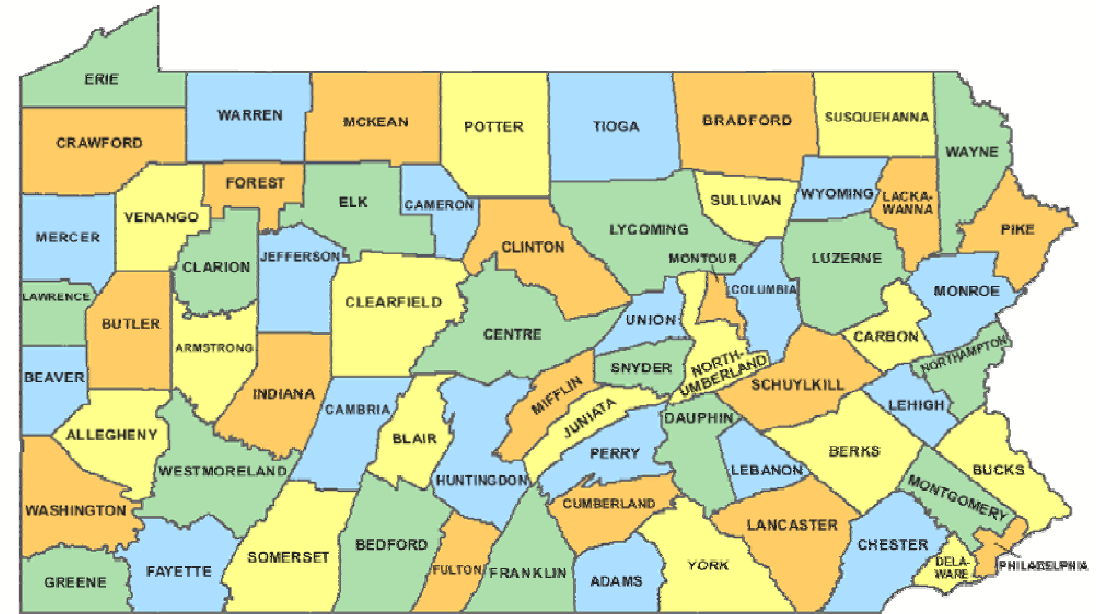

# Goals

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1. Assess current infrastructure/landscape of crisis intervention services and infrastructure across the commonwealth, with a focus on understanding gaps and developing recommendations for sustainable funding mechanisms.
2. Evaluate current implementation of CIT and identify opportunities for expansion, enhancement, and increased data collection.



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# Key Activities

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Conduct landscape review of crisis infrastructure and CIT programs.



Identify key stakeholders and hold listening sessions.



Prioritize meaningful engagement with people with lived experience.



Synthesize information into a written report.



Develop and disseminate an action plan.

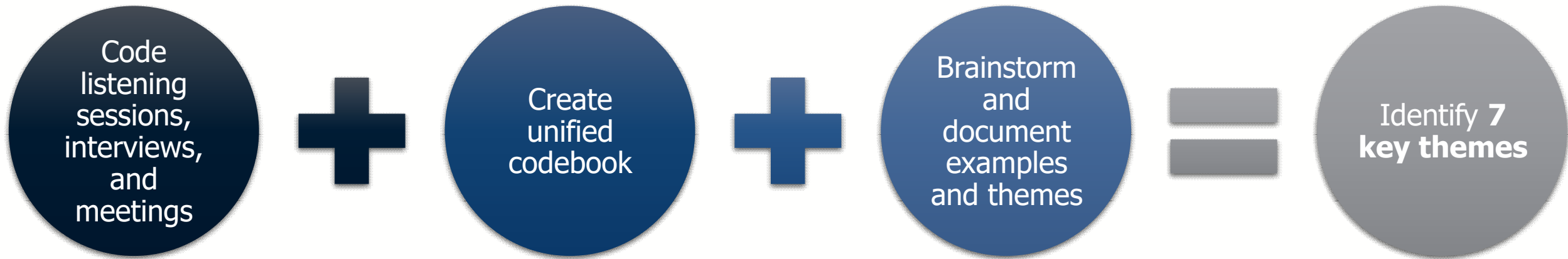
**To what degree are counties following the Memphis model?**

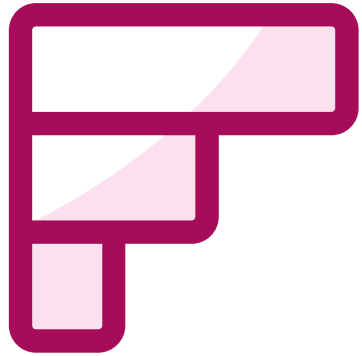
# CIT Programs

- Law enforcement staffing and buy-in
- Strengthening connections between CIT coordinators
- Program fidelity and standards
- Train-the-trainer opportunities
- CIT-specific funding needs

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# Recommendations Snapshot: CIT Programs

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## Infrastructure

Build CIT program infrastructure at the state level.

Establish statewide CIT steering committee to oversee program training, policies, coordination, and expansion.

Formalize CIT coordinator connections and increase opportunities to collaborate.

# Recommendations Snapshot: CIT Programs

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## Standardization and Certification

- Draft statewide CIT program standards in collaboration with the CIT steering committee.
- Develop and implement protocol for CIT program certification in Pennsylvania.
- Develop statewide guidance for addressing specialized training needs.
- Standardize ongoing and refresher CIT training courses and requirements.

# Recommendations Snapshot: CIT Programs

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## Data

- Develop statewide CIT program data collection and reporting.
- Build public-facing dashboard for statewide CIT training and program visibility.

# Recommendations Snapshot: CIT Programs

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## Funding and Legislation

- Work with legislators to advocate for state-appropriated CIT funds.
- Develop 988 surcharge legislation and use funds for CIT-related programming.
