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PSP and PennDOT Partner for “Operation Yellow Jacket”

Indiana, PA – The Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) Troop A, Indiana Station is partnering with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) District 10 for “Operation Yellow Jacket,” which will be conducted along Indiana County highways today, June 30, and tomorrow, July 1.

“Operation Yellow Jacket” is a program during which Troopers conduct speed enforcement from the vantage point of PennDOT highway maintenance vehicles. The Trooper in the PennDOT vehicle then communicates observed violations via radio to nearby Troopers who are on patrol. This program, which has been in place for several years across Pennsylvania, allows our agencies to work together to keep our highways safe for everyone, including emergency responders and highway maintenance workers.

During “Operation Yellow Jacket,” Troopers will be posted at a select location or locations and will be focused on conducting speed enforcement and enforcement of Pennsylvania’s Move Over Law. Pennsylvania’s Move Over Law requires drivers approaching an emergency response area who are unable to safely merge into a lane farther away from the response area to “pass the emergency response area at a speed of no more than 20 miles per hour less than the posted speed limit and reasonable for safely passing.” An emergency response area is where an emergency vehicle has its lights flashing, or where road crews or emergency responders have lighted flares, posted signs, or try to warn travelers.

The Move Over Law aims to save lives of emergency responders. Day and night, regardless of weather and traffic conditions, police officers, firefighters, emergency medical services personnel, tow operators, and highway maintenance workers perform various duties along our roadways, often placing themselves at significant risk of harm while serving others in need. Please help us to keep our highways safe for everyone by slowing down and/or moving over when approaching an emergency response area.

The Move Over Law also requires that drivers passing a disabled vehicle, if it is possible to do so, pass in a lane not adjacent to that of the disabled vehicle; or, if that is impossible, illegal or unsafe, pass the disabled vehicle at a rate of speed that is no more

than 20 miles per hour less than the posted speed limit and reasonable for safely passing the disabled vehicle. Disabled vehicles are covered by the Move Over Law when they display at least two of the following markings: vehicular hazard signal lamps, caution signs or other traffic control device, or road flares.
