#### **MPOETC Operations During COVID-19**

On March 6, 2020 Governor Wolf declared a state of emergency in Pennsylvania and by March 16, 2020 the offices of the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission (MPOETC) had been closed, like most other offices and businesses as the state responded to the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic. Plans were implemented to continue providing essential support to police academies, departments, cadets, and officers even as everyone across the state grappled with how the outbreak was going to affect their own operations. As of March 26, 2020, the offices at MPOETC are currently operating remotely. While all functions related to municipal police officer certifications are still being conducted, users may experience delays due to communications issues and limited access by staff members to certain resources required for processing applications. Below is some additional information addressing specific concerns related to obtaining and maintaining certification as a police officer during this situation.

**MIST** - Most if not all municipal police academies have cancelled classroom-based in-service (MIST) training classes. Despite this, police officers certified by MPOETC will continue to have access to MIST classes on the PA Virtual Training Network (PAVTN.net). Certified officers or their departments should follow instructions on the PAVTN website to request an account. Training that is completed on PAVTN automatically transfers to TACS for use by MPOETC to satisfy mandatory training requirements. There is no cost to access and use PAVTN for this training. Cancellation of in-class MIST instruction will not be considered a valid reason for failing to complete 2020 MIST requirements.

**CPR/AED/First Aid** - Based on the cancellation of refresher classes, MPOETC has extended CPR/AED/First Aid expiration dates for all officers who expire between March 16, 2020 and June 30, 2020. Any officer scheduled to expire between these dates will have until July 1, 2020 to complete their recertification. At this time the PA Department of Health does not recognize online CPR/AED/First Aid training and officers should not attempt to recertify using an online training provider.

**Firearms** - At this time, no accommodations are being made regarding firearms qualification since officers will have until the end of 2020 to complete their annual firearms qualification.

New Certifications – Most certification examination dates have been cancelled and this will cause delays in getting potential officers certified. MPOETC is currently only conducting certification examinations for officers who are hired or have a conditional offer of employment from a police department. These examinations are being scheduled and conducted on a case-by-case basis. Departments wishing to schedule a test date for a hired applicant should send the request via email to <a href="mailto:mpotraining@pa.gov">mpotraining@pa.gov</a>. Applications for officers who have completed all required training and are eligible for certification will continue to be processed as normal, while applications to attend training, and the training activities of most academies, are delayed to varying degrees. Of special note, tele-health examinations for purposes of psychiatric review for Act 120 and Act 235 certifications will be permitted for the duration of the COVID-19 state of emergency, as long as they comply with guidance from the American Psychological Association (<a href="https://www.apa.org/practice/guidelines/telepsychology">https://www.apa.org/practice/guidelines/telepsychology</a>) and the requirements for telemedicine under HIPAA.

#### **Track and Trace**

In 2007, the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearm Act was amended to include the above "Firearms Tracing" provision. 18 Pa.C.S. § 6127 states local law enforcement, upon recovering a firearm from someone not permitted to possess by State or Federal law shall trace the subject firearm. By complying with this law and comprehensively tracing firearms through ATF and notifying PSP, it allows federal, state and local law enforcement to identify gun traffickers, build intelligence, strategically stop trafficking pipelines, and ensure straw purchasers are not legally permitted to buy guns again.

The easiest and most efficient way to comprehensively trace crime guns is by using the ATF's National Tracing Center's eTrace system (<a href="https://etrace.atf.gov/etrace/">https://etrace.atf.gov/etrace/</a>). ATF's Electronic Tracing System (eTrace) is an internet-based system that allows participating law enforcement agencies to submit required firearm traces to the ATF. Authorized users can receive firearm trace results via this same internet web site, search a database of all firearm traces submitted by their individual agency, and perform analytical functions. Opting in to collective data sharing allows more effective use of the database and allows for participating agencies to link purchasers and recoveries that cross county lines.

### **Quarterly Legal Updates**

The Commission recognizes that both statutes and case law can change frequently and throughout the year. While officers take mandatory Legal Update training, many times the officers would have benefitted from knowing about the changes when they happened rather than waiting months to attend the class. To help reduce the time it takes for officers to hear about recent changes to the law, the Commission's quarterly newsletter now includes a synopsis of the most significant recent changes.

#### Commonwealth v. Bowens, \_\_\_A.3d\_\_\_, (Pa.Super. Jan 17, 2020)

"Based on the ruling in this case, any extraction of electronic media from an electronic device seized prior to October 1, 2017 MUST occur within the 48 hours allowed by the search warrant or a new search warrant must be obtained. For electronic devices seized after October 1, 2017, Officers should contact their local District Attorneys for guidance if the extraction cannot occur within the time constraints of the search warrant. Officer should remember to follow MPJA and Pa. Rules of Criminal Procedures guidelines."

#### Act 100 of 2019 (House Bill 1402) (effective January 26, 2020)

Pennsylvania's new law defines sexual extortion as knowingly or intentionally coercing or causing someone to: engage in or simulate sexual conduct; become nude; or make, produce, or disseminate images that depict the person naked or performing or simulating a sexual act.

The law also lists five ways that a person could be considered to have extorted someone for sexually explicit images or conduct:

- 1. Harming or threatening to harm the individual, their reputation, their property, or anything of value to them
- 2. Making or disseminating, or threatening to make or disseminate, a video or image of the individual naked or engaged in a sexual act
- 3. Exposing or threatening to expose information that would result in the individual becoming involved in a criminal or civil proceeding, or would subject them to hatred, embarrassment, or ridicule
- 4. Withholding or threatening to withhold a service, job, or anything of value from the individual
- 5. Causing or threatening to cause a loss or injury to the individual or their family or household member

#### Commonwealth v. Cost, \_\_\_A.3rd\_\_\_\_ (Pa.Super. Jan 22, 2020)

On January 22nd, 2020 the Pennsylvania Supreme Court decided, Commonwealth v. Cost. The brief facts of the case are as follows: Philadelphia Police initiated an interaction with Harold Cost when he was observed in an alley of a residential block. During the interaction the police asked for, and received, identification from Cost. One officer checked Cost through the usual databases, while the other officer talked to Cost. During the talk, the officer inquired if there was anything of concern in Cost's backpack. Cost responded that he had a gun in the backpack. Cost was subsequently arrested for firearms violations.

Cost argued that when the police asked for his ID, and retained it for the purpose of checking his criminal want/warrant status, the interaction transformed from a mere encounter to an investigative detention and that the detention was not supported by reasonable suspicion.

The Supreme Court agreed and opined that, when an officer asks for and retains identification for the purpose of conducting a warrant check, the citizen would not feel free to leave and thus the mere encounter becomes an investigative detention.

Officers should be mindful that, in light of this opinion, asking a citizen for ID is still within the scope of a mere encounter but retention of the ID to conduct a want/warrant check would create an investigative detention situation.

When the request for ID is made during the mere encounter the police officer may be able to mitigate impression of detention by:

- 1. Explaining that the ID will be briefly retained in order to record the citizen's information for documentation purposes.
- 2. Asking the citizen for consent to run a want/warrant check.

#### Officers should remember that:

- 1. When the request for ID is made the citizen has the right to refuse the request.
- 2. If the citizen does consent to the request and gives the officer the ID, the information should be recorded quickly to comply with the stated reason for the request (documentation purposes).
- 3. If the person does not consent to being "run" through the warrant databases the officer cannot "run" the citizen.
- 4. If the person consents to being "run" and there is a "hit" then, at a minimum, reasonable suspicion of criminal activity has been developed.
