MISSING ENDANGERED PERSON ADVISORY (MEPA) - Cumberland County, 1/4/26

– A MEPA was issued for a 59-year-old white male, last seen in the area of Walnut Bottom Road in Carlisle Borough on 1/2/2026 at approximately 1100 hours. He is described as 6 feet 3 inches tall, approximately 250 lbs., with bald hair and hazel eyes, wearing a black Baltimore Ravens hooded sweatshirt. Police believe he may be at special risk of harm or injury or may be confused.

WATER OUTAGE – Carbon County, 1/3/26 -

Weatherly Borough lost water pressure within their municipal water system. Crews believe there is a large leak somewhere, and they have yet to locate it. Both of their storage tanks are nearly empty. Weatherwood and Forest Hills Rehabilitation and Healthcare Centers are both affected. They share an address and have 200 beds. The population of Weatherly Borough was 2,549 in the 2024 census. PA DEP is working with the Borough toward the issuance of an emergency permit. On 1/3/26, Weatherly Borough signed a Declaration of Disaster Emergency in response to this incident. As of 1/4/26, water has been restored. A Boil Water Advisory (BWA) is in effect.

TRAIN DERAILMENT – Butler County, 1/1/26 -

A Canadian National Railway (CN) train derailed on a freight-only line in the vicinity of Branchton Road and Industrial Boulevard in Slippery Rock Township. The locomotive was not derailed, but 25 open-top hopper cars carrying iron ore pellets did. A large number of the pellets were spilled, but there were no other hazardous materials involved. No injuries were reported. The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) deployed an emergency response team member to the scene, and a cleanup contractor is on site. Branchton Road (State Route 4010) was reopened on 1/2/26. As of 1/3/26, all railcars have been removed, and cleanup is underway.

WATER OUTAGE – Bucks County, 12/30/25 –

On 12/27/25, a loss of well water was reported at the Buckingham Valley Rehabilitation and Nursing Center located at 820 Durham Road in Buckingham Township. The well is the only source of water for this licensed Pennsylvania Department of Health skilled nursing facility with 130 beds. A Boil Water Advisory will remain in effect until positive pressure has been restored and two consecutive days of satisfactory test results are recorded. Provisions are being supplied to residents while repairs are conducted. On 12/31/25, an emergency permit was issued for repair work to be completed.

NURSING HOME EXPLOSION – Bucks County, 12/23/25 –

Emergency crews responded to an explosion, resulting in a partial building collapse with entrapment, at Silver Lake Nursing Home located at 905 Tower Road in Bristol Township. A Level Three Mass Casualty Incident was declared. The Commonwealth Response Coordination Center (CRCC) transitioned to a Limited Partial Activation, and the Bucks County EOC transitioned to a Full Activation. Both have since demobilized. All facility residents are accounted for, and relocation plans have been completed. A reunification number, 888-878-5889, has been established for responsible parties to contact if seeking information about residents. A Declaration of Disaster Emergency was signed by Bristol Township in response to this incident.

BOIL WATER ADVISORY (BWA) – Butler County, 12/23/25 –

A Boil Water Advisory has been issued for Quality Life Services – Sarver, a nursing home located at 126 Iron Bridge Road in Winfield Township. The facility obtained a bulk water hauling permit and will be receiving water from a chloramine treated source. The BWA will remain in place for as long as they are hauling water into the facility.

SINKHOLE – Fayette County, 12/17/25 – The 200 block of Lynn Road in Brownsville Township will be closed indefinitely due to the discovery of a 20-foot by 30-foot sinkhole. There are no impacts to utilities, and the residences are still accessible. On 12/18/25, Brownsville Township issued a Declaration of Disaster Emergency for this incident.

COMPOST FIRE - Lancaster County, 12/15/25 - The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) reported an active fire at A&M Compost, a SARA Facility located at 2022 Mountain Road in Penn Township. The facility has had a continuously burning indoor compost fire for the past week. PA DEP has not reported any air quality concerns related to the incident. Local fire departments are assisting the facility with monitoring the fire. As of 12/18/25, PA DEP representatives are planning to visit the facility to further assess this incident.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ASSISTANCE COMPACT (EMAC) – State of Alaska, 10/14/25 – Two PEMA staff members departed Harrisburg on 10/20/25 for a 10/21/25 report date in Anchorage, Alaska to provide EMAC A-Team assistance after the state was impacted by two major coastal storms. As of 11/5/25, both PEMA staff members have returned from providing EMAC A-Team assistance in Anchorage, Alaska. On 11/9/25, a PEMA Finance Specialist arrived in Alaska to fulfill an EMAC request. On 11/24/25, the Finance Specialist returned safely to the Commonwealth. On 12/13/25, the State of Alaska accepted Pennsylvania’s Offer of Assistance to provide one GIS Specialist from PEMA. The specialist reported to Alaska on 12/19/25 and returned to PA on 1/3/26.

FUEL SPILL – Delaware County, 9/22/25 – A commercial vehicle hauling 4,400 gallons of diesel fuel overturned on US-1 northbound near mile marker 39, Upper Providence Township, releasing about 2,000 gallons of diesel fuel from the tanker and saddle tanks, impacting the roadway, soil below the bridge, and Ridley Creek. Hazardous materials teams deployed booms as Lewis Environmental began mitigation and cleanup operations. A vacuum truck was utilized to remove fuel from the creek. Aqua PA shut down their Ridley Creek drinking water plant as a precaution due to the oil sheen. About 2,000 gallons of diesel fuel was recovered from the tank before it was removed from the roadway. US-1 was closed in both directions while recovery operations and a bridge inspection by PennDOT took place. The northbound lanes were closed for nearly nine hours, and the southbound lanes were closed for about five and a half hours. Remediation efforts continued under the coordination of the PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and PennDOT, which took several days to complete. On 9/26/25, a progress meeting was held. The rain on 9/25/25 flushed the product down to the collection point at Baltimore Pike, above the water treatment plant. Aqua PA continued to use the Chester Creek intakes and re-evaluated whether to begin using the Ridley Creek intakes. On 10/7/25, Aqua PA resumed using the Ridley Creek intakes, and cleanup proceeded according to plan. On 10/10/25, work was scheduled through the week of 12/8 to include local road closures and the northbound lane closures of US-1, between Baltimore Pike and PA-252, during the overnight hours of the week of 11/17. As of 12/4/25, restoration of the site is underway. The Ridley Creek Road closures are anticipated to continue until the week of December 15th. The work on US-1 was completed, and further closures are not expected. Following restoration of the site and Ridley Creek Road, this incident will enter into the Act 2 program for long term follow-up.

MISSING ENDANGERED PERSON ADVISORY (MEPA) - Centre County, 8/27/25 – A MEPA was issued by the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP), Rockview Station, who is searching for a 48-year-old white male, five feet five inches tall, weighing 160 pounds, with brown hair and blue eyes. He is operating a 2016 Subaru Outback, navy blue in color, bearing a Pennsylvania registration. He was last seen near Nilson Road, Benner Township, on 08/20/25

at 1200 hours. Police believe this person may be at special risk of harm or injury or may be confused.

MISSING PERSON – Clearfield County, 7/4/25 – The Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) are searching for a 72-year-old male who has been missing from his residence on Anderson Creek Road in Union Township since 7/1/25. Local fire and a search and rescue team assisted. Clearfield County contacted PEMA operations to request a cell phone ping through the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center (AFRCC). The latest ping result was on 7/1/25. Search teams were able to locate the missing person's vehicle. The cell phone was not inside. The search was called off for the night and resumed in the morning. On 7/5/25, crews returned to the scene and expanded the search area. An underwater drone was used in the creek with negative results. PSP Aviation joined the search with no success. As of 7/6/25, search efforts concluded for the day and will resume 7/7/25. On 7/7/25, PSP turned the search over to the PA Game Commission. As of 7/21/25, PA Game Commission reported that this individual is still missing. The case remains open, but there are no active searches being conducted.

CLOSURE OF HOSPITALS AND EMS SERVICE – Delaware County, 4/21/25 – An emergency declaration was signed by Delaware County and 14 municipalities following the public announcement made by Prospect Medical Holdings and Crozer Health that they would begin ceasing all operations at Crozer-Chester Medical Center, located at 1 Medical Center Boulevard, Upland Borough, and Taylor Hospital, located at 175 East Chester Pike, Ridley Park Borough. County emergency management monitored the status of both facilities, coordinated internal and external resources, and supported communication among all stakeholders as the situation unfolded. On 04/22/25, Delaware County received notice from Prospect Medical Holdings and Crozer-Chester Medical Center (CCMC) that all CCMC EMS services would cease operations on or about 05/02/25, "based on patient needs and census." This included the closure of seven EMS substations. On 04/23/25, the Delaware County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was activated to Enhanced (Virtual) status from 0830 to 1630 hours daily. Daily EOC Health System Support meetings were held Monday through Friday at 0830 hours, beginning on 04/24/25. On the same day, Delaware County Council announced it would extend the County's Emergency Declaration indefinitely during its scheduled meeting. On 04/24/25, three additional municipalities signed disaster declarations. On 04/25/25, one more municipality signed and brought the total to 18. Delaware County Council approved a resolution declaring a Continuing Disaster Emergency, which remained in effect until no longer required. At 1700 hours on 04/26/25, the last patient was discharged from Taylor Hospital, which marked the facility's closure. The Crozer crisis center closed on 04/28/25. The Crozer emergency department closed on 04/30/25 at 0800 hours. Two EMS units were staged outside the emergency department to triage and transport any walk-in patients. The census on the evening of 04/30/25 was 15. On 05/01/25, the census at Crozer Medical Center was seven, with the goal of transferring all patients by noon on Friday, 05/02/25. At 1900 hours on 05/02/25, the census at Crozer Medical Center was zero. The number of municipalities with declarations was 25, with additional declarations expected in the following days. As of 05/03/25, Crozer EMS maintained two BLS transport units in Clifton Heights and Ridley Township until 05/07/25, and two ALS transport units were staged outside the closed Crozer Emergency Department until 05/30/25. All other Crozer EMS units were out of service. The county EMS contingency plan was in effect and continued for 90 days. On 5/7/25, Delaware County closed its EOC effective at 1000 hours on Monday, 5/5/25. Additional emergency declarations were received from Chester Township and Aldan Borough. Affected stakeholders continued to meet regularly to discuss long-term impacts. On 5/14/25, concerns were addressed regarding utility shutoff to the CCMC building due to fire and security risks, as well as the need to maintain power to county radio equipment installed on the roof. The County EMA will facilitate communication between Upland Borough officials and the Pennsylvania Department of Health (PA DOH). On 5/27/25, Delaware County Council approved the

submission of a funding application to the commonwealth to continue to support funding for the Delaware County EMS Contingency Plan, which also included the continued staging of EMS units outside the closed emergency department at CCMC, beyond May 30, 2025. Delaware County's emergency services are actively developing a plan for the radio communication infrastructure located on the CCMC rooftop. On 6/3/25, this incident moved to the recovery phase. Coordination meetings will continue monthly into September. Delaware County's emergency declaration remained in effect as of 6/3/25. 30 of 49 municipalities have active emergency declarations filed with Delaware County's emergency services and PEMA. On 8/1/25, the monthly Delaware County Health Care Support Meeting was held. The status of EMS, and other unmet community needs, will be discussed at the next meeting on 8/7/25. On 8/5/25, the monthly recovery team meeting was held. The EMS contingency plan concluded on 8/2/25. The Disaster Declaration continues until at least September for potential gaps in EMS, as well as continued issues with primary care and wrap around services. Two of the former hospital facilities are being abandoned by Prospect Holdings. As of the 9/2/25 recovery team meeting, the disaster declaration related to regional healthcare and emergency medical services remain in effect to ensure continuity of operations and public safety. Most municipalities have established formal ALS agreements, while the remaining are continuing to work on establishing agreements with alternate services. The sale of Delaware County Memorial Hospital is complete, and the Taylor Hospital sale is in progress to a for-profit organization. Interest exists in Crozer and Springfield facilities; neither facility has been declared abandoned. As of 9/19/25, three municipalities have not yet finalized agreements for EMS coverage. The county will maintain the declaration until ALS coverage is stabilized and 911 operational support is no longer needed. As of 11/21/25, county emergency management has queried affected municipalities about the status of their declarations. A coordination meeting was held on 12/2/25, and the county declaration will remain in place until 3/2/26, as remaining gaps in ALS coverage are resolved.

MISSING ENDANGERED PERSON ADVISORY (MEPA) – Dauphin County, 8/10/24 - A MEPA was issued by the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) who are searching for a 76-year-old male who was last seen near Pheasant Road in West Hanover Township on 08/10/24 at 0810 hours. He was wearing a yellow shirt, black shorts, and white sneakers. Police believe this person may be at special risk of harm or injury or may be confused. On 8/16/24, PSP updated the clothing description of the missing individual as wearing a white shirt, black shorts, and navy-blue shoes with white soles.

DISASTER DECLARATIONS:

1/3/26 – Weatherly Borough, in Carbon County, signed a Declaration of Disaster Emergency in response to a loss of pressure in their municipal water system that occurred on 1/3/26.

12/23/25 – Bristol Township, in Bucks County, signed a Declaration of Disaster Emergency in response to a natural gas explosion at Silver Lake Nursing Home that occurred on 12/23/25.

5/22/25 – The U.S. Small Business Administration issued SBA disaster declaration #21090 and #21091 (PA-20019) due to severe storms and flooding that occurred on 5/13/25. The following Pennsylvania areas have been determined to be adversely affected by the disaster: the county of Somerset and the contiguous counties of Bedford, Cambria, Fayette, and Westmoreland. This also includes the contiguous Maryland counties of Allegany and Garrett.

The Physical Loan Damage Application deadline date of 7/21/25 has passed and the Economic Injury (EIDL) Loan Application deadline date expires on 2/23/26.

4/21/25 - Delaware County, along with multiple municipalities, signed Disaster Declarations due to the public announcement by Prospect Medical Holdings/Crozer Health that they will begin ceasing all operations at Crozer-Chester Medical Center in Upland Borough and Taylor Hospital in Ridley Park Borough. As of 5/14/25, 31 municipalities had signed Disaster Declarations: Aldan Borough, Aston Township, Bethel Township, Brookhaven Borough, Chadds Ford Township, Chester City, Chester Township, Chester Heights Borough, Clifton Heights Borough, Collingdale Borough, Darby Borough, Darby Township, Eddystone Borough, Folcroft Borough, Lower Chichester Township, Middletown Township, Nether Providence Township, Norwood Borough, Parkside Borough, Prospect Park Borough, Radnor Township, Ridley Park Borough, Ridley Township, Sharon Hill Borough, Springfield Township, Swarthmore Borough, Thornbury Township, Trainer Borough, Upland Borough, Upper Chichester Township, and Upper Darby Township.

11/8/24 - A Federal Register Notice (FRN) designated the following counties for Public Assistance under Tropical Storm Debby: Cambria, Cameron, Clearfield, Elk, Indiana, Lycoming, Potter, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Tioga, Wayne, and Wyoming. Union County was added to the FRN on 11/14/24.

9/11/24 - A Major Disaster Declaration was declared on 9/11/24 to supplement recovery operations in areas affected by Tropical Storm Debby on August 9-10. Individual Assistance was approved for Lycoming, Potter, Tioga, and Union Counties. The designation is FEMA-4815-DR.

8/9/24 - Governor Josh Shapiro issued a Proclamation of Disaster Emergency for Adams, Bedford, Berks, Bradford, Carbon, Chester, Cumberland, Dauphin, Fulton, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Lycoming, Monroe, Pike, Potter, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Tioga, Union, Wayne, and Wyoming Counties, due to the impacts of the remnants of Tropical Storm Debby, which caused dangerous conditions, including flash and riverine flooding across the named counties. Lycoming County issued a county Declaration of Disaster due to adverse weather. The following municipalities in Lycoming County have issued Declarations of Disaster: Anthony Township, Gamble Township, Hepburn Township, Lewis Township, Lycoming Township, McIntyre Township, Mifflin Township, Nippenose Township, Old Lycoming Township, Pine Township, Salladasburg Borough, South Williamsport Borough, and Woodward Township. The following municipalities in Susquehanna County have issued a Declaration of Disaster Emergency due to adverse weather: Choconut Township, Liberty Township, Middletown Township, and Susquehanna Depot Borough. Clymer Borough and Green Township in Indiana County have issued a Declaration of Disaster Emergency due to adverse weather. Penbrook Borough and Reed Township in Dauphin County have issued a Declaration of Disaster Emergency due to adverse weather.

9/10/21 - The Honorable Tom Wolf, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, requested a major disaster declaration from the President through the Federal Emergency Management Agency to provide additional support for state, county and municipal governments, and individuals affected by the remnants of Hurricane IDA between 8/31/21 and 9/5/21. The declaration includes Individual Assistance to individuals and households in Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery, Philadelphia, and York Counties, and assistance under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program in all areas of the Commonwealth. Public Assistance is under review. The President approved the declaration on 9/10/21 under Major Disaster Declaration FEMA-4618-DR. 9/24/21 - Amendment No. 1 designates Bedford and Northampton Counties for Individual Assistance. 10/8/21 - Amendment No. 2 designates

Bucks, Chester, and Montgomery Counties for Public Assistance (already designated for Individual Assistance). 10/14/21 – Amendment No. 3 designates Bedford, Philadelphia, and York Counties for Public Assistance (already designated for Individual Assistance). In addition, Fulton, Huntingdon, Luzerne, and Schuylkill Counties for Public Assistance. 10/20/21 – Amendment No. 4 designates Delaware County for Public Assistance (already designated for Individual Assistance), and Dauphin County for Public Assistance.

3/30/20 - Governor Tom Wolf requested a major disaster declaration from the President through the Federal Emergency Management Agency to provide additional support for state, county and municipal governments and certain nonprofits, as well as individuals who are struggling during the COVID-19 outbreak. The request for a major disaster declaration will provide the same emergency protective measures available under the nationwide emergency proclamation; the following Individual Assistance programs: Disaster Unemployment Assistance, Crisis Counseling, Community Disaster Loans, and the Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Program; and Statewide Hazard Mitigation. The President approved the declaration on 3/30/20 under Major Disaster Declaration FEMA-4506-DR.

11/27/18 - A Major Disaster Declaration was declared on 11/27/18 for severe storms and flooding that occurred 8/10/18 – 8/15/18. Public Assistance (Cat A-G) was approved for Bradford, Columbia, Lackawanna, Lycoming, Montour, Northampton, Schuylkill, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Tioga, and Wyoming Counties. In addition, all areas in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are eligible for assistance under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. The designation is FEMA-4408-DR.

A round of light snow is expected this morning across the northern third of the Commonwealth. A few flurries will make it down close to Interstate 80, but the southern half of Pennsylvania will remain dry. Much warmer air moves into the Commonwealth this afternoon, raising high temperatures into the 40s over the southwest. The northeast will stay coolest, with highs in the lower 30s on the hilltops.

Temperatures will warm into 40s and 50s for Tuesday through Thursday. Some rain showers are likely on Tuesday with the highest totals in northwest Pennsylvania. Friday will be the warmest day of the week with temperatures in the 50s for most of the Commonwealth. A widespread soaking rainfall is expected Friday into Saturday, with colder and windier conditions to follow to end the weekend.
