



Each time a hunter buys a hunting license, the money he spends goes toward many facets of wildlife management. Since 1920, close to a million and a half aces of State Game Lands have been acquired with these funds. Each year nearly \$7,000,000 is spent to improve wildlife habitat. Habitat improvements enhance living conditions for non-game birds and mammals as well as those species which are hunted. Pennsylvania hunters willingly share these lands with the non-hunting public, and with few exceptions, State Game Lands are open for general use year round. Surveys indicate that hunting accounts for only thirty-five percent of game land usage. The remaining sixtyfive percent is used by the general public for nonhunting purposes.

"Working Together for Wildlife" is a Game Commission program providing everyone an opportunity to help support wildlife management in the areas for endangered and non-game animals. Monies derived from the "Working Together for Wildlife" Program are being used in Pennsylvania to re-introduce the osprey, river otter, bald eagle, peregrine falcon and provide habitat for other birds and mammals indigenous to the Commonwealth. Construction placement of blue bird houses on State Game Lands provides needed homes for this beautiful songbird. Islands in the Susquehanna River have been set aside as propagations areas for nongame shore birds. Numerous other projects are planned on State Game Lands and other public

SPORTSMEN'S RECREATION MAP




STATE GAME LANDS No. 217

State Game Land (SGL) 217 totals 8,513.2 acres, and is located in Lynn, Heidelberg, and Washington Townships Lehigh County as well as West Penn Township, Schuylkill County and East Penr Township, Carbon County. It is mostly in the Pennsylvania Game Commission's Southeast Region with the exception of the Carbor County portion which is in the Northeast Region and located entirely in WMU 4C. State Game Land 217 is 16 air miles Northwes of Allentown.

Public access to the various portions of the property is adequate State Route 895 provides access to the north slope of the property while State Routes 143 and 309 give access to the southern slope Numerous township routes branch off of the state routes and traverse the Game Lands, providing further access. Parking areas are numerous and scattered along these township roads. Internal service roads and trails provide limited access to the interior of the property The Appalachian Trail traverses the entire length of the game land: at or near the summit of Blue Mountain.

CARBON, LEHIGH & SCHUYLKILL COUNTIES SGL 217 is in WMU 4C. Deer is the predominate species that is hunted throughout the game lands. . Turkey hunting is also a popula activity with spring hunting seeing more hunting pressure than fall Bears are hunted on the game lands with one or two being harvested most years. There is some small game hunting with squirrels and grouse being the most popular quarry. Fur bearers are hunted or SGL 217, especially foxes and coyotes. There are also ample trapping opportunities, especially along the various access roads.

> The Appalachian Trail runs through the center of SGL 217. Because o this, hiking is very popular on this game lands. SGL 217 is also very popular with birders. Every fall birds of prey migrate along the ridge and birders gather at Bake Oven Knob, Baer's Rocks, and other observation points along the ridge to observe the migration. During the spring migration when warblers are moving through birders can be found along Leaser Road and Bake Oven Road. Both these dirt township roads go up steep portions of the ridge and allow eye level tree-top viewing.
