.7% of all delinquency dispositions, showing disproportionate representation. When excluding Philadelphia County and Allegheny County, Black Non-Hispanic youth represent 7.4% of the juvenile population but 30.9% of all delinquency dispositions. 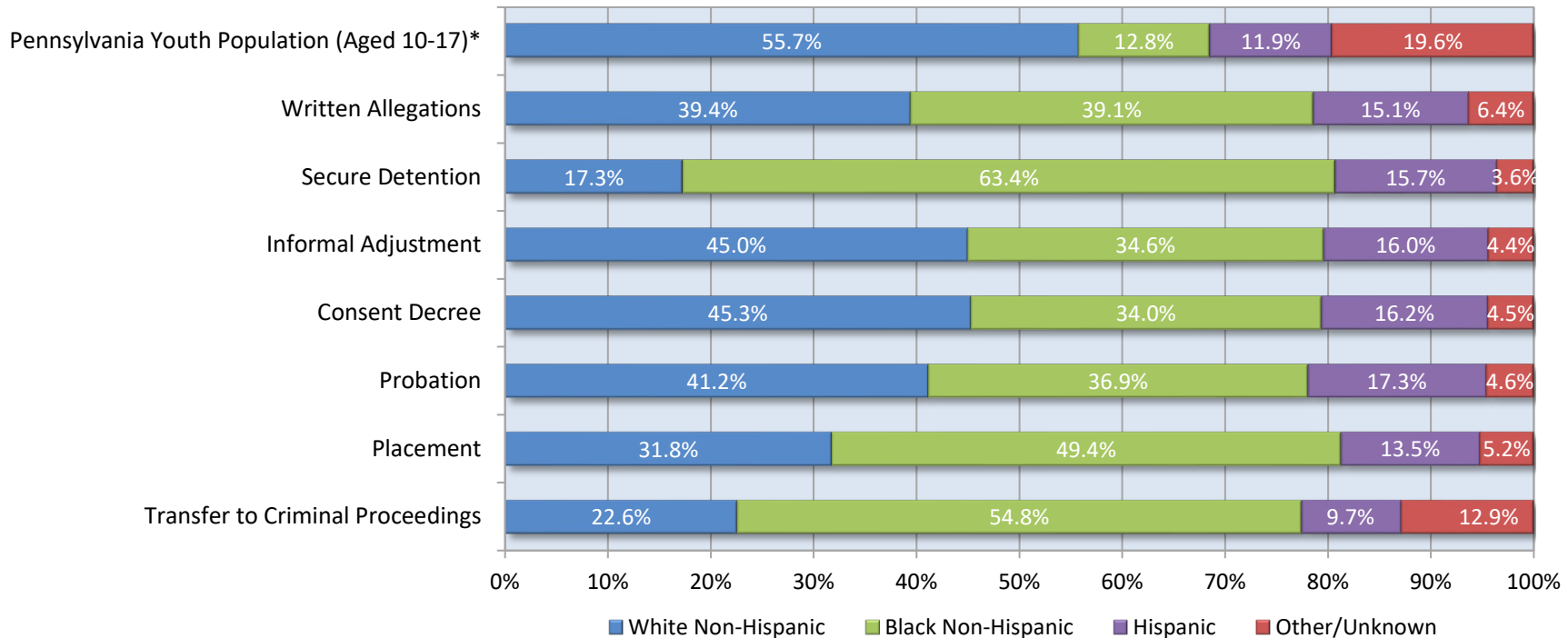
Race and Ethnicity by Decision Point, 2025

Relative to the youth population (aged 10-17), Black Non-Hispanic youth were overrepresented at key juvenile justice decision points, including written allegation, secure detention, placement, and transfer to criminal proceedings.

The following chart shows the distribution of decision points by race and ethnicity within the juvenile justice system. To better contextualize the representation of a specific race at a given decision point, the overall youth population (aged 10–17) of the state is used as a benchmark. For example, White Non-Hispanic youth account for 55.7% of the youth population, but only 39.4% of written allegations, 17.3% of secure detention admissions, and 31.8% of Placement dispositions.

Conversely, Black Non-Hispanic youth account for 12.8% of the youth population, but 39.1% of Written Allegations admissions, 63.4% of Secure Detention admissions, 49.4% of Placement dispositions, and 54.8% of Transfer to Criminal Proceedings dispositions.

Section 5: Delinquency Placements

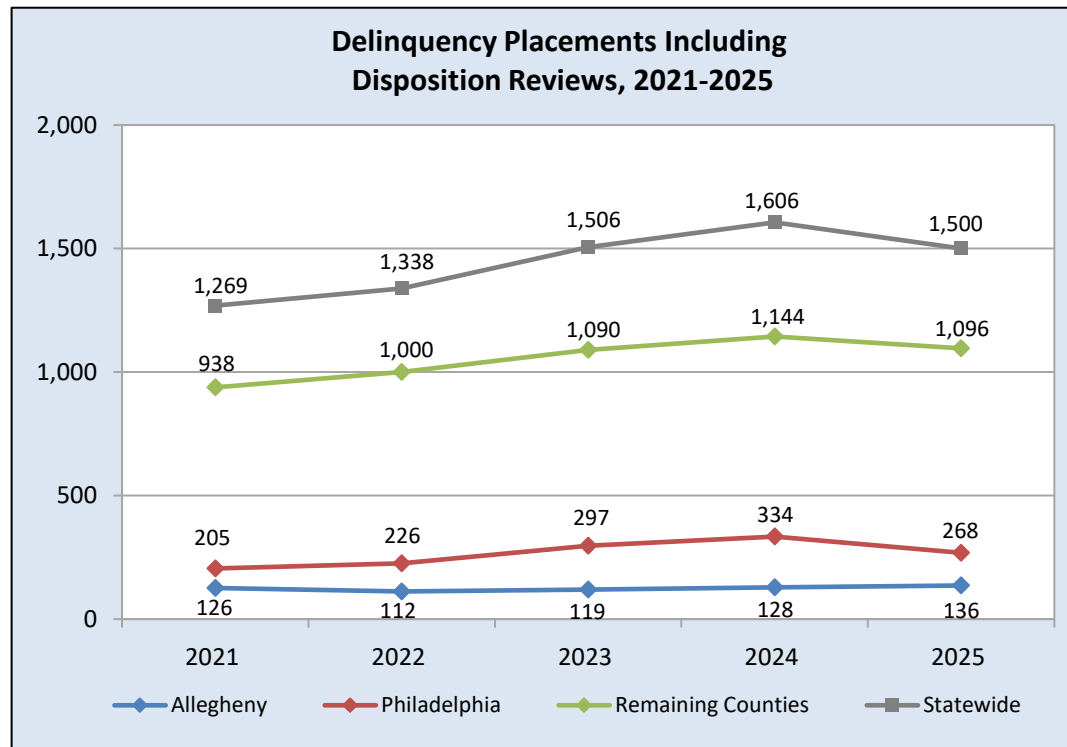
1. The unit of count for this section of the report is a delinquency placement disposition (placement disposition). A placement disposition is defined as an allegation of delinquency disposed of by the court to a residential placement facility. Any one youth may be involved in a number of placement dispositions within a calendar year containing multiple allegations. In addition, a youth may have multiple referrals disposed of at once and receive only one placement disposition. Therefore, the reader is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret placement dispositions as the number of youth who were placed by the court. Placement dispositions in this section occurred between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.
2. A placement disposition is used when a juvenile is removed from the home and ordered to a placement facility. Scenarios in which a youth is transferred from one placement facility to another placement facility are not included in these figures. See Section 6 for more information on these scenarios.
3. A placement disposition can occur as a new allegation disposition (i.e., the first disposition on a case) or as the result of a review hearing.
4. On pages 59 and 61, data are provided to describe the trends in the use of different placement facility types (e.g., residential treatment facilities, secure residential services) affiliated with the placement disposition that occurred in 2025. If the placement type was not known at the time of the placement disposition (e.g., the juvenile was ordered to a facility, but a bed was not currently available), that case is excluded from the total counts on these pages. The reader is therefore cautioned that placement disposition counts may differ from placement type counts.
5. Data for this report were compiled from the PaJCMS on March 12, 2026. Any placement disposition that occurred in 2025 and was entered into the PaJCMS after this date may not be included in these statistics. The numbers published in this report therefore may not reflect current numbers within the system.
6. Finally, the reader should be cautioned that beginning in 2020, figures were likely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Placement disposition figures dropped significantly in 2020 and 2021 but have increased slightly since then.

Delinquency Placements Including Disposition Reviews, 2021-2025

The use of residential placement as a disposition decreased in 2025.

Between 2021 and 2025, delinquency placements increased 18.2% statewide. Philadelphia and Allegheny counties experienced an increase in placement dispositions of 30.7% and 7.9%, and the remaining counties' placement dispositions increased 16.8%.

Between 2024 and 2025, however, delinquency placements decreased 6.6% statewide, 19.8% in Philadelphia County, and 4.2% in the remaining counties. There was an increase of 6.3% in Allegheny County during the same period.

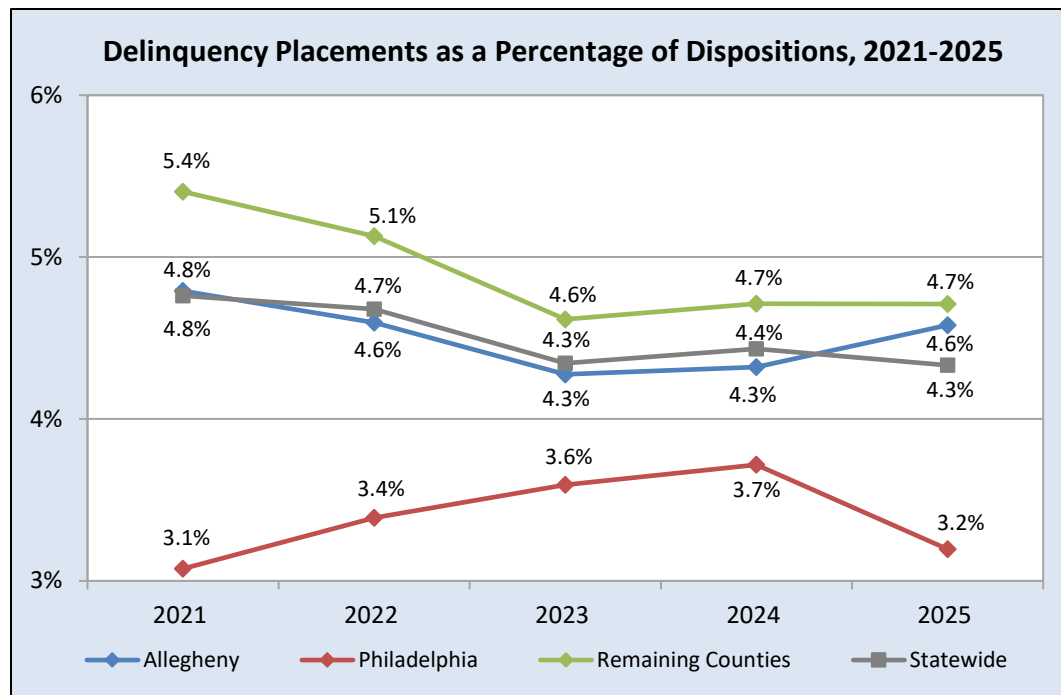


Delinquency Placements as a Percentage of Dispositions, 2021-2025

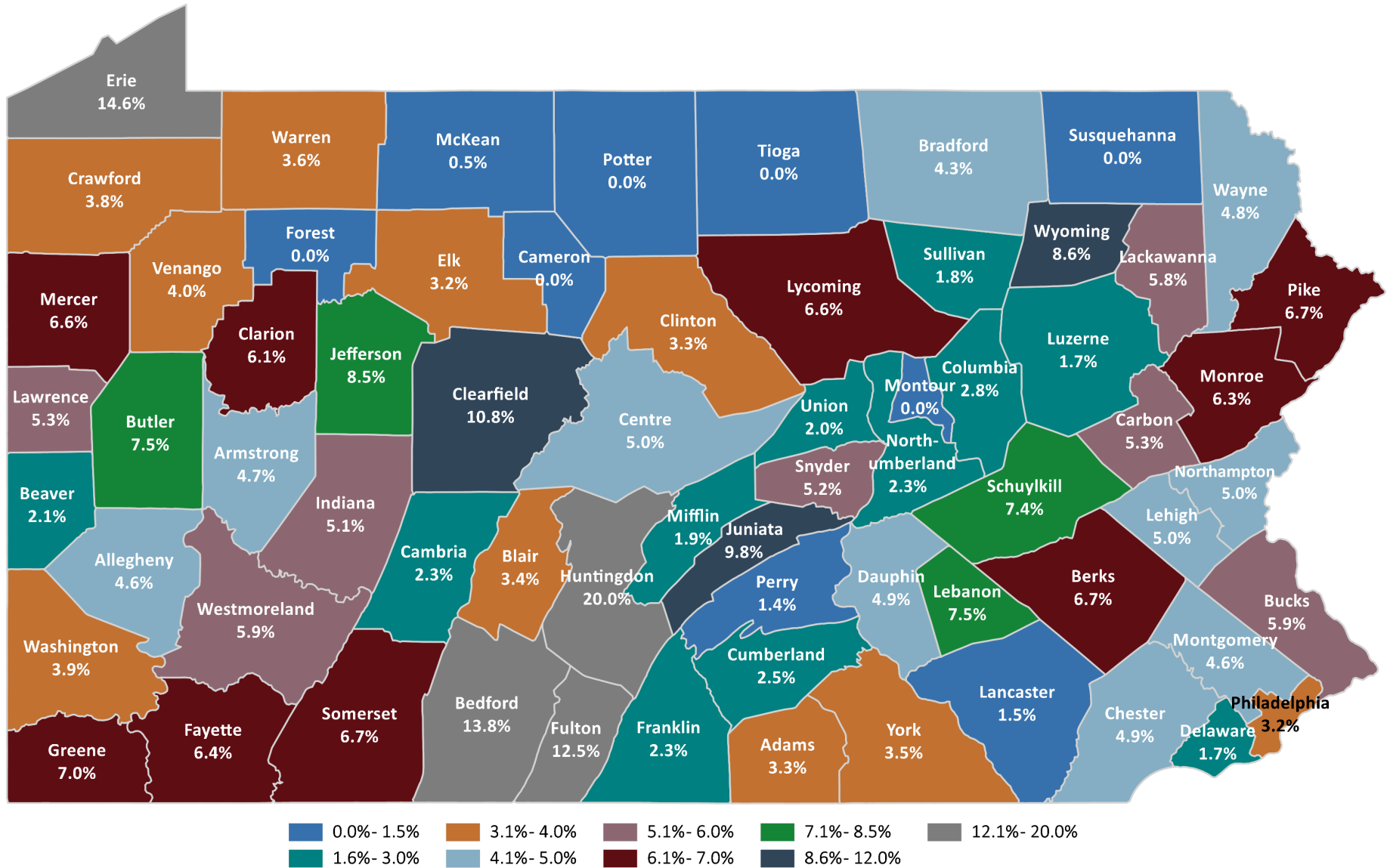
Delinquency placements as a percentage of total dispositions hit historic lows in 2025.

Delinquency placements as a percentage of total dispositions, including disposition reviews, decreased from 4.8% in 2021 to 4.3% in 2025. Similarly, delinquency placements as a percentage of dispositions decreased from 4.4% to 4.3% between 2024 and 2025.

Philadelphia County placements as a percentage of total dispositions increased from 3.1% in 2021 to 3.2% in 2025 but decreased from 3.7% in 2024 to 3.2% in 2025. Allegheny County placements as a percentage of total dispositions decreased from 4.8% in 2021 to 4.6% in 2025 but decreased from 3.7% in 2024 to 3.2% in 2025. Allegheny County placements as a percentage of total dispositions decreased from 4.8% in 2021 to 4.6% in 2025 but increased from 4.3% in 2024 to 4.6% in 2025. In all counties other than Allegheny and Philadelphia, the percentage decreased from 5.4% in 2021 to 4.7% in 2025 and remained constant at 4.7% in 2024 and 2025.



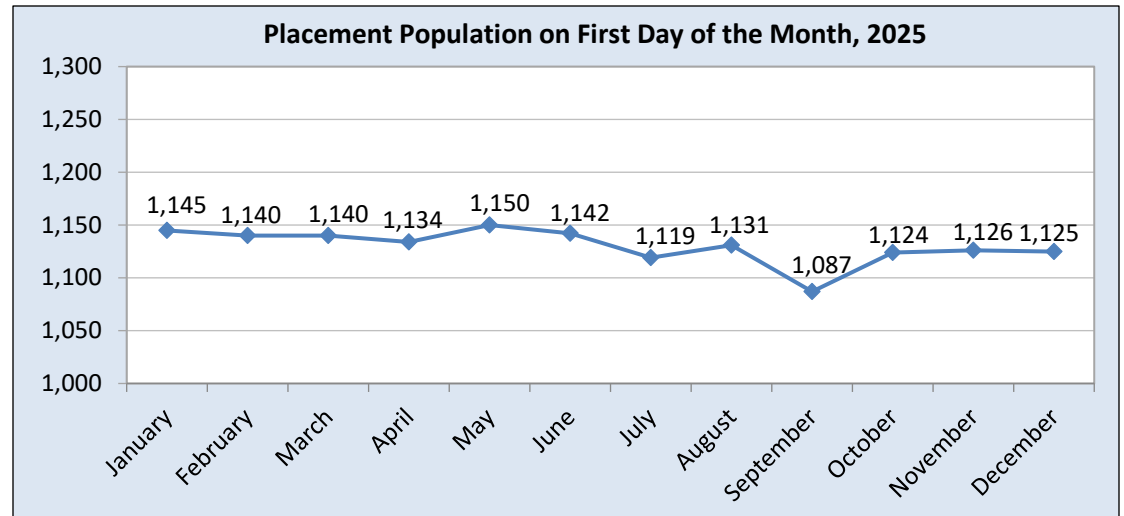
2025 Delinquency Placements as a Percentage of Dispositions Including Disposition Reviews



Placement Population on First Day of the Month, 2025

Throughout 2025, an average of 1,130 youth were in placement on the first day of the month.

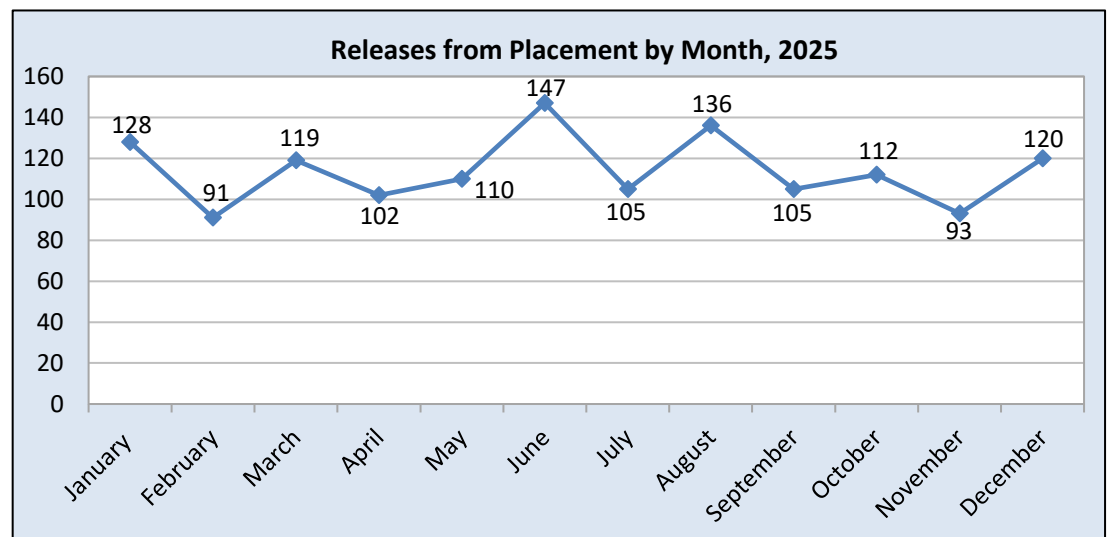
In January 2025, the number of juveniles in placement on the first day of the month was 1,145. By May, the number of youth in placement on the first day of the month had slightly increased 0.4% to 1,150 youth, before steadily decreasing 5.4% through September to 1,087 youth. Between September and December, the number of youth in placement on the first day of the month increased 3.4%, from 1,087 to 1,125.



Releases from Placement by Month, 2025

On average, 114 youth per month were released from placement statewide in 2025.

Statewide, between January and March, the number of youth released from placement decreased 7.0%, from 128 releases to 119 releases, before increasing 23.5% through June. Between June and September, the number of youth released from placement decreased from 147 releases to 105 releases, a decrease of 28.5%. Between September and December, releases increased 14.2%, from 105 juveniles released from placement to 120 youth released from placement.



New Allegation Placements vs. Disposition Review Placements, 2025

Approximately half of delinquency placements were ordered as the result of a disposition review.

The following chart depicts the relative percentage of placements that resulted from new allegations versus disposition review proceedings. A disposition review is a hearing conducted by the court regarding a previous disposition which did not result in out-of-home placement.

The percentage of placements resulting from both new allegations and disposition reviews is shown for each county, by county class.

Approximately half of delinquency placements statewide (51.7%) were ordered as a result of a disposition review. This figure, however, was notably influenced by Philadelphia County, which accounted for 17.9% of all delinquency placements statewide, and 71.0% of all delinquency placements were ordered as a result of a disposition review.

Across all other county class groups, the average distribution of delinquency placements was 52.4% from new allegations and 47.6% from disposition reviews. Class 2, Class 2A, Class 4, Class 5, and Class 7 are the county class groups with a majority of delinquency placements originating from disposition reviews.

Delinquency Placements by Type, 2025

Including Disposition Reviews

Nearly one in four youth were placed at a state-operated Youth Development Center (YDC) secure program in 2025.

Beginning in 2016, the collection of delinquency placement-related data was enhanced within the PaJCMS. All residential placement programs are now categorized by licensed service types, which are determined by PA Code Title 55 Chapter 3140. For the purposes of this report, there are three overarching service types: Community Based, Institutional, and “Other.”

Community Based Category:

- Community Residential Service/Group Home
- Foster Care
- Supervised Independent Living
- Transitional Living

Institutional Category:

- General Residential Services
- Secure Residential Services
- YDC Secure
- YDC/YFC Non-Secure

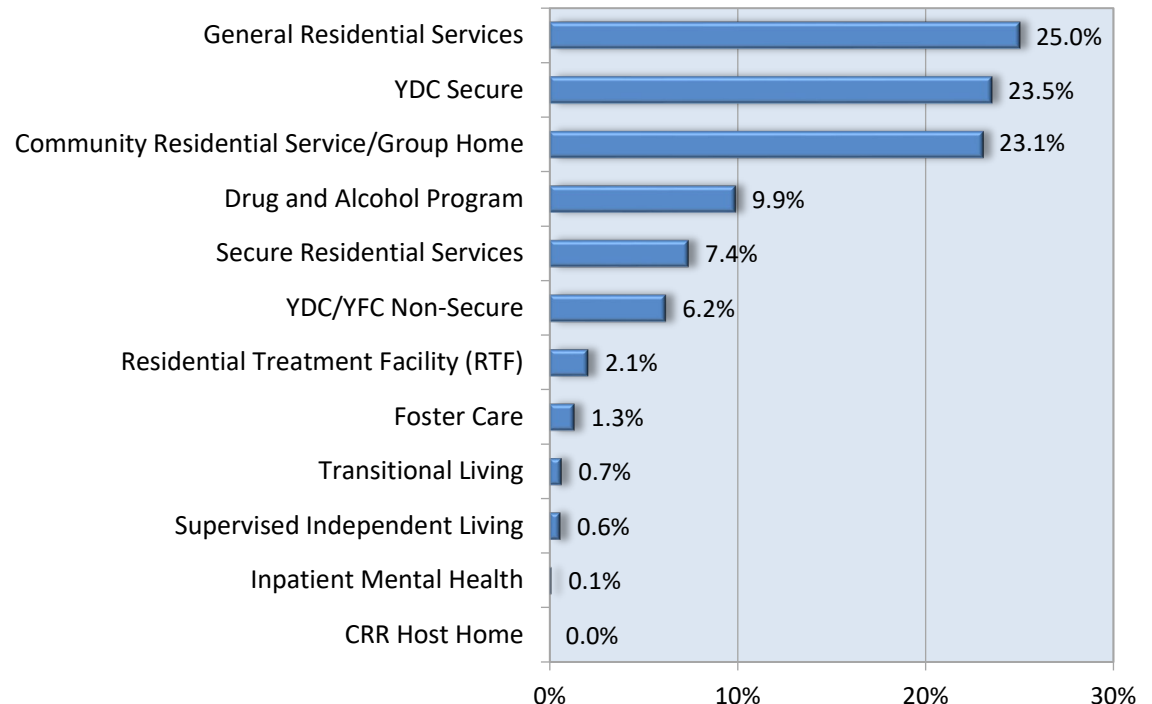
“Other” Category:

- CRR Host Home
- Drug and Alcohol Program
- Inpatient Mental Health
- Residential Treatment Facility (RTF)

General Residential Services, YDC Secure, and Community Residential Service/Group Home were the most frequently utilized residential programs in 2025, comprising 71.6% of all delinquency placements.

Of note, the utilization of YDC Secure programming has increased substantially over the last decade. In 2016, only 8.1% of admissions to residential placement were to YDC Secure programs. In 2025, the proportion of delinquency placements to YDC Secure programs was 23.5%, nearly triple the rate ten years ago.

Delinquency Placements by Type, 2025

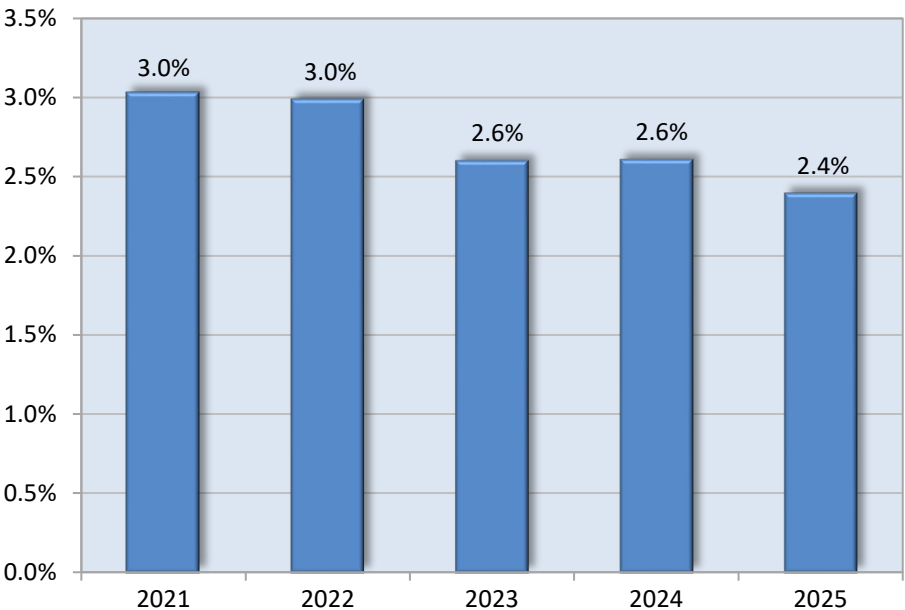


First-Time Justice-Involved Youth in Placement with a Delinquent New Allegation Disposition or Review Disposition, 2021-2025

Only 2.4% of first-time justice-involved youth were disposed to placement in 2025.

In 2025, only a small fraction, 2.4%, of first-time justice-involved youth were placed in out-of-home care. The proportion of first-time justice-involved youth referred to placement has decreased from 3.0% in 2021 to 2.4% in 2025. The number of first-time justice-involved youth referred to placement also decreased from 627 in 2024 to 536 in 2025.

Percentages of First-Time Justice-Involved Youth in Placement with a Delinquent New Allegation Disposition or Review Disposition, 2021-2025

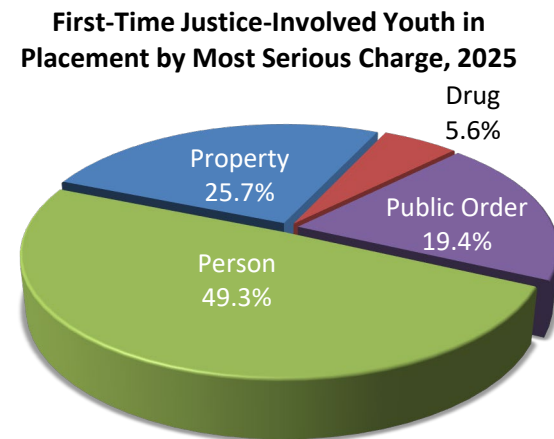


First-Time Justice-Involved Youth in Placement by Most Serious Charge, 2025

First-time justice-involved youth with a delinquency placement were most likely to have committed a Person offense.

In 2025, Person offenses were the most common charges for first-time justice-involved youth ordered to placement (49.3%), followed by Property offenses (25.7%) and Public Order offenses (19.4%). Drug offenses (5.6%) were the least common charge among first-time justice-involved youth in placement.

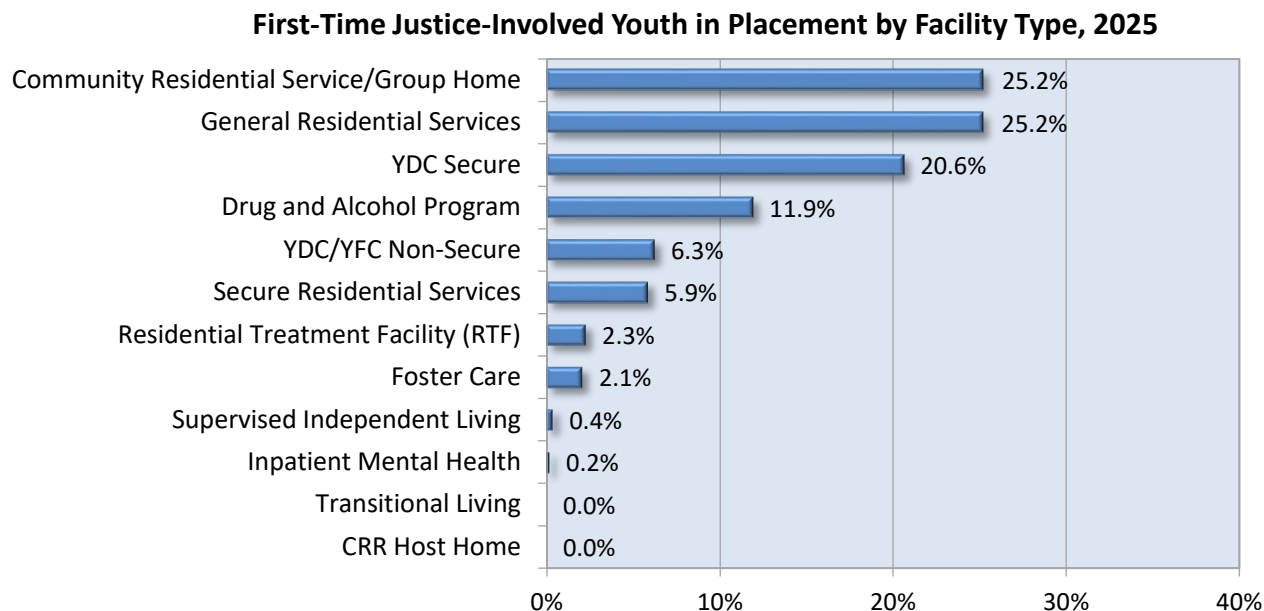
Note: The Public Order offenses category includes but is not limited to: offenses such as Disorderly Conduct or Weapon on School Property, and Firearms Offenses.

First-time justice-involved youth were most likely to be placed at a Community Residential Service/Group Home program.

Community Residential Service/Group Home, General Residential Services, and YDC Secure were the most frequently used programs among first-time justice-involved youth placed in 2025, comprising 71.0% of all such placements.



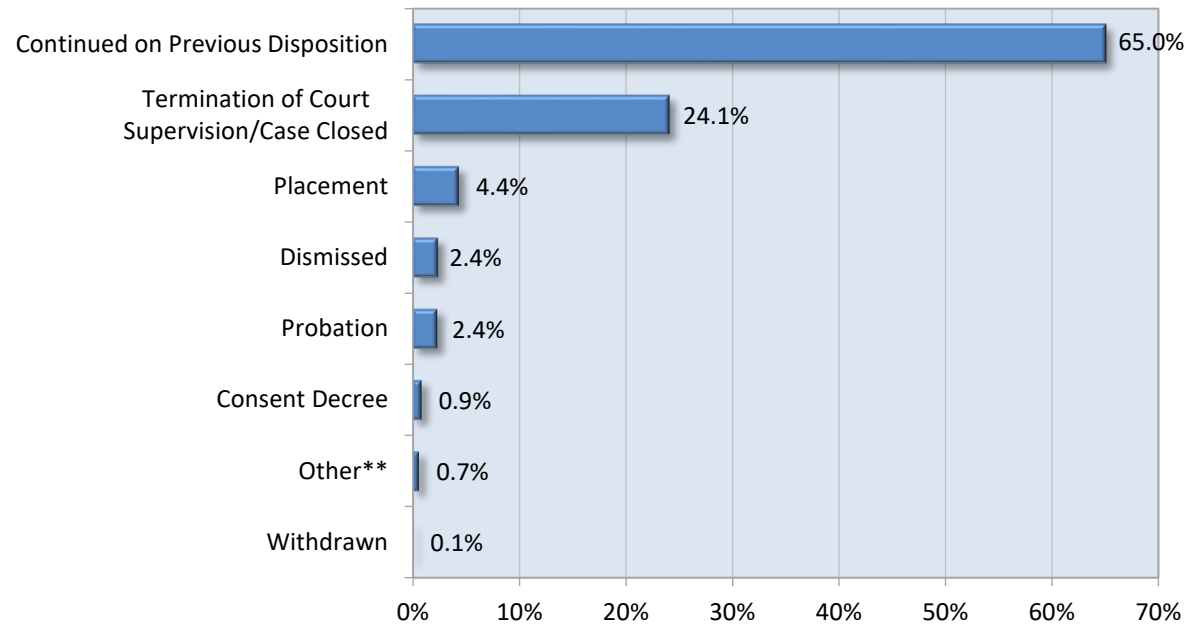
Section 6: Delinquency Disposition and Placement Review

Outcomes of Delinquency Disposition Reviews, 2025

Less than 5% of delinquency disposition reviews resulted in a placement disposition.

A disposition review is a hearing conducted by the court regarding a previous disposition. It was noted on page 57 that more than half of delinquency placements in 2025 resulted from disposition review. However, less than 5% of all disposition review proceedings resulted in a delinquency placement. The vast majority of disposition reviews resulted in an order of Continued on Previous Disposition.

Outcomes of Delinquency Disposition Reviews as a Percentage of Total, 2025

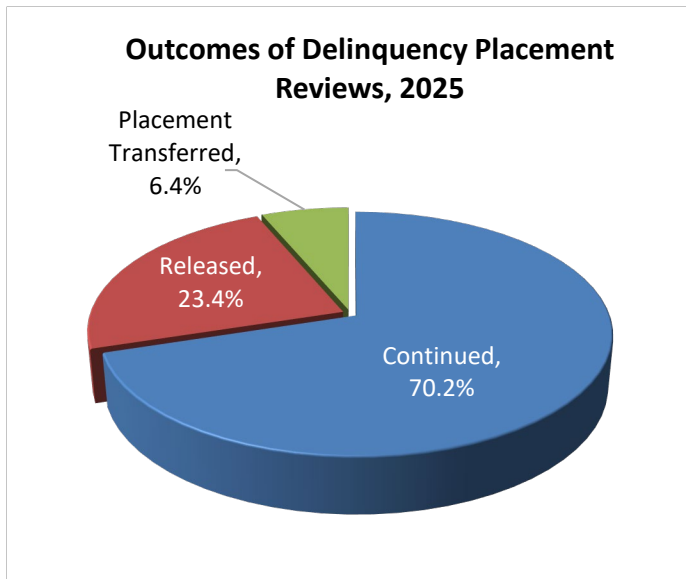

Outcomes of Delinquency Placement Reviews, 2025

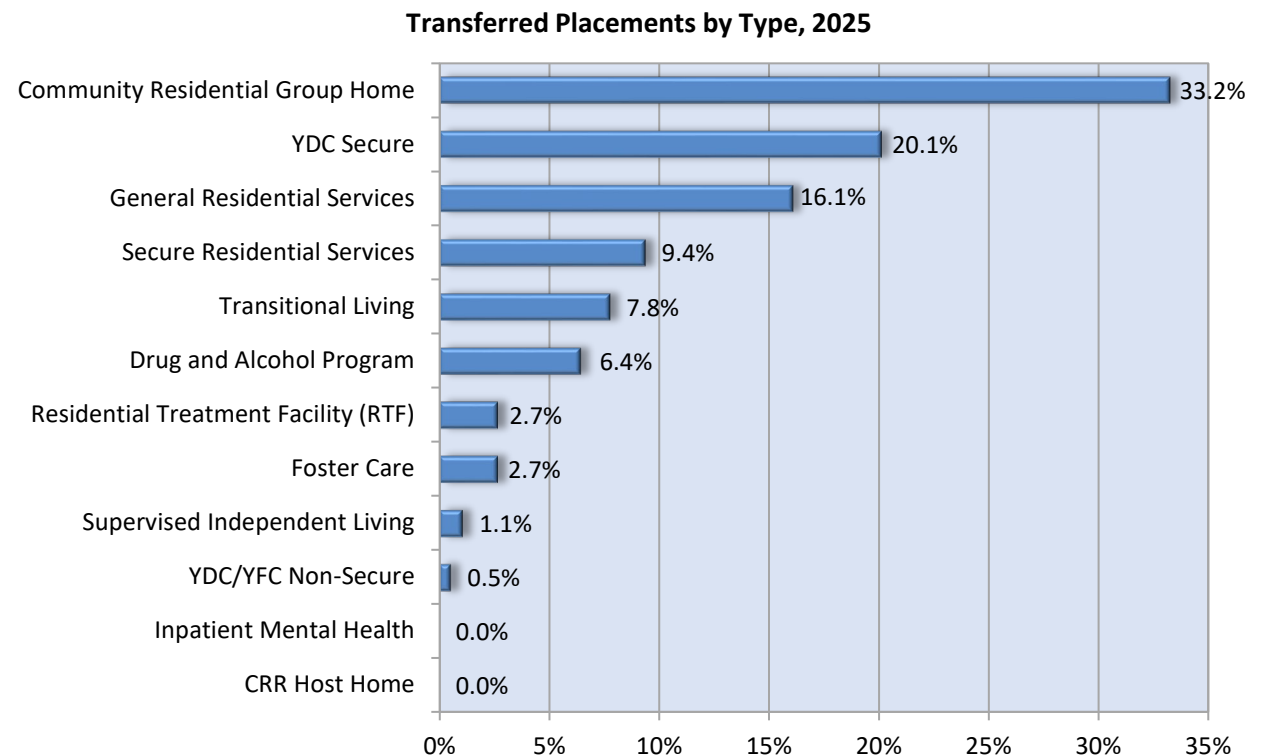
Less than 10% of placement reviews resulted in a transfer to another placement in 2025.



A placement review is a hearing conducted by the court regarding a previous disposition which resulted in out-of-home placement.

The majority of delinquency placement review proceedings resulted in an order of Continued in Previous Placement (70.2%). Released from Placement was the outcome in 23.4% of placement reviews, and Transferred to Another Placement occurred in 6.4% of placement reviews.

In the small percentage of placement reviews in which a transfer to another placement was ordered, most transfers were to a Community Residential Service/Group Home.



Section 7: Dependency Dispositions

Dependency Dispositions, 2025

Most dependency cases resulted in an informal adjustment in 2025.

Since 1991, the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission has collected information on dependency cases processed by juvenile probation departments. These figures do not reflect the total number of dependency cases in the Commonwealth. For the purpose of the annual report, a dependency case is defined as a new referral that is processed by the juvenile probation department that does not have accompanying delinquency allegations.

Only the counties that report dependency dispositions are shown in the tables in this section.

Most dependency cases resulted in an Informal Adjustment (59.7%). Warned and Counseled (19.5%) and Placement (12.8%) dispositions were the next most common outcomes among dependency cases.

The "Other" category includes dispositions of Transfer to Another Juvenile Court, Accepted Courtesy Supervision, Community Service Only, and Referred to Another Agency/Individual.

Dependency Dispositions by Age, 2025

Sixteen-year-olds account for the majority of dependency dispositions in 2025.

Sixteen-year-olds accounted for 23.5% of all dependency dispositions in 2025, representing the most dependency dispositions for any age group. Youth aged 17 accounted for 19.5%, while 15-year-olds accounted for 16.8% of the dependency dispositions.

Chapter 3 – Juvenile Justice Trends

Overview

As Pennsylvania systematically integrates data-driven policies and practices at every stage of the juvenile justice system, stakeholders continually track the performance and outcomes of such activities to ensure they are promoting positive outcomes for youth. These metrics provide a clear picture of the impact of various initiatives on key justice measures, such as the crime rate and recidivism.

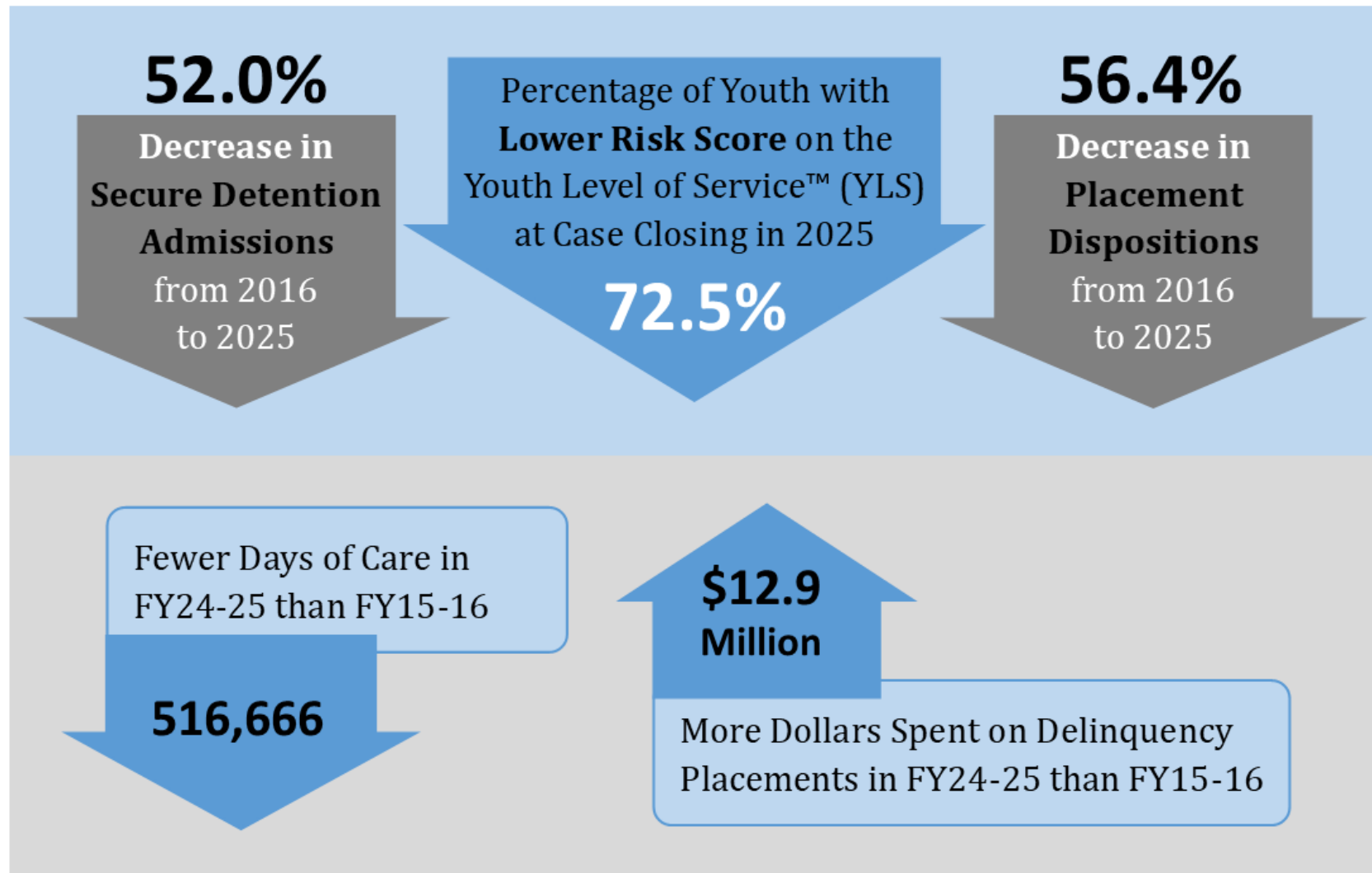
In this chapter, longitudinal data are presented to demonstrate long-term changes over time at several key decision points throughout the system, including arrest, written allegation, secure detention, disposition, and placement. While Chapters 1 and 2 of this report include five years of trend data, this chapter includes 10 years to allow for a more robust analysis of change over time.

This chapter also provides a summary of the impact of the juvenile justice system on Pennsylvania's youth, as measured by the change in the youths' risk level and score on the YLS from the initial assessment to the closing assessment, as well as recidivism. The figures in this chapter related to these two measures only provide a small snapshot of these important juvenile justice system outcomes. The reader is encouraged to visit the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission website to review the 2025 Outcome Measures Report and the various recidivism studies: [Outcome Measures Report](#) and [Recidivism Report](#).

In addition to drawing upon data retrieved from the PaJCMS, this section also utilizes data collected by the Pennsylvania State Police Uniform Crime Reporting System (arrest figures); the United States Census Bureau (juvenile population figures); the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services' Office of Children, Youth, and Families (delinquency placement days of care and expenditures); and the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts (recidivism rates). Given the variety of external sources utilized for the figures in this chapter, county-level statistics are not available in the Appendix.

Finally, the reader should be cautioned that beginning in 2020, figures in this chapter were likely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Key Juvenile Justice Trends



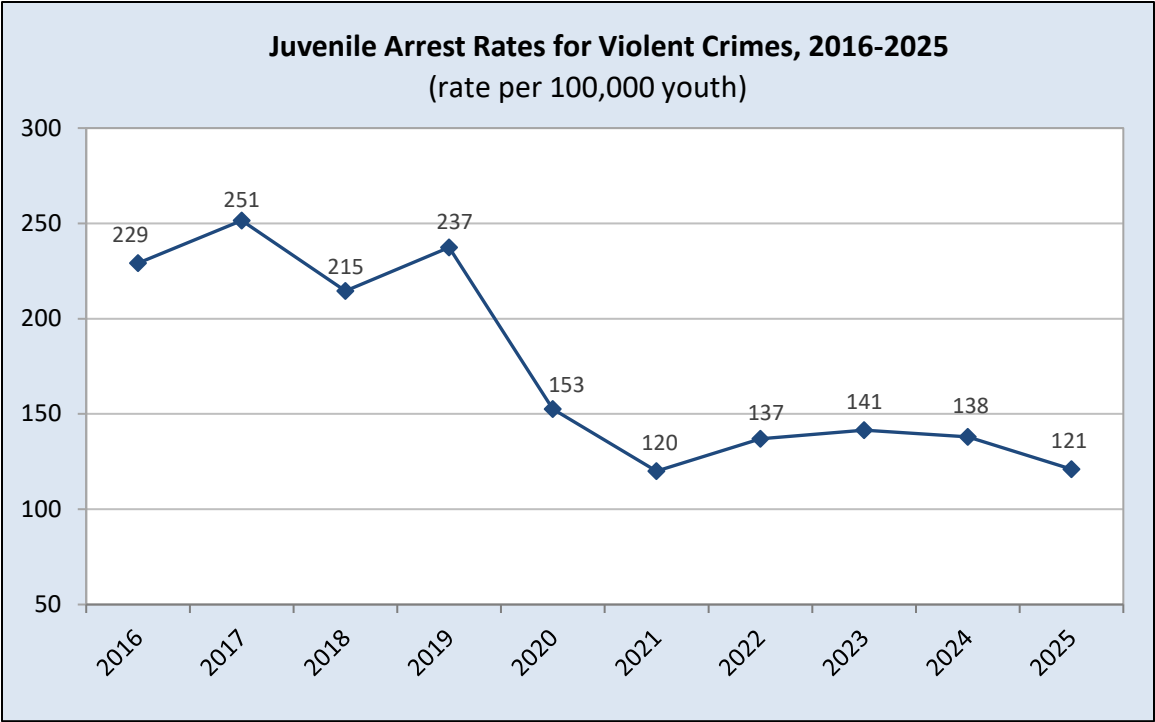
Section 1: Arrest Rates for Violent Crimes

1. The unit of count for this section of the report is based on an arrest. Any one juvenile may be involved in a number of arrests within a calendar year. An arrest does not automatically result in a written allegation to the juvenile justice system. In addition, a youth may be referred to the juvenile justice system without being arrested. Finally, a youth may be arrested on more than one occasion and receive only one written allegation to the juvenile justice system. Therefore, the reader is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret arrests as the number of youth who are referred to the juvenile justice system or the number of offenses.
2. Arrests in this section occurred between January 1, 2016, and December 31, 2025.
3. Only the most serious offense is captured in the arrest data.
4. For the purposes of this report, violent crime includes the offenses of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
5. The juvenile population information used to calculate the arrest rate was retrieved from the United States Census Bureau. Before the *2022 Pennsylvania Juvenile Court Annual Report*, population figures were retrieved from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. From the 2022 report forward, population figures are now retrieved from the United States Census Bureau. As such, the reader is cautioned when comparing population figures in the 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025 reports to previous *Pennsylvania Juvenile Court Annual Reports*. At the time of publication of this report, the United States Census Bureau had not yet published 2025 population figures. Consequently, 2024 population figures were utilized, which can be retrieved here: <https://data.census.gov>.
6. The violent crime arrest rate per 100,000 youth is calculated by dividing the total number of arrests for violent crimes by the total number of juveniles aged 10–17 in the state, then multiplying the resulting figure by 100,000.
7. The arrest data in this section were retrieved from the Pennsylvania State Police’s Uniform Crime Reporting System (UCR). These figures are available online at <https://www.ucr.pa.gov/PAUCRSPUBLIC/home/index>.
8. Data for this report were compiled from the Pennsylvania State Police’s Uniform Crime Reporting System and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on March 12, 2026. Any changes to those systems after this date may not be included in these statistics. The numbers published in this report, therefore, may not reflect current numbers within the respective systems.

Juvenile Arrest Rates for Violent Crimes, 2016-2025

The juvenile violent crime arrest rate has fallen sharply over the last decade.

Between 2016 and 2025, the juvenile arrest rate for violent crime decreased 47.2%, from 229 arrests per 100,000 youth in 2016 to 121 arrests per 100,000 youth in 2025. The violent crime arrest rate per 100,000 youth decreased 12.3% from 2024 to 2025.

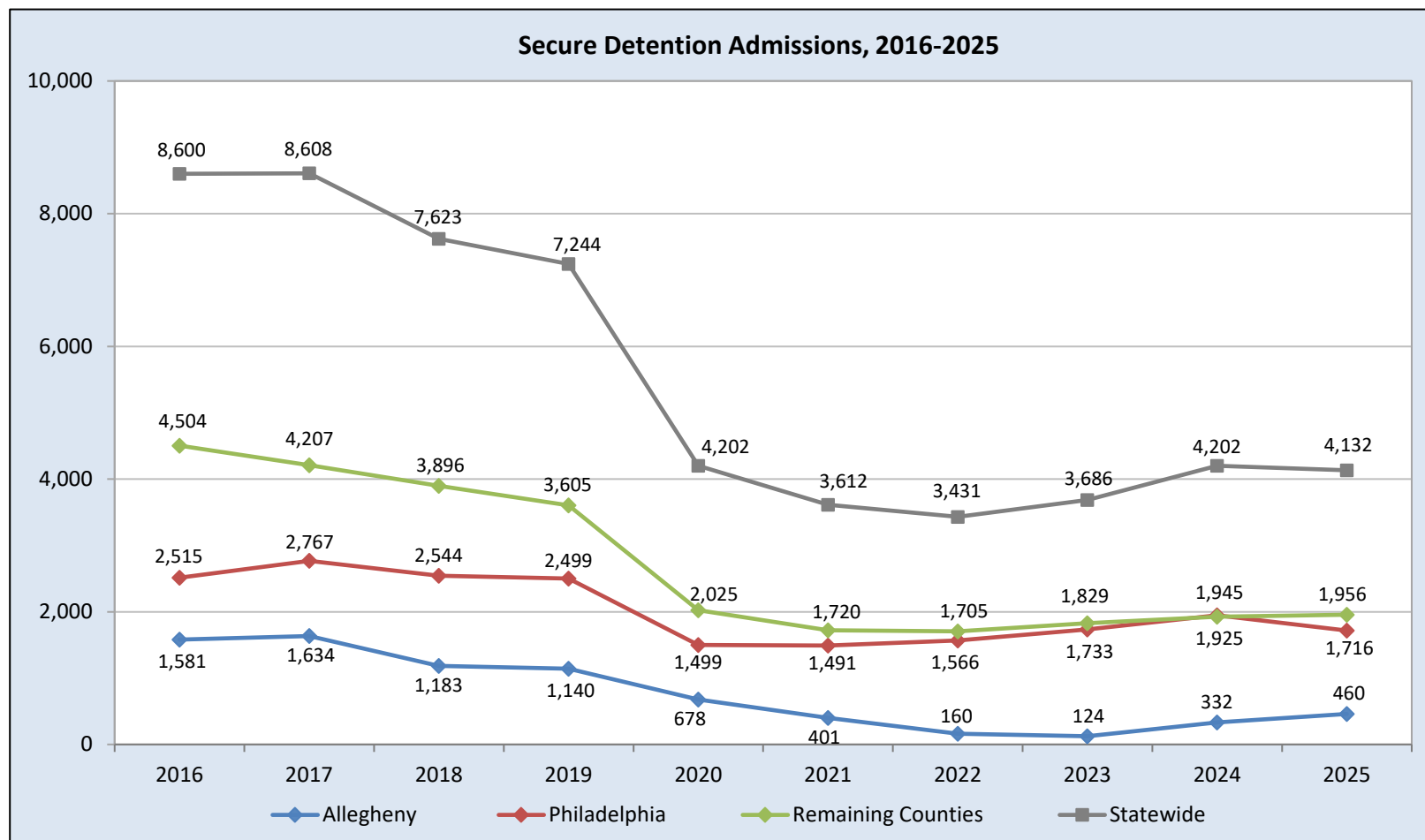
Section 2: Secure Detention

1. Beginning in 2019, the detention data contained in this report was extracted from the PaJCMS. Prior to 2019, this data was extracted from the secure detention database at the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research, which was populated with information reported directly from juvenile detention centers each month.
2. When interpreting the data contained in these tables, the reader should note the following:
 - The unit of count is the admission of a youth to a secure detention center.
 - A juvenile who is admitted to a secure detention center and subsequently transferred to another secure detention center without release is counted as two admissions.
3. Secure detention admissions in this section occurred between January 1, 2016, and December 31, 2025.

Secure Detention Admissions, 2016-2025

Reflecting a substantial long-term decline, secure detention admissions have fallen by more than 50% since 2016.

Since 2016, secure detention admissions have declined 52.0%. There were 4,468 fewer secure detention admissions in 2025 compared to 2016. Allegheny County detention admissions decreased by 70.9% from 2016 to 2025, while Philadelphia County admissions decreased 31.8% during the same time period. Overall, statewide admissions, excluding Allegheny and Philadelphia counties, decreased by 56.6% from 2016 to 2025.



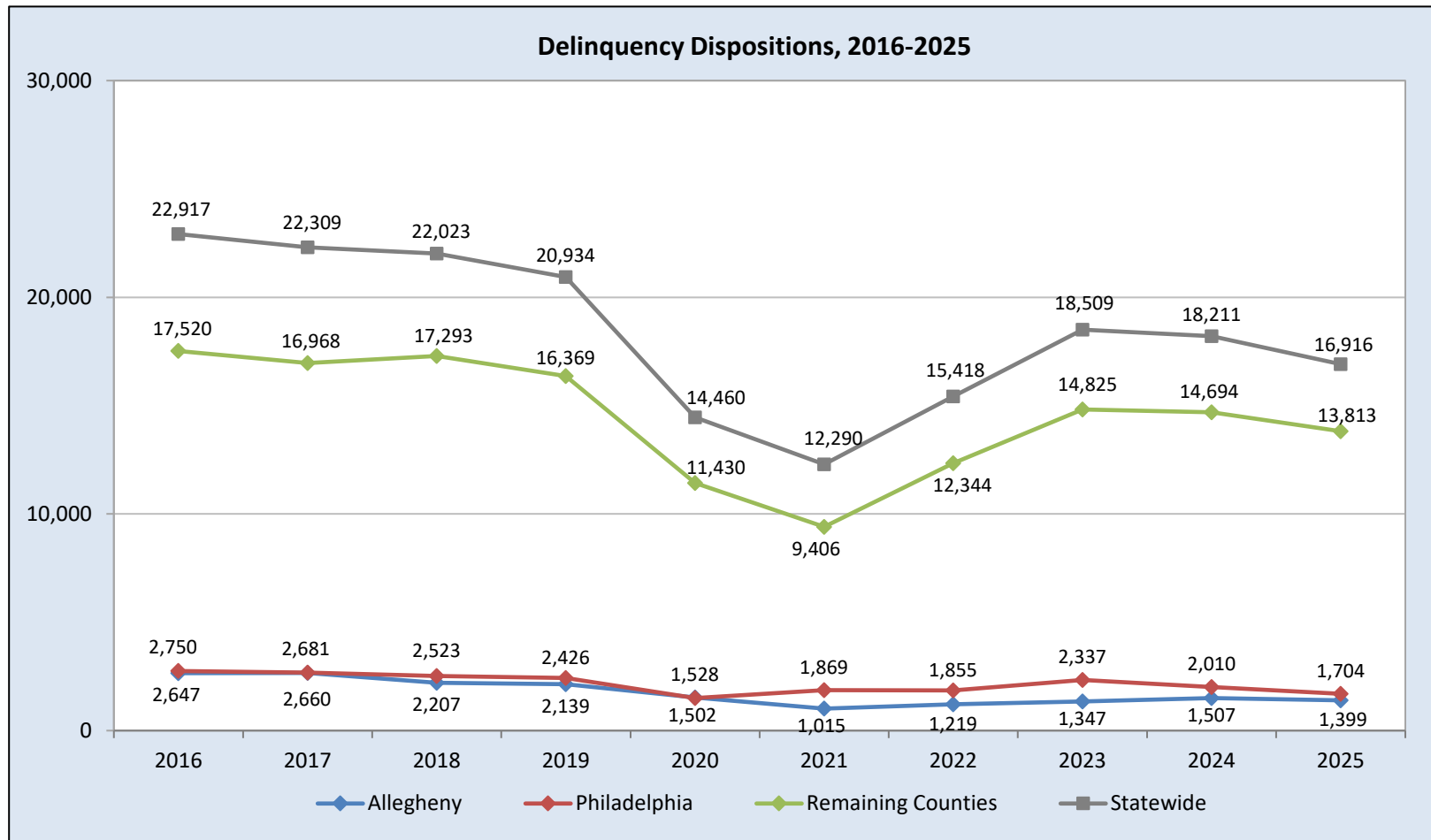
Section 3: Delinquency Dispositions

1. The unit of count for this section of the report is the disposition. A disposition is defined as an allegation of delinquency disposed of by the juvenile probation department and/or the court. Any one youth may be involved in a number of dispositions within a calendar year containing multiple allegations. In addition, a juvenile may be referred on more than one occasion and receive only one disposition. Therefore, the reader is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret dispositions as the number of juveniles who are processed by the court or the number of offenses.
2. Dispositions in this section occurred between January 1, 2016, and December 31, 2025.
3. The juvenile population information used to calculate the percentage of juvenile population receiving delinquency dispositions was retrieved from the United States Census Bureau. Before the *2022 Pennsylvania Juvenile Court Annual Report*, population figures were retrieved from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. From the 2022 report forward, population figures are now retrieved from the United States Census Bureau. As such, the reader is cautioned when comparing population figures in the 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025 reports to previous *Pennsylvania Juvenile Court Annual Reports*. At the time of publication of this report, the United States Census Bureau had not yet published 2025 population figures. Delinquency Dispositions, 2016-2025

Despite rebounds after the pandemic, delinquency dispositions remain well below pre-pandemic levels.

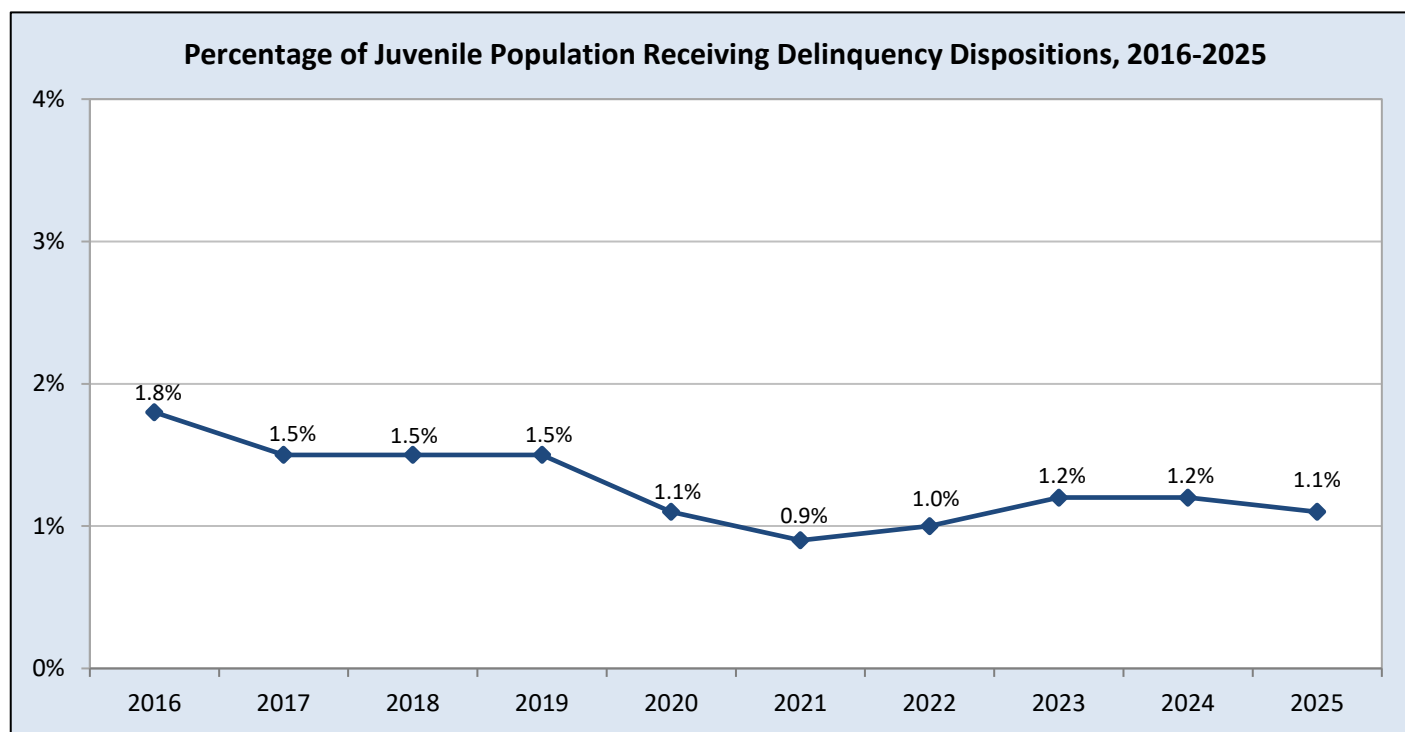
As reported in Chapter 2 of this report, delinquency dispositions increased 37.6% statewide between 2021 and 2025. Since 2016, however, statewide delinquency dispositions decreased 26.2%. In Allegheny County, delinquency dispositions decreased 47.1%, while Philadelphia County experienced a decrease of 38.0%. In the remaining counties, delinquency dispositions decreased 21.2%. Statewide, there were 6,001 fewer dispositions in 2025 compared to 2016.



Percentage of Juvenile Population Receiving Delinquency Dispositions, 2016-2025

Despite post-pandemic upticks, the delinquency disposition rate per juvenile population was significantly lower in 2025 compared to 2016.

It is important to determine the reduction of dispositions when accounting for changes in the youth population. This determination is accomplished by calculating the percentage of the juvenile population that received a delinquency disposition. In Chapter 2 of this report, it was noted that between 2021 and 2025, the rate of juvenile delinquency dispositions as a percentage of the Pennsylvania juvenile population increased 22.2%, from 0.9% to 1.1%. In the same period, Pennsylvania delinquency disposition rate per juvenile population declined by 38.9%, from 1.8% to 1.1%.

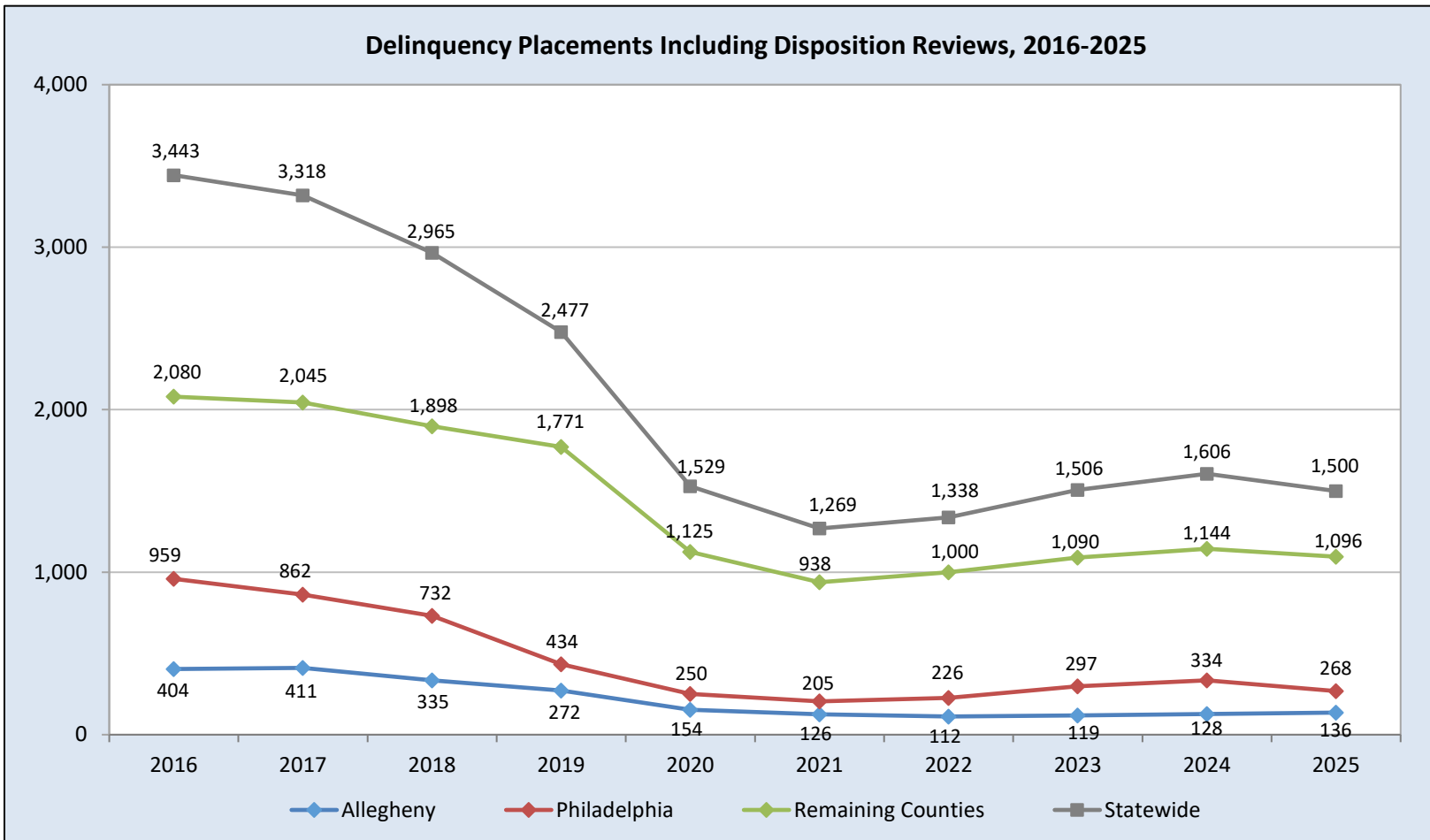

Delinquency Placements, 2016-2025

Delinquency placements remain well below pre-pandemic levels.

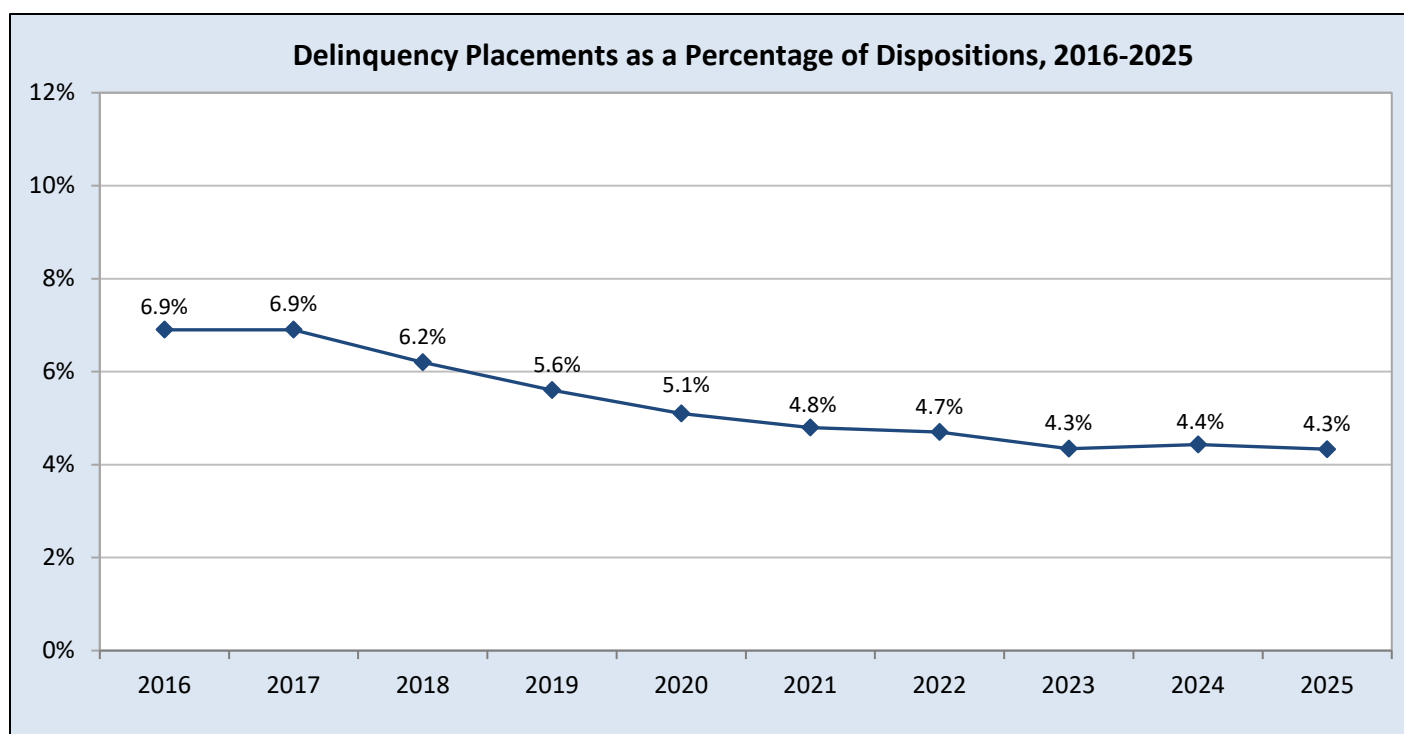
Delinquency placements are typically reserved for youth who have committed the most serious offenses. As reported in Chapter 2 of this report, juvenile delinquency placements increased 30.7% between 2021 and 2025. Compared to 2016, however, delinquency placement figures in 2025 were still well below pre-pandemic levels. In fact, delinquency placements were 56.4% lower in 2025 compared to 2016. Statewide, the number of delinquency placements was reduced by 1,943 in 2025 compared to 2016.



Delinquency Placements as a Percentage of Dispositions, 2016-2025

Delinquency placements as a percentage of dispositions remained at historic lows since 2016.

It is important to determine the reduction of placement dispositions when controlling for changes in the total number of overall dispositions. This determination is accomplished by calculating the percentage of total dispositions that resulted in a placement disposition. As previously shown in this report, over the last five years, delinquency placements as a percentage of total dispositions have decreased from 4.8% in 2021 to 4.3% in 2025. Between 2016 and 2025, Pennsylvania saw a 37.2% decrease from 6.9% of all dispositions in 2016 to 4.3% of all dispositions in 2025.



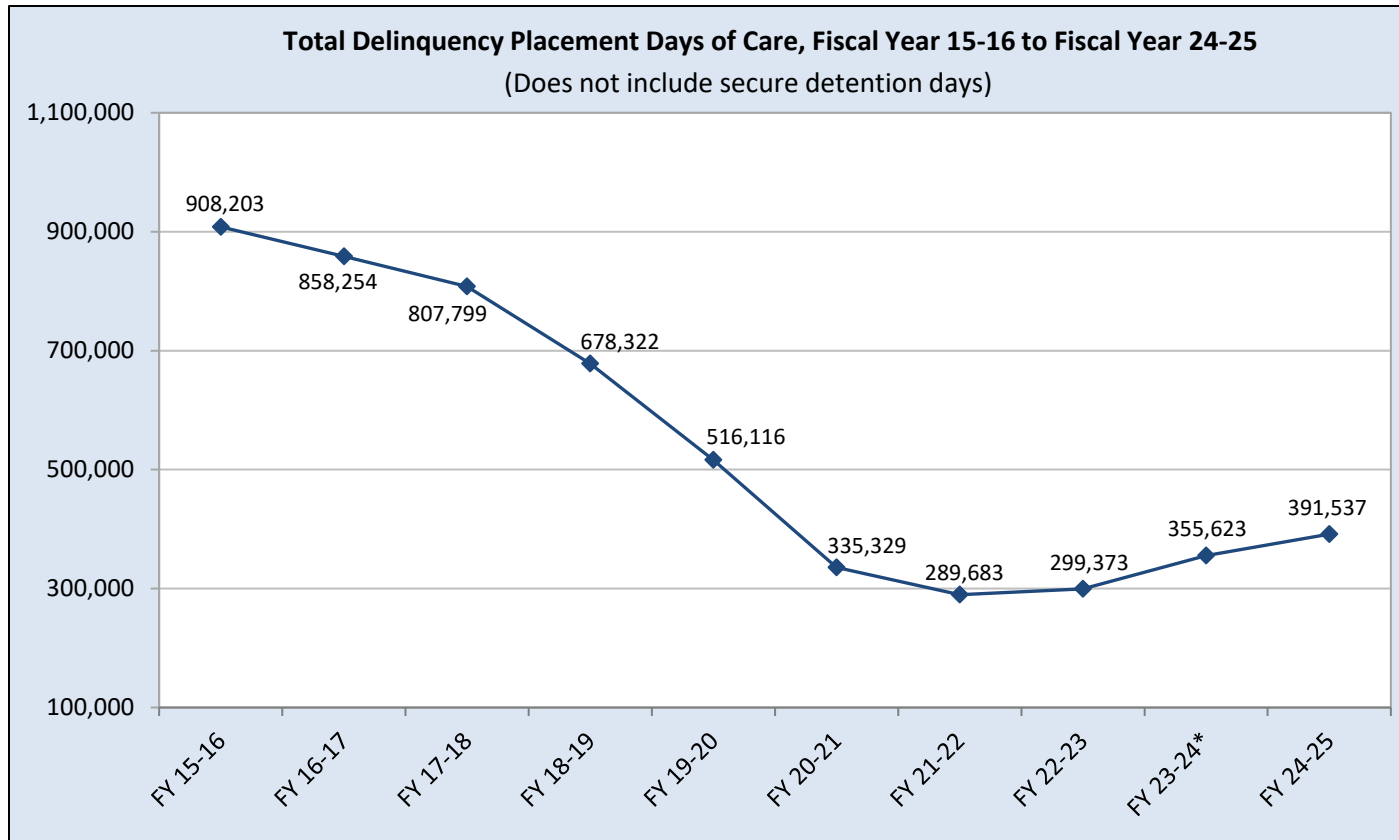
Section 4: Delinquency Placement Days of Care and Delinquency Expenditures

1. The information for this section was provided to the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission by the Department of Human Services' Office of Children, Youth, and Families (OCYF). This information is compiled during the annual Needs-Based Plan and Budget process.
2. For the purposes of this report, days of care are defined as the total number of days the juvenile spent outside their home while in residential placement.
3. Detention days of care and expenditures are excluded from these figures.
4. Please note that data are presented by fiscal year, not calendar year.
5. The data contained in this section are from FY15-16 through FY24-25.

Total Delinquency Placement Days of Care, Fiscal Year 15-16 to Fiscal Year 24-25

Youth are spending less time in residential placement, with recent years indicating a leveling off rather than continued sharp declines.

As noted in Section 3 of this chapter, delinquency placement dispositions were down 56.4% since 2016. Days of care were also down significantly. Between FY15-16 and FY24-25, placement days of care decreased 56.9%. There were 516,666 fewer days of care in FY24-25 than FY15-16. This reflects progress on two fronts – fewer youth are being placed out of home, and most youth placed outside the home experience fewer days of care.



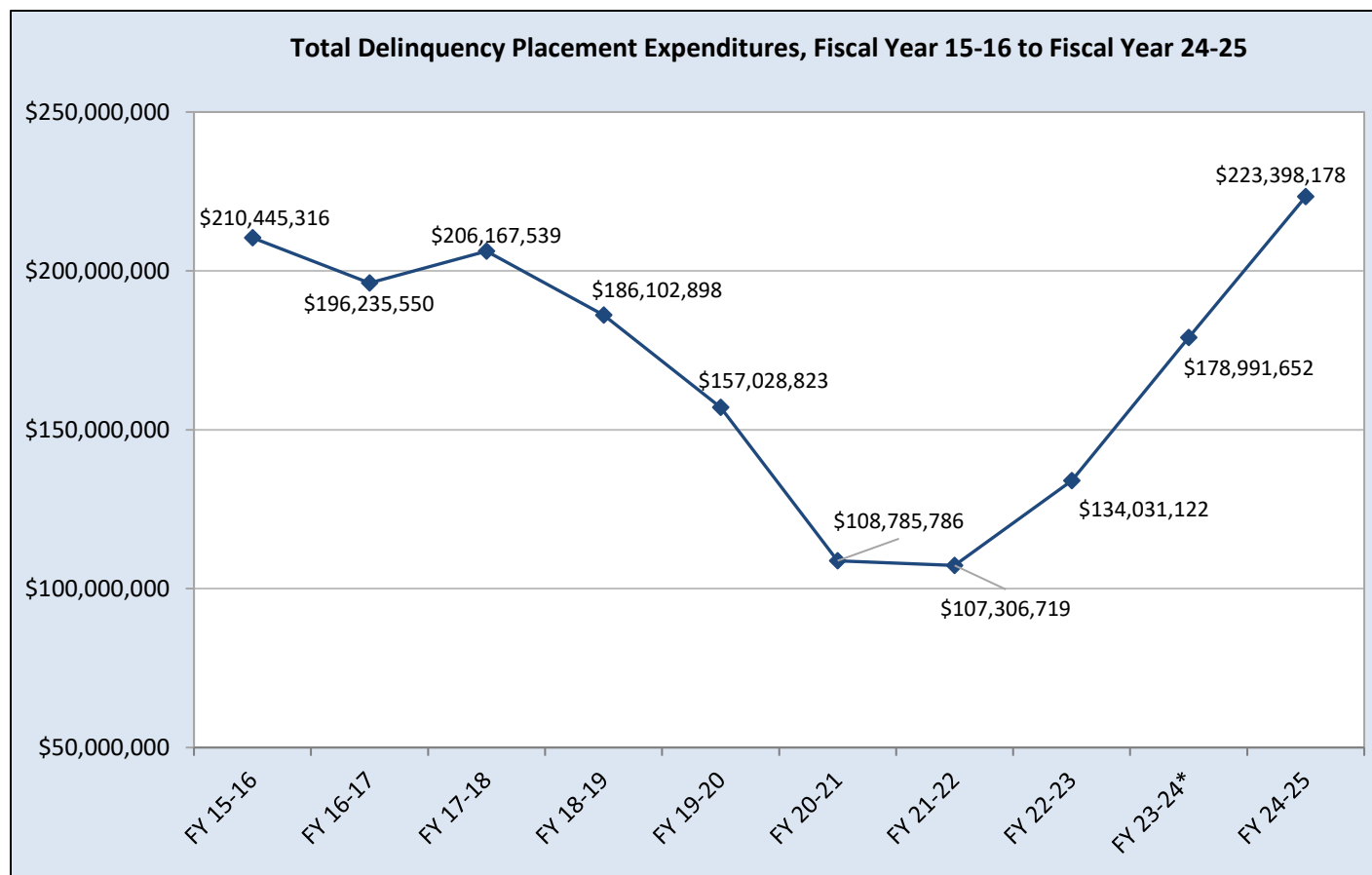

Total Delinquency Placement Expenditures, Fiscal Year 15-16 to Fiscal Year 24-25

Despite fluctuations over time, recent years have brought costs back to their highest since FY15-16.

Juvenile delinquency placement expenditures increased by 6.2% from FY15-16 through FY24-25. In FY24-25, \$12,952,862 more was spent on delinquency placements compared to FY15-16. This increase was driven by higher placement costs and longer periods of care, reflecting the greater use of specialized services for youth with complex treatment and behavioral health needs.

Section 5: Juvenile Justice System Outcomes: Risk Reduction and Recidivism

Risk Reduction

As noted in Chapter 1, the use of the YLS is the cornerstone of Pennsylvania’s Juvenile Justice System Enhancement Strategy (JJSES). The YLS is an actuarial risk assessment tool used for juvenile offenders. In addition to being administered at the time they enter the juvenile justice system, best practice also dictates that juveniles be reassessed at regular intervals while under juvenile court supervision and again at the time of case closure. Changes in scores between the juvenile’s initial YLS assessment and the juvenile’s case closing YLS assessment serve as one indicator of the impact of a juvenile’s involvement in the juvenile justice system. Therefore, decreases in risk scores indicate a positive outcome for the youth.

1. The unit of count for this analysis is a juvenile with a case closed from a Pennsylvania juvenile probation department who had outcome measures completed.
2. Only juveniles with both an initial YLS assessment and a case closing YLS assessment captured in the PaJCMS were included in these figures.
3. The figures in this chapter are for youth closed between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2025.

Recidivism

Recidivism is another measure utilized by stakeholders to determine the impact of a juvenile's involvement in the juvenile justice system. One of the main tenets of the Balanced and Restorative Justice (BARJ) mission of the Pennsylvania juvenile justice system is that youth should leave the system with the tools to become law-abiding citizens. Determining the youth's return to criminal behavior (recidivism) is one way to calculate the degree to which this BARJ goal is met.

Since the beginning of the implementation of the JJSES, the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission has tracked the recidivism rates of all youth with cases closed from the juvenile justice system. These analyses serve two purposes. First, since the core premise of the JJSES is that recidivism rates can be reduced through the implementation of evidence-based practices, these analyses establish an ongoing, consistent recidivism benchmark. Second, these analyses allow stakeholders to examine differences between recidivists and non-recidivists in terms of demographics, risk level, disposition history, and other key variables to identify factors most closely associated with recidivism in the Pennsylvania juvenile justice system.

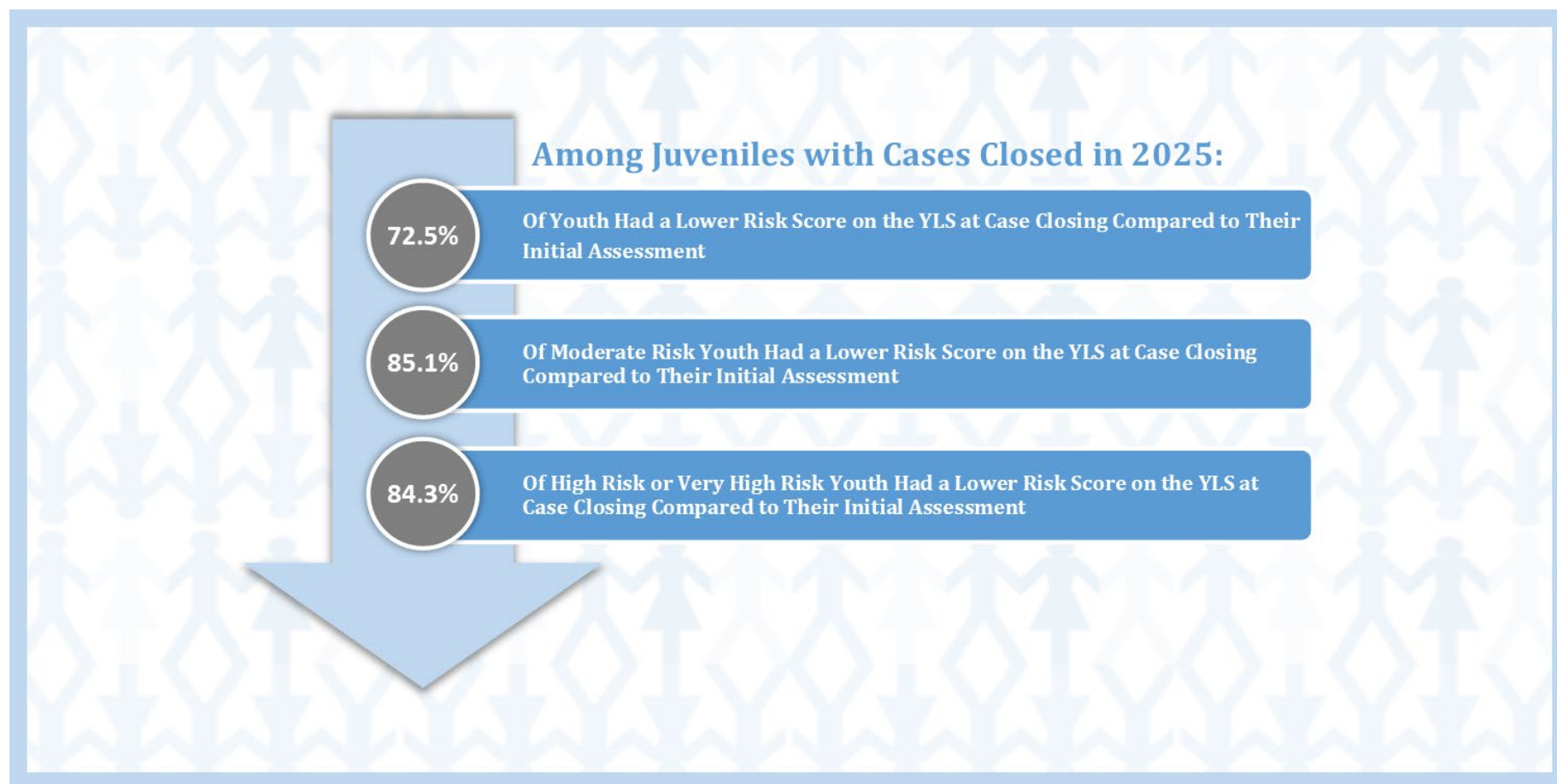
A benchmark recidivism rate pre-JJSES implementation was established using years 2007 through 2010. Since then, the recidivism rates of juveniles closed for services from years 2011 through 2022 have been analyzed.

1. The unit of count for this analysis is a juvenile who was closed from a Pennsylvania juvenile probation department who had been under some form of juvenile justice supervision. Any one youth may have a number of arrests, written allegations, and dispositions at the time of their case closing.
2. Recidivism rates in this section were based on youth who were closed from juvenile probation departments between January 1, 2007, and December 31, 2022.
3. For the purposes of this report, recidivism is defined as: a subsequent delinquency adjudication in juvenile court or conviction in criminal court for either a misdemeanor or felony offense within two years of case closure.
4. Subsequent adjudication of delinquency information was retrieved from the PaJCMS. Subsequent conviction information was provided by the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.
5. The recidivism rate is calculated by dividing the total number of youth with a subsequent delinquency adjudication in juvenile court or conviction in criminal court for either a misdemeanor or felony offense within two years of case closure by the total number of juveniles closed.

Risk Reduction as Measured by the Change in Youth Level of Service Score

Despite fluctuations over time, recent years have brought costs back to their highest since FY14-15.

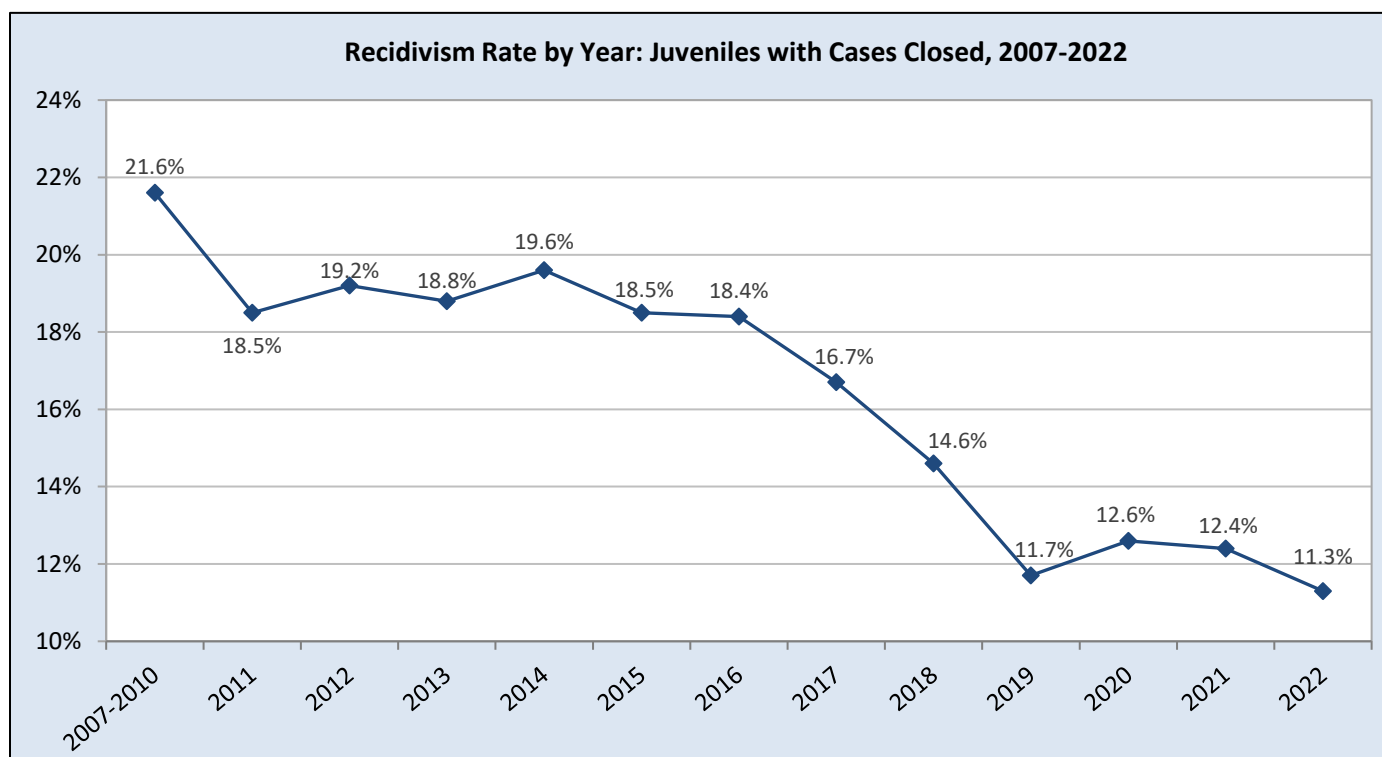
In 2025, among all youth closed from juvenile probation departments who had both an initial YLS score and a case closing YLS score, 72.5% had a lower risk to reoffend score at case closing compared to their initial assessment. Among just those youth identified as moderate risk to reoffend on their initial assessment, 85.1% had a lower risk to reoffend score at case closing. Finally, among just those youth identified as high/very high risk to reoffend on their initial assessment, 84.3% had a lower risk to reoffend score at case closing.



Recidivism Rate by Year: Juveniles with Cases Closed, 2007-2022

Pennsylvania's recidivism rate continues to be its lowest since the state began tracking it in 2007, despite recent upticks.

In the benchmark years of 2007-2010, the statewide recidivism rate was 21.6%. This figure dropped to 18.5% in 2011 and remained relatively consistent through 2016. Starting with juveniles whose cases were closed in 2017, the recidivism rate began to decrease to a low of 11.7% in 2019. The Pennsylvania recidivism rate increased to 12.6% in 2020 before dropping for two consecutive years to 11.3% in 2022. This shows an overall reduction in recidivism of 47.7% between 2007 and 2022.

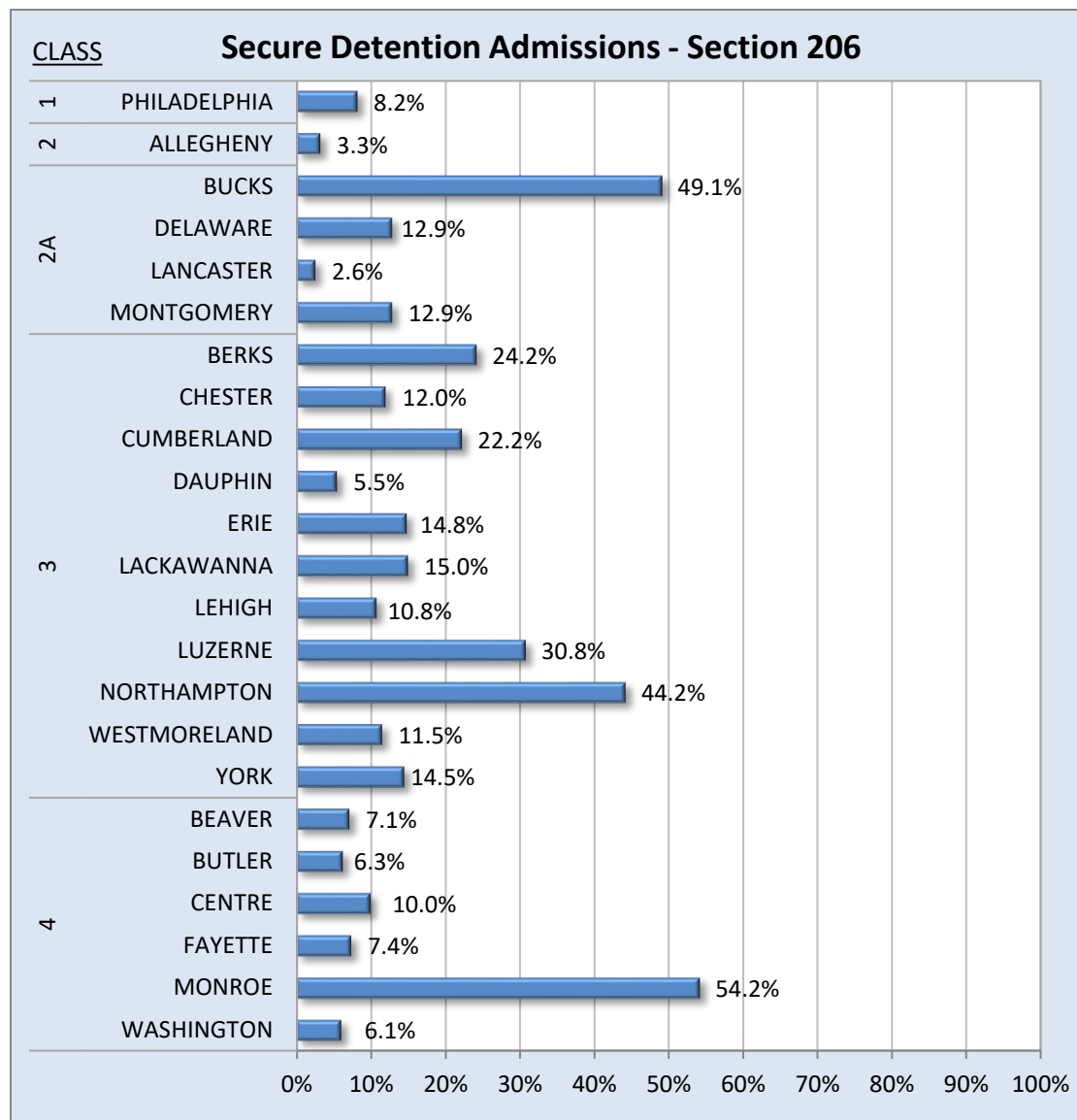

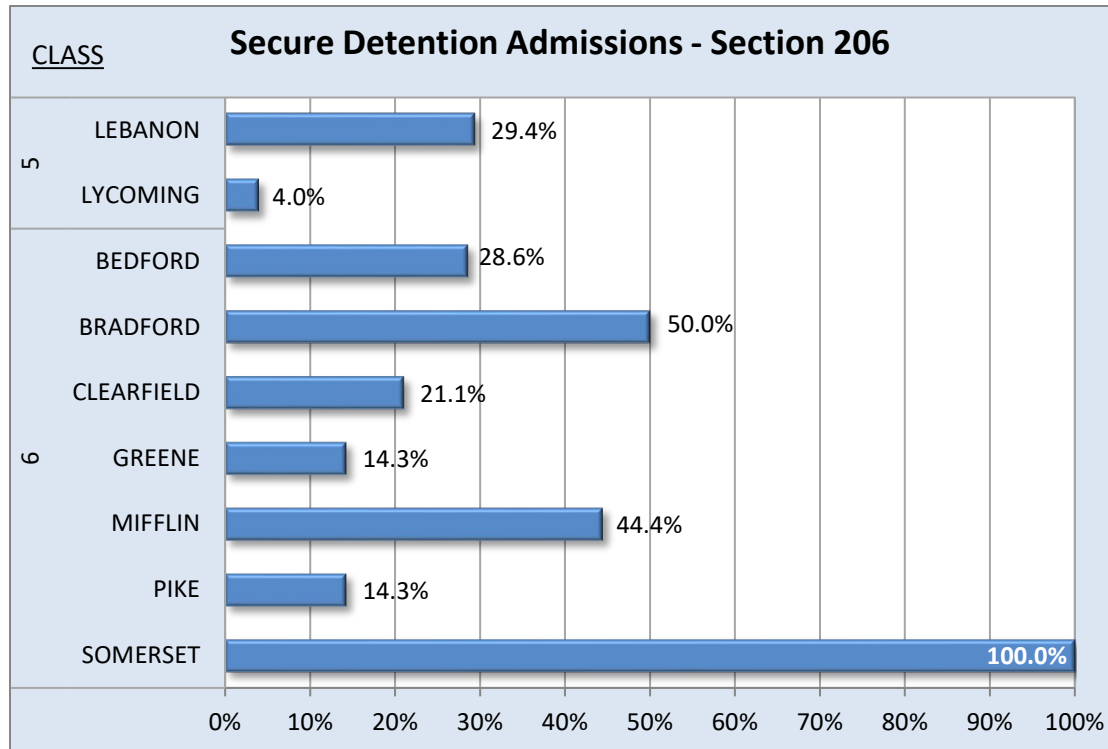

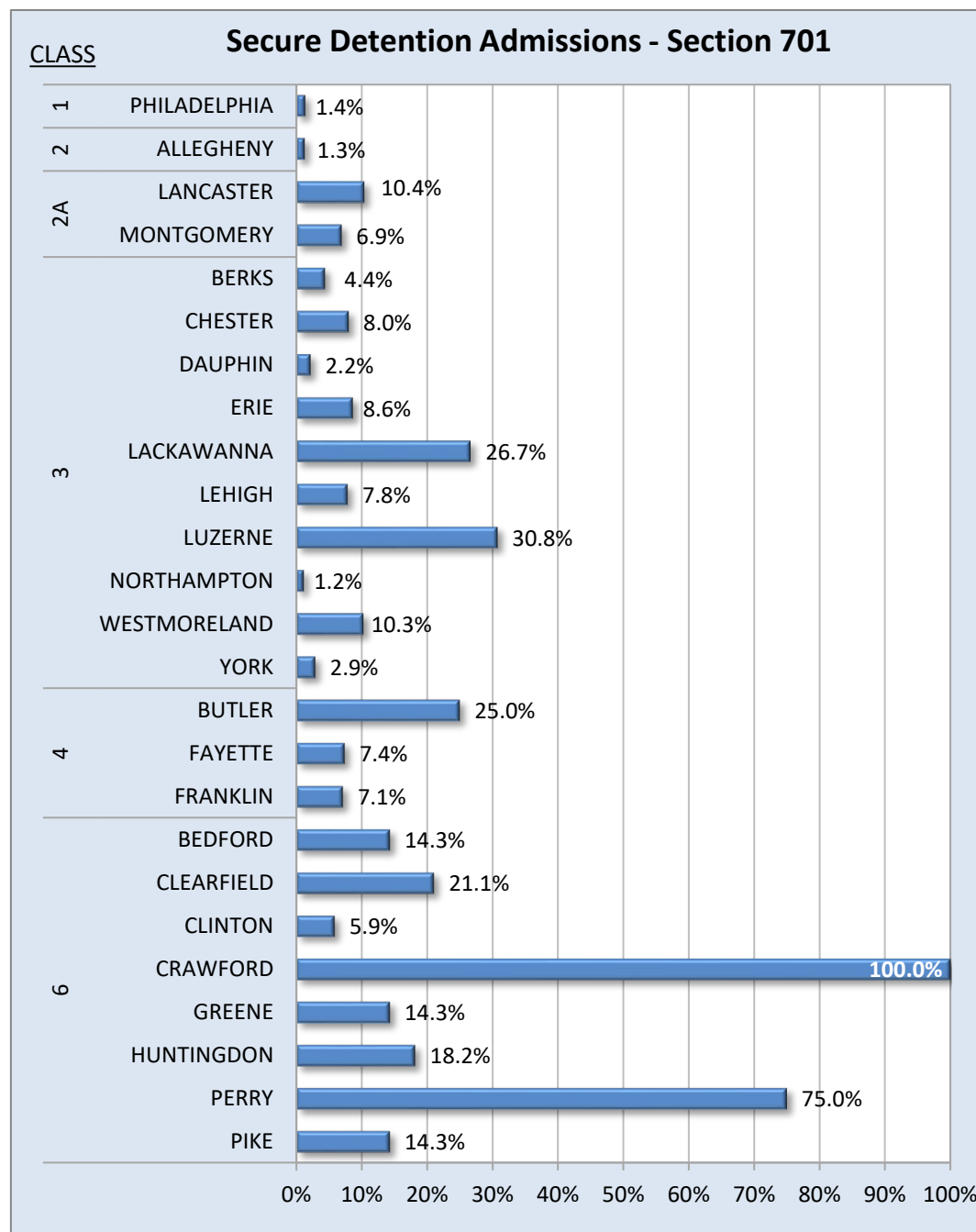

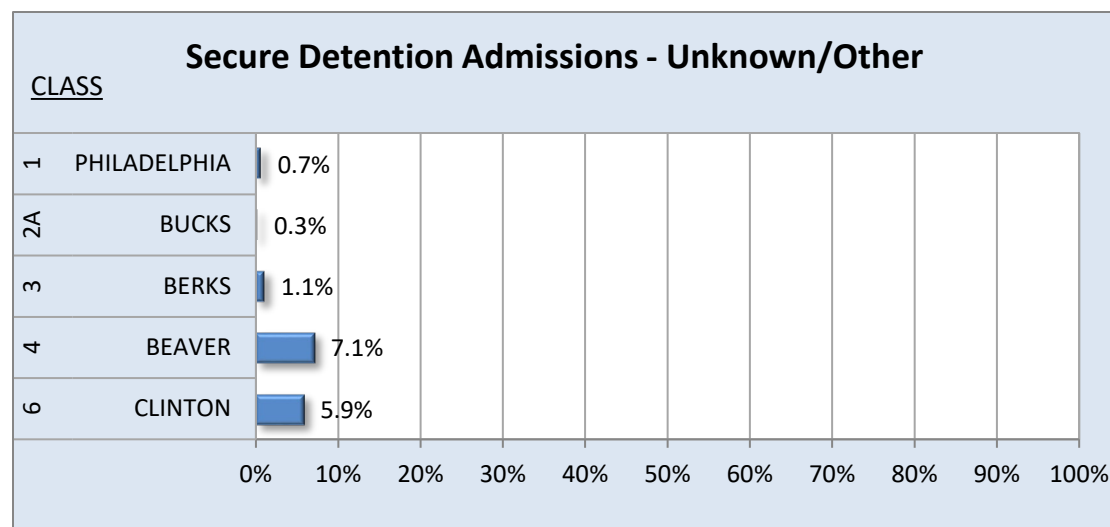
Secure Detention Admissions by Unknown/Other Code and County Class, 2025

Glossary

Advanced Communication Technology: Any communication equipment that is used as a link between parties in physically separate locations and includes, but is not limited to, systems providing for two-way simultaneous audio-visual communication, closed circuit television, telephone and facsimile equipment, and electronic mail.

Delinquency Allegation: The document completed by a law enforcement officer or other person that is necessary to allege a juvenile has committed an act of delinquency. It is synonymous with a “court referral,” though written allegation is the preferred language.

Dependency Allegation: The document alleging that a child is without proper parental care or control; subsistence; education as required by law; or other care or control necessary for their physical, mental, or emotional health.

Detention: A secure holding facility utilized to detain a juvenile temporarily. The term *detention* when used in this report does not include shelter care.

Disposition: The action/decision implemented, or treatment plan decided upon, by a juvenile court in response to a delinquency allegation. This is similar to the sentence imposed in criminal court.

Disposition Review Hearing: A hearing that must occur every six months for juveniles under court supervision for the purpose of ensuring that the youth is receiving necessary treatment and services and that the terms and conditions of the disposition are being met. In this report, disposition review hearings involving out-of-home placement are referred to as placement review hearings (see definition below).

Juvenile: A person who has attained 10 years of age and is not yet 21 years of age who is alleged to have, upon or after the juvenile’s 10th birthday, committed a delinquent act before reaching 18 years of age or who is alleged to have violated the terms of juvenile probation prior to termination of juvenile court supervision.

Out-of-Home Placement (or Placement): An out-of-home program utilized as a juvenile court disposition. Included in this definition are placements into group homes, general residential programs, secure residential care, foster care, drug and alcohol programs, residential treatment facilities (RTF), Youth Development Centers (YDC), and Youth Forestry Camps (YFC).

Placement Review Hearing: A hearing that must occur every six months for juveniles residing in out-of-home placement for the purpose of ensuring that the youth is receiving necessary treatment and services and that the terms and conditions of the placement disposition are being met.

School-Related Offense: Any offense committed in the school setting, including in the school, on the school grounds, in school vehicles, at a designated bus stop, or at any activity sponsored, supervised, or sanctioned by the school. Failure to comply offenses are not included.

Substantiated Offense: Any petitioned offense the court finds the youth committed.
