

Does Your Municipality Have a Truck Ordinance?

Zoning officials in recent years have had to deal with issues many may not have imagined just five or 10 years ago. Large-scale warehousing, solar arrays, and data centers top the list. Arguably the biggest issue for many along the already congested thoroughfares across the commonwealth is the surge in requests for warehousing, and the immense size of these facilities.

Last year, the York County Planning Commission (YCPC) published a <u>Truck Terminal/Distribution Center/Fulfillment</u> Center & Warehouse Logistics Center Model Ordinance to provide guidance for municipalities in York County.

"We've had 24.5 million square feet of new warehousing," said Kurt Leitholf, chief of the municipal planning division in York County. "That's an example of the scope that York County is facing with this new kind of development. It was something we thought was needed."



"We still have a lot of development going in some of the municipalities north of York City, lots of warehousing coming in," added Jesse King, senior planner with YCPC. "We had some requests from other municipalities throughout the county saying that they knew their ordinances might not be as up to date as they probably should be ... to properly regulate these larger warehouses, distribution centers, and the truck traffic and employee traffic that comes along with it."

The document is a model ordinance containing suggested language, current terminology, and definitions commonly associated with regulations, for Truck Terminal/Distribution Center/Fulfillment Centers and Warehouse/Logistics Centers. This model ordinance serves as a summary document of the various components that the YCPC believes are necessary for a municipality to consider when evaluating the impacts of these uses on their municipalities. It should be the goal of the municipality to clearly articulate its expectations and requirements to any developers proposing these uses within their municipality, as well as to clearly address the concerns and interests of municipal residents.

Municipalities are encouraged to alter the text of this model ordinance to best suit their municipality, as what works best for one municipality may not provide the same results in another. There are suggested sizes, distances, and thresholds throughout this model ordinance that are recommendations, and should be thoroughly considered by municipal officials to determine if these requirements make sense for their municipality. Additional context has been provided for some topics in sidebars throughout the document.

As noted above, there are also sections of this model ordinance that – while important topics for consideration – may not be topics that municipalities currently want to address, are topics that municipalities have already addressed elsewhere in their ordinance, or can be viewed as forward-thinking.

Sections of this model ordinance that fall into these categories are presented in blue text. Municipalities are encouraged to review the language in these sections to determine if these are topics that currently make sense to address in zoning ordinances.


Municipalities protect and promote the safety, health, and morals of their communities by following and enforcing proper planning procedures, ensuring that development within their borders has been thoroughly considered well in advance of the submittal of plans for development. When considering where to permit and how to regulate more intense uses (such as the ones discussed in this model ordinance), municipalities should conduct "Community Impact Assessments" to evaluate the social, environmental, and economic impacts that these types of uses could have on their communities, and to determine where in their municipalities these types of uses can safely function. This type of assessment should be conducted by municipalities during the planning stage, when municipalities are considering adding language to their ordinances. Early assessment of the potential social, environmental, and economic impacts of these more intense uses during the planning stage minimizes the potential for conflicts when a developer submits a land development proposal.

As warehousing standards continue to evolve, municipalities will be challenged to keep up with them, let alone prepare in advance of any changes. This model ordinance is presented based on technology and knowledge available at this time. As always, municipal staff and officials are encouraged to reach out to their Metropolitan Planning or Rural Planning Organizations if questions arise regarding any of the content found within this model ordinance.

Funding Opportunity – TA Set-Aside

PennDOT has opened the application site for the 2025 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside of the Surface Block Grant Program (TA Set-Aside).

The TA Set-Aside provides funding for projects that enhance pedestrian and bicycle facilities, improve access to public transportation, create safe routes to schools, preserve historic transportation structures, provide environmental mitigation, create trails that serve a transportation purpose, and promote vulnerable road user safety.



Eligible project sponsors must submit draft applications by September 5, 2025, for District review. After review, final applications may be submitted until October 31, 2025. Selections from participating large Metropolitan Planning Organizations will be due January 23, 2026. The statewide project selection committee will meet in March 2026 to recommend projects for receipt of statewide TA Set-Aside funds. Approximately \$70 million in statewide funds will be made available.


The TA Set-Aside guidance document has been updated to incorporate revisions based on feedback received from the Districts and Metropolitan Planning or Rural Planning Organizations from past rounds. We've also created a video to help guide potential sponsors through the application process. These items will be housed on PennDOT's <u>TA Set-Aside website</u>, and are currently available for review. Discretionary Grants Spotlight - Update

<u>PennDOT's Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) webpage</u> offers the latest news and information on federal grant opportunities available through the IIJA.

Grant opportunities, application guides and other resources on federal grant funding are added as they become available, so please visit often to see if any of these grant funding programs are an opportunity that would benefit your community.

The following is a federal grant program currently accepting applications:

Bridge Investment Program (BIP) – Large Bridge

The goals of the BIP - Large Bridge grants are to:

- Enhance the safety, efficiency, and reliability of transporting people and freight across bridges;
- Upgrade the overall condition of bridges throughout the United States; and
- Offer financial support that incentivizes and leverages non-federal contributions from sponsors and stakeholders for planning, designing, and constructing eligible projects that will cost more than \$100 million.

The deadline for applying for FY 2026 funds in this rolling application process* is Friday, Aug. 1, 2025, 11:59 p.m. EST.


* Submissions will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis until program funding is expended or the notice of availability is superseded.

PennDOT will consider providing support for regionally supported grant proposals, as applicable, and may include providing data and subject matter expertise, as available.

Guide for Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act Grant Applications

PennDOT has added a guide for grant applications to the website dedicated to the IIJA, and specifically the federal discretionary programs. Also, included are Grant Alerts that provide background on these opportunities including eligibility, application deadlines, and federal and Department of Transportation (USDOT) resources and guides to assist in applying for the specific programs.

USDOT Discretionary Grant Resources

The USDOT has developed a discretionary grant preparation checklist for federal fiscal year 2024 to help applicants prepare and chart a strategic pathway to apply for infrastructure investments. More than \$32 billion is available to the USDOT this fiscal year to provide competitive grant funding to local governments, metropolitan planning organizations, transit agencies, Tribal governments, U.S. Territories and state departments of transportation. The USDOT has published a list of anticipated dates for the upcoming Notices of Funding Opportunity (NOFOs) for key programs within the IIJA and the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), as well as adjacent programs that support IIJA and IRA objectives. This list is not comprehensive, and the agency will periodically update it with additional programs and revised dates as appropriate.
