Good morning. My name is Jake Sitler, and I'm the founder of Endo — Pennsylvania's first hemp-derived cannabis beverage company.

We've safely sold well over one million cans nationwide.

We're a top-selling THC beverage in over 100 Total Wine stores across the country, and we recently landed one of the largest direct distribution deals to date for a cannabis beverage brand.

We've done this without outside investors — just hard work, care, and a deep commitment to compliance, safety, and community.

We employ more than 10 Pennsylvanians in Lancaster — including adults with disabilities — and we're currently building Endo Ranch, a full-scale manufacturing and testing facility in York County that will create jobs and help define what responsible cannabis beverage production should look like on a national scale.

But let me be absolutely clear:

The PLCB's advisory notice effectively outlawing hemp-derived Delta-9 has real consequences.

- It has disrupted lawful, compliant commerce
- It has created widespread confusion for retailers, lawmakers, and consumers
- It has cost the Commonwealth millions in lost taxable revenue
- It has deeply harmed struggling PLCB licensees, many of whom could benefit from this emerging category
- It has restricted access to a product Pennsylvanians both want and benefit from
- And most critically, it is actively punishing compliant small businesses like Endo and your own licensees —

while unsafe, untested, and unregulated products continue to be sold unchecked across the state

I stood before you in July of 2023, shortly after Shangy's Beer Authority — who intended to distribute our product in-state — was subjected to a rigorous audit.

On November 2, 2023, Fran O'Brien, under guidance from the Pennsylvania Beer Alliance, submitted a formal legal opinion directly to Chairman Holden.

To this day — we've received no response.

The Department of Agriculture, the agency that actually oversees hemp and naturally occurring delta-9, has not been meaningfully engaged since. That's a problem. But what's worse is this:

Even today, the Department of Agriculture is not enforcing against us — and our product continues to be legally sold under their jurisdiction.

That alone proves the issue:

The PLCB is operating outside its authority, regulating a category that isn't even within its statutory scope.

This isn't just a policy gap — it's a systemic failure, and it's hurting real, local businesses who have done everything right.

Meanwhile, Endo is actively distributing in three states surrounding Pennsylvania, paving the way for what safe, compliant cannabis beverages should look like.

We've earned shelf space. We've built lasting retail relationships. And we've helped shape policy in those markets.

But here in our home state?

We're frozen — in the very place where Endo was born.

A state that *should be* leading is instead lagging behind.

Not because of bad actors — but because of agencies that won't coordinate and won't respond.

Yes, we have legislation in final drafting stages — and I'm incredibly grateful for the bipartisan support that emerged yesterday from multiple senators, who are now working to directly address this inter-agency confusion.

But let's be clear — this can be addressed now.

And it needs to be.

I want to note that while HB 1200 is not a bill we supported, it did one important thing: It brought the issue of PLCB authority and agency coordination into the spotlight.

That's why I'm here today — because this is the moment to start having the conversations that should have happened two years ago.

I fully understand this will fall on multiple agencies to coordinate — but we're not just asking for clarity. We're acting as a bridge.

We're ready to help agencies, lawmakers, and stakeholders create a workable solution that protects consumers, supports local businesses, and keeps Pennsylvania competitive in a rapidly evolving national market.

Pennsylvania has a rare opportunity to support a true, community-rooted brand in becoming a national leader — a family-owned business that reflects everything this industry *should* look like.

We are not asking for special treatment.

We are asking for regulation in the right hands, with the right framework.

We've done everything by the book.

We've waited.

We've engaged in good faith.

Now we need action.

Because silence isn't neutral —		
It's harm.
