Why did we pursue this work?

DV relationships are 5x more dangerous with the presence of firearms

Firearms were present in 100% of the IPV homicides in Allegheny County in 2024

There are millions of DV/gun violence survivors living everyday with their injuries



Allegheny Co. Landscape

- Allegheny County has more than 1,200,000 residents; 25% reside within the City of Pittsburgh
- 108 police departments and 130 municipalities
- City of Pittsburgh has their own police department
 - Comprised of 6 zones and a specialized Domestic Violence Unit Detective
- Four Domestic Violence agencies that work in tandem with each of the Magisterial District Judge offices and police departments
- IPV Reform Initiative developed in 2023



Allegheny Co. Homicide Statistics



Women's Center & Shelter
of Greater Pittsburgh

- Between 2016 to 2021, there were 643 homicides; 86% (553) involved a firearm
- Of the IPV homicides between 2019 to 2022, 50% involved a firearm
- In 2023, all IPV murder/suicides involved a firearm
- In 2024, all IPV homicides involved a firearm



Allegheny Co. Court Statistics (2023)

City of Pittsburgh Police's administration of the Lethality Assessment Protocol (LAP) when responding to IPV 911 calls

- 72% of the 1,226 LAPs administered scored as at high danger of being killed and were immediately referred to WC&S services

Court of Common Pleas, Family Division

- 49% of the 3,246 PFA Petitions filed included a Weapons Relinquishment Supplement

Court of Common Pleas, Criminal Division

- On average, 206 new criminal cases for IPV are filed every month

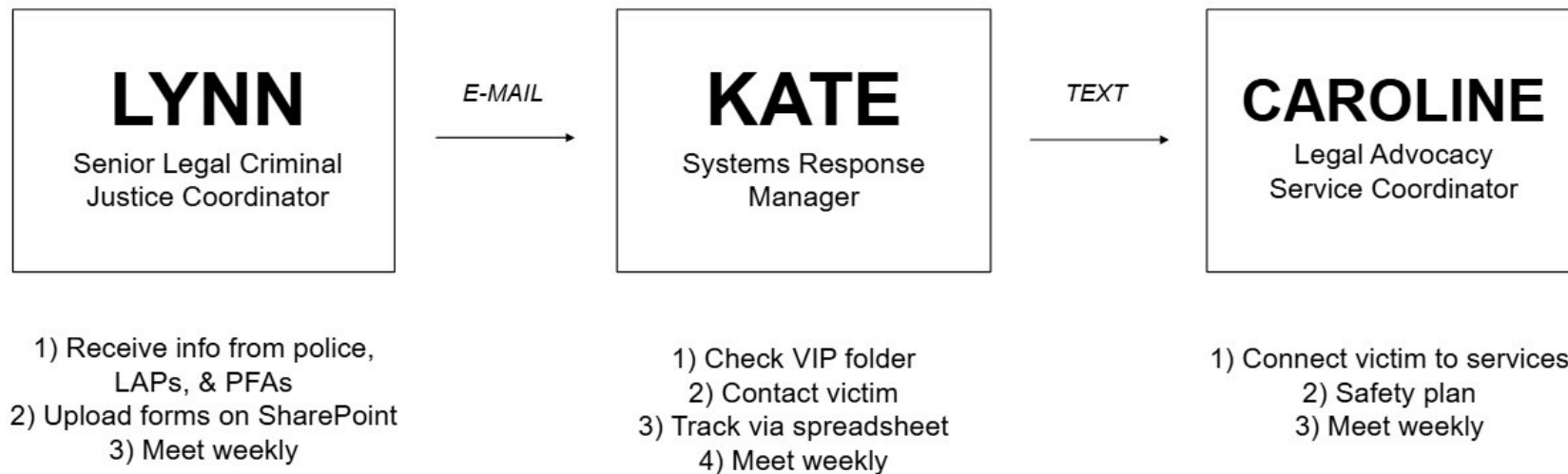
- Pittsburgh Police and local universities committed to administering Lethality Assessment Protocols (LAP) since 2013
- PFA assistance provided by DV advocacy groups
- Allegheny County High-Risk IPV Offender Review Group's weekly meetings



Q2: What Was the Day-to-Day Work?

At first, our plan looked like this:

The workflow naturally evolved to be more survivor-centered

Weekly case management meetings where all 4 advocates review each case and identify the primary need of the survivor and who should be the first point of outreach for:

- Systems support
- Direct court support
- Direct emotion support
- Immediate safety support
- Intersections

In addition to our VIP group (“Firearm Safety Team”), now all WC&S Legal Advocates discuss firearm safety during our LAP follow-up calls and PFA intake work.

Q3: What Did We Learn in Year 1?

We don't know a lot about firearms!

We identified projects to help ourselves and our clients:

1. Firearm Identification guide
2. Access to PFAD
3. Access to Pittsburgh Police PFA service/weapons relinquishment tracking sheets

We've become more creative in safety planning

The value of relationship-building with our law enforcement officers



Firearms Identification Sheet

This guide is to assist in helping you accurately identify firearms that you would like to include in the weapons relinquishment form of your PFA petition. The more accurately you can identify these weapons, the higher the likelihood that police can have successful relinquishment of firearms.

The more information you can share the better!

1. List actual make and type of weapon, if known—there are examples of common firearms below.
2. Share a detailed description of where it could be (ex: if kept in car, make/model/license plate; if in house, note home address, room, and where it is usually kept within the room (ex: at 123 Main Street in defendant's room under bed).
3. Descriptors of weapon—color, size, handle material, whether there is a scope or silencer (ex: silver revolver with wooden handle and silencer).
4. Reminder: Police can not and will not relinquish "knives" from home unless they are prohibited by law, such as switch blades.

Revolvers (look like handguns with a barrel that spins where bullets are loaded):

Rifles & Shotguns:

If known, include info regarding bolt-action, lever-action, or pump action. If there is a scope you can share that as well.

**Silencers can be found on handguns as well as rifles.

REMINDER: only illegal knives can be recovered by police. Kitchen knives, Swiss Army/utility Knives, etc... will not be confiscated by officers.

Issues

- Unclear understanding of what happens to blank Weapons Relinquishment supplements
- Defendants have reported that their firearms are stolen or lost at time of relinquishment request
- Defendants have said they don't have the weapons listed on Relinquishment Forms
- Plaintiffs are not being notified when weapons are being returned to defendants once their PFA expires
- When a defendant is incarcerated, weapons relinquishments aren't a priority—but what happens once they are released and weapons are still in their possession?



Systems Improvements

- A form for all departments to use and upload into PFAD when defendants say they don't have firearms
- Search warrants for weapons when defendants are saying they don't have a weapon and plaintiffs have a detailed description of where a weapon is located
- DA's Office to share universal expectations for Weapons Relinquishments to *all* departments, including weapons return requests
- Check in with PFA clients when their final PFA is scheduled to expire/weapons may be returned

PFA follow up calls—increased conversation and awareness of weapons relinquishment safety planning



LAP follow up calls



Check-in with PFA clients when their Final PFA Order is scheduled to expire/weapons may be returned; safety planning

Weapons Guide (handout) to decrease blank Weapons Relinquishment Supplements as a result

Weapons Relinquishment information sheet—Act 79 information for plaintiffs to understand weapons relinquishment options for their PFA cases

Connections to US Attorney's Office re: ICCs with firearms

Trainings with Advocates and attorneys for Act 79

Assistance from our Local DA's Office to create a standard response for weapons relinquishment and firearm release requests once PFAs expire

Connections to Sheriff's office

Consistent PFAD entry

A clear form in PFAD to attest when defendants say they do not have a firearm

Search warrants information when plaintiffs detail a clear location of weapons and defendants deny there is a weapon present

Connections to community violence intervention groups
