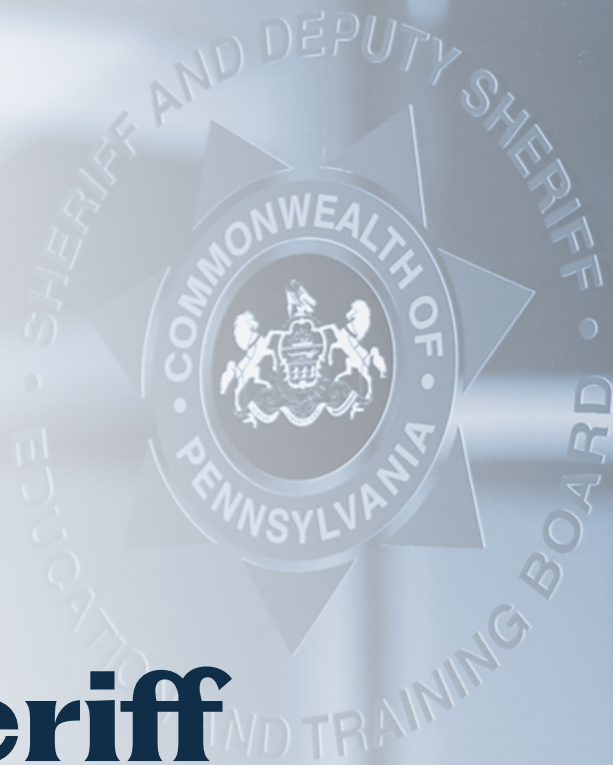

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A Message from the Chair

This report, which provides details on activities pertaining to the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Education and Training Board (SDSETB) during calendar year 2025, serves as a review of the SDSETB's accomplishments and future goals. It is my pleasure to present this report to you on the 41st anniversary of the Training Program.

In February 1984, the Deputy Sheriffs' Education and Training Board was established through Act 2 of 1984, known as the Deputy Sheriffs' Education and Training Act, to train and certify deputy sheriffs employed by the Commonwealth's 67 county sheriffs' offices. In September 2014, Act 114 amended this legislation, renaming the Deputy Sheriffs' Education and Training Board to the SDSETB and expanded its scope to include training requirements for sheriffs as well as provisions for certification revocations. With oversight and staff support from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), the SDSETB continues to implement and refine training and certification processes as delineated by the Act.

The SDSETB remains committed to evolving with the changing needs of the Commonwealth's sheriffs as well as their role in the criminal justice system, shaped by legislative mandates and the courts. Since its inception in 1984, the SDSETB has trained and certified over 7,838 deputy sheriffs, while the training population has tripled in size. The training program curriculum has expanded from 160 to 760 hours and now offers year-round classes leading to certification. Several new subjects were developed, and revisions have been made to the existing curriculum. In addition, the SDSETB has instituted a series of supervisory trainings along with several optional skills, web-based online, and instructor development courses. Students seeking certification are now required to complete a portion of their coursework through online instruction.

During 2025, the SDSETB made significant strides to enhance the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Training and Certification Programs. The SDSETB continues to address fiscal challenges, but with the passage of Act 134 of 2020, increased surcharge collections have allowed the SDSETB to begin reimbursements to counties.

Given the accomplishments of the past 41 years, the SDSETB will continue to meet the training needs of the Commonwealth's sheriffs and their deputies while advancing the development of new and innovative training programs.

Board Organization

The SDSETB was originally established as the Deputy Sheriffs' Education and Training Board under Act 2 of 1984, the Deputy Sheriffs' Education and Training Act, to serve as an advisory body to PCCD. In 2014, Act 114 expanded the Board's responsibilities to include training for sheriffs, prompting the renaming to its current title.

The SDSETB consists of 10 members: two judges from the Court of Common Pleas, two sheriffs, three current or former deputy sheriffs, one educator, one county commissioner, and the Pennsylvania Attorney General.

Under 44 Pa.C.S. Chapter 74 (relating to sheriffs and deputy sheriffs), the SDSETB is required to establish, implement, and administer a program of basic and continuing education training for sheriffs and deputy sheriffs. The statute requires all newly hired deputy sheriffs attend basic training to be certified as a deputy sheriff. Sheriffs (in general) are also required to obtain certification within their first term of office. Additionally, all sheriffs and deputies are required to maintain their certification through biennial continuing education.

The SDSETB is authorized to establish rules and regulations governing all aspects of the training program, including the certification of sheriffs and deputy sheriffs. The SDSETB operates under the oversight of the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), which provides the administrative structure and staff support to carry out its responsibilities.

The activities of the SDSETB and its program staff, along with related training programs, are supported independently of PCCD's General Governmental Operations budget. This is accomplished by the assessment of a surcharge on all legal papers served by sheriffs' offices. After remaining unchanged for 20 years, the fee was increased under Act 134 of 2020.

PCCD is responsible for disbursing funds from the Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Education and Training Account, a restricted receipts account maintained by the Office of State Treasurer, for the costs of the training program, its administration, and the expenses of the SDSETB. The Act also authorizes reimbursement to each county for costs associated with the training of sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, including tuition and allowable living and travel expenses during training, and their salary while they attend training.

In 2013, the SDSETB's expenditures exceeded its revenues. This, along with transfers by previous administrations from the training account to the State's General Fund, depleted the SDSETB's resources. To address this issue, the SDSETB took prudent cost-saving measures and reduced or cancelled training where appropriate. In 2017, the SDSETB and PCCD made the decision to suspend reimbursements to counties for salary and travel. With the passage of Act 134, which increased surcharge collections for the Training Account, the SDSETB resumed paying reimbursements owed to counties.

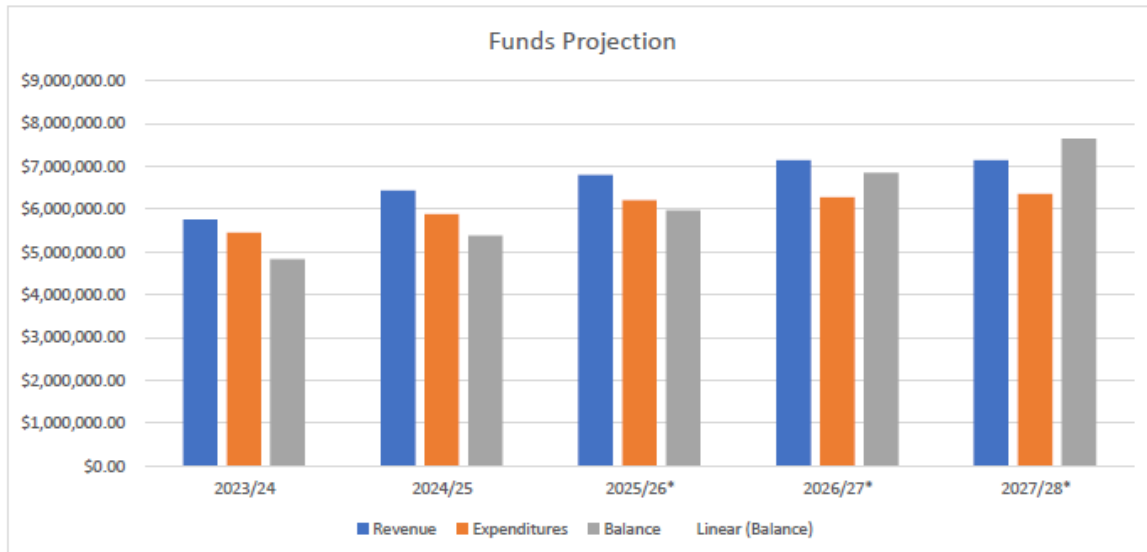

History of the Program

Since its establishment, the SDSETB has trained and certified 7,838 sheriffs and deputy sheriffs through basic training and has renewed their certifications through a continuing education program. The amendments to the law required all sheriffs to obtain and maintain training certification. It also gave authority to the SDSETB to revoke certification in cases involving certain types of misconduct or lack of fitness for duty. Additionally, the changes restricted the use of the Training Account, limiting expenses primarily to training activities that directly support sheriffs and deputy sheriffs.

In 1999 and 2000, the SDSETB and its training development contractor, Temple University's Department of Criminal Justice, developed a comprehensive 560-hour core curriculum for basic training. The first pilot program was launched in July 2000 by the SDSETB's basic training delivery contractor, Pennsylvania State University's (PSU) Justice and Safety Institute. PSU-Eberly Campus, incorporated feedback, then refined and enhanced the curriculum. Additionally, during this time, the SDSETB reviewed and revised its regulations, policies, and procedures, which support the training programs and provide direction to staff, sheriffs' offices, and deputy sheriffs on issues related to training and certification.

On December 12, 2002, the Pennsylvania Independent Regulatory Review Commission approved updated regulations of the SDSETB, which included the expansion of the Deputy Sheriffs' Basic Training Program from 560 hours to 760 hours. The increased hours included the topics of Patrol Procedures and Operations, Motor Vehicle Code/Accident Investigation, Driving Under the Influence Enforcement, Criminal Investigation, and Drug-Related Investigations. The first 760-hour (19-week) basic training was launched in August 2003.

While maintaining its focus on cost-saving measures, the SDSETB continues to enhance both the curriculum and certification process by integrating innovative online training solutions. The SDSTEB remains committed to adapting its programs to meet the evolving needs of today's sheriffs and deputy sheriffs. In addition, Act 134 of 2020 increased the training surcharge collection from \$10, as follows:

Waivers of basic training are granted to a limited group of sheriffs and deputy sheriffs who possess prior Pennsylvania-based law enforcement experience and training. Prior to 2000, eligible deputies were required to complete a 40-hour, one-week waiver course that focused on civil law and procedure, court security, and prisoner transport. In 2000, the SDSETB implemented an expanded 101-hour waiver course to align with the broader basic training curriculum. However, after conducting several waiver classes, it became evident that participants—due to their prior training and experience—could assimilate the material in less time. Consequently, in 2001, the SDSETB approved a reduction in the waiver course to 80 hours, while maintaining the full scope of instructional content.

2025 Year in Review

By the end of 2025, the SDSETB, in conjunction with PCCD, completed its 41st year of providing initial certification to sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, as authorized under 44 Pa.C.S. Chapter 74. During 2025, 198 sheriffs and deputies successfully completed training requirements for initial certification: 121 in basic training and 77 in the waiver courses.

Also in 2025, 1,819 sheriffs and deputies successfully completed the required continuing education courses. The SDSETB's continuing education training delivery contractor, Temple University's Department of Criminal Justice, provides the annual online training. The 2025 training cycle began in January 2025. The training included the following subjects: Legal Updates, Liability and Ethics, and Critical Decision Making.

During 2025, the SDSETB continued to revise and update the curriculum, as well as explore the use of web-based training to better meet the needs of the sheriffs and deputy sheriffs and produce cost savings.

The SDSETB revised its basic supervisory training course in 2025 and are pleased to be offering a session in 2026. In addition, the SDSETB developed a Train-The-Trainer Program to assist sheriffs in establishing internal training capabilities. In 2025, twelve deputies were certified as firearms and patrol rifle instructors and seven deputies completed instructor recertification training.

With the passage of Act 134, which increased surcharge collections for the Training Account, the SDSETB resumed paying reimbursements owed to counties. As of the end of 2025, with continuing payments, the SDSETB had an outstanding balance of \$7,880,172.66 owed to counties in reimbursements. With the increase in surcharge collections, the SDSETB authorizes payments as funding allows, and will periodically review the training fund for additional payment opportunities.

Training and Certification Programs

Basic Training

Since the program's inception in 1985, the SDSETB has conducted a total of 101 basic training classes and 121 waiver classes, resulting in the certification of 7,838 sheriffs and deputy sheriffs across the Commonwealth.

Utilizing PSU as the basic training delivery contractor has expanded the capabilities of the SDSETB's Basic Training Academy. This partnership provides access to state-of-the-art fitness facilities and experienced instructors, as well as enhanced firearms ranges, all of which contribute to a high-quality training experience for sheriffs and deputy sheriffs. Additionally, a Simulations Complex, including lock-up, vehicle sally port, apartment, offices, and courtroom were created for use in various scenario-based trainings.

Additionally, to enhance the professionalism and educational opportunities of Pennsylvania's sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, the SDSETB collaborated with PSU to establish college credits for the completion of basic training. Following a curriculum review, PSU approved the awarding of 16.5 specific academic credits to each graduate of the basic training program. These credits can be applied toward a degree at PSU or transferred to other accredited educational institutions. The SDSETB also partnered with the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Division of Veterans/Military Education, to obtain recognition as an educational program under Title 38, United States Code, Section 3676 (GI Bill of Rights). This approval enables eligible sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, who are also veterans, dependents, or National Guard and Reserve members, to receive educational benefits for attendance at the SDSETB's expanded basic or waiver training programs. Eligible sheriffs and deputies could qualify for tax-free benefits of approximately \$1,500 per month.

Continuing Education

To maintain certification under 44 Pa.C.S. Chapter 74, sheriffs and deputy sheriffs are required to complete continuing education every two years. In support of this mandate, the SDSETB revised its training format to offer 10 hours of virtual continuing education annually.

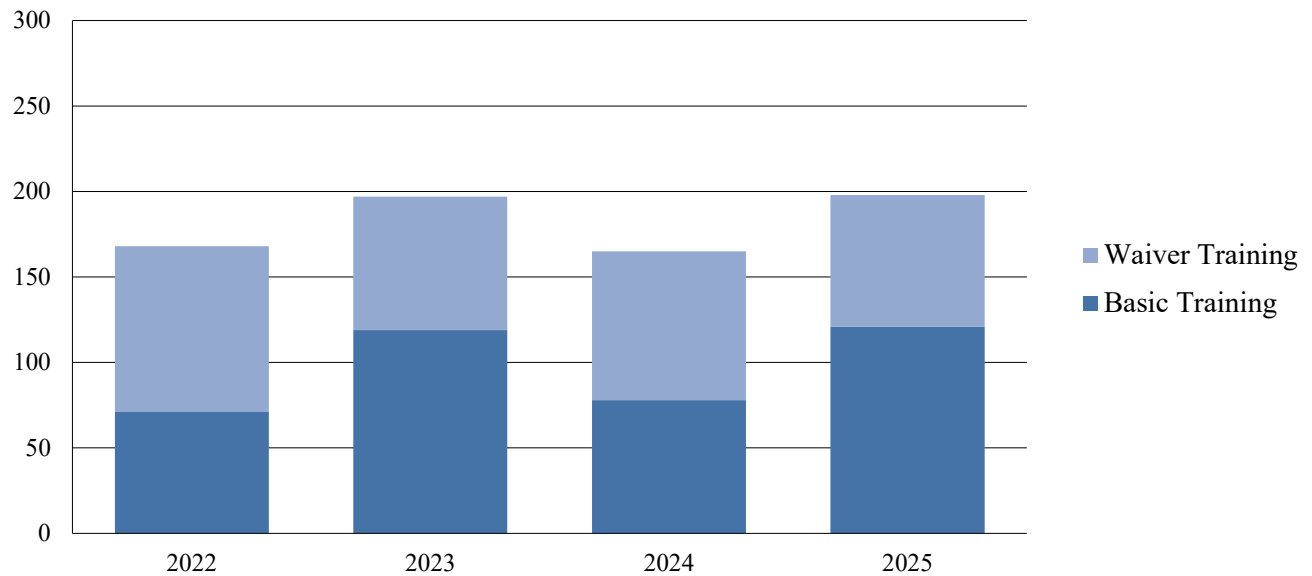
Merit Courses

In addition to the training mandated by 44 Pa.C.S. Chapter 74, the SDSETB identified several specialized training needs within sheriffs' offices. To address the need, the SDSETB developed a series of merit courses to provide instruction on specific topics. These courses were delivered through a variety of methods, including both online and in-person.

Temple University offered Legal Updates, Liability and Ethics, Critical Decision Making, Cultural Diversity, Waiver Pre-requisites, and All Hazards to 2,125 sheriffs and deputies in an online format.

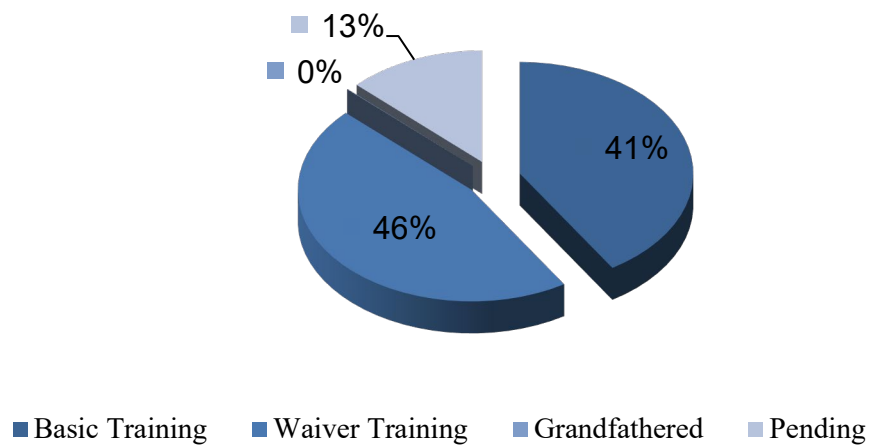
Sheriff and Deputy Sheriff Certifications
