## SESSION 1A: FROM CONFLICT TO COLLABORATION: STRATEGIES TO STRENGTHEN TENANT STABILITY



## SESSION 1B: LET'S TALK! DEMYSTIFYING THE REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION PROCESS

This session discussed how fair housing protections enable individuals with disabilities to request changes that are needed to for them to use and enjoy their housing. Panelists shared an overview of the reasonable accommodation process, focusing on how housing providers and tenants can work together to find reasonable solutions. #### **SESSION 1C & 2C: RACIAL WEALTH GAP SIMULATION**

Through this simulation, participants were supported in understanding the significance and repercussions of racial disparities perpetuated by various federally sanctioned policies. Participants gained insight into how these policies perpetuate systemic inequalities across various domains such as property ownership, education, wealth accumulation, economic mobility, among others, and exacerbate poverty within communities of color. Additionally, the simulation underscored the importance of addressing race, utilizing reliable data sources, and elevating the nexus between poverty alleviation and policy enhancement. This session was offered to two groups of attendees throughout the morning.

#### Learning objectives

- Participants will be able to break down barriers to engaging in conversations about economic policy, based on racial identity, and develop an understanding of the role policy plays in creating or removing barriers to opportunities.
- Participants will increasingly develop an understanding that racial inequities are not based on individual attitudes, rather they are structural at national, state and often times local levels.
- As awareness increases, participants will be able to support policies and strategies to redress structural inequities in various areas, but especially in housing and economic opportunity.

## SESSION 2A: IMMIGRANTS & HOUSING: NAVIGATING A CHANGING Landscape

This panel examined the multifaceted challenges facing immigrant communities in securing safe and affordable housing. These challenges include a fear of retaliation when reporting issues, a lack of knowledge about how to address housing concerns, technological barriers, increasing income requirements, and a lack of affordability, as well as language barriers. Intersectional identities of immigrant households, including those with disabilities, those who have experienced domestic violence, and those with limited English Proficiency were discussed. Panelists highlighted the importance of supports and education for immigrant households, as well as training and relationship building with local landlords.

## SESSION 3B: DISABILITY CASE INVESTIGATION FOR ENFORCEMENT Professionals

This interactive workshop session covered the fundamentals of investigating housing cases on the basis of disability. Each year, the PHRC receives more disability-related complaints than any complaints on the basis of any other protected class. Participants in this session learned about the process of investigation, looking protected classes and acts of harm, using relevant proof formulas for cases, reviewing evidence, and investigating and writing up cases.
