Chapter Recap

- ✓ Pennsylvania's diverse, knowledgeable, and motivated natural resources community eagerly and fully supported the comprehensive review and revision process.
- ✓ The 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum provided a structured, facilitated format for 82 participants from 58 entities (including affiliates/subunits) to share their resource concerns and suggested conservation actions on Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan (PA WAP) relevant themes.
- ✓ The Pennsylvania Game Commission and Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission are committed to supporting and engaging current and new partners to implement the 2025-35 PA WAP.

Background

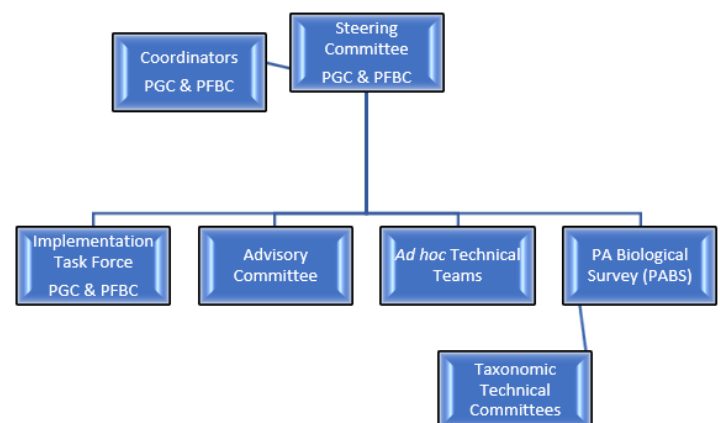


Fig. 7.1. Administrative and committee structure for revising the 2015-25 PA WAP.

The Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) and Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) are empowered with state authorities to secure the well-being of the Commonwealth's fish and wildlife. Thus, PGC and PFBC (Commissions) coordinate 2015-25 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan (PA WAP or Plan) implementation, comprehensive review and revision, and developed the 2025-35 PA WAP. In this effort, the Commissions are supported by an enduring coalition of statewide conservation partners participating in technical and advisory capacities, within an established PA WAP administrative structure (Fig. 7.1)

Steering Committee and Wildlife Action Plan Coordinators

Relevant to their statutory roles for managing Pennsylvania's fish and wildlife, the PGC and PFBC led the 2015-25 PA WAP comprehensive review and revision process. PA WAP Steering Committee members provided essential support and input throughout (Table 7.1). As a foundational PA WAP administrative body operating under an established Committee charter, Steering Committee roles in this process included administrative and technical

guidance, and critical review of key plan features and draft materials.

Responsive to the Steering Committee, the PGC and PFBC Wildlife Action Plan Conservation Planning Coordinators (hereafter Coordinators) (Fig. 7.1; Table 7.1) directly managed the revision process including a broad range of administrative and technical tasks and communications. Among these activities were coordinating with the Advisory Committee and technical committees (Table 7.2), commission staff, and partners, as well as organizing and facilitating meetings and webinars, overseeing PA WAP database management, developing grant proposals, editing and drafting original materials, and assimilating internal and public comments into the revised plan. Beyond Pennsylvania partners, the Coordinators also worked with established Northeast U.S. regional committees, building upon processes supporting landscape-scale conservation, established for 2015-25 Wildlife Action Plans across the Northeast region.

Other critical support for the plan included extensive programming, administrative, and Geographic Information Systems support provided by several PGC Bureau of Automated Technology Services personnel. Outreach assistance from PGC and PFBC marketing and communications personnel provided instrumental support to promote the plan through web, social media, and other formats.

Engaging Partners in the Revision Process

For decades, Pennsylvania partnerships have been the conservation keystone. It is through these collaborations of knowledge, financial resources, and technical skills we work towards our collective conservation goals to achieve desired outcomes. Pennsylvania’s fish and wildlife face unprecedented challenges to their survival (see Chapter 3, Threats; Required Elements Associations) with solutions beyond the scope of any individual agency or organization. For the past 20 years, each PA WAP has identified the most current threats to at-risk species and their habitats, coupling potential actions with these threats to ameliorate their impacts. To identify and address these expansive resource concerns, as discussed below, we engaged partners across multiple formats and topics to comprehensively review and revise, where needed, the 2015-25 PA WAP.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)

The PGC and PFBC formally initiated the 2015-25 PA WAP comprehensive review and revision through a joint letter of commitment (December 6, 2023, Appendix 7.1), followed by a virtual meeting with USFWS Northeast Regional Office of Conservation Investment leadership on February 14, 2024. During this meeting, PGC’s Wildlife Recovery Conservation Planning Coordinator and PFBC’s Conservation Coordinator reviewed Pennsylvania’s proposed revision process, including tasks and timelines.

Throughout the revision process, the USFWS remained an active partner. In June 2024, USFWS Northeast regional staff convened a Wildlife Action Plan Coordinators meeting to share essential regional materials, answer questions, and demonstrate approaches to addressing the eight Required Elements. This meeting provided crucial revision guidance and highlighted significant conservation opportunities for Wildlife Action Plans. Northeast Association of Fish and Wildlife (NEAFWA) State Wildlife Action Plan Coordinator Subcommittee conference calls provided ongoing opportunities for coordinators and technical contributors (e.g., Terwilliger Consulting, Inc., The Nature Conservancy, U.S.



Geological Survey-Northeast Climate Adaptation Science Center) to share information specifically developed to support the revision process. We also coordinated with a USFWS Wildlife Refuge Manager in Pennsylvania in a request for site resource management plans.

Advisory Committee

For the 2015-25 PA WAP, the Commissions formed an Advisory Committee to seek external experience and perspectives from natural resource community members. We continued to engage this committee during 2015-25 PA WAP implementation and, sought their advisement during 2025-35 PA WAP development.

This external committee is composed of federal, state and county governments, research institutions, non-governmental organizations and private foundations with statewide, multi-species, or landscape-scale responsibilities (Table 7.3). These partners historically contributed to vital scientific natural resource needs, guided crucial management decisions, or have been direct partners in implementing conservation actions. A formal Advisory Committee Charter and Operational Guidance outlined committee responsibilities and expectations. As process advisors (i.e., not decision-makers), this deliberative group provided essential input on foundational PA WAP components, critically reviewed draft materials, and recommended scientific and technical materials to the Steering Committee and Wildlife Action Plan Coordinators.

Technical Committees and Related Support

Technical contributions were instrumental to the revision process, including extensive support from Pennsylvania Biological Survey (PABS) taxonomic committees and a Habitat Committee. PABS members (see [PABS, https://www.pabiologicalsurvey.org/](https://www.pabiologicalsurvey.org/)) and technical committees (Table 7.4; see *Acknowledgements*) include scientists throughout the state, state and federal agency representatives, Pennsylvania's major natural history museums and scientific institutions, and interested individuals with requisite technical expertise. Taxonomic experts reviewed and contributed species data, provided recommendations for Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) designation, threats, conservation actions, research and survey needs, and authored several species accounts. Technical committee participants often worked well beyond their daily responsibilities and, in some cases, retired technical experts provided their knowledge from years of experience to advance the process.

Tribal Governments

Pennsylvania has a rich Native American heritage and, per the 2020 U.S. Census, 31,052 Native American and Alaskan Natives live in Pennsylvania (0.2% of Pennsylvania population; [U.S. Census Bureau, https://data.census.gov/profile/Pennsylvania?g=040XX00US42#race-and-ethnicity](https://data.census.gov/profile/Pennsylvania?g=040XX00US42#race-and-ethnicity)). Recognizing this important historical relationship, we invited tribal government representatives to the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum (discussed below), though representatives were unable to participate. No formally designated tribal lands are administered by federally recognized tribes in the state; yet we seek to more fully understand the relationship of indigenous ecological knowledge to Pennsylvania's Species of Greatest Conservation Need and their habitats.

2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum

The Commissions administered and coordinated the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum (hereafter Forum), in collaboration with PABS and Foundation for Pennsylvania Watersheds (Appendix 7.2). This 1.5-day invitation-only event included 82 conservation leaders from 58 entities, with a collective



emphasis to bolster PA WAP effectiveness by soliciting partner recommendations for the 2025-2035 PA WAP. Pre- and post-meeting surveys helped further assess and understand 2015-2025 PA WAP implementation advantages and constraints. Forum objectives were to:

1. Exchange information on conservation accomplishments in the preceding decade.
2. Highlight PA WAP implementation accomplishments.
3. From conservation stakeholders, enlist resource concerns and potential actions to address those concerns.
4. Inspire active participation by stakeholders in PA WAP implementation.
5. Illustrate approaches and resources that may benefit priority species and habitats.
6. Describe opportunities for voluntary participation in wildlife conservation.

Five plenary presenters offered a national overview of State Wildlife Action Plans and specific PA WAP implementation by the PGC and PFBC. This essential background material preceded the seven facilitated breakout groups which formed the primary venue for participants to share their extensive knowledge of resource concerns and associated conservation actions. Participants in these productive breakout groups generated over 300 resource concerns and identified over 400 conservation actions.

Through a post-Forum survey, respondents offered valuable feedback on ease of use and interpretation of 2015-2025 PA WAP and Conservation Opportunity Area (COA) Tool, which will guide the PGC and PFBC as they consider the structure and content of the 2025-2035 PA WAP. Overall, the Forum met or exceeded attendee expectations and provided a venue for fostering collaboration and networking.

Forum input influenced foundational 2025-35 PA WAP components, such as guiding principles, goals, objectives, and strategies. Additionally, species account authors considered threats and actions when updating threats assessments and devising action strategies, research priorities, and survey needs. We also shared Forum breakout group responses within the Commissions for program assessment.

Partner Collaboration to Advance 2025-35 PA WAP Implementation

Partnerships are foundational to achieving 2025-35 PA WAP goals and essential for successful conservation action implementation. It is through collectively exchanging ideas, acknowledging mutual responsibilities, and sharing resources that we will meet the challenges posed by growing resource concerns (e.g., threats, stressors). Pennsylvania's fish and wildlife live in dynamic environmental conditions and management actions must adapt with emerging issues to maintain and enhance their populations. The most challenging conservation situations are when prompt collaboration is essential for the persistence of habitats or species.

White-nose Syndrome (WNS) is a notable example of when the need for immediate action by partners with diverse expertise proved essential. WNS was unknown in Pennsylvania in 2005, yet by close of the 2005-15 PA WAP, extensive resources were gathered and partnerships developed, including wildlife managers, scientists, technical resources, state and federal agencies, to research and address this existential threat to hibernating bats. In the interim, from these collective efforts, substantial progress has been made to ameliorate WNS impacts, though the work is ongoing (see WNS Case Study [*in prep*]).



Advisory Committee

In the decade ahead, the Advisory Committee will continue to serve an integral role in informing and guiding 2025-35 PA WAP implementation. Beyond providing supportive scientific information, member organizations and agencies (as well as private landowners) will be able to assist with tracking implementation activities through the [Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Map](https://wildlifeactionmap.pa.gov/) Conservation Action Tracker (CAT) (<https://wildlifeactionmap.pa.gov/>). Throughout the 2005-15 and 2015-25 PA WAPs, we were unable to adequately track implementation types and distribution, especially work not funded by State and Tribal Wildlife Grants. The CAT was developed to address this challenge.

We will continue to engage Advisory Committee members during implementation through PA WAP Coordinator-led meetings or written updates. Minimally, this collaboration will occur annually; however, we will convene the committee more frequently when guidance or topical discussions are needed.

Technical Committees

The PABS Steering and Technical Committees will remain essential partners to ensure PA WAP scientific rigor, assist implementation, and promote PA WAP goals, objectives, and strategies. Other technical and *ad hoc* committees will be activated as needed to maintain a science-based plan and assist implementation pursuits. The revision process identified numerous conservation actions and resource concerns which are expressed in the species accounts and throughout the Plan. Implementing and resolving many of these needs is expected to require broad technical input and action.

Northeast U.S. Regional Partners

Species-level fish and wildlife management requires collaborative conservation across jurisdictional boundaries and, through the PA WAP, we engage regional partners to address multi-state species needs. Central to this regional collaboration is the USFWS, with jurisdictional responsibilities for Pennsylvania's federally listed species. The USFWS also coordinates regional initiatives and administers significant financial resources through multiple grant programs, especially State and Tribal Wildlife Grants for State Wildlife Action Plan revision and implementation.

State Wildlife Action Plans in the northeast region are also supported by the U.S. Geological Survey Northeast Climate Adaptation Science Center (NECASC) with timely and well-developed summaries of complex climate science research, included in this Plan. Climate data compilation, modeling and analysis (e.g., Staudinger et al. 2024) have greatly advanced in recent years, but under these dynamic conditions, additional studies are needed to understand the pervasive threat of climate change. Allied in this climate science is the Regional Invasive Species and Climate Change (RISCC) network which assesses the mutually synergistic effects of climate change and invasive species. NECASC and RISCC are regional scale partners for 2025-35 PA WAP implementation.

The PGC and PFBC will remain active participants in the Northeast Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (NEAFWA) and SWAP relevant committees, including the Northeast Fish and Wildlife Diversity Technical Committee (NEFWDTC) and SWAP Subcommittee. The NEFWDTC guides numerous initiatives supporting regional data collection and analyses. For example, the NEFWDTC provides technical input



for Regional Conservation Needs Program and Competitive State and Tribal Wildlife Grant projects, with products from many studies used throughout this Plan.

Additionally, AFWA leads several national and international work groups and programs with which PGC and PFBC will continue to partner for SGCN recovery. For example, AFWA coordinates the multi-partner Southern Wings program to support and advance habitat conservation, management, and research for priority migratory birds that spend up to eight months of the year outside of the United States (*Southern Wings*; <https://southern-wings.fishwildlife.org/>).

Tribal Governments

Throughout 2025-35 PA WAP implementation, the PGC and PFBC will work to provide opportunities for federally recognized tribes, historically present in Pennsylvania to contribute to SGCN habitat and population recovery and 2035-45 PA WAP development. Coordinating with Native American Tribes is currently constrained by several factors including limited tribal resources (e.g., staffing, funding), limited PGC and PFBC resources (e.g., staffing), and administrative barriers for coordinating with tribal sovereign nations. With assistance from federal agencies, especially USFWS, we aim to develop an enduring partnership with federally recognized tribal nations historically connected to Pennsylvania.

Summary

Conservation partners are essential to an effective and enduring plan. In Pennsylvania, partners supporting the PA WAP encompass broad ecological interests and expertise. For the 2025-35 PA WAP, the knowledge, support and enthusiasm of these partners contributed immeasurably to the PA WAP revision process and will be indispensable to the Plan's successful implementation. Through the next decade, we will continue collaborating with these partners while fostering new relationships to guide innovative technologies (e.g., Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Map), develop novel applied research and survey techniques, and implement priority conservation actions. For this coordination, as we progress into 2025-35 PA WAP implementation, we will maintain our current administrative (e.g., Steering, Advisory, technical committees) and operational (e.g., Wildlife Action Plan Coordinators) structure, adapting when needed to accommodate dynamic environments. This approach will allow us to effectively work with partners and Commission staff, oversee relevant projects (e.g., Wildlife Action Map), and track implementation progress.

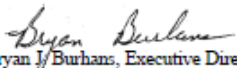
We are pleased to announce that the Pennsylvania Game Commission and Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission will comprehensively review and revise, as needed, the 2015-2025 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan, with submission of the revised plan by October 1, 2025. A project timeline is attached for your reference.

For nearly 20 years, Pennsylvania's Wildlife Action Plans have guided the Commonwealth's at-risk species management and galvanized the Commissions and partners with a common purpose to secure our Species of Greatest Conservation Need and their habitats for future generations. Since 2005, this work has delisted, upgraded (i.e., from state endangered to threatened), or recovered 27 species in the state. This notable progress is well-aligned with congressional intent of the State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program to avoid species endangerment. Further, the Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan Conservation Opportunity Area Tool has enhanced our Plan's accessibility by the public and practitioners.

Understandably, considerable work remains, and we look forward to advancing our efforts under the 2025-2035 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan (Plan). Through our new Plan, we will tackle ongoing and emerging environmental threats using innovative techniques for species recovery and enhancing implementation through advanced technologies to make the new Plan more readily usable by staff, partners, and public.

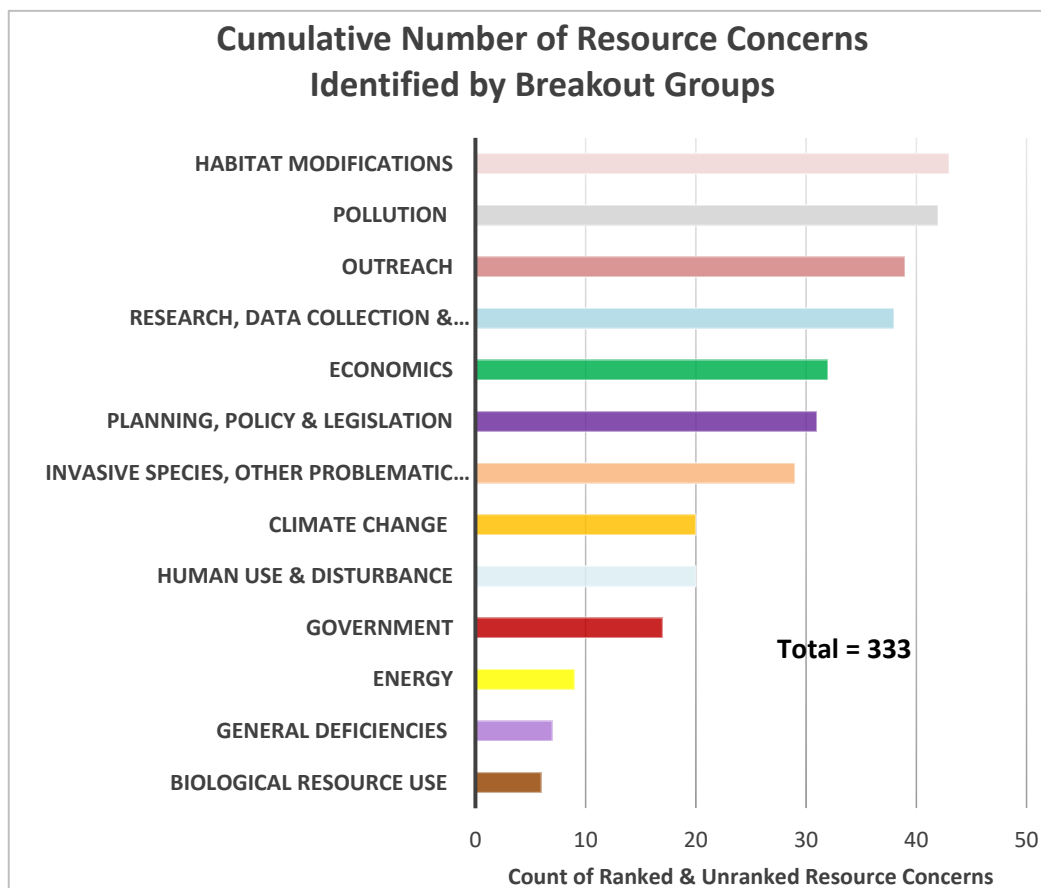

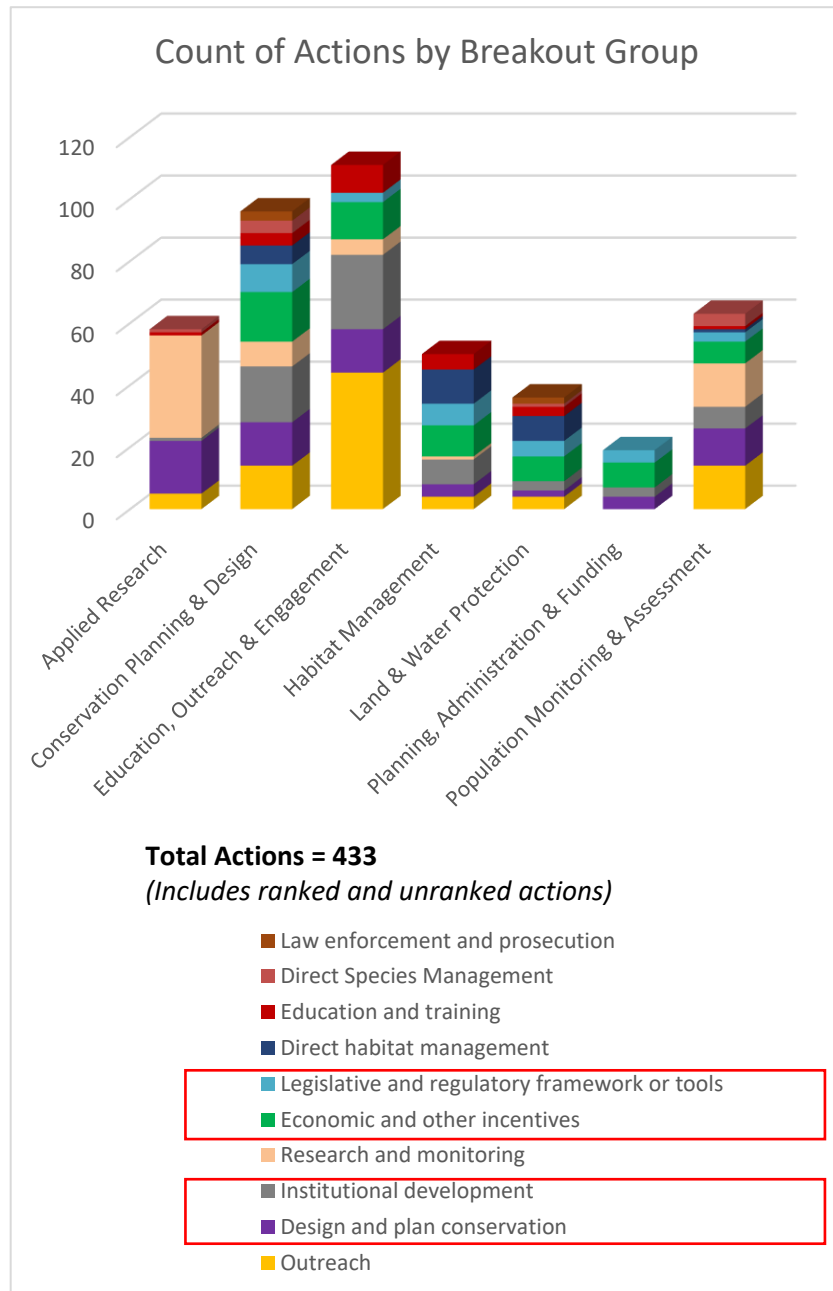

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On March 7th and 8th, 2024, in State College, PA, the Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) and Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) hosted the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity (FWD) Forum. We initiated the event to enlist conservation partner recommendations for the 2025-2035 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan (PA WAP) implementation and, through pre- and post-meeting surveys, assess constraints and benefits of the 2015-2025 PA WAP.

For State Wildlife Action Plans, states are obligated to fulfill eight Required Elements. Of these congressionally identified directives, Required Element 7 mandates states to *“coordinate with federal, state, local agencies and Indian tribes as part of implementation and comprehensive review and revision of State Wildlife Action Plans.”* The 2024 FWD Forum supported this Required Element, but also contributed to Required Elements 3 (Threats), 4 (Conservation Actions), and 5 (Monitoring). Acquired information will support the 2025-2035 PA WAP.

PFBC and PGC Executive Directors distributed invitations to over 230 individuals from 137 state and federal agencies (including subunits/affiliates), nongovernmental organizations (e.g., conservation districts, environmental educators, local land use planners, implementation groups), and tribal governments. These invitations yielded 82 participants from 58 entities (including affiliates/subunits).

Five plenary presenters provided a national overview of State Wildlife Action Plans and specific PA WAP implementation by the PGC and PFBC. This essential background material led into the seven facilitated breakout groups which formed the primary venue for participants to share their extensive knowledge of resource concerns and associated conservation actions. These breakout groups were immensely productive with over 300 resource concerns and 400 conservation actions identified.

Through a post-Forum survey, respondents offered valuable feedback on the ease of use and interpretation of 2015-2025 PA WAP and Conservation Opportunity Area (COA) Tool which will guide the PGC and PFBC as they consider the structure and content of the 2025-2035 PA WAP. Overall, the Forum met or exceeded attendee expectations and provided a venue for fostering collaboration and networking.

ABOUT THE FORUM

Background

The Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan (PA WAP), led by the Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) and Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC), is the authoritative decadal blueprint for conserving Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) and an essential resource for conservation partners across the Commonwealth. Initiating and nurturing partnerships is integral to advancing conservation, thus the role of partnerships is securely imbedded in federal State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program enabling legislation. Congressionally required Element 7 mandates states to *“coordinate with federal, state, local agencies and Indian tribes as part of implementation and comprehensive review and revision of State Wildlife Action Plans.”*

In 2012, the PGC convened the Wildlife Diversity Forum (2012 WDF) bringing together conservation partners from across Pennsylvania to provide crucial input on resource needs and potential actions to support wildlife diversity and the forthcoming 2015-2025 PA WAP (see AFWA 2012). This event was instrumental in framing important issues and sparking creative solutions, such as the concept of a web-based tool to visualize where PA WAP actions should occur. The Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan Conservation Opportunity Area (COA) Tool, which launched in August 2019, eventually emerged from these ideas. With success of the 2012 WDF well-documented, the PA WAP Steering Committee approved a Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum (2024 FWD Forum) to enlist from conservation partners their perspectives on the implementation and constraints of the 2015-2025 PA WAP and support the development of 2025-2035 PA WAP.

Further, the 2024 FWD Forum was identified in the 2016 PA WAP Communications Strategy and addressed select 2015-2025 PA WAP, goals, objectives, and strategies (i.e., broad to fine scale). Among these, Goal 5 specifies the PGC and PFBC will *continue to improve cooperation within and between public agencies and other partners in wildlife conservation planning and implementation* of which one of the objectives (5.1) is to *maintain an effective Wildlife Action Plan*. Within this objective, two strategies are particularly relevant:

Strategy 5.1.1. Convene conservation partners at a frequency sufficient to assess knowledge gaps, document progress and ensure a relevant State Wildlife Action Plan.

Strategy 5.1.2. Coordinate with local, state, and federal governments, private landowners, and other conservation partner to support Pennsylvania's Wildlife Action Plan.

Overall, the 2024 FWD Forum addressed federally required Element 7 (Partners), supported required Elements 3 (Threats), 4 (Conservation Actions), and 5 (Monitoring) while contributing to 2015-2025 PA WAP implementation.

Purpose

The PFBC and PGC convened the 2024 FWD Forum to enlist conservation partner recommendations for the 2025-2035 PA WAP and, through pre- and post-meeting surveys, understand implementation and constraints of the 2015-2025 PA WAP.

Objectives

1. Information Exchange: Serve as venue for exchanging information and strategies among conservation leaders, educators, local officials, and conservation professionals across Pennsylvania on conservation responsibilities, status of Pennsylvania Species of Greatest Conservation Need fish, wildlife, and their habitats and funding the conservation of legacy species (plenary session).
2. Highlight Accomplishments: Inform conservation leaders, educators, local officials and conservation professionals of PA WAP accomplishments and progress over the past decade (plenary session and displays).

3. Identify Conservation Concerns and Actions: Gather insight from conservation stakeholders on short-term (5-10 years) needs and strategies for critical conservation actions that would benefit priority species (nominal group process).
4. Inspire Action: Motivate multiple stakeholders to better understand and engage/advance fish and wildlife conservation programs and projects at the local, state, and national level (facilitated discussion, networking opportunities).
5. Highlight Species & Habitats: Present PA WAP approaches and resources that may facilitate actions benefitting priority species and habitats (displays).
6. Encourage Participation: Describe opportunities to actively participate in Pennsylvania fish and wildlife conservation (volunteer opportunities).

Anticipated Outcome(s)

1. Essential input from partners on PA WAP implementation, conservation concerns and potential actions, barriers, and solutions.
2. Identified needs for the 2025-2035 PA WAP including: planning, implementation, funding, coordination, and other issues.
3. Advance collaboration between governmental and non-governmental entities.

APPROACH

Overview

Co-hosted by the PGC and PFBC, with administrative support from the Pennsylvania Biological Survey (PABS) and funding support from Foundation for Pennsylvania Watersheds (FPW), the 2024 FWD Forum was convened March 7-8th in State College, PA. Spanning 1.5 days, the Forum included five plenary presentations, seven facilitated breakout groups, a keynote banquet presentation and concluded in the afternoon, March 8th with an all-participant summary of breakout group discussions (see [Appendix A: Agenda](#)). The PGC and PFBC fostered communication with invitees and registrants, prior to, during and after the event by materials posted to an event web page and via email.

Audience

PFBC and PGC Executive Directors distributed invitations to over 230 individuals from 137 state and federal agencies (including subunits/affiliates), nongovernmental organizations (e.g., conservation districts, environmental educators, local land use planners, implementation groups), and tribal governments through the PGC GovDelivery digital communications system. To address priority topics efficiently and effectively, it was important that participants had broad knowledge and experience within their agency/organization. Therefore, within these entities, invitations were directed primarily towards program managers, organization leaders (e.g., presidents, tribal leaders), academicians, researchers, and PABS Executive Committee members and relevant Technical Committee Chairs ([Appendix B: Attendees](#)).

Scholarships

Optimizing participation by reducing financial barriers to nongovernmental organization attendance was of particular interest to the PGC and PFBC. To support this intention, PABS secured a \$2,000 convening grant from FPW from which they offered competitive travel scholarships to offset participation costs. Invitees received email announcements for scholarship availability and PGC posted information on the event web page. Three organizations requested, and were granted, assistance. With approval from FPW, PABS applied remaining funds to limited, specific uses to offset Forum costs.

Surveys

The PGC and PFBC enlisted participant input through pre- and post- Forum surveys (Microsoft® Forms). Results from these surveys offered crucial information that guided Forum development and perspectives on the 2015-2025 PA WAP that will inform the 2025-2035 PA WAP.

Agenda

Plenary session presenters welcomed participants and provided foundational information especially focusing on PA WAP planning, implementation, partnerships, Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN) recovery, and monitoring.

PGC and PFBC staff-facilitated thematic breakout groups garnered detailed information for the 2025-2035 PA WAP. During event registration, participants prioritized their preferred breakout group from seven topics/themes adapted from the 2012 WDF groups (Table 1). Following registration, we reviewed the number of participants and affiliations for parity and consistency among groups. In most cases, we assigned participants to their first or second priority topic, with rare exception requiring assignment to lower priority topics. We instructed participants to stay with the same breakout group throughout the event, enabling the discussions to build from resource concerns to actions over the 1.5 days.

We provided PGC and PFBC staff facilitators and recorders detailed guidance and an MS-Excel template file for recording participant responses. Following an introductory period for breakout group members, facilitators posed the question: *What concerns need to be addressed, now or within the next 10-12 years, to conserve Pennsylvania's diversity of fish, wildlife, and their habitats?* The intent of this discussion was to assess threats, stressors, needs, and barriers to fish and wildlife conservation in the remaining 2015-2025 PA WAP and upcoming 2025-2035 iteration. After listing concerns, participants ranked the concerns as “high”, “moderate”, or “low” priority using a weighted scoring rubric. We then sorted concern scores from high-to-low for the subsequent task of identifying actions to address priority concerns.

Table 1. 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum breakout group themes. Participants prioritized their preference during registration and remained in the same group throughout the event.

- Applied Research
- Conservation Planning & Design
- Education, Outreach & Engagement
- Habitat Management
- Land and Water Protection

- Population Monitoring

Facilitators asked: *For each identified priority concern, what are the critical conservation actions that must be taken to address it?* As with the initial question regarding “concerns”, as time allowed, conservation actions were ranked as “high”, “moderate”, and “low”. Additionally, participants were asked to identify partners who would be involved in implementing the conservation action and a categorical timeframe (years) for initiating implementation (i.e., 0-3, 4-7, 8-12).

From the seven breakout groups (Table 1; Figure 1), we compiled and synthesized information to maintain details while harmonizing similar information to enhance interpretation. We then combined resource concerns and conservation sections from all breakout groups and assigned each to standardized threats and action categories identified in the 2022 Northeast Lexicon (Crisfield and NEAFWA 2022) to facilitate event synthesis and better align with 2025-2035 PA WAP development.

We removed unranked resource concerns from the count because unranked concerns lacked associated conservation actions. We assumed these concerns to be purposefully excluded by the group.

The standardized threat categories do not account for indirect threats to species or habitats. Therefore, we adopted additional themes for organizing individual concerns as applicable.

RESULTS

Audience

PFBC and PGC Executive Director invitations garnered a total of 82 attendees from 58 entities (including affiliates/subunits) ([Appendix B: Attendees](#)). Additionally, 27 PGC and PFBC staff participated as emcee, plenary speakers, facilitators, recorders, and on-site support staff. Including PA WAP Advisory Committee members and special guests (e.g., PGC Commissioner Pride), 110 individuals attended the Forum in total.

Plenary Session

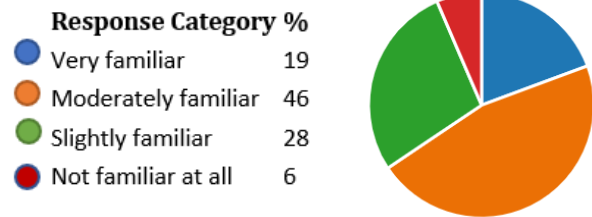


Figure 2. Responses by 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum registrants to the pre-event survey question: *How familiar are you with the 2015-2025 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan?*

Prior to the event, sixty-five percent (65%) of participants were “very” or “moderately” familiar with the PA WAP, with only 6% “not at all” familiar (Figure 2). For participants with “slight” or “no” PA WAP familiarity, plenary presentations ([Appendix A: Agenda](#)) provided context for the breakout group discussions.

Opening the session was emcee Matthew Schnupp, PhD (PGC) and, on behalf of the PGC and PFBC, PFBC Executive Director Tim Schaeffer, PhD, provided a warm, inspiring, welcome (Figure 3). Mark Humpert (Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies) provided an overview of State Wildlife Action Plans, their historical significance and role in current conservation. Building on this, Lisa Williams (PGC) discussed the many parts needed for productive conservation, leading into Chris Urban’s (PFBC) review of conservation successes, such as species delisting, and acknowledging the long-term commitment required for these achievements. Scott Bearer, PhD (PGC) reflected on the role of partnerships in conservation and Sean Murphy, PhD (PGC) illustrated landscape-scale partnerships and technological advances in bird conservation with the Motus Wildlife Tracking system. Universally, all presenters attributed the importance of partnerships for the

many successes thus far and emphasized their essential role for future conservation advancements.

Breakout Groups Overview

Collectively, breakout groups identified and ranked over 300 unique resource concerns and over 430 conservation actions. Given time constraints and topic complexity, not all breakout groups were able to identify conservation actions for priority concerns, or if conservation actions were identified, were unable to assign a priority rank. Throughout this report, counts or percentage display of concerns or actions do not imply or impart statistical significance, but rather offer context for the number of ideas noted about

a topic. Here, we offer an initial digest of extensive information garnered from breakout group participants that will continue to be refined as we develop the 2025-2035 PA WAP.

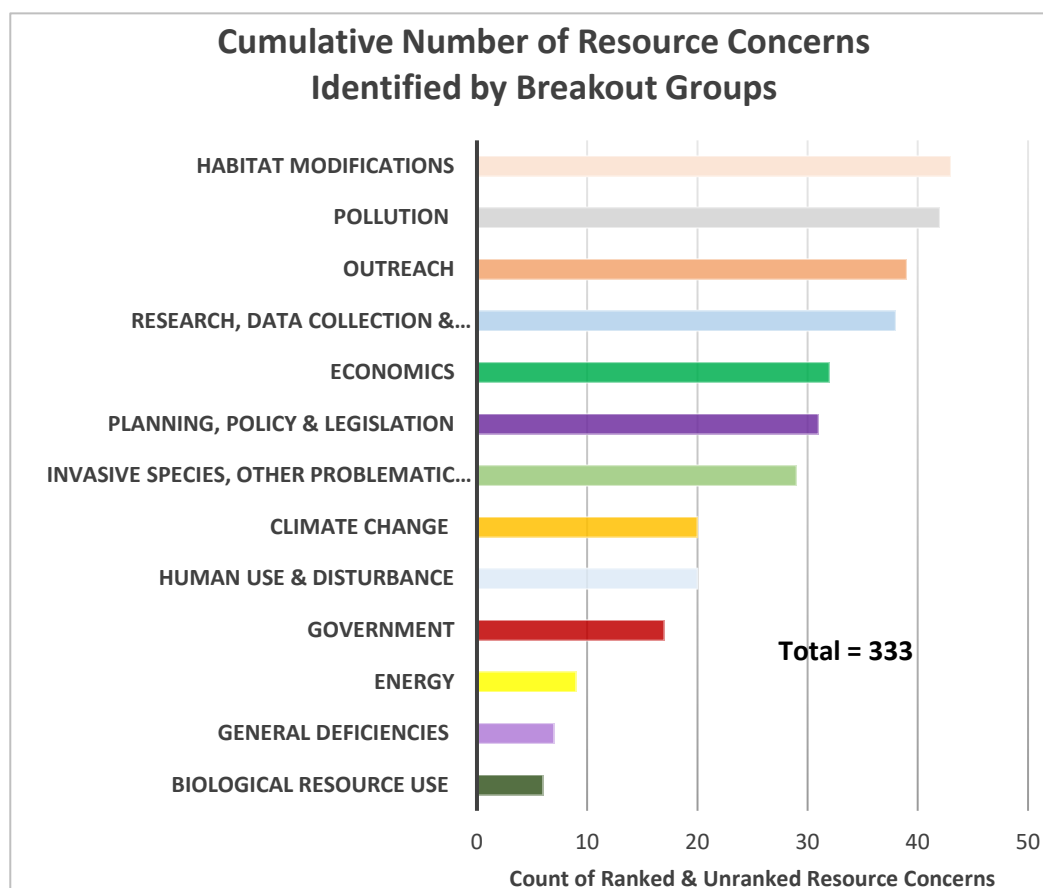


Figure 4. Number of unique resource concerns identified by 2024 Fish & wildlife Diversity Forum breakout groups, organized by theme/category. Includes ranked resource concerns or unranked resource concerns with ranked Actions.

From a simple count of topics within these themes, we found the top four concern categories to be *Habitat Modifications*, *Pollution*, *Research*, *Outreach*, and *Data Collection & Management* (Figure 4). These concerns were followed by similarly numbered *Economics*, *Policy & Legislation*, and *Invasive Species and other Problematic Diseases and Genes*.

Within the major themes, we compiled sub-topics (Table 2) and, though not a comprehensive list, collectively illustrate the broad scope of concerns facing Pennsylvania's fish and wildlife resources as identified by breakout group members. As the state's comprehensive reference for SGCN and their habitats, the PA WAP brings together these concerns and associated actions to guide recovery and management.

Concerns by Breakout Group

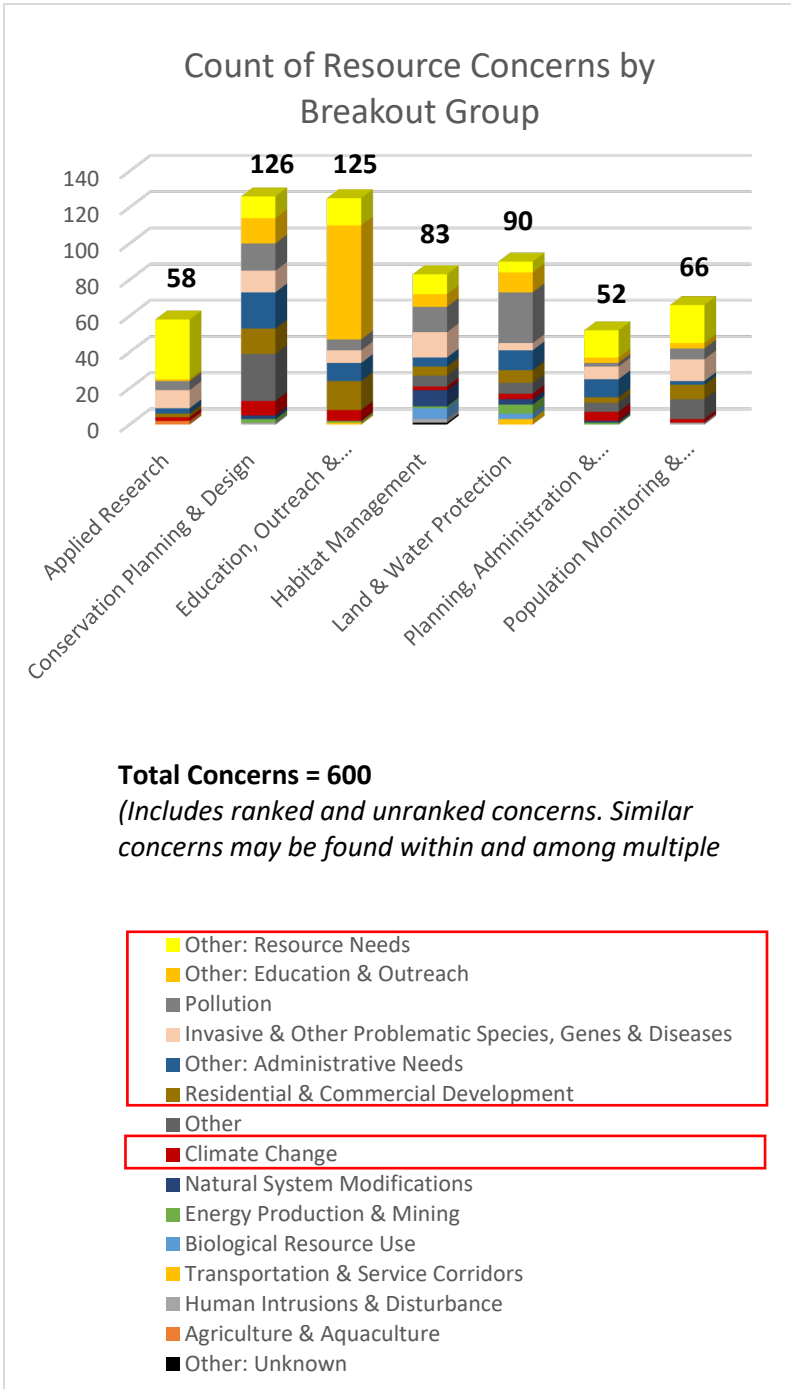


Figure 5. Total resource concerns identified by breakout groups during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum. Red boxes indicate common concerns identified among all breakout groups.

Each breakout group was thematically different, yet groups identified common resource concerns. Common categories among all groups included: *Other: Resource Needs* (19%), *Other: Education & Outreach* (17%), *Pollution* (13%), *Invasive & Other Problematic Species, Genes & Diseases* (11%), *Other: Administrative Needs* (10%), *Residential & Commercial Development* (9%), and *Climate Change* (5%) (Figure 5; [Appendix D: Results](#)). Notably, the generic category *Other: Resource Needs* includes topics such as inadequate funding, lack of personnel or human capacity, insufficient data or information, and similar deficiencies.

Actions by Breakout Group

Similarly, we placed conservation actions within defined categories and summarized them by breakout groups. For the 433 conservation actions identified, *Outreach* accounted for more overall actions (20%) than other action categories, though it was not noted by every breakout group. All groups noted four action categories including *Design*

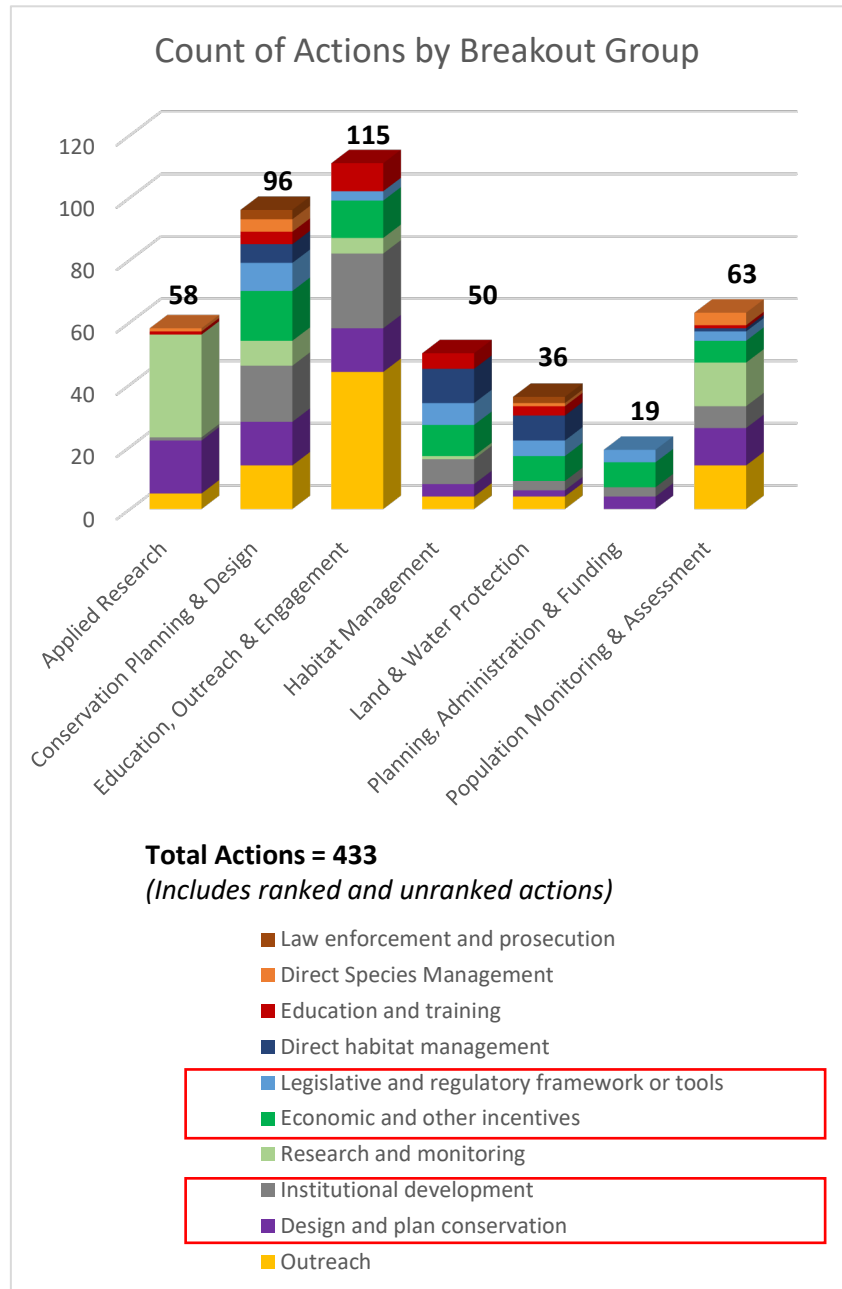


Figure 6. Summary counts of categorically classified conservation actions by breakout groups during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum. Red boxes indicate Actions common among all breakout groups.

and Plan Conservation (16%), Institutional Development (15%), Economic and Other Incentives (14%), and Legislative and Regulatory Framework or Tools (7%) (Figure 6). Differences in the number of actions identified by breakout groups is attributable to differential complexity of breakout group topics.

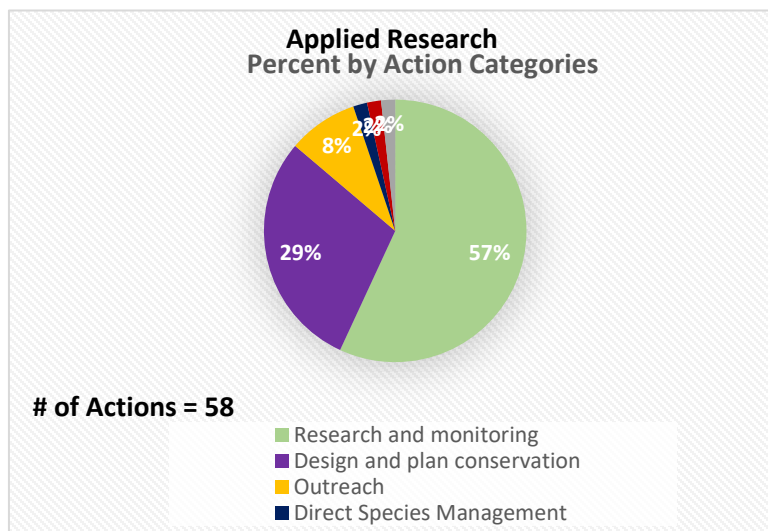


Figure 7. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Applied Research breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

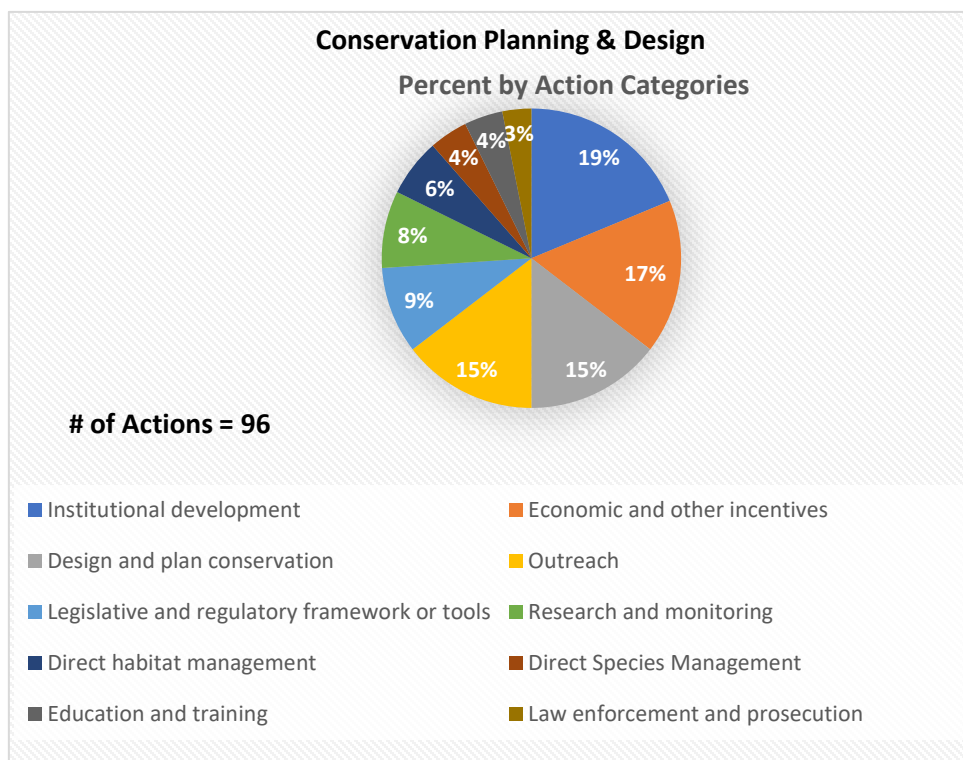


Figure 8. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Conservation Planning & Design breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

Within each breakout group, priority topics varied. Not surprisingly, the **Applied Research breakout group** indicated *Research and Monitoring* as a priority, encompassing 57% of all topics, followed by *Design and Plan Conservation* (29%) and *Outreach* (8%) (Figure 7). With its broad theme and scope, conservation actions identified by the **Conservation Planning & Design breakout group** fell within all 11 categories, with four categories - *Institutional Development*, *Economic and Other Incentives*, *Design and Plan Conservation*, and *Outreach* - ranging from 15-19% each, encompassing 65% of all 96 actions (Figure 8). The remaining seven action categories contained 3% to 9% each of the identified actions.

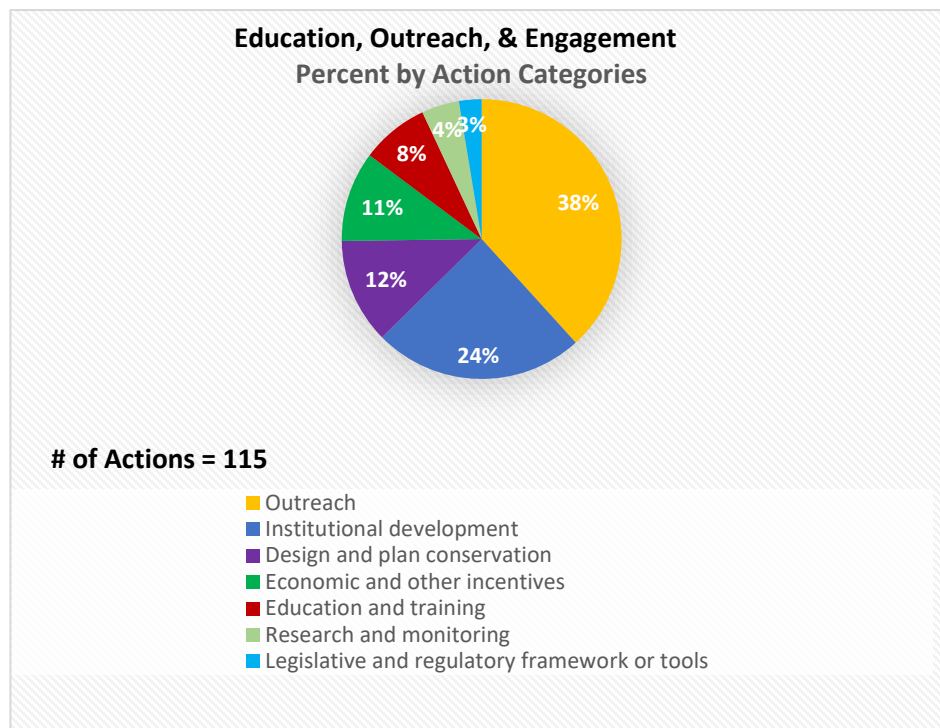


Figure 9. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Education, Outreach & Engagement breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

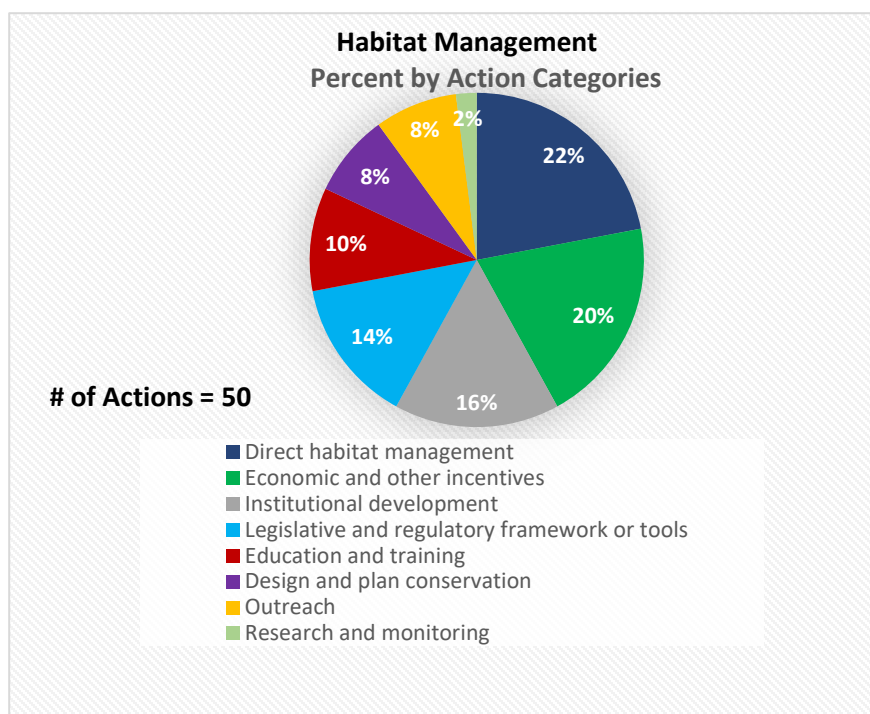


Figure 10. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Habitat Management breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

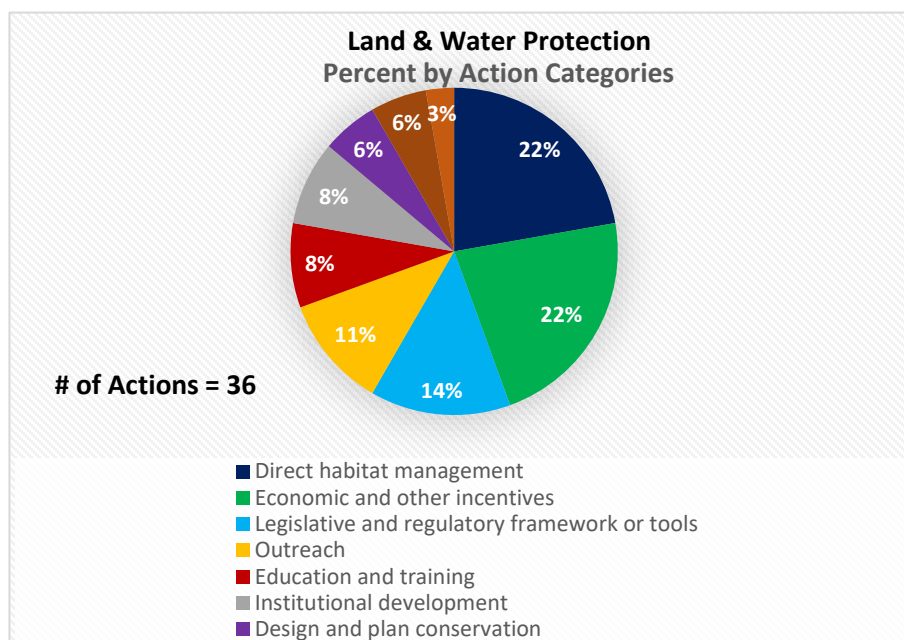


Figure 11. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Land and Water Protection breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

Outreach (38%) actions understandably dominated the **Education, Outreach, and Engagement breakout group**, followed by *Institutional Development* (24%), *Design and Plan Conservation* (12%), and *Economic and Other Incentives* (11%) (Figure 9). The **Habitat Management breakout group** identified 50 actions, with 58% falling within three categories: *Direct Habitat Management* (22%), *Economic and Other Incentives* (20%), and *Institutional Development* (16%) (Figure 10). Within the **Land & Water Protection breakout group**, *Direct Habitat Management* and *Economic and Other Incentives* (22%) led the categories (Figure 11).

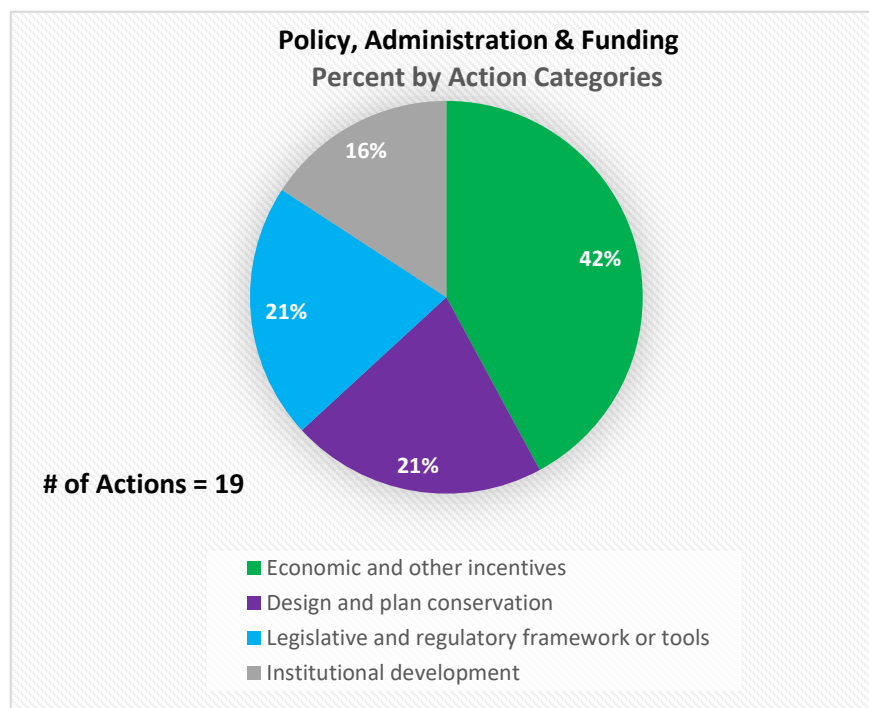


Figure 12. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Policy, Administration & Funding breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

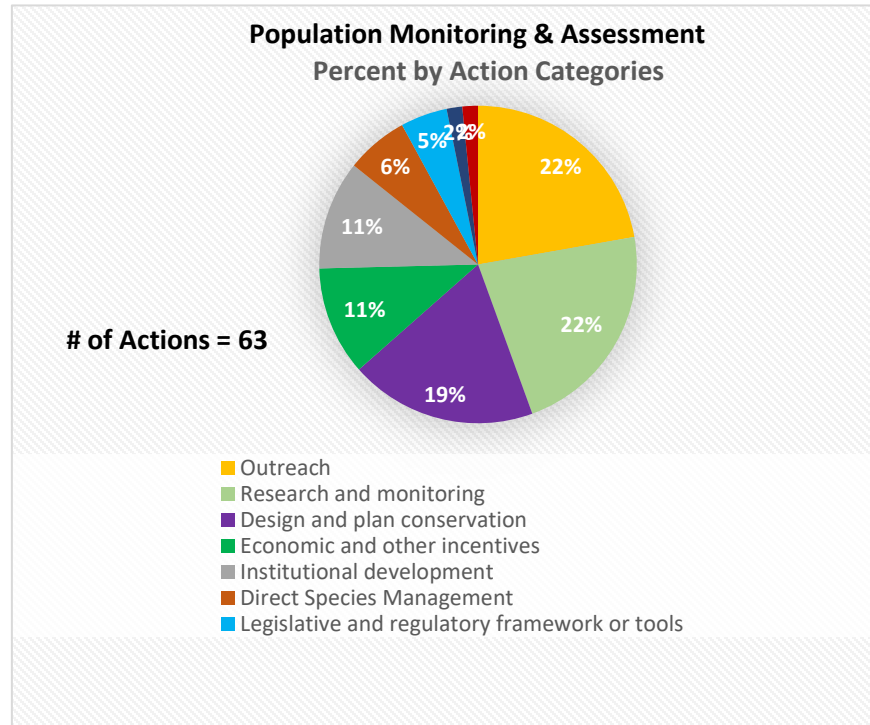


Figure 13. Percent distribution of conservation actions identified by the Population Monitoring & Assessment breakout group during the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum.

Notably, these two categories similarly dominated Habitat Management group actions. Within the **Policy, Administration & Funding breakout group**, *Economic and Other Incentives* accounted for nearly half (42%) of the 19 identified actions (Figure 12). Sixty-three percent (63%) of **Population Monitoring & Assessment breakout group** actions fell within three categories *Outreach*, *Research and Monitoring*, and *Design and Plan Conservation* (Figure 13).

Posters

We offered all registrants the opportunity to present a poster on PA WAP relevant topics. Four abstracts were submitted and accepted ([Appendix C: Poster abstracts](#)), with posters available for viewing throughout the event and especially during the Thursday evening social when authors were present to answer questions.

Banquet Keynote Address

As part of the banquet festivities, Scott Weidensaul delivered a special presentation entitled, “Taking Pennsylvania’s Fish and Wildlife to a Brighter Future,” in which he noted that fish and wildlife face many challenges to survival, yet technological breakthroughs and informed management strategies are providing hope for recovery (Figure 14). Weidensaul is a renowned author of nearly 30 books on natural history, including the Pulitzer Prize finalist *Living on the Wind* and his latest, the New York Times bestseller *A World on the Wing*. A native of Pennsylvania now living in New Hampshire, he is a contributing editor for Audubon and writes for a variety of other publications, including Bird Watcher's Digest (BWD) and Living Bird. He is a Fellow of the American Ornithological Society and an active field researcher, studying saw-whet owl migration for more than 25 years, as well as winter hummingbirds in the East, bird migration in Alaska, and the winter movements of snowy owls through Project SNOWstorm, which he co-founded.

Surveys

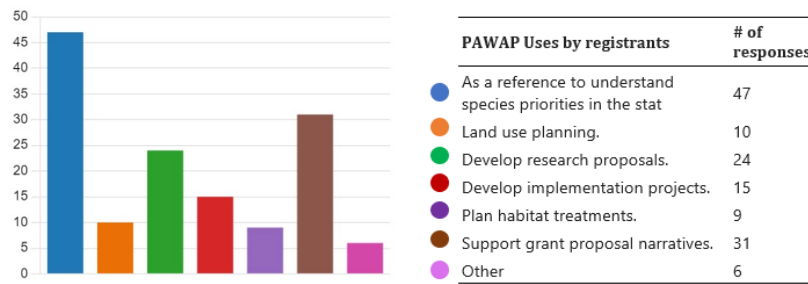


Figure 15. Pre-event survey respondents indicating familiarity with the 2015-2025 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan, were also asked how they used the 2015-2025 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan. Multiple responses were allowed.

To further inform 2025-2035 PA WAP development, we wished to understand *how* registrants use the 2015-2025 PA WAP. Of the available pre-event survey options, respondents could select all that applied. Overall, respondents noted the PA WAP was especially helpful *as a reference to understand species priorities in the state* (47%), *to support grant proposal narratives* (31%), and *to develop research proposals* (24%) (Figure 15). To a lesser extent, the PA WAP has been used *to develop implementation projects* (24%), *for land use planning* (10%), and *to plan habitat treatments* (9%).

Post-Forum Survey

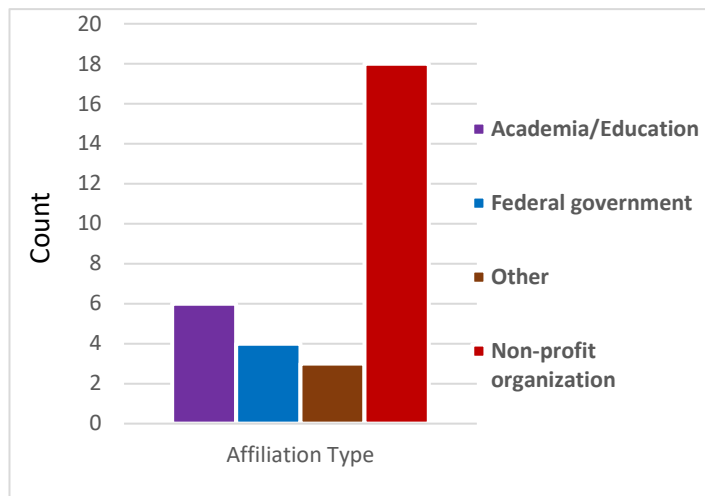


Figure 16. Count of respondents by affiliation type to post-Forum survey.

We conducted a post-forum survey to garner registered participant perspectives regarding the PA WAP and on the event. We received 31 responses (37.8% response rate), with over half representing non-

profit organizations (Figure 16). Affiliations of four respondents constituted the “Other” category. For non-profit organizations, we expanded our questioning to inquire about the number of Pennsylvanians collectively represented at the Forum. Non-profit organizations have members who are passionate about natural resources and may be dues-paying members, volunteers, or those simply interested in knowing more about the organization’s conservation work. Post-forum survey respondents accounted for a subset of all non-profit organization Forum participants yet represented over 101,000 Pennsylvanians.

As planned, the Forum was structured to expand participant’s knowledge about the PA WAP and broader conservation issues with the plenary session offering foundational information for consistent

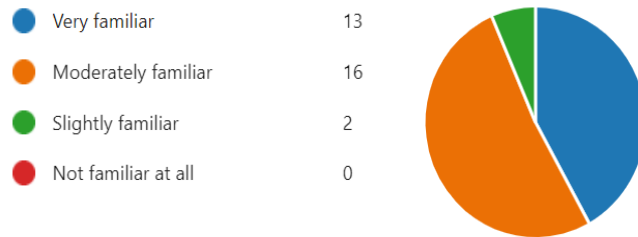


Figure 17. Post-Forum survey responses to the question "How familiar are you with the 2015-2025 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan?"

understanding for all participants. At the most basic level, the event was successful in this endeavor with all respondents to the post-Forum survey indicating familiarity with the PA WAP and, collectively, over 93% expressing they were “Very” or “Moderately” familiar with the PA WAP (Figure 17), compared to a combined 65% for the same categories in the pre-Forum responses (Figure 2).

Increased understanding by participants of key topics was also illustrated through self-assessment of pre- and post- Forum knowledge of PGC and PFBC agency missions, as well as projects supporting

SGCN ([Appendix E](#), Questions 9 and 10). All post-Forum respondents had “Moderate” or “Extensive” knowledge of PGC and PFBC missions. Knowledge ratings improved for PGC SGCN projects, increasing from 71% to over 93% for the combined “Moderate” and “Extensive” knowledge categories. Even greater improvement occurred for PFBC SGCN projects, for these same knowledge categories, increasing from a combined 54.9% prior to the event to a cumulative 87% “Moderate” and “Extensive” post-Forum.

For some participants, expectations for the Forum may have been influenced by attendance at the successful 2012 Wildlife Diversity Forum. Other participants were unfamiliar with the PA WAP. So, after attending, we wanted to know to what extent participant's expectations were met. Nearly all post-event survey respondents (96.7%) indicated the event "met" or "exceeded" expectations ([Appendix E](#), questions 5 -

6). Additionally, an anticipated Forum outcome was enhanced collaboration and, similarly (96.7%) of post-Forum survey respondents indicated the event was successful and offered networking opportunities ([Appendix E](#), Questions 7 - 8).

The 2015-2025 PA WAP - Understanding the Present, Building for the Future

The PGC and PFBC are eager to understand how the PA WAP, as a "living" document, can be more useful to Pennsylvania's conservation community. Thus, recognizing the benefits and constraints of the 2015-2025 PA WAP would be especially helpful for guiding development of the 2025-2035 PA WAP. Overall, respondents agreed the 2015-2025 PA WAP is accessible (74%), easy to use (61%), easy to understand (67%), has useful information (96%), and is relevant to their work (77%) ([Appendix E](#), Questions 13 & 14). Yet, despite positive responses regarding the information and relevancy, respondents expressed difficulty in using and interpreting the 2015-2025 PA WAP. The PGC and PFBC will seriously consider these important and timely comments as the 2025-2035 PA WAP is developed.

From the early days of State Wildlife Action Plans, technological and outreach advances have expanded opportunities for making material in the SWAPs more available and appealing to audiences. So, we asked: *What features or content would increase the likelihood you will use the Wildlife Action Plan?* ([Appendix E](#), Question 15). Primarily, respondents noted increased accessibility through interactive tools, searchable keywords, and trainings.

The PGC and PFBC similarly asked about the Conservation Opportunity Area (COA) Tool. For this tool, respondents agreed it was accessible (63%), easy to use (57%), easy to understand (50%), has useful information (80%), and is relevant to my (their) work (58%). As with the PA WAP document, the COA Tool appears most limited in its ease of use and interpretation ([Appendix E](#), Questions 16, 17 & 18). Again, suggestions on how to improve included training, promotion, and marketing. These comments are especially helpful as the PGC and PFBC prepare to adapt the COA Tool to the 2025-2035 PA WAP.

To expand awareness and usefulness of both the PA WAP and COA Tool, respondents provided several suggestions including webinars, use of social media (e.g., Facebook, LinkedIn), public outreach events, links to videos on websites, webinar talks with outreach to new audiences and other options for the PGC and PFBC to consider for the 2025-2035 PA WAP ([Appendix C, Question 19](#)).

DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS

Resolving fish and wildlife challenges is beyond the scope or capacity of any single entity, thus collaborating on topics of mutual interest results in more effective conservation and enduring outcomes. The PA WAP is the Commonwealth's comprehensive guide for protecting and recovering SGCN. Acting upon this desire for collaboration, the 2024 Fish & Wildlife Diversity Forum brought together leaders of Pennsylvania's conservation community to elicit their concerns and potential solutions to be considered for the 2025-2035 PA WAP. The PGC and PFBC invited a broad group of agencies and organizations, including industry and tribal representatives with relevance to Pennsylvania's SGCN or their habitats. Not all invitees were able to attend, but, unless otherwise expressed, will continue to receive information for their awareness and can provide feedback on interim PA WAP materials.

Common topics highlighted by event breakout group participants can reflect the current mindset of the conservation community. The seven thematic breakout groups (~8-15 participants per group) were extremely productive, providing a rich and diverse expression of participant's knowledge and experience on complex topics. Though more than a decade has elapsed since the 2012 Wildlife Diversity Forum, habitat loss and fragmentation, pollution, floral and faunal invasive species, climate change, deer browse, staff capacity, and funding limitations remain chronic concerns or needs. Importantly, the frequency of habitat loss and fragmentation mentions may infer a greater sense of action urgency. Emerging concerns may be a contributing factor, such as the rapid pace of land conversion from large-scale solar development and shipping warehouses. Additional common emerging resource concerns or needs included gas and solar decommissioning/site restoration, climate refugee accommodation, understanding/addressing wildlife health threats, thwarting invertebrate declines and adopting orphaned taxa, and establishing long-term monitoring stations statewide. Plastic, light, and noise pollution are more recent concerns identified by several groups. Emphasized during the plenary question and answer session, and expressed in nearly all breakout groups, was concern for the lack of ethnic and racial diversity in the conservation field. Coupled with this lack of diversity is youth apathy and disconnection with nature, leading to fewer skilled conservation professionals in years ahead.

Despite the numerous and significant resource challenges identified, groups met them head-on, developing creative and tangible solutions for the most pressing needs. Several groups noted novel approaches to incentivizing conservation, especially for private landowners. With most of the Pennsylvania land area in private ownership it will be critical to enhance conservation efforts on private land and increase involvement of private landowners as partners in coming years. As expressed by several groups, private lands will be especially important to support resilient landscapes as climate changes. Short- and long-term funding is necessary and critical, particularly expedient access to capitalize quickly on new opportunities. Highlighted were the importance of leveraging partner organizations to pursue conservation funding and a suggestion to include an invasive species line item in the state budget (e.g., support Partnership for Region Invasive Species Management (PRISM)). To address a paucity of ethnic and racial diversity in the conservation field and engage youth, ideas included identifying role models, expanding youth outdoor corps, direct marketing campaigns, offering paid internships, and 'gamifying' conservation.

Discussed above are the proverbial ‘tip of the iceberg’ regarding Forum results. The expansive record of resource concerns and conservation actions noted in this report ([Appendix D: Results](#)) exemplifies the extensive contributions by participants. Group efficiency was supported by PFBC and PGC facilitators and recorders who kept discussions relevant to target topics. The PGC and PFBC will continue synthesizing and analyzing the expansive breakout group input throughout the PA WAP revision process.

Post-event participant survey results indicate we achieved our intended objectives to provide a venue for information exchange and highlight implementation accomplishments, identify critical concerns and actions needed over the next decade, and motivate implementation through networking opportunities. Most attendees increased knowledge of PGC and PFBC missions and projects supporting SGCN, which will hopefully inspire new partnerships. We were pleased that the event met or exceeded expectations of 97% respondents, with many stating they made new contacts with whom they are already pursuing collaborative projects. Survey responses provided essential feedback regarding need for WAP and COA Tool improved accessibility and ease-of-use, which we will strongly consider going forward. New technologies and updated USFWS administrative guidance for paperless SWAPs offer options for the PGC and PFBC to explore so the 2025-2035 PA WAP is more accessible and easier to use.

Overall, and importantly, the knowledge and energy of partners and staff participating in the Forum, and associated surveys, provided valuable feedback on the 2015-2025 PA WAP and information for developing the 2025-2035 PA WAP. As mentioned many times in the plenary session, partnerships are crucial to success of our collective endeavors as we *move fish and wildlife conservation forward into the next decade!*

POSTER SESSION ABSTRACTS

INTEGRATING WILDLIFE HEALTH PRIORITIES IN THE 2025-2035 PENNSYLVANIA WILDLIFE ACTION PLAN

Wildlife health threats include disease-causing organisms, toxins, and pollutants that may negatively impact species or entire taxonomic orders, potentially leading to ecosystem-wide disruptions. This developing project will identify and prioritize existing and emerging health threats that may lead to population-level impacts for Pennsylvania Species of Greatest Conservation Need (SGCN). It will describe knowledge gaps, identify priorities for surveillance and research, and evaluate management strategies that could mitigate population-level impacts and geographic spread of priority wildlife health threats. The approach to this project includes assembling working and advisory groups, synthesizing literature on known wildlife health threats, and surveying wildlife health professionals and wildlife agencies in the Northeast. Information from literature searches and survey results will be summarized to generate a succinct wildlife health section for the 2025-2035 Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan, with a focus on actionable content.

ENVIRONMENTAL DNA (eDNA) ANALYSIS REVEALS PRESENCE OF CHYTRID FUNGUS AND RANAVIRUS DETECTED IN THE SOUTHERN END OF MICHAUX STATE FOREST, PENNSYLVANIA

Amphibians can experience population decline due to infectious diseases such as chytrid fungus -*Batrachochytrium dendrobatidis* - (Bd) and ranavirus -*Iridoviridae* - (Rv). Environmental DNA (eDNA) techniques, in conjunction with qPCR, quantify pathogen DNA in aquatic environments. Our objective was to detect and quantify Bd and Rv eDNA, via a multiplex qPCR, from vernal pools in the southern end of Michaux State Forest, Pennsylvania. We collected 33 water samples (~500 mL) from 16 pools in April, May, and August (2022) and March 2023. In the lab, we filtered water (409.5 ± 16.5 mL) through a cellulose nitrate membrane ($0.2 \mu\text{m}$) within 3.5 h of collection. We stored membranes at -80°C until DNA extraction. We extracted DNA from membranes using the DNeasy PowerSoil® Pro Kit (Qiagen) according to manufacturer, except for extended vortexing step (2.5-hour). We used a pre-established multiplex qPCR for Bd and Rv DNA quantification. Our results indicate Bd positivity rates of 18.75% in April and 0% for May August and March, whereas Rv displayed 0% in March and April, 8.3% in May, and 20% in August. We observed 301.9 ± 105.7 Bd copies/dL and 9.1 ± 8.6 RV copies/ μL . Concentrations of Bd were slightly higher compared to previous results in western Pennsylvania, whereas Rv concentrations were similar to previous findings in other areas of the United States. This study is a step forward to refine and broaden biomonitoring approaches, at a landscape scale, in Michaux State Forest and potentially other regions in Pennsylvania. Future efforts should additionally use metabarcoding for amphibian species detection to gain deeper understanding of pathogen/host/disease dynamics.

A CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK TO PREDICT ACIDIFICATION IN PENNSYLVANIA HEADWATER STREAMS

Surface water acidification is a process characterized by increasing concentrations of hydrogen ions (H^+), which lowers the pH of waterbodies. Acidification is a major stressor in Pennsylvania, with abandoned mine drainage and atmospheric deposition most often to blame. Numerous aquatic species of greatest conservation need (SGCN) are negatively impacted by acidification. Underlying geology, roads, land cover, abandoned mine lands, and wetlands are the major landscape variables that determine a watershed's susceptibility to acidification. This conceptual framework can be used to prioritize restoration of SGCN and increase the availability of cold water refugia across Pennsylvania.

HARE TODAY, GONE TOMORROW: RECENT SNOWSHOE HARE RANGE CONTRACTION IN PENNSYLVANIA

The range of the snowshoe hare (*Lepus americanus*) has been contracting northward along its southern boundary over the last century. In Pennsylvania, winter temperatures and snowfall have been identified as key drivers of this range shift; changes in the distribution of hunter harvests in the late twentieth century show a northward contraction to the coldest regions of the state, and spatial variation in snowfall has been found to explain snowshoe hare site occupancy in these areas. In 2023, we used occupancy modeling based on presence-absence data from tracks and fecal DNA to model current snowshoe hare occupancy across northern Pennsylvania, with a goal of assessing whether range contraction had continued as predicted based on occupancy data collected in 2004. The best model indicated that winter snowfall remained an important factor explaining snowshoe hare occupancy, along with the amount of surrounding forest cover and the proportion of that forest cover in the early-successional stage. Using this model to estimate snowshoe hare occupancy probabilities across the study area in 2004 and 2023 showed an overall decline in occupancy, with the total area with a $\geq 60\%$ predicted probability of occupancy declining by 86%. This contraction is occurring faster than was previously predicted and was not mitigated by increases in the amount of early-successional forest cover in the study area over the last two decades. These findings have negative implications for the persistence of snowshoe hares in Pennsylvania as the decreasing trend in winter snowfall is expected to continue.

The forum provided a great opportunity for discussion amongst stakeholders

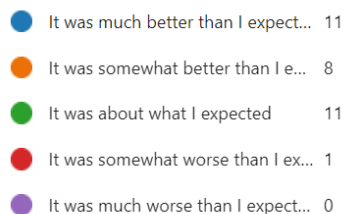
It would have been good to have clearer guidelines on what was to be discussed by each panel, I think there ended up being too much overlap

Networking was OUTSTANDING! Loved seeing so many folks working together!

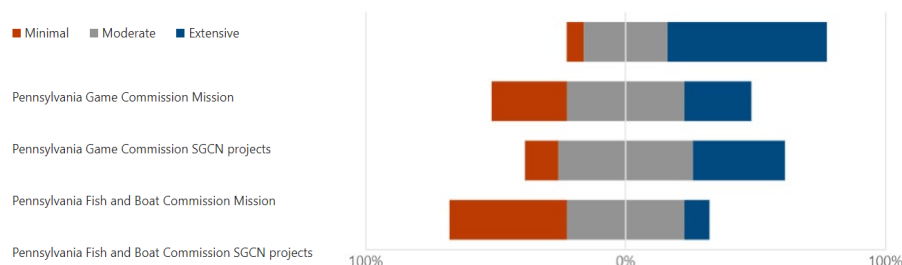

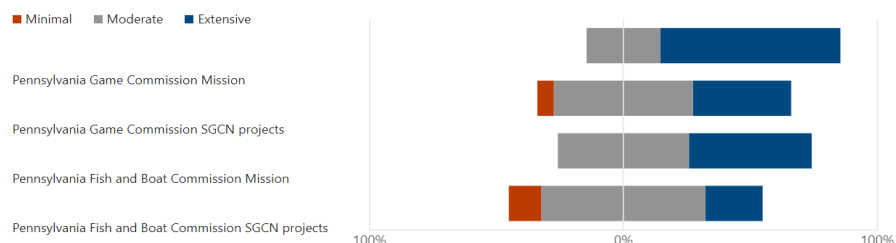

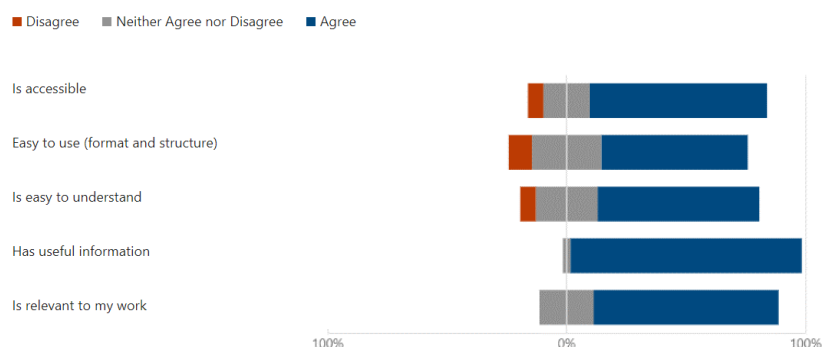

In NJ, it helps because it separates the portion of the WAP that is marine, vs. highlands, vs. pinelands, etc and turns them into separate SWAPs that are more relevant to people in each part of the state.

Continue to focus on species that are in decline, even if they are still common. I would love to have the human dimension aspects integrated more into the conservation piece. 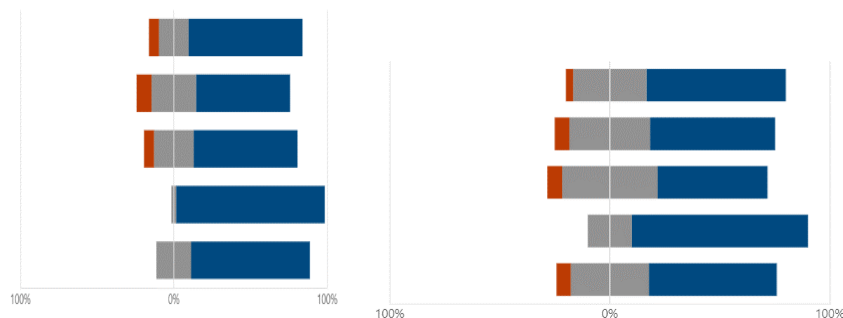
Very useable now.

Same as for the SWAP, the tool is accessible if you know where to look for it—more marketing and promotion is needed for greater public knowledge.
