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EDUCATORS EDGE

It's been a busy month here at MPOETC! In addition to developing 2026 MIST, we conducted 13 separate Certification exams throughout the Commonwealth. The exam is now fully computerized, and we've had tremendous success delivering it via our web-based platform.

About 80% of all officers in the Commonwealth have completed most, if not all of their required 2025 MIST training. If you haven't completed it yet, set a goal to get it done by the end of the summer. Last year, we had over 250 officers that did not finish their MIST by the end of the year and were not certified after December 31st.

MPOETC is actively revising and enhancing its Control Tactics training program to ensure compliance with Act 120 standards. Per Commission policy, only Act 120certified officers or approved Academy Instructors are authorized to deliver Control Tactics training to municipal police officers. Departments utilizing non-approved instructors risk non-compliance, exposing agencies and officers to significant legal and operational liabilities.

As of June 1, 2025, the deadline for Temporary MIST Control Tactics Instructors to transition to permanent certification has passed. Over 300 individuals have yet to respond to this requirement. If you missed the deadline and wish to be considered as a certified CT instructor, please submit current, unexpired CT/DT certificates and an updated, signed MPO-239 to the MPO training account at ra-

mpotraining@pa.gov A list of approved instructors will be published on our website shortly.

ICER SPOTLIG

In March 2025, City of Johnstown police officers Jared Lefevre and Eric Allen demonstrated exceptional life-saving bravery during a house fire on Steel Street in Old Conemaugh Borough. Responding to heavy smoke around 11 p.m., Officer Lefevre forcibly entered the burning home after noticing a light on the second floor and hearing a woman's voice indicating she couldn't walk. With Officer Allen's assistance, they carried her from the second floor through a back exit as flames spread, ensuring her survival as fire crews and EMS arrived. Deputy Chief Mark Britton praised their courage, noting she "most certainly would have lost her life" without their actions, a sentiment echoed during a City Council recognition on May 15, 2025. Well done gentlemen!







IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS

Changes to the Fingerprint Process

Beginning July 1, 2025, all Act 120 officer and training applicants, to include basic training, waivers, pre-service, academy instructors and directors will be required to use an IdentoGO location for fingerprints to determine eligibility of MPOETC certification.

The change is due to FBI requirements that applicants be provided a privacy notice and a challenge to records notice, as well as an FBI fee requirement. MPOETC does not have the ability to provide these required notices and collect the required necessary fees. IdentoGO centers currently comply with these FBI requirements.

The fingerprint requirements through IdentoGO are only for the purpose of MPOETC to determine if applicants are eligible for certification. Police departments should still print applicants for the purposes of a background investigation to determine suitability for employment as a police officer.

Commission Meeting Highlights

On June 10-11, 2025, the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission held its regular quarterly meeting in Bedford, PA at the Omni Bedford Springs Resort. On Wednesday afternoon, June 10, 2025, the Commissioners held committee meetings to discuss the business of the Commission. On Thursday morning, June 11, 2025, the Commissioners met in an Executive Committee meeting, which was followed by the normal meeting of the full Commission, where they took the following actions:

- The Commission voted to fully reimburse Act 120 Academies for MIST conducted during July through December 2024 and January through June 2025.
- The Commission voted to approve a Mandatory Rifle Qualification Course and a Mandatory Shotgun Qualification Course for officers who carry either or both of those weapons. These new courses will be effective starting January 1, 2026.
- The Commission voted to restrict department level Control Tactics annual training to only current Act 120 certified officers and current Act 120 academy instructors approved by the Commission to conduct Control Tactics instruction.
- The Commission revoked certifications of four officers for convictions of the following offenses: one for theft and forgery; one for possession with intent to deliver, obstruction, hindering apprehension and reckless endangering another; one for institutional sexual assault; and one for strangulation and simple assault.
- The Commission voted to suspend the Act 120 instructor certification of an approved instructor for a period of six months for aggressive and reckless behavior in violation of MPOETC standards.

QUARTERLY LEGAL UPDATES

TYPE: Legal Update

TITLE: PA License to Carry, while being prohibited from possessing firearms.

Content: Pennsylvania State Police v. Drake, 304 A.3d 801 (Pa. Commonwealth Court. 2023)

FACTS: In Pennsylvania State Police v. Drake, 304 A.3d 801 (Pa. Commonwealth Court. 2023), the Pennsylvania Commonwealth Court held that where an applicant for a Pa. license to carry firearms (LTC) has only a federal firearms prohibition, or the state law firearms prohibition applies based solely on the application of federal law (18 Pa. C.S. 6105(c)(6) and 18 Pa. C.S. § 6105(c)(9)), in order to deny a background check, PSP must also present evidence that a firearm has moved in interstate commerce. There is no identifiable firearm related to an LTC, and PSP may be required to issue an approval for the LTC-related Pennsylvania Instant Check System (PICS) background check in such matters, despite the applicant being subject to a firearms possession prohibition. However, the issuing authority in each county retains its discretionary authority whether to approve the issuance of the LTC.

The <u>PSP v. Drake</u> ruling has significant implications for how the PSP will process LTC-related PICS background checks, in situations where an individual is prohibited from acquiring an LTC solely due to a federal firearms prohibition and/or the state law prohibition applies based solely on the application of federal law. As a result, LTCs may be issued by the County Sheriff's Office or Philadelphia Gun Permit Unit when a federal or state firearms prohibition is based on the following federal statutes:

- a. § 922(g)(4) Mental health commitments reported out of state in NICS.
- b. $\S 922(g)(5)(b) \text{Non-immigrant visa holders.}$
- c. § 922(g)(7) Individuals who have renounced U.S. citizenship.
- d. § 922(g)(8) Out-of-state domestic violence protection orders.
- e. § 922(g)(9) MCDV convictions where the underlying offense is not punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year.

LTCs issued to federally prohibited persons will be designated within the Concealed Weapons Query (CWQ) of the Commonwealth Law Enforcement Assistance Network (CLEAN), with a note stating "LTC Issued - Individual may be prohibited from possessing firearms - Contact PICS for more information (or PACIC after hours)". This change will be available for all METRO connections and will require METRO vendors to parse the "Federally Prohibited" field to display on a user's Mobile Data Terminal/Computer screen. Agencies may obtain additional information regarding the firearm prohibition by contacting the Pennsylvania Instant Check System (PICS) Operations Section at 717-720-5199 between 0800 hours and 2200 hours, or after hours through the Pennsylvania Criminal Intelligence Center (PACIC) at 877-777-6835.

<u>PSP v. Drake</u> does not impact the PSP's ability to deny individuals during PICS background checks related to the purchase, transfer, and return of a firearm. It also does not specifically preclude enforcement of the Pennsylvania Uniform Firearms Act, when a federally prohibited person, who has been issued an LTC under the <u>PSP v. Drake</u> ruling, is in possession, use, control, sale or transfer of a firearm and is also prohibited from possessing the firearm under state law, in particular 18 Pa. C.S. § 6105(c)(6) and 18 Pa. C.S. § 6105(c)(9).

The Delaware County Community College Municipal Police Academy has served the community since 1977 and continues to this day.

DCCC was one of the first schools to conduct police academy training for the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission in accordance with Legislative Act 120. It now serves as a leader in providing local and regional departments with qualified and prepared candidates.

The Police Academy provides the basic training (Act 120) curriculum that is required for every municipal police officer in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Upon successful completion of the program, students are eligible to work as police officers in Pennsylvania.

The Academy is certified by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania through the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission in Harrisburg, Pa. The faculty includes active chiefs of police, police supervisors, Assistant District Attorneys from Delaware County, and many others in the law enforcement field. Training and coursework are conducted at the College's Marple Campus (901 South Media Line Road, Media, Pa. 19063). In addition, they also conduct mandatory (Act 180) inservice training for current municipal police officers. This training is provided at locations across Delaware and Chester Counties.

For nearly 50 years, the Delaware County Community College Municipal Police Academy has produced 95 percent of all police officers in Delaware County, and 75 percent of the Chester County police force.

The Delaware County Community College Police Academy is led by **Director Bill Davis**, who has served in this role since January 1991. Prior to his appointment, Mr. Davis completed a distinguished 25-year career as a Pennsylvania State Police Trooper, including service on the Major Crimes Task Force in the Delaware County District Attorney's Office, where he contributed to resolving two cold case murder investigations. He holds a Master's Degree in Administration of Justice from West Chester University.

On July 8, 2025, Mr. Davis will commence his 123rd class as Director with the start of Class 174. His leadership has been instrumental in training nearly every active municipal police officer in Delaware County. Additionally, Mr. Davis secured two virtual reality simulator machines to enhance cadet training at the Police Academy.

We express our gratitude to Mr. Davis for his unwavering dedication over 34 years as Director and his remarkable 59 years of service to the law enforcement community.

Commission on Crime and Delinquency

The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) is pleased to announce that it has been awarded a \$2.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) through the FY24 National Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (NSAKI). This critical funding will support the enhancement of Pennsylvania's processes for handling, tracking, and testing sexual assault kits (SAKs) across the Commonwealth and aligns with the mandates of Act 122 of 2024, which directs PCCD to implement a statewide SAK tracking system.

Project Oversight and Stakeholders

The grant is administered by PCCD's Office of Victims Services (OVS), which has convened a multidisciplinary team (MDT) to guide project implementation. This team includes representatives from law enforcement, forensic laboratories, healthcare providers, victim service agencies, and other key stakeholders. The MDT plays an essential role in ensuring effective interagency coordination, system integration, and accessibility for both survivors and professionals. Participating organizations include:
